## Big Lake State Park moving forward with improvements

Big Lake State Park in Big Lake, MO, hosted an open house on Wednesday, Jan. 14, at the park headquarters. Missouri State Parks District Supervisor Jack Winburn, Northern Parks District, of Brookfield, MO, was present to explain to the public how newly funded projects will improve and expand the facilities at Big Lake State Park. During the 2013 legislative assembly, \$800,000 was appropriated to the park for improvements in 2015.

According to Winburn, bids are going out for eight camper cabins that will replace the cabins destroyed in the devastating 2011 flood. These cabins will have an axle with the capability to hook onto and move to high ground in the event of a flood. Each cabin will be skirted and will have electricity, air conditioning, heat, a small kitchen and shower. All eight cabins will be easily accessible, with two of the cabins being Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant. The cabins are slated to be available for rent in the summer of 2015.

Two new shower houses will be installed this spring. The main shower house will replace the existing one at the north end of the campgrounds and a smaller shower house will be located at the south end of the campgrounds. These facilities will be structures made completely of concrete to allow for power wash cleanup in the event of flooding. A concrete vault toilet will be installed on Boy Scout Island.

The flood in 2011 wiped out the playground south of the swimming pool. In 2015, that playground will be replaced and a second playground will be set up just north of the campgrounds.

Ten of the electrical sites in the campground will be replaced with 50-amp hookups. The other flood-damaged electrical pedestals were replaced before reopening the park in 2014.

Winburn pointed out that an additional \$600,000 has

math of the 2011 flood. Demolition of the motel, dining lodge and cabins was included in that cost. Replacing the sewer system at the park and swimming pool repairs also took part of that money. The remainder of the \$600,000 was spent on park and campground cleanup, including the removal of approximately 1,500 dead or damaged trees, the removal of several feet of silt from the park and the reseeding of 70 acres of park grounds.

In addition to the extensive park renovations, the Missouri State Parks has joined forces with the Big Lake Improvement Association and plans on utilizing the Association's facilities for guests' reunions, receptions and other group gatherings.

According to Big Lake Improvement Association spokesperson, Steph Miller-McCann, the Association and Missouri State Parks are looking forward to working together on upcoming events in 2015 such as a cardalready been spent on Big Lake State Park in the afterboard regatta, a 5K fun run, cleanup projects and more.

## MoDOT reports "Tough Choices Ahead" for state's highways and bridges

outlined its plan for taking care of roads and bridges with a severely reduced construction bud-

"Missouri's 325 System" calls for MoDOT to focus its limited resources on approximately 8,000 miles of Missouri's 34,000-mile state highway system. The 8,000 miles make up the state's primary roads and are the highways that connect cities across the state.

The department will use its annual construction budget which is expected to drop to \$325 million in 2017 - to keep these primary roads in the good condition they are in today with maintenance and rehabilitation work such as overlays and bridge replacements; however, enhancements such as interchange improvements or road widening will not be possible.

The remaining miles of roads and bridges will make up the state's supplementary system and will receive only limited routine maintenance. That means MoDOT crews will do the best

"State and federal fuel taxes provide the bulk of revenue for transportation in Missouri, but that funding source is no longer adequate," Nichols said. "That's because cars have become more fuel efficient; the fuel tax rate has not increased in almost 20 years, while the cost of doing business continues to rise; and inflation has decreased today's purchasing power by more than 50 percent.'

Nichols said MoDOT has done all it can to put as much money as possible toward roads and bridges.

"We've reduced staff, facilities and equipment and directed the savings to roads and bridges," Nichols said. "Without additional funding, though, we're now faced with having to reduce services as well.'



Gage Rosier is a 2010 graduate of Mound City R-2. He received a bachelor degree in History from Northwest Missouri State University (NWMSU) in the





The Fortescue Special Road District has not received a filing for the open three-year board member position.


