Holt County property owners consider lawsuit against KCP&L areas north of the Squaw Creek National Wildlife The issue of eminent domain and Kansas City

Power and Light's (KCP&L) Midwest Transmission Project reads like a "he said, they said" case. A property owner, frustrated by the potential loss of his land, talks to a lawyer; the high-powered (no pun intended) company responds with vague statements and promises that it followed the letter of the law. So where does the stalemate leave resentful property owners and determined company muckety-mucks? One possible solution: endless delays to the proposed project, in this case the Midwest Transmission Project.

Norman K. Marion, the plaintiff in this potential case, received a letter informing him that the chosen path for the Midwest Transmission Project would cross through his Holt County property. Incensed, Marion first hired a lawyer in St. Joseph, MO, though he said the attorney was unable to accomplish much. As a last resort, he hired Denlow & Henry, a St. Louis, MO-based law firm that focuses exclusively on eminent domain and condemnation issues. (Eminent domain is the power of the government to take private property for public use by providing a fair-market value for it; condemnation is the legal procedure of eminent domain.) Denlow & Henry has successfully delayed a similar project in St. Joseph by four years, Marion said. Now Marion's hoping that the law firm can help him and his neighbors, one of whom will have his property bisected diagonally by the project.

The Midwest Transmission Project is a joint effort between KCP&L and the Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) to run a 345-kV transmission line from a Sibley, MO, substation to a Nebraska City Power Station just south of Nebraska City, NE. The two companies tracked the 180-mile line through a variety of paths, many of which were rejected. One such line that initially worried Holt County residents would have run west across the Missouri River and directly over private waterfowl hunting

Refuge near Mound City, MO. Luckily for Mound City residents and avid hunters, that proposal, one of 300, was rejected.

In order to pare down the myriad path options, KCP&L representatives held town hall meetings with concerned property owners and those that would live within 1,000 feet of the electric lines. Marion was one of those who went, but he came away feeling baffled.

"They're slick," he said. "They've schmoozed, conned, whatever [word] you want to use, us."

The problem, Marion said, is that answers are too vague and intended paths do not line up on the KCP&L website.

"It's just window dressing," he said.

KCP&L, however, has made efforts to consider property owners' concerns. A St. Joseph News-Press article reported that KCP&L received over 1,100 written comments from initial meetings in January that had more than 3,000 people in attendance.

"It's a credit to the process and a credit to the people coming out," the article quoted KCP&L project spokesman Bill Musgrave saying in reference to the company's dialogue with concerned property own-

Essentially, KCP&L attempted to choose the least intrusive route. For property owner Marion, however, that decision just isn't good enough.

"We're not getting anything from it," he said. "Nothing, not anything, not one thing, not one kilo-

Marion has joined with at least three other property owners to protest the new line, though that number could grow after a scheduled meeting on Monday, Nov. 4, at 6:30 p.m. at the Nutrition Center in Mound City, MO.

Regardless of his concerns, Marion can sum up his feelings on the KCP&L matter simply: "I don't want the intrusion."

Despite well-publicized problems with the website and the public's misunderstanding of what the ACA actually is — late night comedian Jimmy Kimmel exposed some Americans' confusion as to whether or not the ACA and Obamacare were the same thing (they are) — Graff thinks that it can only benefit residents of Holt County and sympathizes with others' frustration.

"Since day one, we've been prepping for it," he said. "[For] all the bumps and hiccups, we've been a part of it."

What is most notable and probably widely unknown, the ACA works with existing insurance policies, whether they are private, employer-provided, Medicare or Medicaid. Those unsure of how to combine existing insurance coverage with the ACA may log on to a virtual

shopping center, "The Marketplace," to input personal and financial data; consumers may then browse various health insurance companies and policies

Tina Whiting, a certified application counselor with Northwest Health Services, also points out that "one of the biggest changes that comes with the ACA is insurance companies will no longer be able to increase premiums due to pre-existing conditions, regardless of age... Patients not able to afford health insurance due to asthma, diabetes or even cancer will now be able to get affordable, comprehensive health insurance through a reputable provider."



Last Passenger Train at Mound City Depot

For the Louie Field children, it was their first train ride. Their father took them to Bigelow and left them to ride to Mound City. He and Mrs. Field met them in Mound City. Even the conductor waved back when they all said goodby and watched the train go around the bend beyond the grain elevator". One of those Field children is now Delores (Mrs. Sidney) Smith of Mound City. Ask her what she remembers about the ride. It also states that freight trains will continue using the tracks. Ramona Shields will share the history of the rail line at a society program at the Legion Building in Maitland, MO, at 2 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, November 3.



Jackie Martin, a registered nurse with Community Hospital-Fairfax (CH-F), discussed hearthealthy living with five freshmen at "Check It at the Door" at Craig R-3 on Tuesday, Oct. 29.

"Try to limit your [television and computer] time to two hours," Martin began.

"What about homework?" Jocelyn Clayton asked.

"Well," Martin laughed, "If vou're on a [computer] screen for homework, it doesn't count. [Homework] is good for the brain."

Martin, working with Holt County school nurse Susan Lentz and Ann Schlueter, Director of Strategic Planning at CH-F, conducted a series of free health screenings to check students' cholesterol, blood sugar, blood pressure, body composition and analysis and height and weight. Ideally, each student would be in a healthy target range, but a few are prone to unhealthy habits.

"Genetics is huge," Martin said. "Genetics and environment."

Those that tested as less than ideal were given goals for the next assessment in the spring. More exercise, better nutrition and more sleep are all necessary, Martin said. Teenagers in particular are vulnerable to detrimental behaviors, such as staying up late and indulging in junk food.

When the going gets tough, the tough get a new generator

The Mound City Water Department has invested in the first generator for the plant.

Randy Crowley, water superintendent and chief water operator, said that the Foley Caterpillar gen-

erator is really only meant to be used during times of emergency, such as when floods or tornadoes hit the area. The generator itself is actually rented; when a weather disaster occurs, the generator will be delivered, and the city may use it indefinitely until full power returns.

To ensure the generator would be compatible with the water plant's electrical system, Mound City officials used the water fund to pay for a \$9,000 service test from St. Joseph, MO-based Pinnacle Electric.

"It works just fine," Crowley

The weekly rental rate for the generator, which runs on diesel fuel, and the necessary cables is \$2,250, according to City Clerk Patsy Smith.

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
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
