



The U.S. Department of Education is inviting each state education agency to voluntarily request flexibility from certain accountability provisions of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, than one decade ago, the federal law calls for all students to be proficient in reading and math by the year 2014.

Last week, the U.S. Department of Education approved waivers for 10 states that applied during the first round of the application process. Twenty-eight other states, including Missouri, indicated their intent to seek a waiver during the second round of the process. Waivers approved in the first and second rounds could go into effect as early as the 2012-13 school year.

"This waiver will bring about desperately needed relief for schools and districts from the unreasonable and flawed expectations of No Child Left Behind," said Dr. Don Senti, executive director of Cooperating School Districts in the Greater St. Louis Area. "Districts will be able to use the funds they have to implement locally designed improvement strategies. The waiver restores a measure of local control and

From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago- 1962



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A lot of skimming has a long way to go

Skimming the sand off of valuable cropland- North of Big Lake is not a very accurate description. On Monday, February 20, the excavator pictured above was digging through at least three feet of sand that was loaded and hauled to the large cavernous hole that still exists on Highway 111, just west of the Highway 118 and 111 exchange. The piles of sand shown on the horizon were cut around to determine the depth to which the sand had accumulated. The field on the west side of the highway has already been cleared. Scrapers were still working on the ground to level and remove the remainder of the sand that was up to 6 feet deep. Hill Brothers Construction of Platte City, MO, received the Missouri Department of Transportation contract for the work. Work on the west side of the highway was slowed because of the search for Trooper Fred Guthrie, Jr. Once his body was found, the removal sped up and over 60,000 cubic yards of sand have already been hauled to the hole. Richard Hill, site manager of the operation, said it is anticipated that the hole will require 300,000-350,000 cubic yards to fill it. The hole was created by swift floodwaters in the Flood of 2011.



Moonscape or aftermath

This area just south of Big Lake- Looks much like that of a moonscape. Blowing and drifting sand and other light particles, and ridged land surround this enormous water hole that was left on Tom Tubbs' farmland after the Flood of 2011 washed its way through the area. Tom hopes that the dredge he purchased for use at Big Lake will allow him to use the sludge from the lake to fill this hole and others left on his once productive farmland. Tom has over 70 acres marred by scour holes from the flood. Will the sludge make this ground farmable again, and what about the sand? That is entirely another story.

Are soil test levels dropping?

While planning fertilizer programs, be sure to notice trends in soil test nutrient levels identified in soil by Bob Seger. The 3rd and tests. Soil test values in some 4th grade cub cheerleadgrower fields have been found to be declining. Sometimes it phosphorus. Other times is potassium and many times, it is both nutrients.

Adequate amounts of these nutrients are critical for high crop yields. Other inputs will not maximize yields if either of these nutrients are limited. If one of these nutrients are limited, then adding additional inputs such as increasing the rate of nitrogen that is applied will not have the desired impact.

If using variable rate fertilizer applications show areas of fields with symptoms of poor growth, consider moving soil sampling points to sample these areas to ensure that adequate amounts of nutrients are being applied. Between grid soil test points, there may be lower testing soil nutrient levels. By moving points, this will allow to more accurately find what is in fields.

Another approach to calculate the crop removal of nutrients per bushels of yield harvested is applying less amounts of nutrients than are being removed during harvest of grain. This will cause soil test levels to de-

Also, forage crop yields should be considered. Growers who are selling or buying hay should consider the price of nutrients that are contained in the hay. They may be exporting nutrients off the farm or bringing nutrients onto the farm if purchasing hay.
