Season yielding good harvest

The 2013 harvest is promising to be good, a welcome change for many Missouri farmers who weathered a drought last year that affected crop yields.

"We're looking better," said Jeff Geib, Golden Triangle Energy commodities manager. "The quality's looking good."

Craig, MO, farmer David Drewes agreed. "I'm happy with the yield so far."

Corn has yielded about 180 bushels per acre, according to Randy Altena of Craig Grain and Craig Supply. The soybean yield has averaged about 50 bushels per

The key to this year's harvest, particularly for corn, is drying time. Due to a late planting in

the spring and cooler weather conditions, the harvest has been delayed, and corn hasn't yet reached its peak moisture content, which should ideally be 15.5 percent, according to both Geib and Craig resident Travis Kent.

Kent, a furloughed worker with the U.S. Department of Agriculture who is now working on the family farm, explained that moisture content can be a deciding factor for a corn harvest. Based on the hybrid of kernel, drying time can vary, so some farmers will harvest the crop only to then store it so it can dry properly. Some farmers also use short-term methods to change the moisture content.

"If [the moisture content] is at 17 to 18 percent, you can use a fan to get it down to 15.5 percent," Kent said.

Wayne Flanary, agronomy specialist at the University of Missouri Extension, wrote in a recent news release that drying corn can be a tricky but necessary science.

"Some growers choose to field dry corn, [which allows] the moisture to decline," he wrote. "Field drying of corn is best balanced when judging stalk quality, which will ensure that the crop will remain harvestable."

"Last year the drought drove prices sky high," Geib said. "This year is a more normal

It's after harvesting the corn, and in some cases, soybeans, that farmers are tasked with the balancing act between supply and demand. If anything, the post-harvest triggers an economic chess game with farmers on one side, the government and the Chicago Board of Trade on the other.

The price for corn is dropping off, Geib advised, and since it's lower now than last year, farmers are holding their grain in the hope that the price will go up. Right now, the price is \$3 per bushel cheaper than last year.

"It's the economics of supply and demand,"

Until then, farmers are spending days and nights combining corn, augering it into trucks and storing it in grain bins. When the backand-forth on prices reaches an amenable point, those dedicated farmers can count on reaping the rewards for their work.

Foreign exchange students spend year in Mound City

Roanne Bonke, 17, and Janine Bludau, 15, sit side by side in the Mound City High School library, both a little shy, both giggling, both typical teenagers.

"I really like it here," Bludau offers.

"Me too," Bonke says.

Although they had never met before coming to Mound City, MO, for the 2013-2014 academic school year, the pair has a lot in common. When returning home, for example, neither will be returning to the houses they left. Bonke, who is originally from Denekamp, a city in the eastern part of the Netherlands, will be heading to a new house; Bludau, who's from Hoexter, a town near Hanover, will be returning to not only a new home, but also a new city: Karsldorf, in southern Germany.

When asked if they were homesick, however, the girls shook their heads, said "Nah." The only part of home they miss? The food.

Bludau, nodding in agreement, said, "I miss the black bread."

"I miss the health food," Bonke said.

Bonke and Bludau first signed up with Ayusa, a foreign exchange program, to attend school in the U.S. After creating profiles and writing letters, they were chosen by two host families in Mound City. Carolyn and Jason Hall are hosting Bonke; Kim and Donnie Ireland family are hosting Bludau.

The teens are happy to stay with their new, second set of parents and siblings. Bonke, who has a twin sister and an older brother in the Netherlands, now has a sister in ninth grade, Sydney, and an older brother, Drew. Bludau, who has a 13-year-old brother in Germany, has earned two more brothers, Justyn, 17, and Jacob, 6. Despite their expanded relationships, the girls strive to maintain a connection with their families in Europe. Text messaging, email and Skype dates help.

"I talk [to them] on the weekends," Bonke said. Bludau, luckily, is able to send and receive texts from her mom, though the time difference can be a challenge.

In the meantime, Bonke and Bludau are embracing the American teenage life: hanging out with friends, playing sports, driving around. Bonke has made her mark on the varsity volleyball team, and Bludau is a strong runner. In Germany, Bludau is also a talented break dancer, a skill that should serve her well at the Homecoming dance. "Yeah," Bludau agrees, blushing.

Bonke adds that the two are going Homecoming dress shopping in St. Joseph, MO, before the Oct. 18 Homecoming coronation. They are honorary queens this year.

"I'm excited," Bonke offers. "Me too," Bludau says.

Every store, whatever kind of business, usually had a couple outside and a few inside, but the best thing they used to have was a wide long set of steps out in front. On a Saturday night, the steps were usually full. In some locations, you'd be picked up for loitering. Of course in our up-to-date malls, generally in the center and handy to all, you can go and sit and drink and eat food as long as you want, but that's different.

The best example of recognizing the need for a good place for a few minutes or all day resting was in Hawesville, KY. child; Zech was charged with the sexual exploitation of a minor. Barnett stated he knew Daisy was under the influence of alcohol. He also admitted to the act and claimed it was consensual. Under Missouri law, however, when a person is incapacitated by alcohol, any sexual acts are considered non-consensual.

Nodaway County Sheriff Darren White, who felt the department put together a prosecutable case, tied up the investigation in a neat bow and passed it off to the prosecutor, Robert Rice. It was with Rice that the Coleman case stopped. All charges against the boys were dismissed.

Some believe that the case drew up short because of family influence, according to The is the grandson of Rex Barnett,

tative; the Barnett family also has close ties to prosecutor Rice. Both Rice and Barnett deny any favors or undue influence affected the outcome of the case.

As it stands now, the Coleman family, whose Maryville, MO, house mysteriously burned down last April, remains unsatisfied, frustrated and generally angry about the case. Although she has been going to therapy, Daisy Coleman has twice tried to commit suicide. Before leaving Maryville to move to Albany, MO, Daisy and her siblings were also repeatedly bullied. One girl even showed up to a dance competition wearing a T-shirt emblazoned with "Matt 1, Daisy 0."

The incident has marred both the Coleman family and the city of Maryville. The Colemans be-

Each county handles permits differently, according to Campbell. In Andrew County, Savannah Reporter writer Kenny Ragland investigated the sheriff's office's handling of permits; there, the office deals with more than 1,000 concealed carry permits. Holt County deals with about a third of that amount: 300, give or take.

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



MOUND CITY MEMORIES

Rodney O. Gibson, in a phone call and an e-mail, provided a wonderful history of the businesses on the south end of Mound City's Main Street in the 1930's. He attended Mound City School and quit to join the Air Force. His family lived on the corner of 7th and High streets and he moved to live in California in

Beginning at Davis Creek and coming north on the west side was Henry Bickel's Cafe. It was "full all the time". D.L. Warren's Machine and Welding Shop was next. Then there was a lean-to for storage of the new cars for the E.A. Pence Ford Garage that was located on the edge of the alleyway. On the 21st of March in 1935 or 36 there was a "whiteout" snowstorm, it was so bad that school children could not leave the school, and the lean-to fell in. Fred Rockwell owned the business later.

Next was the Lumber Yard and Al Arnold had his Shoe and Harness Repair on the south side of the building and Harold Robinson worked for him and

In later years, Garney Bowers Grocery located there. Gibson also worked at the bowling alley for Hap Hitchcock setting pins before the pin setters were in style. Next was the Phillips 66

On the east side of the street coming north from Davis Creek Bridge was Chris Young's Garage on the corner of 4th Street. He sold Chrysler and Plymonth autos. Clyde Thompson's mule shed was next, which later was Bone Orley's Auto shop. It was next to Gibson's dad's blacksmith shop, Gibson and Son, that was directly across from the E.A. Pence Garage. Idecker Garage was in the back; Pete Travis and Granville White worked there on tractors and autos and Gibson worked there for a time (with them giving him direction).

Next was a small building where Henry Bickel moved for a larger place for his cafe. On the south side of Carter's Store is where Bill Bahl ran a hardware store. Later Vaughn Moss did likewise. Mona Bickel had a beauty shop in a side entrance. Carter's Store had two sections: one for dry goods and one for groceries.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Peters, who owned and operated the business for the past 20 years, arrived at this sad decision because of failing health. Previous to their ownership, Mr. Peters managed the store for a number of years for the Schooler Bros. This leaves the sundry store operated by Mrs. Juanita Ware as the only business enterprise of this type continuing to operate in Corning.

25 Years Ago - 1988

- Mound City's Griffith Park was formally dedicated in honor of Hestherlynn Griffith and her late husband, E.K Griffith. The City Council approved the measure to dedicate the park, located at the north end of Nebraska Street, in appreciation of the contributions to the park and other civic activities by the Griffiths.



Quick draw lottery starts for waterfowl hunters

Missouri hunters may have more options when it comes to duck season this year. The Missouri Department of Conservation (DOC) has allocated more space for hunters, and the quick draw starts Friday, Oct. 18.

The DOC has allocated onequarter of all hunting areas in Grand Pass, Eagle Bluffs and Otter Slough conservation areas to be given to hunters who cannot make reservations and are unsuccessful in the twice weekly quick draw drawings, a lottery system that assigns hunters to prime locations with ADA-accessible blinds.

Hunters can register for the first drawing at Grand Pass starting at 12:01 a.m. on Oct. 18. Registration will close at 3 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 21. For Eagle Bluffs and Otter Slough, registration runs from 12:01 a.m. on Friday, Oct. 25, through 3 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 28.

After the initial drawings, applications will open from 12:01 a.m. on Friday through 3 p.m. on Monday for the following weekend. Applications for Tuesday through Thursday hunting reservations will be open from 12:01 a.m. Tuesday through 3 p.m. Thursday the previous week.

While hunters who participate Helping Hand Hoedown. in the quick draw ("poor-liners") are not always guaranteed a spot, they've secured 56.5 percent of hunting spots after reservation holders were no-shows. Poorline hunters are always guaranteed at least 20 percent of hunting spots.








On Friday, dubbed "Spirit Day," students will spend the morning building floats for the 2 p.m.

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
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

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

The proposed eral food stamp program. Missouri change would cause more than officials are now proposing that the 58,000 people to forfeit food stamp state government allow the waiver to expire, potentially to motivate beneficiaries to find work.

> Under the new proposal, the federal waiver for expanded food stamp coverage would only apply in counties that have an unemployment rate higher than 10 percent. Adults receiving benefits in the applicable counties would have three months to find a job that requires a commitment of at least 20 hours per week. Eligible adults can also enroll in a federally approved job training program. In counties where unemployment is less than 10 percent, adults can only receive food stamps for three months during a three-year

> Jeanette Mott Oxford, executive director of the Missouri Association for Welfare, said that the rule change would not be an effective incentive for the unemployed to find work.

> "Making people hungry does nothing to actually improve our economy in any way," Oxford said. "Hunger is actually a debilitator rather than a motivator when it comes to employment."
