

Private family inurnment took place at Cedar Memorial Park Cemetery in Cedar Rapids.

Harold is survived by his loving wife of 51 years, Peg; his sons, Mike of Cedar Rapids and Blake (Angie) of Marion, IA; his daughter, Codi, of Denver, CO; his mother, Alois, of Mound City, MO; his sister, Jan (Doug) of Litchfield Park, AZ; his brother, Dean (Jana) of Sanford, NC; many nieces and nephews; four grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

Harold was born on a farm near Mound City in 1937. He grew up on various farms in the community and graduated from Mound City High in 1955. In 1960, Harold married there, Harold taught junior high science, junior high industrial arts, and boys' and girls' physical eduation. He was athletic director and assisted conference champion football and basketball teams. In 1962, Harold started the girls' track and field program in Belle Plaine. Belle Plaine quickly rose to fame with a group of talented athletes. In 1964, the team, nicknamed the Blue Streaks by local editor Moe Burrows, won the State Championship in West Des Moines, IA, wearing their blue gym suits.

Harold received his M.A. degree from Northern Colorado University in 1963. In 1965 and 1966, his teams won the state indoor and outdoor meets. During this time, there was only one class for girls' track. Ironically, Belle Plaine did not have a track. Athletes practiced on a 220-yard oval on a playground. They even held meets there!

In 1971, the Wilkinsons moved to Cedar Rapids. Harold worked at Kennedy High School and was a physical education teacher and coached several girls' athletic teams in cross country, track and basketball. He later became the Cougar girls' basketball coach as well. During his tenure at Kennedy, he continued to have outstanding individuals and teams. Harold's 1977 girls' basketball team finished second in the state tournament.

In 1985, Harold was named the National High School

Athletic Coaches' Association's Track and Field Coach of the Year. He was inducted to the Kennedy High School Coaches' Hall of Fame, the National High School Athletic Coaches' Association Hall of Fame, and the Belle Plaine Civil Hall of Fame.

Harold and Peg moved to rural Solon, IA, where Harold continued to coach and enjoyed watching the various athletic programs and activities of the community. They had recently moved back to Cedar Rapids.




25 Years Ago - 1986

Let it snow! MoDOT is ready

Transportation (MoDOT) is ready to plow once the snow starts to fall, so hopefully roads will be delightful.

accumulations expected in parts of the Northwest, our crews will be out in full force treating and clearing the state's highways," said Don Wichern, MoDOT Northwest District Engineer. "We urge drivers to be very cautious and avoid travel in bad weather unless necessary."

With 10,770 lane miles in northwest Missouri to plow, crews and equipment have been ready since early November to keep motorists safe during the winter season. MoDOT's Northwest crews have checked and made any necessary repairs to the 190 trucks, plows and other available equipment, stockpiled supplies and tested emergency preparedness operations to ensure motorists get where they're going safely when the snow begins to fly.

Crews focus on getting roads drivable in bad weather by treating the highest-traveled major roads and regionally significant roads first, until they are mostly clear. All the less-traveled remaining roads will be plowed to allow for two-way traffic, concentrating on hills, curves and intersections. MoDOT crews will again be using plows that can cover more roads in a single pass such as TowPlows, wing plows and 14-foot plows.

"We're doing everything we can to keep everyone safe on the roads, but we still need you to do your part to keep safe," Wichern

Ten facts you won't hear at the Capitol

One of the great jobs I have as Executive Director is being able to attend MASA district meetings and hear the concerns, issues, and yes, joys, that school administrators are experiencing across this state. This year, I have been sharing with administrators some facts that they will not hear in the halls of the state Capitol.

There is a lot of talk about how to improve schools. There is a significant disdain for any discussion regarding financing schools or even letting the local patrons approve a bond issue by a simple majority or increasing the bonding limits so $\,$ schools can construct the kind of facilities that truly do provide the world class education

I am sharing come from the National Conference of State Legislatures. Some of the other information comes from Dan Domenech, Executive Director of American Association of School Administrators (AASA), who has a presentation on what he calls the 95/5 dilemma. Other information came from a newly formed group, the Missouri Public School Advocates. So here are my top ten facts you won't hear at the Missouri State Capitol.

1. Missouri schools receive an average of \$844 per student from the federal government. This is \$315 below the national average and only nine states receive less than Missouri.

> 2. The state of Missouri provides \$4,370 per student on average. This includes formula funding and all of the categoricals. This amount is \$1,355 below the national average and only nine states contribute less to their elementary and secondary school systems than Missouri. Vermont is the highest as it contributes \$15,169 to its schools

- 3. Missouri ranked 47th in average salary of public school teachers. This is \$10,100 below the national average. See points 1 and 2.
- 4. Missouri ranked 46th in corporate taxes last year and this was prior to the elimination of the corporate franchise tax which the legislature approved in 2011.

 - **6.** High school math scores rose by 2.4 points this year and high school science rose by 3.9 points. Missouri ranked 11th could be fully funded to meet in the nation in ACT scores this past year.
 - 7. Only four states in the nation scored better than Missouri with National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) scores last year.

8. Of those who took the Advanced Placement exams in Missouri, the number earning college credit was 5th in the nation. Missouri had a 59% success rate this year compared to the national average of 56%.

9. The graduation rate in Missouri has increased from 75.3% in 1994 to 85.1% in 2008. We are keeping kids in school and graduating more students.

10. The 42nd annual Phi Delta Kappa/Gallup poll of the public's attitudes toward public schools said that 77% of America's parents gave the school their oldest child attends either an "A" or "B". These are the highest grades parents have assigned to their oldest child's school since the poll began. During the past 25 years, parent grades assigned to schools have continued to improve.

The bottom line is that Missouri public schools are doing a great job with resources that they have. Funding levels for education should match achievement expectations.

A lot of time is spent talkstate, but I have not attended one meeting at the Capital in which the topic was focused on how the foundation formula the needs of Missouri students.

An entire special session was devoted almost entirely to the discussion on economic development, but not a minute was spent talking about the most important economic development tool in this state, public schools. The task force is formed from many federal agencies, representatives of each of the eight states and various tribes in the Missouri River Basin. Participating as partners and contributors to the Task Force is an array of non-profit organizations and industry groups that represent a spectrum of interests impacted by the flooding this past summer.

"The Task Force creates an open forum for the exchange of information, ideas and approaches related to the Missouri River Flood Recovery and longer-term solutions," said Thomas Christensen, a co-chair of the MRFTF from a subsidiary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. "It brings together tribes, state and federal agencies, and other partners, to foster collaborative approaches that will optimize the use of available technical and financial resources to assist local communities, ag producers, tribes and others in the recovery process."

The Missouri River Flood Task Force is chaired by three federal agencies: the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Regions 7; the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture; and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Northwestern Division.

The December 12 MRFTF meeting allowed the various members and stakeholders to gage flood recovery efforts to date. Through the collaborative efforts of task force members, some key progress made includes:
