# Americans to play it safe at 2014 Olympics

For spectators and athletes, the months, weeks and days leading up to the Olympic Games are filled with varying degrees of excitement and anticipation. This year, however, the build-up to the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia, which last from Friday, Feb. 7 through Sunday, Feb. 23, is reflective of a more anxious and wary American public; this year's Olympics are tinged with the fear of terrorism.

Various American media outlets have reported on the mount-

ing threats against both American Olympic hopefuls and eager sports fans flocking to the Russian city nestled against the Black Sea. First, three suicide bombings tore up the city of Volgograd, approximately 500 miles from Sochi, and killed at least 30 people this winter, according to *The Washington Post*. Second, *Fox News* reported that three "black widows," the wives of alleged Islamist insurgents who were killed as a result of



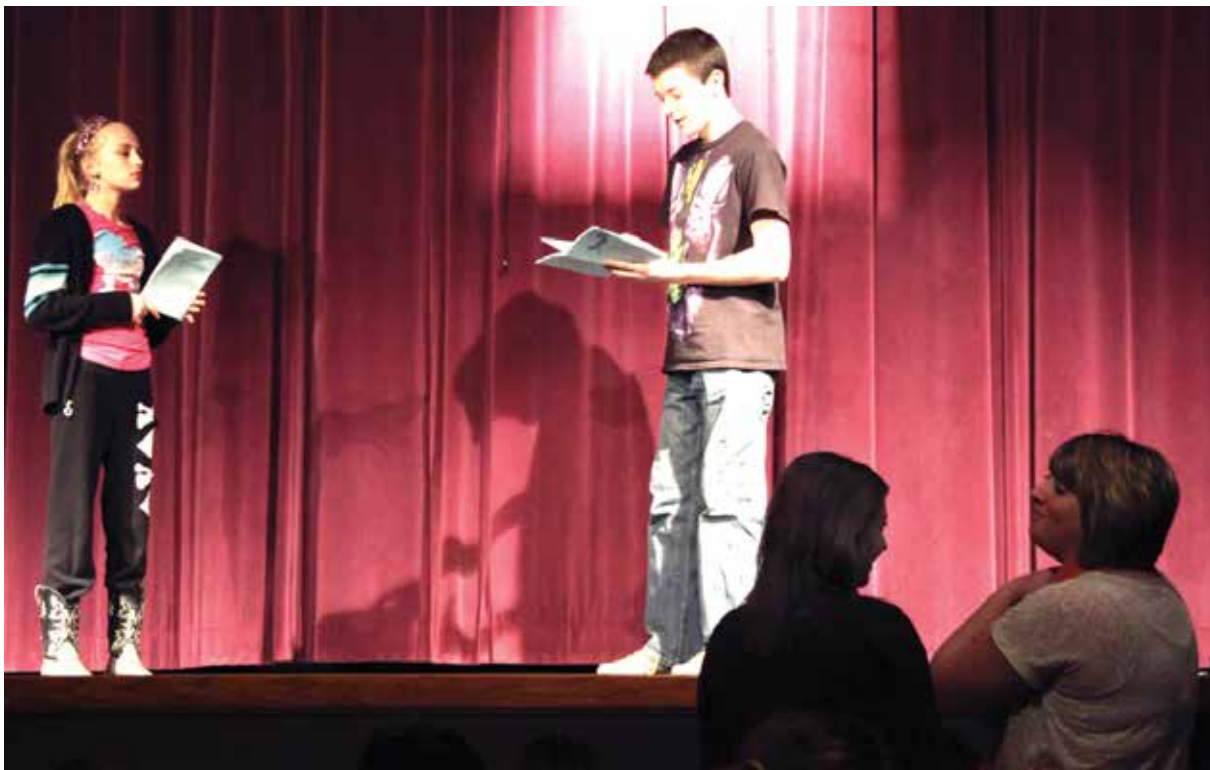
tensions with Russia, had made their way to Sochi. (Russia has a long history of trying to quell political unrest in the North Caucasus region, not far from where Sochi is located; most Americans would recognize the war with Chechnya in the 1990s as a prime example.) Of these three widows, one has reportedly made it past the "ring of steel," the Russian security cordon circling Sochi. Third, so-far unnamed radical Islamists

have threatened to ambush the Olympic games. According to CNN, those threatening to do so have a history of attacking with hidden bombs; in 2004 a bomb was detonated under a stadium grandstand in Grozny, the capital of the Chechen Republic.

In light of these reports, the U.S. government is increasing the presence of its security in Sochi. Contingency plans to evacuate Americans should an attack take place have been arranged, though some security

experts doubt the feasibility of such ambitious logistics. CNN reported that two warships have been moved to the Black Sea, and C-17 transport aircraft are at the ready in Germany. FBI agents are also on the ground in Russia and cooperating with local intelligence operatives, the news outlet said.

## Propane shortage a lesson in economics

Propane in ice-cold Missouri is, at the moment, a hot commodity. Prices have skyrocketed in the past several days (some areas in Missouri reported prices as high as \$5 per gallon, according to *The St. Louis Post-Dispatch*) as a result of an imbalance between supply and demand.

Tom May, director of employee and public relations at MFA Oil, explained that there are three factors at play. First, the industry has seen a high amount of exported propane.

"Last year, there was a record amount of exports to Asia and Europe, where the price of propane is significantly higher," May said.

Bryce Schoonover of Schoonover Oil Company in Mound City, MO, agreed: "[There is a] shortage created by too much exporting."

Second, after an unusually wet harvest season, farmers used propane heaters to help dry crops. *The St. Louis Post-Dispatch* reported that "As October ended, that produced the greatest one-week drain on Midwest propane supplies in 20 years, according to the U.S. Energy Administration."

Third, thanks to the polar vortex, weather temperatures have repeatedly dipped below zero degrees Fahrenheit, forcing residents to use more

For travelers, the State Department has updated an alert for Sochi and is warning Americans to be careful and vigilant about their surroundings. Experts, according to *The Washington Post*, believe that “soft targets,” such as hotels, transportation stations and tourist areas are more likely to be attacked than “hard targets,” like the Olympic venues. *CBS News* quoted its senior security contributor and former CIA deputy director Michael Morell as saying “With 40,000 Russian security personnel at the

Olympics, I think the venue itself is fairly safe...[but] if somebody put a package down or a backpack down, I would walk away from it as fast as I could. I'd inform security personnel. I'd also watch people's behavior, and if there was anything concerning, I'd walk away.” Morell's comments, including his statement that he would take his family to Sochi, are in line with what most higher-ups are saying. Mitt Romney, for example, was quoted by *USA Today* as stating “There's never been a games I know of that have been so targeted for specific threats as you're seeing in Sochi. At

the same time, the level of security preparations appears to be at an unprecedented level. So, I think people can recognize that the hard sites will be safe. The athletes will be safe, spectators when they're in the venues will be safe... It's the soft places you can't be 100 percent certain will be entirely safe, but my guess is that the Russians have done everything humanly possible to protect the games.” An estimated 6,000 athletes from 87 countries will be at the Winter Olympics, CNN reported, as well as countless spectators. American athletes and supporters have been warned not

to wear their uniforms and gear outside of the venues, according to *Wall Street Journal*, and some planning to travel to Sochi have also canceled their plans out of fear. Common sense and a heightened awareness, however, should be enough to stay safe. In an interview with “Face the Nation,” House Homeland Security Committee Chairman Michael McCaul said: “I would say we should not scare people from attending our Olympics. It's a time-honored tradition. If we do not support our team and show up, I think the terrorists are winning, and I think that's what they're trying to do here.”

# Grant funds for waste management now available

The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District now has grant funds available from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources' Solid Waste Management Program to finance recycling and waste reduction projects in the public, private and not-for-profit sectors throughout Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway and Worth counties. The grant funds are intended to reduce the amount of solid waste entering the local waste stream and to facilitate recycling. Any individual or organization with a project to reduce, reuse or recycle such items as paper, aluminum, organic waste, plastic, electronics or other recyclable materials may submit an application and may be awarded funds to support their project. Previous grants have included the purchase of wood chipper, recycling bins, composting equipment, recycling trucks and various equipment that assists in recycling or other waste reduction activities. District grant funds have also been used for electronic and household hazardous waste collections, outdoor classrooms, recycling education and recycling business expansions.

Preference shall be given to projects that, as mentioned above, reduce, reuse, recycle or strengthen consumer demand for post-consumer wastes, including paper, glass, plastics, demolition waste, organic waste, yard waste, waste oil and electronics. Applications will be evaluated according to several criteria, some of which are:

- How well the project contributes to community-based economic development;
- If the project promotes waste reduction or recycling;
- Project feasibility;
- If the project has an effective marketing strategy;
- If the project can be implemented in a timely manner;
- How well the project complies with federal, state and local requirements.

**Alpine skiing:** Features five main competitive areas (downhill, slalom, giant slalom, super giant, super combination) for both men and women.

**Biathlon:** Includes five events (individual race, sprint, pursuit, mass start race and relay, mixed relay) for both men and women. This sport is known for its alternation of skiing and prone shooting.

**Bobsleigh:** Involves high-speed mountain descent on ice tracks on controlled sledges, for both men (two-person and four-person teams) and women (two-person teams). Many will recognize this event from the film “Cool Runnings.”

**Cross-Country:** Features six events (individual race, mass start race, skiathlon, relay, individual and team sprints) for both men and women.

**Curling:** A team sport with four players per team; the goal is to deliver a 19.96-kilogram stone to a target area known as the “house” by using brooms.

**Figure skating:** Includes individual men's and women's events, pairs events, ice dancing and team events. Fun fact: Figure skating was originally part of the summer Olympics.

**Freestyle skiing:** Has five events, two of which (ski half-pipe and ski slopestyle) were added in 2011. The others are mogul skiing, aerials and ski cross.

**Ice hockey:** Two teams attempt to make the most points by shooting a puck into a goal. This sport is a crowd pleaser in Canada and parts of the U.S., especially Minnesota.

**Luge:** One of the most dangerous Olympic sports, it involves sliding at high speeds on single or two-person sleds down artificially frozen ice. Fun fact: “Luge” means “sled” in French.

**Nordic combined:** Includes individual and team events that combine ski jumping and a 10-kilometer cross-country ski race.

**Short track:** A speed skating event that features both individual competitions and relays.

**Skeleton:** Not to be confused with the luge, athletes, lying face-first and on their stomachs, slide down an artificial track on a sled. In the luge event, athletes ride feet-first and on their backs.

**Ski jumping:** Includes individual normal hill competition, individual large hill competition and team competition. Fun fact: Women will compete in ski jumping for the first time during the Sochi 2014 games.

**Snowboard:** Features half-pipe, parallel giant slalom, snowboard cross, slopestyle and parallel slalom for both men and women.

**Speed skating:** Involves individual events and team pursuit races. Men complete eight laps in the team event and race distances of 500, 1,000, 1,500, 5,000 and 10,000 meters in the individual competition; women complete six laps in the team race and compete in 500, 1,000, 1,500, 3,000 and 5,000-meter individual events.

## Subscription price of Mound City News to increase

Due to an increase in postage by the United States Postal Service, the subscription price of *Mound City News* has increased. The price of stamps went up by three cents to 49 cents while bulk mail and periodicals increased six percent, the Postal Service reported. For in-area residents (those living in Holt, Nodaway, Andrew and Atchison counties), the new price is \$33 for one year. For out-of-area residents (those living anywhere outside of the four counties), the price is \$38 for one year. Subscribers who do not renew by Monday, Feb. 10, will pay the new rates.

## Free ice fishing workshop

For most northern Missouri anglers, frozen lakes and ponds symbolize the end of the fishing season. For those willing to brave the cold temperatures, however, the hard-water season is the beginning of one of the best fishing periods of the year. The Show-Me State, according to the Fisheries Division of the Missouri Department of Conservation, has numerous small lakes and ponds, many of them public, that offer exceptional panfish bluegill and crappie angling. Additionally, ice fishing, which has been on the rise in Missouri, is one of the cheapest and simplest types of angling; the sport does not require boats or expensive gear, and fishing is accessible to anyone willing to walk just a few strides from shore. The fish are reasonably easy to catch, the Fisheries Division says, and fish fillets coming from very cold water are delicious. The Fisheries Division will be conducting a free workshop on Saturday, Feb. 8, for those interested in learning more about ice fishing. Missouri Department of Conservation staff will teach the ins-and-outs of the sport, and topics will include ice safety, equipment and on-the-ice fishing techniques. The workshop will take place at the main boat ramp on Mozingo Lake in Maryville, MO, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. If ice conditions are not favorable or temperatures are too cold, the clinic may be subject to cancellation. Participants must pre-register by calling the Northwest Regional Office at (816) 271-3100 to provide names, phone

numbers and the number of attendees. There is no age limit. Pre-drilled holes for fishing will be available, and bait and tackle will be provided while supplies last. Fishing permit regulations will apply, and participants should dress accordingly for the cold weather. They may also want to consider bringing a chair or bucket for seating. The main boat ramp at Mozingo Lake is located east of Maryville on Highway 36, north of Liberty Road and west on 245th Street.

Uh-oh: KCP&L warns customers of rise in scams

Scammers have been telling customers over the phone that they are past due on bills and must pay immediately to avoid service disconnection. KCP&L, however, never uses such a communication process with potential disconnections. Emails are also circulating that contain a fake utility bill with a falsified account number and company along with links to a malicious site.

Neither the phone calls nor

the emails are associated with KCP&L.

If customers ever have any questions about the legitimacy of a bill, phone call or email regarding a utility bill, they should contact the KCP&L Customer Contact Center at 1-888-471-5275.

KCP&L also urges its customers to take notice of the following safety tips:

- Be suspicious if an email regarding a utility bill arrives if online communications have not been requested from KCP&L;
- For customers using KCP&L’s online bill pay system, always make online payments directly through [kcpl.com](http://kcpl.com);
- Never provide personal information via email or click any suspicious links;
- Never give credit card, debit card, social security, ATM, checking or savings account numbers to anyone who comes to a home, calls, texts or sends an email requesting such information in respect to a utility bill without also verifying the communication with KCP&L’s Customer Contact Center.

# Propane shortage a lesson in economics

propane to heat their homes. Individually, each of these factors might not have radically affected propane supplies; together, however, they have knocked the propane market off-balance. Complicating matters, May explained, is the fact that trucks have to be sent to Nebraska, Texas and Mississippi to bring propane back to Missouri. Although such a process is time consuming and expensive, May hopes that it will help alleviate problems, for now. The real key, May says, to solving the supply and demand issue and reducing the fluctua-

tions in prices depends on the weather. “We need to get through winter,” he said. “But the forecast is [still looking] cold for the first half of February.” In the meantime, government officials are stepping in to clear up confusion and anger over propane prices. According to the Associated Press, Chris Koster, the attorney general of Missouri, released a statement stating that “we are currently investigating all complaints and working with businesses and agencies in nine other states across the Midwest to determine the cause of these price increases.” Likewise, U.S. Sen. Claire McCaskill demanded that the Commodity Futures

Trading Commission (CFTC), an independent federal agency that protects consumers from fraud and regulates futures and option markets, examine whether any seller was guilty of price-gouging. “Millions of Americans are being forced to wonder how they will heat their homes while making the mortgage payment and putting groceries on the table,” McCaskill wrote in a press release to *Mound City News*. “Given the CFTC’s prior findings of manipulation in the propane market, it is critical that the government continue to ensure rural Americans that they are not being harmed by opportunistic trading and price manipulation.”

May noted, however, that not all propane users are suffering from high prices. MFA Oil, like many other propane dealers, has an allocation program where the customer can pre-buy propane at a fixed price. Buyers who have taken advantage of the program have not been affected by the surge in prices. “[Allocation programs] are a key thing for the industry to look forward to,” May said. According to both May and Schoonover, it is difficult to predict when prices will go down as they can change rapidly, but efforts, it seems, are being made by all parties to ensure Americans will not have to endure any more propane problems.

# Cronkite gets a posthumous notch on his Belt

The Missouri General Assembly’s Joint Committee on Transportation Oversight unanimously approved an application to rename a portion of Belt Highway in St. Joseph, MO, for the city’s famous native son, newsman Walter Cronkite. The application was submitted by Missouri Western State University (MWSU), home of the Walter Cronkite Memorial. “We’re very grateful to the Missouri General Assembly and the Joint Committee on Transportation Oversight for acting so quickly on our application and to our local lawmakers who supported it so enthusiastically,” said Dr. Robert Vartabedian,

president of MWSU. “Walter Cronkite was proud of his St. Joseph beginnings, and I’m pleased that we are honoring the most influential journalist of the twentieth century in this way.” The Joint Committee’s action designates a portion of U.S. Highway 169 from Frederick Avenue south to Interstate 29 as the “Walter Cronkite Memorial Highway.” Signs with the designation will be erected within six to eight weeks, according to Rep. Delus Johnson, one of the application’s sponsors. Other sponsors included Sen. Rob Schaaf, and state representatives Pat Conway and Galen Higdon, all,

including Johnson, of St. Joseph. In addition to the Memorial Highway signs, directional signs leading motorists to the Walter Cronkite Memorial at MWSU will be constructed on U.S. Highway 36, Riverside Road and Belt Highway. Dr. Sharon Kosek, a 1977 graduate of MWSU, coordinated the signage effort. Cronkite was born in St. Joseph on Nov. 4, 1916. He anchored the CBS Evening News from 1962 to 1981 and was consistently named “The Most

Trusted Man in America” in public opinion polls. MWSU dedicated the Walter Cronkite Memorial on Nov. 4, 2013, which would have been the renowned newscaster’s 97th birthday. The permanent 5,000-square foot memorial in the atrium of Spratt Hall includes video, audio, photographs and memorabilia that tell the story of Cronkite’s life and the historic events he covered. ## Graves tries to extend insurance coverage

U.S. Congressman Sam Graves of Tarkio, MO, has introduced legislation to make it easier for dependent children of military families to remain on their parents’ TRICARE health insurance plan until the age of 26. Under the current law, children must enroll in their own plan through a completely separate program. Graves’ bill, however, known as the TRICARE Family Improvement Act, would streamline the process so that children can seamlessly remain covered by their parents’ plan.

“Considering the sacrifice made by our military families, I don’t think it is asking too much to allow them to stay on as long as non-military chil-

dren are allowed to and save a few extra dollars on their health insurance costs,” Graves said. “Cutting spending to [other] items in order to prioritize caring for the families of brave Americans who protect our freedom on the front lines is something we should all get behind.”

Currently, TRICARE coverage for children on their family plans ends when a dependent child turns 21, or if the child is enrolled in college, 23. That age deadline is three years earlier than what is now typically allowable for non-military families.

## Brace yourself: February is Missouri’s Earthquake Awareness Month

On Feb. 7, 1812, one of the largest earthquakes ever recorded in the continental United States shook New Madrid, MO. Now, 202 years later, Missouri takes the second month of the year to recognize the devastating effects of earthquakes and to encourage residents to consider earthquake safety.

“Missouri experiences a wide range of natural disasters, from ice storms and blizzards to tornadoes and flooding, but an earthquake provides no warning, and a major quake would have a large and long-term impact on our state,” Michael Barrett, director of the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), said. “Earthquake Awareness Month is an excellent opportunity to learn about and prepare for a potential earthquake, and many of the safety steps apply to other emergencies as well.”

One of these steps took place on Thursday, Oct. 17, 2013, when more than 406,000 Missourians participated in the Great Central U.S. ShakeOut

earthquake drill, which teaches participants to “drop, cover and hold on” — “drop” to the floor, “cover” under a desk or table, and “hold on” in the event of an earthquake. There are also additional steps that people can take, particularly those who live in or near the New Madrid Seismic Zone:

- Put together an emergency kit, including a flashlight, first aid kit, radio, drinking water and blankets;
- Develop a family communication plan by identifying a relative living at least 100 miles away with whom everyone can check in;
- Bolt bookcases to wall studs, install strong latches on cupboards and strap water heaters to wall studs because should it tip over, a fire or gas leak could start, and residents could lose a valuable source of water;
- Know how to turn off the

gas and water mains;

- Understand that earthquake coverage is not included in most homeowner insurance policies as it must usually be purchased as an “endorsement,” or a separate coverage that requires an earthquake to be the direct cause of damage to property. More information can be found at the Missouri Department of Insurance, <http://insurance.mo.gov/consumers/home/EQTable.php>.

Other preparation and awareness events for the month include:

- Saturday, Feb. 8: The St. Louis Center will host an earthquake awareness day from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and offer hands-on activities that teach participants how to prepare homes, families and businesses for earthquakes. The event is free and open to all.
- Saturday, Feb. 22: “The

Earth Moves Under Our Feet” program will take place from 10:30 a.m. to noon at Onondaga Cave State Park near Leasburg. Representatives from SEMA and the Missouri Department of Natural Resources’ Missouri Geological Survey will present a program about earthquake history, preparedness and impacts on society. A video about earthquakes in the Midwest will also be shown at the free event.

SEMA has information about earthquake safety and resources, including videos, to help citizens prepare for an earthquake at [http://sema.dps.mo.gov/earthquake\\_preparedness/](http://sema.dps.mo.gov/earthquake_preparedness/).

The New Madrid Seismic Zone is the nation’s most active earthquake zone east of the Rocky Mountains. At least three of the largest earthquakes ever recorded in the continental U.S. are believed to have occurred there in 1811 and 1812. A major New Madrid Seismic Zone earthquake now would likely be felt throughout the state, as well as in nearby states to the south and east. Missouri has a comprehensive earthquake response plan in place to assist the 47 counties that would likely be the most impacted; Holt County is not among those counties. ## Doctor available for commercial drivers

active older brother and sister, started playing basketball when she was in the second grade.

“I was always at the gym,” she explained.

# Study says Missouri students would benefit from digital learning

A study released on Thursday, Jan. 30, showed that Missouri has fallen behind in its effort to bring digital learning opportunities to kindergarten through twelfth-grade students. The current public offerings in the Show-Me State are geographically restricted or require tuition payments, a condition that leaves Missouri students lagging as other states construct modern and open digital learning options.

The study, commissioned by the Missouri Chamber of Commerce Education Foundation and conducted by the Evergreen Education Group, noted that digital education reforms are needed if Missouri is to achieve its goal of having one of the nation's 10 best educational systems by 2020.

"In most states online coursework is a viable, valuable option for students seeking to supplement the education they are receiving in the classroom," said Daniel P. Mehan, president of the Missouri Chamber of Commerce and Industry. "Unfortunately, Missouri's fractured digital learning system does not give equal access to these resources to all students. With this new study, we have identified the problem areas, and we are providing practical suggestions to help Missouri improve its digital learning policies."

Key findings of the study revealed that, unlike other states, Missouri students do not have a publicly funded online school option. Furthermore, Missouri law does not allow open enrollment in virtual schools. With students in rural schools and others in failing educational institutions, now is the time for Missouri to re-examine the existing policy that is potentially unfriendly toward the virtual learning option.

The Missouri Chamber Education Foundation has a vested interest in ensuring Missouri students are receiving a world-class education.

"In seeking to perform among the nation's best educational systems, Missouri has set a high bar for our state's administrators, students and teachers," said Brian Crouse, vice president of the foundation. "We applaud this ag-

gressive goal. As we work together toward achieving this vision, let's make sure that we are utilizing all of our digital resources to provide outstanding content and learning material options to all Missouri students who have an interest in enhancing their knowledge in order to engage and inspire them, and most important, set them on a pathway to success following high school."

Recommendations from the report include:

- Allowing statewide, fully online public schools;
- Allowing schools to receive 100-percent funding for students taking online courses without requiring seat time;
- Allowing schools to receive funding beyond one full-time equivalent (FTE) for students seeking to take online courses beyond the school day;
- Increasing opportunities for rural students by offering fully funded courses through MoVIP and other state-approved providers and developing a best practices guide for rural consortia;
- Supporting unaccredited and provisionally accredited districts that want to make online options available to their students;
- Continuing to pursue broadband access not just to schools and community centers but in “the last mile” to homes statewide;
- Considering developing policy that all students statewide should take one online course in order to graduate from high school;
- Requiring all districts in the state — not just those that are unaccredited or provisionally accredited — to pay for students to take classes from MoVIP or other approved providers;
- And identifying state resources for schools and districts that wish to expand online and blended learning opportunities for students.

## A minute with Mike

Much of our work as legislators is done in committee hearings where bills are heard, amended, debated and approved or disapproved. After four weeks those bills that have been approved are beginning to hit the chamber floor for debate. The first one that was passed out of the House to move on for further discussion in the Senate would allow men and women who serve in the military and disabled Missourians who are going to run for public office to be treated fairly when their names are placed on the ballot.

This legislation would allow deployed military members and folks with disabilities to file by certified mail rather than appearing in person. Our current law does not allow them to be in the drawing to see whose name appears at the top of the ballot if they are not present at the filing location. The legislation would allow them to send a proxy who would be included in the draw for ballot placement. This is a small change but allows a level playing field for all who wish to run for office.

Last week was the first meeting of the Committee on Higher Education, and I was able to present a bill that I believe would make college more affordable for some of our state's best students and, hopefully, entice them to stay in Missouri. The bill would improve the level of financial assistance received by our highest performing students by adding a forgivable loan program to our existing Higher Education Academic (Bright Flight) scholarship. The loan amount would be up to \$5,000 per academic year for a maximum of \$20,000 and would be forgiven at \$5,000 per year if the student stays in Missouri and has full-time employment here.

The Bright Flight Scholarship originated in 1986, and the intent was to keep our best and brightest here in Missouri to attend school and hopefully to join our workforce. Students who scored in the top 3% on the ACT or SAT were awarded \$2,000 if they attended a Missouri institution. At that time \$2,000 would pay for tuition and fees at the University of Missouri. That amount will only pay a small portion of tuition and fees now, and the scholarship, as it exists, is not particularly influential to students of that caliber that are looking across our country for the best education. We feel that if this bill passes, it could make a significant difference to those top students who are deciding where they will go to school and where they will use their talents.

A concern that most share during this bitterly cold time of the year is that dreaded utility bill. We have all seen escalating cost and this is especially true for those who use propane. In just one week propane prices have soared, in some cases have tripled. The House and Senate have called for an immediate investigation, which will be launched by Missouri Attorney General Chris Koster, to determine the cause.

Our Attorney General is coordinating with nine other Midwestern states to find the truth about why this has happened. In addition, the U.S. Department of Transportation has issued emergency declarations to allow more propane to be shipped to our state in the hopes that additional propane will help drive down the price. We will continue to stay involved in this issue until we reach a resolution that will

help our citizens who have been affected by this drastic price hike.
