

kel about the Q/A time. "I was grilled pretty hard by California Democratic Congresswoman Grace Napolitano. She said we had substandard levees and that her state works well with the Corps."

In Kathy Kunkel's testimony, she outlined the destruction by design that the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has orchestrated in Holt County. She extolled the county's assets and recounted its destruction. "Holt Countians take issue with the USACE not only for management practices on mitigation lands that threaten our way of life and the levee system that protects it," stated Kunkel, "but they also see operational changes in the main stem system working against them."


Kunkel continued with the necessity of the USACE to make operational changes to the main stem reservoir system. The Corps currently tries to juggle the operation of the reservoir system with 7 purposes, all but one of which requires extra water to be kept on hand. logue between those present about Congress needing to take action. Congress has the Corps trying to juggle too may purposes, and to change, the Corps needs new marching orders," stated Kunkel. The upper and lower states appear galvanized behind a central idea for river management-flood control.

"We believe our area offers unique opportunities to the USACE and United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to join with local stakeholders in shaping the future of the floodplain with compromise and a focus on local involvement," stated Kathy in her testimony.

The Corps needs \$2 million in the Flood Control and Coastal Emergencies Fund to fix the multitude of levee breaks. At present, funding has only been approved to repair 8 of the 52 breaks along the Missouri River, two of which are in Holt County (Union Levee and Levee District #10).

With a river at 19 feet, the breaks in the levee system will begin to take on water. The river has been above 21 feet the past 5 years, and over 24 feet in 2007, 2008, 2010 and 2011. 

Here are some tips to still have a happy holiday season while sticking to a budget. Plan, plan, plan. Establish a budget and how much you can afford to spend on the holidays. Decide how much money will be spent for food, gifts, decorations, etc. Keep a log of expenses so you do not go over budget. If you spend less in one category, funds can be moved to another. STICK TO THE BUDGET!

Utilize grocery ads and sales. Plan your holiday meals around sale ads. Buy seasonal fruits and vegetables. They will be less expensive and more flavorful. Make a grocery list and follow it. Make a list of needed ingredients and cross out any items you already have in your pantry, freezer, etc. Do not buy duplicates. You are less likely to make impulse buys if you make and follow a grocery list. Also you will spend less money on gas for extra trips to the store.

Safely store leftovers for "planned overs". Money is lost when we throw out unused food because it is spoiled or not stored properly. Refrigerate or freeze leftovers immediately following the meal. 



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Graves tells subcommittee that flood control should be top priority

Urges Corps to reduce flood risk for 2012

Graves of Tarkio, MO, told the House Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment that flood control should be the top priority for managing the Missouri River in a hearing on Wednesday, November 30, in Washington, DC.

"I believe that we are asking the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to juggle too many priorities," said Graves. "We must make clear once and for all that the prevention of flooding has to be the number one priority."

The hearing focused on the causes of the 2011 Missouri River flood that devastated homes, farms and small businesses from North Dakota to Missouri. Graves also noted the disparity in funding for projects on the river with \$73 million being spent on wildlife restoration and only \$6 million spent on levee maintenance and operations between Gavin's Point Dam and the mouth of the Missouri.

"That's 12 times more money on two birds and a fish than on levee maintenance," said Graves. "We have got to get our spending priorities in order."

Under questioning from Graves, U.S. Army Corps Brigadier General John Mc-Mahon admitted that the Corps would not be able to repair all the levees breached in the 2011 flood leaving communities, farmland and small businesses at risk for a repeat flood in 2012.

Also appearing before the Subcommittee was Holt County Clerk Kathy Kunkel. Kunkel testified about the effect of the 2011 Flood on the citizens of Holt County. She also noted the support for making flood control the top priority.

"General McMahon asks in his letter when the citizens of the Missouri River Basin will become galvanized behind a central idea for river management," said Kunkel in prepared remarks. "I believe we have. Six of the Basin States' Governors have called on the USACE to make flood control the primary focus of Missouri River main stem management not unlike the primary purpose of the Mississippi River. The Missouri River Working Group, made up of Senators and Representatives from the Missouri River states, has called for flood control as a priority. It is time the USACE is directed by Congress to make flood control the primary purpose – above all other authorized purpos-

Graves has introduced legislation, H.R. 2993, to make flood control the top priority and to reduce the number of authorized purposes for the Graves pressed McMahon river. That bill has been re-

the Missouri River main stem system. Since storage peaked on July 1, the Corps has evacuated 15.4 million acre feet of floodwater and is on track to discharge the remainder by the start of the 2012 runoff season.

The Corps continues to maintain a flexible stance with its reservoir release rates into the winter and intends to maintain that stance this spring, said Jody Farhat, Chief of the Water Management Division.

Initial plans were to reduce releases to 20,000 cubic feet per second out of Gavins Point Dam beginning Dec. 1. In an attempt to increase the amount of flood control storage going into next year's runoff season, the Corps maintained a release of 40,000 cfs out of the reservoir through

"This adjustment, in combination with other management actions, potentially provide us with an additional 500,000 cfs of storage in the system by the start of the runoff season," said Farhat. "That number is based on current conditions and the weather situation we are looking at today. It's very early, and the situation could change quickly throughout the winter, but we're being proactive in the hopes to start the runoff year with some additional storage in the system."

In contrast to last year, precipitation has been below normal over most of the basin this fall, said Farhat. However, it is too early to tell what will material-

Farhat said the team will continue to monitor weather conditions and may consider extending the 40,000 cfs release out of Gavins Point if the weather allows.

"We will continue to monitor the temperatures and be as flexible as we can, but we also want to avoid causing potential ice jam flooding, which can occur when releases are too high amidst freezing temperatures," Farhat said.

Runoff into the system above Sioux City, IA, was 120 percent of normal with inflows of 1.3 million acre feet during the month of November. Normal inflows during the month of November usually total about 1.05 MAF. The Corps evacuated 1.5 MAF of stored floodwater last month.

On Nov. 29, the mountain snowpack in the Missouri Riber basin was 87 percent of normal in the reach above Fort Peck and 103 percent of normal in the reach between Fort Peck and Garrison dams, which consists primarily of the Yellowstone River basin. On average, 25 percent of the peak snowpack accumulation has occurred by Dec. 1.

Delay of Final Draft of AOP

The public comment period for the final draft of the Annual Operating Plan closed Nov. 25. The Corps is in the process of reviewing written and emailed comments and incorporating them into the report to the

extent feasible. In early October, the Corps commissioned a panel of four experts in hydrology and reservoir system operations to review, analyze and assess the operation of the six main stem dams along the Missouri River leading up to, and during the Flood of 2011. The panel expects to complete and release its report Dec. 20.

Biweekly Conference Calls Planned for January

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
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Our national bird showcased at Squaw Creek
