while. Getting ready for Christmas was usually a fun timemaking candy, popcorn balls, cookies and cakes. Our whole family would be helping when Mom got things together. Pulling taffy and ending up with an edible piece was an art in itself. If you haven't been in a taffy pull, you sure missed something. We always worked over the kitchen table with a table to protect it. There had to be a bowl of melted butter, a pan of water with a towel to clean and wipe one's hands to start over again. Usually, we worked in pairs kneading the mixture back and forth and if you didn't use butter on your hands it would stick. The more you pulled it back and forth between the two made sure we kids had clean hands to start with. Popcorn balls required a coating that was cooked just right for the popcorn to stay together and not be sticky. Mom knew how to prepare the right ingredients for all our Christmas food treats, including what we all liked- chocolate candy with walnuts mixed in.

Dad or Clayte, my older brother, would take the popcorn grains, after we kids shelled it, outside and let the wind blow the small grains, silks and parts of the cobs out. They accomplished this by holding two pans up and pouring the corn between them, letting Mother Nature take over.

What we kids liked the best was going to church on Christmas Eve. There was a special religious program to celebrate the reason for the Christmas celebration. Gifts were generally passed out by some member playing Santa. The highlight was getting a sack of assorted candies with a big orange on top as we went out the door.

If we could turn back time, we could all have an oldfashioned traditional Christmas and probably the world would be better off.

Davis Creek: Flapper Gate on Drainage Tube - The council discussed problems with a drainage tube dumping into Davis Creek and questioned why it hasn't been fixed. If the flapper is closed when the creek gets high, it fills up with silt and other debris, then when the creek goes back down the flapper will not open because of the buildup. Council members agreed that they need to find out who is doing the design and if it can be altered to include any future development that might occur in that area. 



Basis of Accounting

FUND BALANCE - End of year

The District's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; consequently, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenditures and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. Furthermore, the summary financial information is prepared in accordance with section 165.121, RSMo.

The accounts of the District are organized into funds or account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund or account group are summarized by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which include its assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from cash transactions, revenues collected and expenditures paid. The following funds are used by the District

General Fund - Accounts for general activities of the District, including student activities, food service, and textbook funds, which are not designated in a separate fund.

Special Revenue Fund - Accounts for expenditures for certified employees involved in administration and instruction. It includes revenue restricted by the state for the payment of teacher salaries

Capital Projects Fund - Accounts for the proceeds of long-term debt, taxes, and other revenues designated for construction of major capital assets and all other capital outlay
