The tentative plans will ideas are welcome. Plan to attend if you have the ability to add to the start of a new Craig event.


A new cookbook in the making for **Holt County Historical Society**

The Atchison-Holt Ambulance District's new ambulance building is in full use and has been since August of 2008.

The facility sports all new and much improved digs for staff on duty. Upgrades include a men's and women's bath, separate bedrooms and an all new kitchen area.

The new building meets all federal guidelines and includes one handicapped bath.

It is also designed to be more energy efficient and an emergency generator assures that the site should never be completely without power.

The new facility includes two larger bays to hold the new Dodge ambulance, which never fit in the Mound City building. Also found in the bay is a bio-hazard shower providing easy access to a wash in case of contamination.

Interstate access is also much improved, which is a centralized location for Holt County right off of I-29 at the Eagle's Nest Truck Plaza exit.

One two-man crew is regularly stationed at the new ambulance building serving Holt County.

Craig senior finds success in the vault

Imagine running with con- it." trolled and increasing speed carrying a 15 ft. long pole, dropping the end of the pole precisely in place and letting the inertia of the run ease your body into the air to a height of one and a half sto-

Will Haer, a senior at Craig High School, has been doing just that with great precision and much dedication. He competes in pole vaulting, a track and field event normally only seen during the spring track season in northwest Missouri.

Yet, Will found the ability to train and compete through the winter on an indoor track and field circuit that encompasses a national field of

Will has been competing in the pole vault for Craig High School since he was a freshman. A few years ago, he attended a track and field camp where he met the University of Missouri's All-American pole vaulter, Brian Hancock.

Brian gave Will some advice. He directed him to the coach that got him started, Todd Cooper. Mr. Cooper was currently coaching in Excelsior Springs, MO, and Will started training with him about one and a half years

Will is dedicated. Not only did he make the choice to give up basketball for this winter, but he travels to Excelsior Springs, a two hour drive, once or twice weekly to train with his coach.

"It's the only thing I plan to do in college, so I thought I'd keep working at it," Will said about training specifically for this event. He was quick to point out, "it's a talent God gave me, so I should keep at

The training and dedication is beginning to pay off. Will has competed in three meets so far this indoor season. He has taken first in his last two meets and has a few more meets to go before the season ends around the first week of February.

The meets are not local, with the closest ones having been in Kansas City, MO; Lincoln, NE; and Manhattan, KS. The meets remaining this season are farther away and Will commented that although he is eligible for a national meet, he won't travel that far.

At a recent meet held at Kansas State University, Will reached an all-time best of 15 feet, almost two feet higher than his state title vault.

His season's best vault ranks him first in Missouri and 18th in the nation, a ranking that has earned him an Elite team national ranking on www.milesplit.us and brought the eyes of college recruiters to attention.

Yet, Will keeps shooting higher. He pointed out that if he could hit 16 feet, it would move him into the very top rankings of the nation and he's not far from it. In training, he's made vaults only lacking an inch of clearing 16

Will has seen success in the past, as a sophomore he took third in the state track meet and he took the state title with a vault of 13 feet as a junior. He will continue to compete for Craig High School this spring in the regular outdoor season.

With an old (1987) Missouri State 1A pole vaulting record, maybe we'll see a new state record this year with Will Haer's name attached.

Careful planning by the elected county officials assures the fund will remain solvent in this time of difficult economic forecast.

The Road and Bridge Fund closes the fiscal year with the highest cash balance since 1999 at \$322,209.97, mostly due to FEMA funds that are allocated to roadway and structure repairs from the last two flooding events. Road and Bridge Fund has two partner funds, Local CART and State CART, each fund settles the year end with positive gains, though the county spent more than \$360,000 on CART rock and patch gravel in 2008. Due to the ice storm and winter weather, county

New Sheriff Scott Wedlock takes over the funds with minor adjustments in revenues and spending. Johnson Grass and Senior Citizens Services funds remain stable with minor growth for the Johnson Grass Fund with an increase in the property tax levy for 2008 from 0.02 to 0.04. The fund should gain approximately \$12,000 for increased operating costs in fuel and chemicals. The Senior Citizens Services Fund has increased expenditures to allow for property tax funds to be distributed into the community to assist seniors.


New to the budget this year is the Local Emergency Planning Commission Fund (LEPC). This fund has been part of General Revenue for many years; however tracking of the grant revenues and expenditures has been difficult. The fund stands on it's own in the 2009 Budget with the Commission and LEPC agreeing to a beginning balance of \$6,500 transferred from General Revenue. The CDBG Fund may see action again in 2009, as the commission is seeking bids to build a courthouse annex building to house the Health Department and University Extension offices.

Overall the county funds are stable, reflecting little overall growth in a recessionary atmosphere. Due to diligence on the part of the elected officials and the county commission, they have ensured that the funds continue to preserve balances and allow the county to provide necessary services for the citizens of Holt County. Cost cutting measures may be necessary in 2009 if revenues fail to meet projections. With a watchful eye on state and federal reimbursement payments, sales tax revenues and property tax delinquency rates, the county government as a whole will choose a course that best meets the needs of Holt County's citizens using the resources and funds avail-



1 cup granulated white sugar 2/3 cup pumpkin puree (not pie filling)

1 teaspoon lemon juice 3/4 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

2 teaspons cinnamon

1 teaspoon ginger 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup chopped pecans Filling:

1 cup powdered sugar

2 small packages of cream cheese, softened 4 tablespoons softened butter or margarine 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cake Instructions: Beat eggs on high for five minutes. Gradually beat in sugar. Stir in pumpkin and the lemon juice.

Sift together the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg and salt. Fold into the pumpkin mixture. Prepare a 15x10x1 inch baking pan by greasing and sifting

flour over the pan. Pour in the mix and bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until the top springs back when pushed on.

Filling Instructions: Make filling by beating together sugar, cream cheese, butter or margarine and vanilla. Loosen cake from the pan and turn out on a paper towel

To further sort out value, one should estimate the value of the yield protection traits. For example, if we have a drought resistant hybrid and compare this to one with a more extensive root system, both may have the ability to provide a more consistent yield under less

just the traits of hybrids. The trait value can be easily identified when a particular trait is used to replace another cost. For example, the cost of a pest control application can be used to identify the value of the corn hybrid trait that controls the same pest. The cost used would be product, application and also the percent control as control rarely is one-hundred percent. This cost could be substituted into a partial budget showing the savings from using this trait rather than purchasing the control application to control the pest.

By examining the value of lem is to compile a list of traits, one should consider corn hybrids which have savings, reduced risks, reduced trips over the field, and on the value of knowing the pest is controlled and so forth. Some will be calculated as costs and others savings. Some traits result in increased income and yield protection.

Also, seed costs and value of traits should be converted to a per acre basis. Use your planting population to arrive at costs per acre.







A one-day institute for stocker and backgrounder operators from Missouri and neighboring states is set for Thursday, February 19, 2009, in Harrisonville,

"Missouri is an ideal location for stocker and backgrounding operations because we have an abundance of pastureland and easy access to the Midwest Corn Belt and the Great Plains cattlefeeding belt," said Craig Payne,

University of Missouri Beef beef veterinarian with the University of Missouri Commercial Agriculture Program. By presenting the latest research and state-of-the-art practices, the conference can provide participants with tools to improve the efficiency and profitability of their operations, Payne said.

Speaking during the morning sessions will be two MU Extension beef specialists: economist Joe Horner will present a talk titled "Making money with calves without losing your shirt" and nutritionist Justin Sexten will

discuss nutritional management for cattle during the receiving

In the afternoon, veterinarian Mike Nichols of Pfizer Animal Health will talk about disease dynamics and how to reduce disease challenge. Shaun Sweiger, a veterinary consultant from Edmund, Okla., will discuss treatment protocols for bovine respiratory disease and using data to monitor the effectiveness

Highlighting the institute will be Tom Gallery of the Gallery Ranch in Dewey, OK, which won the 2007 National Stocker Award in the backgrounding/drylot division. Gallery will discuss his

operation with an emphasis on how alliance-formation and realtime data management played a role in the success of his ranch.

Horticulture tips from University of Missouri Extensionby Tim Baker, Horticulture Specialist, Daviess County

Terrariums are a popular way to grow plants indoors, but after a number of years, the plants inside may overgrow the terrarium and you will need to start over. Before replanting, be sure to wash the container in hot, soapy water. Use new, fresh, sterilized soil and disease-free plants to get your new planting off to the best start.

Winter Cactus Care

During the winter, cut back on the amount of water you give your cactus plants. Water them only enough to avoid shriveling. They should be placed in full sun, but where the temperature will not exceed 65 degrees. Night time temperatures should be around 40 to 50 degrees. This will allow them to go semi-dormant, just like they would experience in their natural environment.

Freeze-Thaw Cycles

Warm winter days followed by cold winter nights create a freezing and thawing cycle that can actually push your small perennial plants right out of the soil. Be sure to check them frequently, and push them back down firmly if you see this occur. Be sure to cover with at least two inches of organic mulch to insure this doesn't happen again.

Holt County bridges slated to be repaired

The Safe and Sound non Creek Bridge program will improve 802 of MoDOT's bridges across the state by October 31, 2014. Included in this program of improvements over the next five years are 13 Holt County bridges.

In the Northwest District, 155 bridges will be rehabilitated or replaced. Some of these bridges will be completely replaced with new structures, while others will receive new bridge decks and possible improvements to other bridge structural components. Due to the large amount of bridges in the Safe and Sound program, MoDOT is managing costs by closing the routes during construction.

The date for bid letting and construction of each structure is still to be determined. MoDOT will be in communication with Holt County residents about the upcoming closures of each of these bridges as more information becomes available. Below is a list of the Holt County bridges scheduled for improvement in the Safe and Sound Bridge program.



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



Holt County Commission minutes

met Monday, January 12, with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner Don Holstine present.

After review, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to accept the minutes as written by County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel. The motion passed unanimously.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock appeared to discuss repairs needed at the Jail.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann joined the commission to discuss various road projects in the county.

Also joining the commission and Mr. Biermann were Krista L. Burnett, Martin Liles, Rodney Massman and Don Schwartze, all of Missouri Department of Transportation to discuss the potential closure of west Prairie Road in southern Holt County at a Burlington Northern and Sante Fe Railroad crossing. This project has been underway for nearly one year, with MoDOT taking the lead in negotiations with BNSF on installation of gates, lights and bells at the east Prairie Road crossing, which would become more active with the west crossing closed. Various safety concerns

The Holt County Commission at the east crossing must be addressed before the west Prairie Road crossing can be closed. BNSF has put forward a contract previously, agreeing to pay the county \$40,000 for the closing and associated repairs to the east Prairie Road crossing. Landowner Rodney Wales was unable to attend the meeting, though he has voiced his concern in closing the west crossing in the past. All in attendance agreed that BNSF can move to court action to close the west crossing, at which time, the county will no longer receive \$40,000, and the county will incur attorney's fees. Following discussion, MoDOT agreed for Mr. Liles to complete a survey of the roadway from T Highway to the east Prairie Road crossing, determining the grade and slope. BNSF has asked for this section to be paved by the county. The county has verbally agreed in the past to contract the work, but stipulates that the county cannot maintain asphalt after the project is complete. The county has previously agreed to widen the road and adjust the slope on the north side of the east crossing, using the funds made available from BNSF. MoDOT has agreed to about \$200,000 in cost for the safety gates, lights and bells. Commissioner Sitherwood states that BNSF must also cut back brush at the intersection that obstructs a motorist's view of oncoming trains, and that BNSF should allow at least 250 feet of view when parking trains on the side track at the

Being no further business. Commissioner Sitherwood adjourned the meeting until Tuesday, January 20.

The Holt County Commission met Tuesday, January 20, with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner Don Holstine present.

Treasurer Gav Quick appeared before the commission to give a six-month settlement of accounts report, ending December 31, 2008. The commission reviewed the document with Mrs. Quick.

Larry Kurtz, Oregon, approached the commission to voice his concerns over the potential purchase of GIS software for the county offices. Assessor Carla Markt and Collector Billie Paul Sharp joined the discussion. Funds have been allocated from the Assessor's Budget, Collector's Tax Maintenance Budget, 911 Budget and Road and Bridge Budget to pay for the system that will allow digital access to parcel maps, landowner records, right-of-way records, county bridge data, 911 house addresses, all county roads, streets and highways. The system will include up-to-date aerial photography and will be able to produce current plat books. Funds for this project, with the exception of \$5,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund, cannot be allocated for other purposes.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann joined Mrs. Markt, Mr. Sharp, County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel and the commission to further discuss GIS. Following discussion, Commissioner Holstine made a motion to hold a pre-contract presentation with Midland GIS, Maryville, MO, to review requirements to upgrade the current GIS system. Commissioner Gordon seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

At 10:00 a.m., Commissioner Sitherwood convened the 2009 Budget Hearing. County Clerk and Budget Officer Kathy J. Kunkel read the Budget Message and reviewed the funds in the budget document. Being no public comment, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to adopt the 2009 Budget and sign the Appropriations Order. Commissioner Holstine seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Rick Dozier, Local Emergency Planning Commission, joined the commission to discuss the transfer of funds from General Revenue to a separate LEPC Fund Budget. This has been accomplished in the 2009 Budget Document. The commission agrees to transfer \$6,500 to the LEPC Fund to set the beginning balance. Commissioner Holstine made a motion as such. Commissioner Gordon seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Mr. Dozier also asked for the use of office space in the former University Extension offices in the courthouse basement. The commission agreed to the use of space. Mr. Dozier reported the LEPC will hold quarterly meetings with the first one scheduled for Tuesday, April 3, 2009.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock reported that the boiler in the jail is leaking. Discussion was undertaken on the need for a water softener at the jail. The dishwasher is in need of repairs, and Mr. Wedlock felt that a softener will help the situation. The commission reviewed a quote for rent of a water softener and agrees to the monthly contract for the service at a rate \$47.50 per month.

Sheriff Wedlock reported that he has hired Lydia Campbell as the 911 Supervisor at a salary rate of \$20,800. Ms. Campbell will be in charge of the TAC Officer with MULES system, the recording equipment, scheduling of dispatchers.

Being no further business, Commissioner Sitherwood adjourned the meeting until Monday, January 26, at 9:00 a.m.
