Letter to the editor

To The Voters of Holt County:

As the 2012 Election year approaches, it is time to prepare for the upcoming elections: the Presidential Preference Primary Election in February; the General Municipal Election in April; the Primary Election in August; and the General Election in November. This will be an active year. This is also the time when the 2010 Census figures are used to review the population in the county's various political subdivisions. Holt County has 4,912 citizens. There are 3,616 voters registered in Holt County at this time, with 3,412 considered active. After reviewing the census data and the registered voter numbers, it is apparent that changes are needed in our county's polling places.

As the Election Authority of Holt County, it is my job to determine the best locations for polling places that meet the needs of the voting population and to balance those needs with the increasing cost of elections. Under the current polling place system: Northwest #1, Craig, has 373 voters; Northeast #2, Maitland, has 368 voters; West #3, Big Lake, has 228 voters; Central #4, Mound City, has 1,181 voters; Southwest #5, Forest City, has 247 voters; and Southeast #6, Oregon, has 1,219 voters.

After discussing the situation with many of Holt County's voters throughout the county over the past year, I have determined the most cost effective solution is to redefine the polling place boundaries based on the school district boundary lines. That decreases the number of polling places from six to four with locations in Craig, Maitland, Mound City and Oregon. The polling places in Big Lake and Forest City will be closed.

Under the new system, 542 voters will vote at Craig Church of the Nazarene; 365 voters will vote at the Nodaway-Holt R-7 School; City Hall at Mound City will have 1,282 voters; and the TJ Hall Building in Oregon will have 1,427 voters. Craig will see an increase of 169 voters, mainly from the Big Lake area. Maitland will see a decrease of 3 voters, who will vote in Mound City. Mound City will see an increase of 101 voters and Oregon will see an increase of 208 voters.

Voters will continue to vote for all the issues and offices available in the past. The location of the polling place is the only change. The new polling places will be used starting with the February 7, 2012, Presidential Preference Pri-

As always, Absentee Voting is available by mail or in person at the courthouse for anyone who may not be able to vote at their assigned polling place on Election Day.

Coach from 2004 through 2006. He was a baseball coach in the Mid-Continent baseball league where he was the coach of his son's baseball teams. He coached youth basketball for the West Platte Youth Basketball program, coaching the teams for both his boys as well as his daughter. He also helped assist in coaching a traveling basketball team, the Midwest Mavericks, for his daughter, Amber. He was residing as the Vice-President of the Quarterback Club at West Platte High School.

Trooper Fred Guthrie was very outgoing and enjoyed meeting and visiting with new and different people. He had an enjoyment of life that will be passed on to his children. He had a love of the outdoors that included hunting, fishing, and trapping, all of which he enjoyed doing with his family and friends. He was very active in his children's activities and could always be heard at their sporting events cheering them on. There are several adults and children alike that are sporting a nickname handed to them by Fred. He was greatly loved and will be missed, but not forgotten.

are approved, or the grant application is null and void. The program has \$10 million available for fiscal year 2011, and priority is given to those levees that have Corps program funding.

Commissioners approved all grant requests and further underscored the need for CDBG grant funding to make repairs from this devastating flood.

County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel reported on the FEMA Individual Assistance program close-out she completed November 9. At this time, FEMA has helped 197 registrants with housing assistance totaling \$747,573. An additional 103 registrants have had other needs' assistance with \$10,926 issued. This program is funded in addition to flood insurance, homeowners insurance and other similar programs. Many of Holt County's families impacted by the flood have found that insurance payments are not enough to offset their property loss and out of pocket costs associated with the flood. Many applicants continue to appeal their claims; therefore additional assistance may be issued. Public assistance to rebuild roads and infrastructure on public lands is still pending.

Presiding Commissioner Sitherwood discussed the county's floodplain ordinance with the commission. Mr. Sitherwood is the floodplain coordinator; however the ordinance has not been modified in many years. Language in the ordinance identifies the Assessor of Holt County as the floodplain coordinator. Assessor Carla Markt turned over the position many years ago to the commission, and is not interested in resuming the position now. Under the ordinance, the county must complete Substantial Damage Estimates for every structure in the floodplain following this event. Mr. Sitherwood made a request to the State Emergency Management Agency for assistance in this matter. Mrs. Markt has agreed to provide the parcel data information and field survey notes in an effort to assist in the dam-Regional Council of Governments is also interested in the requirements through a cooperative agreement. Commissioner Holstine made a motion to accept he BCBS of KC with two options for enrollment by county employees: a \$2,500 deductible coverage at \$578.17 per person per month or a \$3,500 deductible coverage at \$532.52 per person per month. The county had previously agreed to cover \$500 per person per month for a health insurance premium; the remainder is the responsibility of the employee. Commissioner Gordon seconded the motion. Approved unianimously.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock met with the commission to discuss matters of his department including recent radio upgrades and the need for additional electrical work in the jail to meet ongoing needs and plumbing problems. Commissioners reviewed the jail departmental budget in general revenue and determined that some work should be completed before the end of the fiscal year if possible. Sheriff Wedlock agreed to make the appropriate contacts.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann shared with the commissioners requirements for the 2012 budget for road rock, corrugated metal pipe and lumber. Bids were planned for Monday, December 12. The location was recently redesigned for a pipe rather than a large bolt-together arch pipe at considerable savings to the county. Kunkel about a WebGIS program that would make the county's data layers accessible in various departments and provide limited data access to a public audience. Mrs. Markt anticipated utilizing the service as a subscription-based access point for realtors and title search companies. The 911 system and other county departments would have access to the data including house addresses, parcel ownership, roadway names and aerial photography.

Chad Higdon, Congressman Sam Graves' Office, met with the commission to discuss ongoing issues with levee repair, FEMA, Corps management and overall flood recovery.

Tye Parsons, Director, Northwest Regional Council of Governments, joined the commission to present a Memorandum of Understanding between Holt County and NWRCOG for work on the National Flood Insurance Program. NWRCOG will assist the county in completing the Substantial Damage Estimates of each structure in the incorporated areas of the Holt County floodplain at no cost to the county. Commissioner Gordon made a motion to enter into the agreement. Commissioner Holstine seconded the motion. Approved unani-

Aaron Luce, Oregon, appeared before the commission to request sponsorship cultural levee on his property in the floodplain. He was seeking grant funds through the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) to make repairs. The NRCS required the county sponsor the project, as it is not covered in a levee or drainage district and is not eligible for FEMA or Corps repair funding. Commissioners agreed to be the sponsor for the project.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann met with the commission to discuss work on Holt Road 130 and tube replacements.

Commissioners took up the cost of group health insurance for county employees. In lieu of raises for employees in 2012, commissioners agreed to increase the county's participation in the cost of the plan to \$532.52, which is the full premium for the high deductible \$3,500 plan. That is an increase of \$32.52 per person per month for the coverage from the base of \$500.00. Employees are paying \$46 per person per month in 2011 for \$2,500 deductible coverage. If an employee elects to increase their deductible, the county will pay 100% of the premium, and employees will no longer pay \$46 per person per month for coverage. Employees who choose the higher deductible will benefit \$390 in additional premium paid by the county, as well as recouping \$46 per month in their paycheck, or \$942 a year in benefit. Employees who choose to stay with a \$2,500 deductible will continue to pay \$46 per month for the coverage, with the to their plan premium each

Commissioners discussed County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel's invitation to Washington, D.C., to testify before a subcommittee of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee regarding the 2011 Flood. Following discussion, commissioners agreed to pay for the trip from general revenue funds allocated to the ongoing flood expenses, rather than the county clerk's regular budget. Mrs. Kunkel will provide written testimony about the effects of the flood on the county's tax rolls, infrastructure and its citizens. She will also take the witness stand for questions related to the county flooding for four out of the last five years, and the Corps management practices related to those events.

County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel reported on cash balances of the county's various funds to date and as budget officer she offers consideration for amending the 2011 budget to allow for expenditures from the recently instituted Sheriff's Revolving Fund. Money in that fund was deposited with County Treasurer Gay Quick, following an audit of the Sheriff's Office by the State Auditor's Office in July. No appropriation exists for expending the funds in fiscal year 2011. Expenditures of \$1,747.75 have been drawn on the fund without budget appropriation. The fund has an anticipated ending balance for 2011 of \$7,000. After discussion, it was determined that budget documents will be secured at the onset of 2012 from the sheriff for appropriations in 2012.

Cell phone use banned for commerical motor vehicles

Beginning January 3, 2012, commercial motor vehicle drivers are banned from using handheld mobile phones and push-totalk cell phones while driving. The ban is being implemented by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration and the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration after research indicated drivers distracted by hand-held phones pose a safety risk to themselves and other mo-

Specifically, the rule prohibits drivers from reaching for, holding, or dialing a mobile phone while driving, and applies to commercial motor vehicle truck and bus drivers who operate in Missouri as well as interstate drivers. School bus drivers and those driving vehicles designed to carry nine to 15 passengers are included.

The ban applies when the vehicle is in operation on the highway, when temporarily stopped on the highway for traffic, or when waiting at a stoplight, stop sign or other traffic control de-

Drivers can use a hand-held cell phone only if the vehicle is stopped in an area safe for parking a commercial vehicle, or to communicate with law enforcement or other emergency services to report emergencies.

"It's about safety," said Missouri Department of Transpor- regulation, visit http://www.gpo. tation (MoDOT) Motor Carrier Services Director Jan Skouby.

"Any steps that can be taken to reduce fatalities is something MoDOT will support in any way it can."

The new rule affects all commercial motor vehicles operated in interstate commerce with a gross vehicle weight rating of 10,001 pounds or more or a vehicle transporting any amount of hazardous materials requiring a placard. Also affected are drivers of vehicles operated solely in intrastate commerce with a gross vehicle weight rating of 26,001 pounds or more or a vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of 10,001 pounds or more carrying any amount of hazardous materials. The new rule includes all contracted school bus operations and shuttle buses. Intrastate carriers who are currently exempted from the federal regulations by the state of Missouri will remain unaffected by the new rule.

The use of hands-free devices is allowed: however, drivers can only use hands-free phones and headsets if the phone is in their reach while being restrained by a seat belt in the driver's seat. Dialing a hands-free phone while in motion is allowed only if it can be

The use of CB radios, other two-way radio communication or electronic devices are not included in the ban.





Council approves financing for street improvements

The regular meeting of the Mound City was held on Thursday, December 8, 2011, at the Mound City City Hall. Mayor Russell called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Those present were Larry Russell, Robert Heck, Jim Krueger, Jason Biermann, City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, City Employee Vince Beyer, Police Chief John Panning, Craig Buckles, City Attorney Brian Tubbs, Building Inspector Chris Krueger and Mark Stoner. Kristine Gibson joined the meeting at 6:30 pm.

There being no additions, deletions or corrections, Alderman Heck moved to waive the reading of the minutes from the November 10, 2011, regular meeting and approve them as presented, Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously.

Mark Stoner: Walnut Trees at Lagoon - Mark Stoner appeared before the council expressing interest in buying eight walnut trees at the lagoon and two at the tree dump that are 18-22" diameter and big enough to harvest. Stoner said none of the trees are close enough to the lagoon to cause any problems while being harvested. Council members agreed to advertise for bids for sale of the trees with bid opening at the January meeting. Stoner will have to submit a formal bid.

Old Business Community Development Block Grant (CDBG): Scoring on 2011 Project & Potential for Future Project Funding - Council members reviewed the city's score of 65.3 out of a possible 100 on the CDBG application. The LMI (income) survey used for the street project application is good for another year, but the regional council has indicated CDBG will not be funding street projects in the next year. The city can apply for another type of grant, such as water or sewer, but would need to get it submitted as soon as possible. The council decided against submitting an application this year.

New Business

Davis Creek Bridge Project: terviewed three applicants for Board of Aldermen for the city of Hazard Mitigation Grant Program - The regional council has duced Craig Buckles and recomsubmitted a Notice of Interest on behalf of the city to the State Emergency Management Agency reviewed Buckles' application. (SEMA) Hazard Mitigation Grant After discussion, Alderman Heck Program for funding replacement of the Davis Creek Bridge at the south end of State Street. The Hazard Mitigation program will only consider total replacement of the bridge and would not fund a repair project. Bob Burnett, Snyder & Associates, prepared a cost analysis with a total of \$297,160 including engineering, inspection and grant administration. The design extends the bridge approaches slightly, but does not have sidewalks. If the project is approved, the city's cost share would be approximately \$75,000.

> Street Designation to Honor Panthers - Mayor Russell was approached about renaming a street in honor of the Panthers' induction into the Missouri State Hall of Fame for the 8-man football program. Russell spoke with Superintendent Ken Eaton who suggested somehow designating entrances to the football field instead of a city street. Actually renaming a street is not advised because of 911 concerns, but an honorary designation may be considered.

Public Hearings

Ward (Voting) Redistricting -Mayor Russell opened the public hearing for discussion of the proposed change to the ward boundaries. No comments were presented from the public.

Floodplain Management Ordinance – Mayor Russell opened the public hearing for discussion of the proposed floodplain management ordinance. The only changes from the existing ordinance are to designate the building inspector as the floodplain administrator and the addition of a few new definitions. No comments were presented from the

the open position. Panning intromended hiring Buckles as a fulltime officer. Council members moved to hire Craig Buckles as a full-time police officer, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously. Buckles will receive a \$21,500 annual salary. Buckles will be looking for a place to live in town.

Sewer Department - Alderman Biermann reported the tear in the lagoon liner has not yet been repaired. Clerk Smith stated that the manufacturer said it would be best to wait until there is a contractor working in the area. Biermann will get contact information from the clerk to try to speed up the process. There is no update at this time on the issue of ammonia effluent from the la-

Water Department - Enclosures for Meter Carts: The council discussed the need for inclement weather enclosures for the meter reading carts. Crowley received a quote from Utt's, Cameron, MO, of \$685 per cart for the enclosures which includes sweeps, brackets and installation. Alderman Biermann motioned to purchase enclosures for the two meter carts at \$685 each, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously.

Street Department – Alderman Krueger reported that the roof for the salt dome has been completed and the salt has been put back into the building. Krueger also noted it is believed the problems with the new spreader and hopper have finally been resolved. The truck was again taken back to Knapheide and the whole unit except for the spinner was replaced. Smith and Krueger discussed ongoing problems with the transmission in the 1995 Dodge pickup. The Certified transmission was installed by MC Auto & Truck in November, 2009, and has a 3-year warranty. The truck has been taken to Laukemper Dodge in hopes that the problems with the transmission and the

Park/Pool Department - Pool:

Gives \$500 salary increase to full-time employees

Electrical Improvements - Clerk Approved unanimously. Smith and Randy Crowley met gather input on specifications for electrical improvements at the pool. Instead of specifically detailing the work to be done, the job will be bid as a design and build project. Each bid could be a little different, but with the same result of removing the electrical system from inside the pump house and relocating it to sealed, weather resistant enclosed structures outside. Each contractor will have to submit a schematic drawing with their proposal. Council members reviewed the summary of work that will be included in the bid packets. Mr. Klaas has been very helpful with the project and agreed to review the summary before the project is advertised. The council agreed that it will put the job out for bid after the January meeting with bid opening at the

February, 2012, meeting. Transfer from Park to Cover Pool Fund Deficit: Alderman Heck moved to approve the transfer of funds from the park fund to the pool fund to cover the \$2,500 deficit, Biermann seconded the motion. Approved unanimously.

Transfer Debt Service Balance to CIP Fund: Alderman Heck moved to approve the transfer of all remaining funds in the Pool Debt Service account, around \$1,857, to the new Capital Improvement (CIP) fund, Biermann seconded the motion. Approved unanimously.

Ordinances

Bill No. 12-8-2011(1): Establish New Ward Boundaries was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance of the city of Mound City, Missouri, establishing and setting fourth new ward boundaries, providing an effective date and repealing prior ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict thereof.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Krueger seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by per year of around \$110,000. Ayes: Heck, Krueger and Biermann. Approved unanimously. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1189.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Krueger seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Ayes: Heck, Krueger and Biermann. Nays: none. Absent: Gibson. Approved unanimously. The bill was duly numbered Or-

dinance #1190. Bill No. 12-8-2011(3): Provide for Regular Annual Election was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance to provide for the regular annual election of the city of Mound City, Missouri, to be held on Tuesday, April 3, 2012, designating the polling places therefore, providing for giving notice of such election, for the purpose of electing a mayor for a twoyear term, an alderman from the south ward for a two-year term and an alderman from the north

ward for a two-year term. Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Krueger seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Ayes: Heck, Krueger and Biermann. Nays: none. Absent: Gibson. Approved unanimously. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1191.

Administration

Group Health Insurance Renewal: Tim Becks, Curtis & Associates, had submitted group health insurance proposals for 2012. The renewal with Blue Cross Blue Shield originally came in with a 9.3% premium increase, but Becks negotiated it down to a 0.5% increase for the same coverage. Alderman Biermann moved to renew the policy with Blue Cross Blue Shield with a 0.5% premium increase. Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously.

City Property & Liability Insurance: The council will consider whether members want to bid out the city's insurance coverage or stay with MIRMA.

Chief Accumulated Police Leave: Alderman Heck moved to compensate Chief Panning for one week of vacation time that he has been unable to take due to officer turnover, Krueger seconded.

Merit Bonuses: Alderman Bierwith Kent Klaas, CK Electric, to mann moved to give merit compensation of \$500 to full-time city employees, Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously.

Monthly Financial Reports: The monthly financial reports were reviewed and discussed.

Reinvestment of Certificate of Deposit: Quotes for the CD were reviewed and discussed. Alderman Krueger moved to accept Citizens Bank and Trust's bid of .60% for investment of \$225,000 in a 12-month CD, Heck seconded. Ayes: Krueger, Heck and Biermann. Nays: none. Motion carried.

Meeting Date: The council set the next regular meeting for Tuesday, January 10, 2012, at 5:30 p.m.

Holiday Closings: With Christmas and New Year's falling on Sunday, City Hall will be closed on Mondays, December 26 and January 2.

Accounts Payable

Alderman Heck moved to approve the bills paid subsequent to the November 10, 2011, meeting and to approve and pay the current month's bills as presented, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously.

Alderman Gibson joined the meeting.

Joey McLiney, McLiney & Company: Financing Street Improvements - Mr. McLiney discussed an alternative to voting G/O bonds for street improvements by instead utilizing a 10-year lease as the financing method and paying for the debt with around \$50,000/year from the capital improvement sales tax (CIP) revenues. The CIP tax generates around \$70,000/year so there will still be funds remaining for other projects. This is similar to the current lease for street improvements, issued in 2008, and paid for with the transportation sales tax. McLiney presented a payment schedule which structures the lease payments for both projects into a total debt payment of \$535,000, which would put

around \$475,000 on the street project after deducting a 10% lease reserve and underwriting fees. Such a lease does not require a vote of the people for approval as it is considered a current expense that must be appropriated every year. The funds could be available in January, 2012, or at whatever point the city needs them. Mayor Russell is hoping to be able to do the project in conjunction with a Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) project in the area in order to garner better rates. McLiney would keep a close watch on the market to determine the best time to sell the lease. Alderman Krueger moved to hire McLiney & Company to underwrite a lease agreement for financing street improvements, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously. The previous plans and specifications for street improvements, which were prepared for the CDBG application, will have to be reviewed to determine which streets are to be included in the 2012 project and to update cost estimates.

Alderman Gibson stated she is in favor of making improvements to the streets, but also feels very strongly that the remaining CIP funds should be invested in improvements to the park and pool for at least a few years.

VOTE TO CLOSE PURSU-ANT TO RSMO 610.0210(1), (3) & (13): Legal & Personnel - At 7:30 p.m., Alderman Heck moved to close the meeting pursuant to RSMo 610.021(1), (3) & (13) - Legal & Personnel, Biermann seconded. Ayes: Heck, Biermann, Gibson and Krueger. Nays: None. Approved unanimously.

Votes taken in closed session: Alderman Heck moved to approve a lump sum, one-time, salary increase for all full-time city employees of \$500, net of taxes, Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously.

Alderman Heck moved to come out of closed session at 8:05 p.m., Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously. Alderman Heck moved to adjourn the meeting at title, considered and discussed. The proposal is for a total lease 8:05 p.m., Krueger seconded. Motion approved.
