"Professional development makes us better as a school," added Eaton. This schedule would allow entire days to be spent in the pursuit, ideally to start and finish a project in a day."

With a couple exceptions, there seems to be very few contests in Holt County in which voters can exercise their right to vote on the 'best candidate'. Given that most of the school board and city alderman positions are minimally filed for, can one assume that people just don't really care anymore, are people just too busy or does no one want to help make the communities better because they know they only get to hear how bad a job they are doing? Whatever the reason, at the filing deadline on Tuesday, January 18, most contests throughout the area towns present no contest.

One exception to the aforementioned apparent apathy is the three-person race for the position of Craig mayor. Candi Whetsel, Bob Lawson and Betty Jackson have each filed to fill the vacancy left by past mayor, Mike Whetsel, who passed away last fall. Currently, the position is being filled by President of the Council Board, Paula Stone.

Additionally for Craig, vacancies in three ward positions see Karen Miller, in-

in the North Ward; and in the South Ward, Charmaine Flint and Ken Kolthoff are in contention for the two-year term seat vacated by Nina Gardner and David Nowling, incumbent, is running unopposed for the one-year term

There appears to be no race in the Mound City Board of Aldermen race. Duane Nauman and Stan Seitz, Mound City councilmen, have both chosen not to file for reelection. Jason A. Biermann has filed for candidate as South Ward Alderman and Kristine D. Gibson has filed for North Ward Alderman.

In Oregon, two alderman seats are open. Steve Rogers, incumbent, is seeking reelection for West Ward Alderman and Richard Wilson is seeking to fill the seat for East Ward Alderman, replacing Troy Cotton who did not seek reelection.

Also on the ballot for April will be a tax levy increase measure for Oregon voters to consider. The city of Oregon is asking voters for approval

cumbent, running unopposed of a \$0.0699 increase in tax levy on \$100 valuation. The tax rate, which in previous years had been at \$1.00, was lowered to \$.9301, and now with rising costs, the city feels it necessary to raise the levy to cover costs.

Maitland will see four uncontested races in April's election. The incumbents seeking reelection are: Mark Russell, mayor; Shirley Markt, tax collector; Charles Carpenter, North Ward Alderman; and Ed Dearmont, South Ward Alderman.

Graham has two alderman seats looking to be filled by incumbents Jacob Rauch, South Ward Alderman, and Jim Jones, North Ward Alderman.

Skidmore has two alderman positions that remain open. Jeff Dearmont's twoyear term East Ward Alderman position and Tina Gladman's two-year term West Alderman position remain open, with no one having filed for either position. Lee Dearmont filed as the incumbent for the one-year term West Alderman position.

KyRyein's mother, Rachel, had always wanted KyRyein to have long hair, so, even prior to KyRyein's decision, had let KyRyein's hair grow since her first haircut in November of 2004. In recent months, KyRyein had indicated her desire to get her hair cut short and so the date was decided. KyRyein's younger sister, Kishia, who is in first grade, had been hoping that her hair would also be long enough to donate. Like KyRyein, Kishia has had only one haircut when she was three years old. We had an extra house (the old original one) that we used for the hired hand and family to use. When we didn't need one, Dad would let some outof-work family live there for free as long as they'd take care of it. I remember when Mom was baking, she would send us kids up with a pie, cake or part of a meal. We were always finding extra clothes for them, if needed, and sharing potatoes and extra canned foods with them too. When we butchered, they would get a share, nothing wrong with all that. Now, with all the government regulation, Dad and others like him would probably be in trouble with Social Services, Medicare, Medicaid and political correctness, because it didn't matter to them which political affiliation they had, if any. 

Mountain lions (Puma concolor), also called cougars, panthers and pumas, were present in Missouri before pioneer settlement. The last documented Missouri mountain lion was killed in the Bootheel in 1927. The closest populations of mountain lions to Missouri are in South Dakota and a small population in northwest Nebraska.

Martensen added that MDC has never stocked or released mountain lions in Missouri and has no plans to do so.

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year. She reported that Holt appropriated County's elected officials are taking a conservative budgeting various offices funds, discretionary with expenditure requests holding steady and revenue projections generally flat to down.

At the close of the year 2010, cash resources were significantly diminished. The General Revenue Fund lost 47% of its available cash on hand, with a loss of over \$153,000 in one year, falling from \$323,114.19 on January 1, 2010, to \$170,020.45 on December 31, 2010. A series of fortunate circumstances kept the fund above \$100,000 at the close of the year as sales tax receipts rallied in the last quarter with a gain of December Use Tax gained \$17,465, over the same month in the previous year. Collector Billy Paul Sharp's gross receipts in November were up. Those, coupled with the settlement of the Golden Triangle Energy, LLC, protested taxes through the State Tax Commission ruling, added needed cash to the dwindling reserves before the close of the year. At times, the fund was under \$90,000, giving rise to concerns over the ability of the county to achieve payroll in the fourth quarter.

Overall, property taxes projected downward with the ailing economy. December receipts were up in the Collector's office, leaving little property tax funds to come in throughout the year, also reducing the penalties received. Those taxes listed as delinquencies are projected remain outstanding through the fiscal year. Sales tax revenues are projected at 97% of the actual collections in 2010. Earned Interest continues to be non-existent county's cash funds. Sales tax will likely be depressed going into the summer.

From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago - 1961

- The American Legion Post 121 was selling subscriptions to Capper Publications in order to raise money for folding wheelchairs and hospital beds.
- Keeling's was having a mid-winter fabric sale: drip dry cotton - \$.44 a yard; synthetic suiting - \$.66 a yard; and corduroy - \$.88 a yard.
- A new 4-H club was organized in the Craig bottom. Officers included: Linda Thurnau, president; Jimmie Ohlensehlen, vice-president; Karen Voltmer, secretary; Dianne Tubbs, treasurer; Donald Tubbs, reporter; Lynn Thurnau, song leader; Vicky Kent, game leader; Carol Holifield, Junior Council member; and Mrs. Irven Thurnau and Mrs. Charles Thurnau were community leaders.

25 Years Ago - 1986

- Of the 75 people who donated blood at the Kiwanis sponsored drive, 14 were first time donors.
- Mound City Troop 71 of the Boy Scouts held a Court of Honor with the purpose of presenting merit badges and rank advancements. Because 1985 was the 75th anniversary of Scouting in the United States, the troop took part in five activities that qualified them for special anniversary patches.





Mr. Dreyer said that while funding is earmarked for loans to socially disadvantaged applicants, loan approval is neither automatic nor guaranteed.

"Socially disadvantaged applicants must meet the same eligibility criteria as other applicants," Mr. Dreyer said.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens; have a satisfactory history of meeting credit obligations; have sufficient education, training or experience managing or operating a farm; possess legal capacity to incur debt; and be unable to obtain credit elsewhere.

The agency can make direct loans to applicants who are unable to get commercial credit or provide loan guarantees to commercial lenders.

Guaranteed loans may be made by any lending institution subject to federal or state supervision (banks, savings and loans, and units of the Farm Credit System). FSA typically guarantees 90 or 95 percent of the loan against any loss that might be incurred if the loan fails. Applicants can use op-
