The flooding of the Missouri River Basin has had devastating economic, agricultural and spiritual impacts on Holt County over the past several years. The Flood of 2010 caused irreparable damage to St. Peter's Lutheran Church, west of Craig, MO, and the Flood of 2011 finalized the decision to decommission the church building.

The trustees and congregation of St. Peter's Lutheran Church had to make the difficult decision, last year, to remove the beautiful stained glass windows and other items from the ruined building after floodwaters undermined the stability of the structure.

The church was established on October 22, 1876, and has spiritually served many generations throughout the decades.

The church building will be decommissioned as a place of worship in a short service on the front steps of the church this Sunday, October 30, at 2:00 p.m. The event, which is open to all, will be held rain or shine, and attendees are asked to bring their own chair if needed.

The congregation of St. Peter's Lutheran Church will remain an organized congregation, and will continue to worship at Concordia Lutheran Church in Mound City, MO, as members have been doing for the past two

USDA announces Disaster Assistance Sign-Up for 2010 crop losses

vice Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Eric Redden, announced that the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program enrollment for 2010 crop year losses begins November 14, 2011.

"Producers across the state experienced several natural disasters during the 2010 crop year that caused hardship and financial losses to many agricultural operations," said Redden. "The SURE program provides assistance to producers when disaster strikes, so I strongly encourage producers with 2010 crop losses to contact the Holt County FSA office to learn more about the program," he said.

To qualify for a SURE payment, the producer's operation must be located in at least one county that had a secretarial disaster declaration or is contiguous to a county with the designation. The producer must have suffered at least a 10 percent production loss that affects one crop of economic significance. Producers with agricultural operations located outside a disaster county or contiguous county are eligible for SURE benefits if they had a production loss greater or equal to 50 percent of the normal production on the

In 2010, ALL Missouri counties received a secretarial designation or were contiguous to a designated county.

To meet program eligibility

Holt County USDA Farm Ser-requirements, producers must have obtained a policy or plan of insurance for all insurable crops through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and obtained Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage on non-insurable crops, if available, from FSA. Eligible farmers and ranchers who meet the definition of a socially disadvantaged, limited resource or beginning farmer or rancher do not have to meet this requirement. Forage crops intended for grazing are not eligible for SURE benefits.



2011 FLOOD: FROM A PERSONAL PERSPECTIVE IN HOLT COUNTY

Historians will find a way to describe the impacts of the Great 2011 Flood in years to come. They will measure and discern from the lasting effects how this flood compares to the benchmarks of the past. In Holt County, Missouri, the people will draw their own conclusions and pass the knowledge down through generations just as we have done with 1952's and 1993's historic tides. There have been other notable floods, but none with such lasting strength and such devastation as we've seen with the siege of 2011. This flood will have a name: Corpstrina. Our children

will know its name and the

reckless administration and

policies that set this debacle in

motion.

The United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) sounded the alarm bells in late May of 2011 as it came to terms with high snow melt and unanticipated rainfall in the northern Rockies. Water was filling the vast reservoir system at such a heightened rate the storage capacity there would not hold it. Water would be released downstream in a deluge never seen in the United States. Communities along the Missouri River from Montana southward would see higher than normal levels of river flow and flooding was imminent. Holt Countians, being no recent strangers to flood woes, took heed of the warnings and began preparations. In a three-week period citizens packed up their lives, moving household belongings, equipment, livestock and pets to higher ground. Families rented homes, moved in with neighbors, family and friends, as electric and gas meters were pulled at their homes in the danger zone. Businesses closed. Workers became unemployed. Farm equipment and grain were moved at a rapid pace to rid the Missouri River floodplain of valuable assets. What couldn't be moved or saved were thousands of acres of planted corn and soybeans enjoying fertile ground and bright sunshine promising a bumper crop; the remaining homes, buildings and grain bins sat empty in a vast ghost town waiting for the coming tempest

Entire communities rallied to sandbag and fortify permanent and temporary levees to keep the water out. On hot, dry days volunteers stood alongside inmates, mission groups and National Guardsmen filling thousands of sandbags. Young and old worked on 52 miles of levees that make up Holt County's western border between prime farmland and the Mighty MO. Dirt and rock were hauled in to armor the earthen levees as sandbags were stacked and great personal risks taken to save what the floodwater so eagerly gobbled up. One by one the levees succumbed to the water's great pressure. On the High Bank Levee and Levee #10 workers narrowly escaped tragedy when the levees failed not long after bedraggled workers had finally called it quits. Tragedy came with heart wrenching reality as daylight unveiled the vastness of the expanding flood and the speed with which it was submerging our county. Husbands and wives, farmers and their sons and daughters stopped and stared as a sea of waving blue and muddied brown replaced the endless green fields where we call home.

Holt Countians understand floods. We recognize that naturally occurring weather patterns bring rise to the Missouri River and occasionally create the potential for flooding conditions. This is a risk we are willing to accept and have done so for over 170 years. This flood is different and it falls on the heels of four preceding years of flood activity on the Missouri River in Holt County. It is this recurrent cycle, that seems so obviously tied to the management practices of the US Army Corps of Engineers, which we wholeheartedly question. Following enabling legislation to apply the Endangered Species Act to the management practices of the Missouri River, Holt County became a target zone for seasonal flooding. Burlington Northern and Sante Fe Railroad was forced to cease all operations as the main rail line was swamped for miles, shutting down coal trains and costing the company millions of dollars. Wildlife has been negatively impacted as thousands of acres of cover crops, four Missouri Department of Conservation areas and Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge were all victims of the water's invasion. Sand dunes mar once fertile fields, while deep gouges scar roadways and fields alike.

The deepest scars are with the people here. The moonscape left as the water has receded is often described as a war zone. In many ways the people here feel they've been through a war. Their sense of community is shaken. Lost are historic churches, neighbors are scattered and lives are forever changed. Tragedy rippled through our small towns when news that a 19 year-old National Guardsman was killed on his way home from duty in our county. There are only two federal levees in Holt County. Both have sustained heavy damage from the torrent of water over the summer. Both levees have been on 24-hour patrol with USACE inspections daily. Over \$2 million has been spent to fortify these levees with sand, rock, trucking and heavy equipment. Large pumps have been in use for months in an effort to keep seep water on the protected side at a low level. Rock dikes were constructed on the levees to help maintain the integrity of the levee system. Rock trucks backed down the top of the levee with up to ten feet of water on the river side to dump rock – even at night. This is a dangerous job, but necessary to keep the levee from failing. We've been imprinted with scars just like the land. Throughout this tragedy the USACE inquired by letter to landowners asking: Wouldn't they like to sell their ground to the Corps now? This is magnified in Holt County, but certainly those flooded in North and South Dakota are equally calling for change along with Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri. Common sense must have a role in guidance of the river. We concur with the governors of the impacted states that flood control must become the number one operating purpose of the river with all other interests falling after that goal. Billions of dollars have been spent to fight the 2011 Flood and millions, if not billions, will be spent to remedy its damage. The people of Holt County recognize that if the policies and procedures governing the focus of river management do not move to flood control, our way of life will cease to exist. We cannot let this situation occur again.

It is time for the USACE to recognize it is a partner with local communities in the Missouri River floodplain and it cannot operate independently and without regard to the people who live and work within its boundaries. We must do our part and move forward together to develop a consistent levee system, setting back some levee structures from the channel and building a new, reinforced levee system that affords protection for our land and homes. Local knowledge of soil types and river characteristics is essential in building a levee system that will work for both the Corps and the local community. We do not have time for lengthy studies or congressional wran-

Last week we merely announced that a brush had taken place in the northern portion of Holt County, MO, between a small force of United States cavalry and a couple of hundred rebels. Since that, we have had the pleasure of a personal interview with Lieut. Tyler, who commanded on that occasion, and of seeing the prisoners who were taken.

On Friday last, Lieut. Tyler reached this place with his prisoners and took them on the steamer, Omaha to St. Joseph, where they will all be tried and, if found guilty, shot, as they richly deserve.

From Lieut. Tyler we learned that in command of fifty men of Capt. Booker's company, in the United States service, failing to connect with Col. (illegible) Regiment at St. Joseph, was ordered back to Rock Port to assist in organizing more forces in Atchison County. At an early hour on Friday evening, September 20th, while in camp, he was informed that he would be attacked before afternoon by 150 rebels under Capt. Ish. Civil War **Battle**

The first and only battle fought in Holt County was known as the Blair Lane Fight in what is now Benton Township south of Mound City. Some one hundred Missouri militia, under command of Captain Hooker from Andrew County, engaged a force of 150 Confederate troops. The militia passed through Oregon, and Daniel Kunkel, Jacob Markt and James Watson shouldered their shotguns and joined the forces at the Gibson farm north of Oregon. It was an ideal fall day, early in September, 1861, when they reached Blair Lane to engage the Confederate troops who had taken cover in the hills.

Captain Hooker led the advance and opened fire. After several rounds had been fired, the recruits were driven out of the hills and re-established their position on the west side of the lane in a hemp field where the commander gave orders to fire. Captain Hooker responded with a similiar order and a solid volley was sent out from rifle and shotgun. When the "smoke of the battle" had cleared away, the recruits had retreated from their position.

It was a bloodless engagement - no one injured or killed. Many of the Confederate recruits afterward enlisted in the Union Army.

The first man killed in battle in the Civil War west of the Mississippi River was Dr. William M. Quarles, Confederate, in the Battle of Boonville, June 17, 1861. It was the first battle of the Civil War west of the Mississippi River.

The first and only battle fought in Holt County was known as the Blair Lane Fight, in what is now Benton Township, south of Mound City. Some one hundred Missouri militia, under command of Capt. Hooker, from Andrew County, engaged a force of 150 Confederate recruits. It was an ideal fall day, early in September, 1861, when they reached the Blair Lane, to meet the "other fellows" in battle array, who were under cover in the hills.

Capt. Hooker led the advance and opened fire, and after several rounds had been fired, the recruits were driven out of the hills, and re-formed on the west side of the lane in a hemp field.

It was never learned who commanded the recruits, but there were many who concluded not to go south, but a goodly number afterward joined the Confederate army and quite a number enlisted in the Union army.

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



Basis of Accounting

The District's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; consequently, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenditures and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. Furthermore, the summary financial information is prepared in accordance with section 165.121, RSMo.

The accounts of the District are organized into funds or account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund or account group are summarized by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which include its assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from cash transactions, revenues collected and expenditures paid. The following funds are used by the District: Governmental Funds:

a separate fund. Special Revenue Fund - Accounts for expenditures for certified employees involved in administration and instruction. It includes revenue restricted by

the state for the payment of teacher salaries. Capital Projects Fund - Accounts for the proceeds of long-term debt, taxes, and other revenues designated for construction of major capital assets and all other capital outlay

Headed for the hills

The house of Cameron and Sharon Pope Corning, MO, is soon to be headed out of town and up to higher and dryer ground. The hard decision to relocate their home was made after floodwaters from the Mis-

souri River rendered them 'out of home' for the second year in a row.

"We liked it down here. It's a nice flat area," commented Cameron Pope about the couple's location in Corning. "It was always nice to be able to see what's going on around you."

The upper level of the couple's home itself did not have water in it in the floods of 2010 or 2011. According to Pope, the house had been built according to 1952 flood levels, but because the home was completely surrounded by water, the Popes were not able to stay in it. This year, they were forced out for over 100 days, in addition to suffering significant damage to the basement, garage, sheds, grain bins and vegetation.

"I've spent over 20 years keeping this place looking nice, and it's all gone," stated Sharon Pope about the condition of the property.

The Popes purchased the 1960's home in 1988, but Cameron has been farming in the community for over 40 years. The


The Popes are just one of several families who have left Corning with no plans of returning. At present, only three residents look to move back.

One couple, who had water just inches from getting into their main floor, has already moved back into their home. The basement, a greenhouse and other outbuildings on the property have damage and 8 inches of mud that needs to be removed. In addition to the mud, the wind storm that went through the area during the flood did significant damage to the greenhouse and the home's roof. The plan for repairs is underway, but the process looks to be long-term. For this couple, however, who has lived in Corning for 49 years, and who 'love it here', the hope is simply that the work is not futile.



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
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Senior night at volleyball brings tears
