Open Season Gun Shop opens in Mound City

Open Season Gun Shop has officially opened its doors for business in Mound City. The new gun shop is located at 215 Walnut Street, which is marked by signs directly behind Hiawatha Implement in Mound City. The new gun shop is open Wednesday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Mound City residents Russ Shifflett and Justin Courtney are the co-owners of the business.

Russ and Justin, both firearm enthusiasts as well as avid hunters and target shooters, became friends in the stands at Mound City football games a couple of years ago. As they talked, both thought it odd that, with Mound City being a historic hunting town, there was not a gun shop in town. Discussion became serious in the summer of 2012, and the plan evolved for the two to join forces and operate a classic small town gun shop. In discussing a name for the shop, Justin threw out the name, Open Season Gun Shop. The name stuck and the business was born.

The new gun shop will handle hunting firearms, handguns and ammunitions. It will also offer scopes and mounts, as well as gun cleaning and gun repair. Open Season will buy, sell and trade firearms. The shop will offer a layaway program and will do state-to-state transfers.

With the fear from the Sandy Hook shooting, and talk across the United States of gun bans and more restrictive gun laws, it was more than a bit difficult to set up this new business venture. Firearm and ammunition sales have been very high as a result, and it has been difficult to get supplies from the distributers.

"There has probably not been a more difficult point in time to set up a new gun shop," stated Russ Shifflett. "The demand for firearms right now is very high, and replacing inventory is definately more challenging."

In the near future, the gun shop owners plan to add retail archery supplies, fishing supplies and ammo reloading supplies. Justin and Russ also plan to relocate the gun shop to State Street in the near future as opportunities allow. The gun shop can be reached by calling 660-442-3252.

Winter storm watch for Holt County

The National Weather Service in Kansas City/Pleasant Hill, MO, has issued a winter storm watch for Holt County as a powerful storm system, developing over the Rocky Mountains, moves into the central United States late Wednesday and Thursday, February 20 and 21. The storm is expected to bring heavy snow and strong winds to the central Plains. Snowfall in excess of a foot is expected across parts of Nebraska and Kansas through Thursday, with freezing rain possible for parts of the southern Plains into the mid and lower Mississippi Valley.

Holt County's forecast is: "An 80% chance of snow in the evening on Wednesday, then snow after midnight. Snow may be heavy at times after midnight with light snow accumulations of one to three inches. Temperatures will be in the lower 20s with east winds of 15 to 20 miles per hour (mph) and gusts to around 30 mph. On Thursday there is a 100% chance of snow in the morning, then snow possibly mixed with freezing drizzle in the afternoon. Snow may be heavy at times in the morning with heavy snow accumulation of four to eight inches. High temperatures will be in the upper 20s with east winds of 15 to 20 mph and gusts to around 35 mph. Thursday night will be cloudy with a 50% chance of light freezing drizzle and snow with lows around 16 degrees. Friday and Saturday should be free of precipitation with a 30% chance of rain and snow late Sunday and early Monday."

The Shiloh School District was organized in 1870 with George Trook as the first teacher and enrollment was 27. Miss Ida Nichols taught later at a salary of \$28 monthly. The first clerk was J.M. Trimble who, with P.M. Loucks and Isaac Wampler, constituted the first board of directors. The assessed valuation of the district was \$92,234.00 and heaviest taxpayer was James Garrett.

In a class photo copy, 1919-1920, Ruth Mohler Fogg was the teacher. The society has a wonderful handwritten history of the school written by Ellen Meyer Abbott Varvel. The Shiloh School building was still standing in 1981.

Local Angus breeders recognized nationally in **Pathfinder** Report

Jackie Lee Miller, Craig, MO. has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having six registered Angus cows included in the association's 2013 Pathfinder Report. Keith Z. Miller, Craig, also has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having nine registered Angus cows included in the association's report; and Kenneth Roy Miller, Craig, has been recognized nationally by the association for having seven registered Angus cows included in the association's report.

Only 1,992 of the more than 25,000 American Angus Association members are represented in this year's report, according to Bill Bowman, chief operating officer and director of performance programs of the association with headquarters in St. Joseph, MO.

The Pathfinder program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits economically important to efficient beef production. These traits include early and regular calving and heavy weaning weights, Bowman says. Over two million eligible dams with more than 6.8 million weaning records were examined to determine Pathfinder status. In addition, bulls that have sired a minimum of five or more Pathfinder cows are recognized as Pathfinder sires.

All registered Angus cows and sires meeting the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the annual Pathfinder Report.

The 2013 Pathfinder Report lists 8,680 individual cows and 234 Pathfinder sires. It is published online at www.angus.org, and printed copies are available from the association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 96. Started in 1978, the Pathfinder Program continues to recognize outstanding breeders participating in the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) Program.

The fourday count typically receives sightings from tens of thousands of people reporting more than 600 bird species as long as they would like in the United States and Canada alone.

Scientists and bird enthusiasts can learn a lot by knowing where the birds are. Bird populations are dynamic; they are constantly in flux. No single scientist or team of scientists could hope to document and understand the complex distribution and movements of so many species in such a short time.

Scientists use the GBBC information, along with observations from other citizen-science projects, such as the Christmas Bird Count, Project FeederWatch, and eBird, to get the "big picture" about what is happening to bird populations.

The results for the Great Backvard Bird Count 2013 had not been released as of press time.


