

Patron Behavior Policy The Mound City Public Library has established certain standards of acceptable behavior on library property in order to maintain an atmosphere that promotes the use of equipment and the resources and services of the library, promotes the safety of the general public and library staff and protects the building and materials of the library. Any activity that is illegal, threatening or interferes with the rights or safety of library patrons or staff, which disrupts the normal functioning of the library or could result in injury to oneself or others or cause damage to the materials of the library is considered disruptive and may result in suspension of the privilege to use the library.

Internet Usage Policy



For dressing, mix: 2 cups mayonnaise







METHODIST CHURCH AT FORTESCUE DESTROYED BY EARLY MORNING FIRE

Anyone living in Holt County on December 7, 1952, will recall the day the Fortescue Methodist Church burned. Early Sunday morning, just months after the town was nearly destroyed by the flood of '52, residents were summoned to help fight a fire that started from a faulty furnace. Party line calls went out, "the church is on fire", and everyone around the county joined to help. The Fortescue community's fire fighting apparatus was out of town. It was not properly balanced and had been taken to the Emil Young repair shop to undergo repairs. The Mound City rural fire depart-



ment was the first to reach the town, followed shortly by the Oregon department. When the call came in, Alderman Dick Vest, in Mound City, realized that maximum help would be necessary to fight a fire like that so he ordered all the town's firefighters to take equipment and water and go. The St. Joseph firemen were the next on the scene, with a pumper and chief's car. There was no way to save the beautiful brick building, built in 1921 at a cost of \$85,000, that was patterned after the Methodist Church in Fairfax.

Note the cross, still standing, after the fire...it now is located on the present structure. The building is now property of the Holt County Historical Society. The society also has that original "fire wagon".

50 Years Ago - 1962

- The Forest City Telephone Company, now owned by the Oregon Farmers Mutual Telephone Company, has been recently converted to the dial system.
- Some 300 junior fire marshals in Mound City and Bellevue continued their safety campaign by making safety tags for Christmas trees being sold in the community. The program was sponsored by Cottier & McCormick Insurance Agency.
- Last week reported summer weather, with the blooming of spring flowers. This week it was ten below zero early one morning.
- Mound City played host to surrounding schools in the first annual College Day.
- The Bellevue school held the annual all-school Christmas program with the cantata, "Noel, Noel".
- Both Oregon teams won first place honors in the Mound City Basketball Tournament. The Panther boys' team took third place.
- Dick's Rexall Drugs advertised a complete set of electric trains for \$12.95, Steve Canyon jet helmets for only \$1.50, guns and holster sets for \$4.50, and dolls from 98¢ to \$5.00.

25 Years Ago - 1987

- A new regulation concerning the Hunter Education Program was to go in effect January 1. Anyone born on or after January 1, 1967, would be required to complete hunter education training.
- The Holt County Historical Society elected new officers for the upcoming year. Wayne Whipple was installed as president. Carolyn Kent presented to the organization a film donated by Dr. J. Bruce McRae. The film was of a minstrel show held in Craig during 1953 or 1954.
- Problems concerning cable television were discussed at the city council meeting. Rates for Evans Circle and the company's plan to delete channel 9 and add CNN were among the topics.
- The Nodaway-Holt Trojan girls' basketball team was the champion of the Mound City Tournament. The Tarkio Indians were the boys' champions.
- Associate Circuit Judge Tom Kennish spoke to the 7-12th grade Mound City students about the new DWI law. Students were informed of the different phases and effects that this new law could have on them now and in the future.

10 Years Ago - 2002

- Mound City 5 year-old, MacKenzie Bohart, and her parents enjoyed a three-day visit to Disney World, and a four-day cruise on a Disney ship. This was made possible though the Dream Factory.
- Site preparation work was nearly done and foundation work started for a new convenience store just south of Schoonover's.
- Mound City aldermen adopted a new ordinance to deal with dangerous buildings.
- The Squaw Creek Truck Plaza was scheduled to be sold on the courthouse steps in Oregon by James Counts, the St. Joseph lawer who is trustee for the Albert E. Richardson Trust.
- Kevin Owens, 37, Mound City, suffered a broken wrist, possible broken ribs and extensive bruising when the Yocum Service lime truck he was driving rolled over on Highway N near the Atchison-Holt county line.
- Eagle Days drew about 3,000 people to Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge.


Hurst is part of a family row crop farm. He raises corn and soybeans with his father, brothers, nephews and his two sons-in-law.








Lady Bulldogs fall to Pawnee City



"Each year we encourage farmers to try new things to raise their management level to increase their yields," stated Dale R. Ludwig, executive director/CEO of the Missouri Soybean Association. "It is our hope that producers across the state learn from one another on ways to increase their yields each year."

Ammonia application continues

The dry fall has led many tures moved to around 50 growers to apply fall nitrogen in the form of anhydrous ammonia. Soil temperatures have a direct impact on the conversion of fall applied ammonia to nitrate. The rule of thumb of waiting until soil temperatures drop to 50 degrees F is a standard, but the conversion from ammonia to nitrate will continue at 50 degrees and below.

Conversion only stops when the soil freezes. The rate of conversion slows dramatically but still takes place. Looking at the Graves weather station, the soil temin November, soil tempera-sion.

degrees. Soil temperatures from mid-November have bounced around 45 degrees well into December.

The speed of conversion can be predicted somewhat by using the application date and soil temperatures. In past years with wet springs, there has been the issue of nitrogen losses. However, while preparing for the next growing season, growers should remain flexible to manage nitrogen through the 2013 growing season.

There are many common-sense avenues to a healthy smile like brushing, flossing and visiting your dentist regularly. Here are a few secrets you may not be aware of:
