Holt County property owners consider lawsuit against KCP&L

The issue of eminent domain and Kansas City Power and Light's (KCP&L) Midwest Transmission Project reads like a "he said, they said" case. A property owner, frustrated by the potential loss of his land, talks to a lawyer; the high-powered (no pun intended) company responds with vague statements and promises that it followed the letter of the law. So where does the stalemate leave resentful property owners and determined company muckety-mucks? One possible solution: endless delays to the proposed project, in this case the Midwest Transmission Project.

Norman K. Marion, the plaintiff in this potential case, received a letter informing him that the chosen path for the Midwest Transmission Project would cross through his Holt County property. Incensed, Marion first hired a lawyer in St. Joseph, MO, though he said the attorney was unable to accomplish much. As a last resort, he hired Denlow & Henry, a St. Louis, MO-based law firm that focuses exclusively on eminent domain and condemnation issues. (Eminent domain is the power of the government to take private property for public use by providing a fair-market value for it; condemnation is the legal procedure of eminent domain.) Denlow & Henry has successfully delayed a similar project in St. Joseph by four years, Marion said. Now Marion's hoping that the law firm can help him and his neighbors, one of whom will have his property bisected diagonally by the project.

The Midwest Transmission Project is a joint effort between KCP&L and the Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) to run a 345-kV transmission line from a Sibley, MO, substation to a Nebraska City Power Station just south of Nebraska City, NE. The two companies tracked the 180-mile line through a variety of paths, many of which were rejected. One such line that initially worried Holt County residents would have run west across the Missouri River and directly over private waterfowl hunting

areas north of the Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge near Mound City, MO. Luckily for Mound City residents and avid hunters, that proposal, one of 300, was rejected.

In order to pare down the myriad path options, KCP&L representatives held town hall meetings with concerned property owners and those that would live within 1,000 feet of the electric lines. Marion was one of those who went, but he came away feeling baffled.

"They're slick," he said. "They've schmoozed, conned, whatever [word] you want to use, us."

The problem, Marion said, is that answers are too vague and intended paths do not line up on the KCP&L website.

"It's just window dressing," he said.

KCP&L, however, has made efforts to consider property owners' concerns. A *St. Joseph News-Press* article reported that KCP&L received over 1,100 written comments from initial meetings in January that had more than 3,000 people in attendance.

"It's a credit to the process and a credit to the people coming out," the article quoted KCP&L project spokesman Bill Musgrave saying in reference to the company's dialogue with concerned property owners.

Essentially, KCP&L attempted to choose the least intrusive route. For property owner Marion, however, that decision just isn't good enough.

"We're not getting anything from it," he said. "Nothing, not anything, not one thing, not one kilowatt."

Marion has joined with at least three other property owners to protest the new line, though that number could grow after a scheduled meeting on Monday, Nov. 4, at 6:30 p.m. at the Nutrition Center in Mound City, MO.

Regardless of his concerns, Marion can sum up his feelings on the KCP&L matter simply: "I don't want the intrusion."

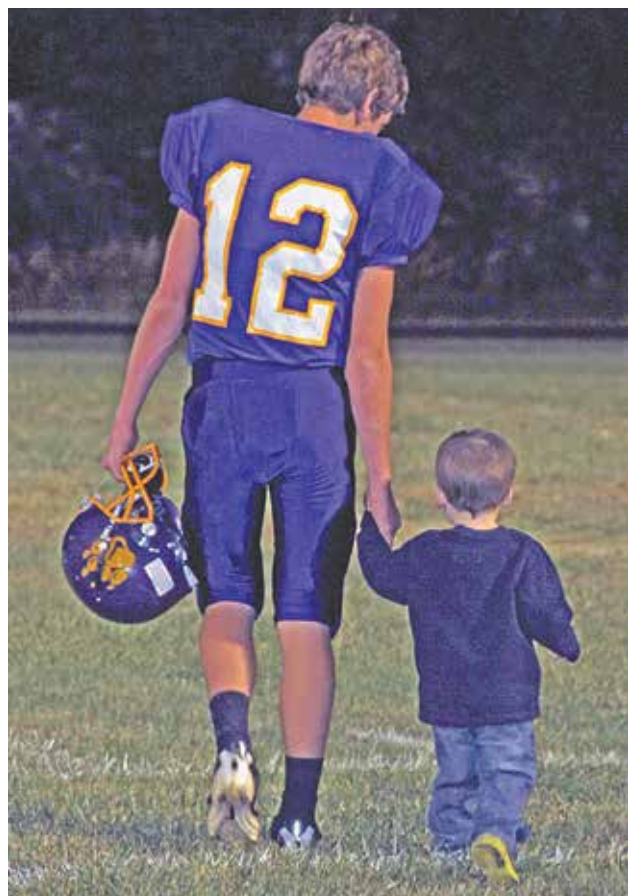
Cancer benefit dinner and raffle for Jennifer Jumps

Holt County Historical Society still turns up

The Holt County Historical Society (HCHS) copper still has been found. It went missing shortly before Saturday, Oct. 5, and was believed to have been stolen. Someone, in fact, had borrowed it.

HCHS has had the still since the Society's inception in the 1970s and used it during 1995's "Nostalgia Daze" as a working prop during a moonshine-making re-enactment. HCHS has used the still over the years and planned to display it at the 2013 Winefest.

As HCHS members prepared sellable items for the Winefest, they discovered the still was missing. They notified the Holt County Sheriff's office, and a deputy determined that someone must have broken into the building through a window as the door lock was secure.

Three weeks later, HCHS learned the still had been borrowed, not stolen. It has since been given back. Society artifacts that have been donated for preservation and safekeeping are not usually loaned.

Skidmore to erect new water tower

The replacement of Skidmore's aging water tower is in the works, according to the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments and Skidmore, MO, City Clerk Tisha Abrams.

With funding by the United States Department of Agriculture Office of Rural Development (USDA-RD) and the Missouri Department of Economic Development (DED), the city of Skidmore planned to construct an interconnection to the Nodaway County Public Water Supply District (PWSB)

No. 1. The reasoning behind the link, which has since been completed, is to allow Skidmore to construct a new water tower. The current tower was originally built in 1932.

Skidmore has accepted a bid from Phoenix Fabricators and Erectors, Inc. to construct the new tower. Ideally, it will be up and ready to use by next summer.

"We were hoping for 170 days [of construction]," Skidmore City Clerk Tisha Abrams said. "We're hoping for July or August."

Fifth annual "Me Market"

The fifth annual "Me Market" will be held on Saturday, Nov. 2. This year's event, which is sponsored by Community Hospital-Fairfax, MO, will be held at the high school gym in Tarkio, MO. From 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., the gym will be filled with booths offering a variety of wares as well as free and minimally priced health screenings.

There will be a Zumba class led by Tiffany Rhine at 10 a.m., and the hospital's auxiliary will be collecting stuffed animals to give to pediatric emergency room patients. Affordable Care Act aid available locally

In order to clear up any misconceptions surrounding the Affordable Care Act and to assist residents in enrolling in the new health insurance program, Northwest Health Services will be offering trained Certified Application Counselors (CAC) to provide unbiased, accurate information.

"We're trying to get some education out there," said Tyler Graff, outreach and enrollment specialist and CAC with Northwest Health Services. "It's here and takes effect in January. We

want to get everyone signed up and covered."

The primary goals of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) are to increase the quality of health insurance and to lower payments to make it more affordable. According to Graff, those that are not insured or are underinsured should be among the first to sign up for a plan that could offer lower monthly premiums with better coverage. Graff believes that farming communities with private health care coverage only are the most at risk and

would benefit from the ACA.

"There are very high deductibles [with just private insurance]," he said.

Since being introduced, the ACA has come under fire, most recently in Congress; congressional remarks point to the ACA as being the catalyst to the government shutdown. Those opposed to the new insurance plan have dubbed it "Obamacare."

Despite well-publicized problems with the website and the public's misunderstanding of what the ACA actually is — late night comedian Jimmy Kimmel exposed some Americans' confusion as to whether or not the ACA and Obamacare were the same thing (they are) — Graff thinks that it can only benefit residents of Holt County and sympathizes with others' frustration.

"Since day one, we've been prepping for it," he said. "[For] all the bumps and hiccups, we've been a part of it."

What is most notable and probably widely unknown, the ACA works with existing insurance policies, whether they are private, employer-provided, Medicare or Medicaid. Those unsure of how to combine existing insurance coverage with the ACA may log on to a virtual

shopping center, "The Marketplace," to input personal and financial data; consumers may then browse various health insurance companies and policies in order to find an appropriate plan.

Tina Whiting, a certified application counselor with Northwest Health Services, also points out that "one of the biggest changes that comes with the ACA is insurance companies will no longer be able to increase premiums due to pre-existing conditions, regardless of age... Patients not able to afford health insurance due to asthma, diabetes or even cancer will now be able to get affordable, comprehensive health insurance through a reputable provider."

Graff and Whiting will be available at Northwest Health Services in Mound City, MO, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 19, and Thursday, Nov. 21, to assist with filling out forms and navigating "The Marketplace." Appointments must be made in advance and should last approximately one hour. Should more people apply than appointments are available, Graff and Whiting will extend their services past the pre-determined dates.

Library updates with new computers

With financial assistance from the Missouri State Library Services and Technology Act federal grant program and local funds, the Mound City Public Library has acquired four brand new computers.

According to librarian Becky Poe, the new Dell Optiplex 3010 desktop computers feature four gigabytes of RAM memory, a faster processor, better graphics and 21.5-inch flat panel monitors. The new computers also have Microsoft Suite, which includes Microsoft Word, Excel,

OneNote, Outlook and PowerPoint.

"That's one of the big pluses," Poe said in regard to the new Microsoft software.

The previous computers were purchased in 2004 and 2006 and were ready to be replaced.

In the three months prior to the library's grant approval, 286 patrons used desktop and laptop computers. The new desktops may see even more visitors.

"So far people have been very pleased with the new computers," Poe said.

Last Passenger Train at Mound City Depot

In March, 1940, it was a "big day" in Mound City when the last passenger train traveled from Bigelow, MO, into Mound City! A large paragraph in a *Mound City News Independent* (21 March 1940) clipping includes, "A larger crowd than usual rode the train this last day. Some made the trip just because it was the last one. For the Louie Field children, it was their first train ride. Their father took them to Bigelow and left them to ride to Mound City. He and Mrs. Field met them in Mound City. Even the conductor waved back when they all said good-bye and watched the train go around the bend beyond the grain elevator". One of those Field children is now Delores (Mrs. Sidney) Smith of Mound City. Ask her what she remembers about the ride. It also states that freight trains will continue using the tracks. Ramona Shields will share the history of the rail line at a society program at the Legion Building in Maitland, MO, at 2 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, November 3.

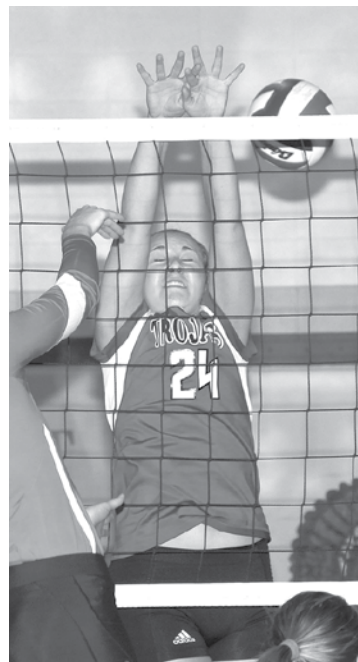

FSA reminds producers of upcoming crop reporting dates for forage crops and fall-seeded small grains

Holt County United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Allyson Wells, reminds producers that all 2014 perennial and biennial forage crops must be reported by Friday, Nov. 15, and fall-seeded small grains by Sunday, Dec. 15.

Wells said all 2014 perennial and biennial forage acres, such

as pasture acreage intended for haying or grazing, must be reported to FSA by the Nov. 15th deadline. All fall-seeded small grain acreage, such as winter wheat, barley and oats, must be reported by Dec. 15. For 2013, the reports will be accepted up until Dec. 16th as Dec. 15th falls on a weekend.

In 2012, FSA changed crop acreage reporting dates as the result of a combined effort of FSA and the Risk Management Agency (RMA) to make acreage reporting easier and

standardized for crop insurance and FSA purposes. All acreage must be reported for a farm, including crops on non-cropland, such as hayed or grazed grassland and other cover crops. Reporting acreage ensures producers are compliant with current and future FSA farm programs, including disaster assistance.

Craig R-3 gets heart smart

Jackie Martin, a registered nurse with Community Hospital-Fairfax (CH-F), discussed heart-healthy living with five freshmen at "Check It at the Door" at Craig R-3 on Tuesday, Oct. 29.

"Try to limit your [television and computer] time to two hours," Martin began.

"What about homework?" Jocelyn Clayton asked.

"Well," Martin laughed, "If you're on a [computer] screen for homework, it doesn't count. [Homework] is good for the brain."

Martin, working with Holt County school nurse Susan Lentz and Ann Schlueter, Director of Strategic Planning at CH-F, conducted a series of free health screenings to check students' cholesterol, blood sugar, blood pressure, body composition and analysis and height and weight. Ideally, each student would be in a healthy target range, but a few are prone to unhealthy habits.

"Genetics is huge," Martin said. "Genetics and environment."

Those that tested as less than ideal were given goals for the next assessment in the spring. More exercise, better nutrition and more sleep are all necessary, Martin said. Teenagers in particular are vulnerable to detrimental behaviors, such as staying up late and indulging in junk food.

"No one told me about [healthy eating]," Schlueter said during a discussion on proper snacks before sports practices. "I used to have Mountain Dew and a caramel donut... I wonder what kind of runner I could've been."

"Check It at the Door," which had its pilot program last year, was started after health professionals noticed increasingly high rates of heart disease in adults. By educating teenagers, Martin, Lentz and Schlueter hope that they can help others avoid an unhealthy path to adulthood.

"We're trying to establish better health habits," Martin said.

The next "Check It at the Door" health screenings are at Mound City High School on Wednesday, Nov. 20, and South Holt High School on Thursday, Dec. 12, for freshmen only. Blood work will be completed in the morning from 7 a.m. to 8:15 a.m. Discussions on nutrition and exercise and how they relate to the heart will take place during the second hour of the school day.

When the going gets tough, the tough get a new generator

The Mound City Water Department has invested in the first generator for the plant.

Randy Crowley, water superintendent and chief water operator, said that the Foley Caterpillar generator is really only meant to be used during times of emergency, such as when floods or tornadoes hit the area. The generator itself is actually rented; when a weather disaster occurs, the generator will be delivered, and the city may use it indefinitely until full power returns.

To ensure the generator would be compatible with the water plant's electrical system, Mound City officials used the water fund to pay for a \$9,000 service test from St. Joseph, MO-based Pinacle Electric.

"It works just fine," Crowley said.

The weekly rental rate for the generator, which runs on diesel fuel, and the necessary cables is \$2,250, according to City Clerk Patsy Smith.
