A company that plans on peddling goods for a short period of time inside the city limits is required to register with the City of Mound City and apply for the proper per-

Mound City Chief of Police, John Panning, stated, "This is a good opportunity to remind all of the citizens of Mound City to think twice before purchasing goods from out-of-town salesmen like this. If anyone questions the legitimacy of a business peddling goods in Mound City, they can contact the Mound City Police Department to make sure the peddler has the necessary permits." Watch out for out-of-town peddlers. Mound City has an ordinance that requires all peddlers to obtain a city peddler's license. The idea behind this ordinance is to try to protect citizens from unscrupulous vendors.

Our food supply chain is very complicated and most of us only understand that we go to the local grocery store and purchase food. We believe that the food is safe because it has been purchased from reputable food wholesalers by our local store for resale.

When the wholesale distributors purchase meat and vegetables from their suppliers, it is believed to be safe. These package houses are supposed to be under tight rules and regulations which our government is supposed to oversee.

When the food chain begins recalls on meat, milk, bread, etc., we start questioning the oversight of these companies and our government's ability to properly regulate these industries. A recent report came out stating that the price tag for health problems related to foodborne illnesses costs the United States over \$150 billion per year.

The food supply chain is much more complicated than 50 years ago when we all just ate eggs from our own chickens, meat from our own cows, milk from our own cows, vegetables that we grew, etc. Now, for the most part, we put our trust in big corporations to provide our families with safe food - is that a good idea?
