April 2 ballot hopes to extend 1945 tax levy for street lights

There is a tax levy on the April 2 Municipal Election ballot for Mound City that would continue the city tax for street lights that has been levied since 1945. The tax has to be approved by the voters every four years, which

would extend the tax until 2016. A 2/3 majority vote is required to pass the levy.

The wording on the ballot states that the tax is to be \$.30 per \$100 valuation for street lighting. However, for the past two years, the city council has taken into consideration the street light fund balance and anticipated expenses and lowered the

tax levy to \$.21. "If the levy passes at the \$.30. mark," stated Mound City Mayor Chris

Krueger, "I'm sure that considering the fund balance, we'll vote to lower it again to the \$.21 mark."

The city council

has plans to install additional lights in town. One light will be added at the north end of town at the junction of Rt. N and View Drive. Two more lights will be added on the street that runs by Chamberlain Funeral Home. Questions regarding street lights can be answered by contacting city hall at 660-442-3447.

The Ryan and Letitia Oswald family at 1604 Childers Drive in Mound City-Suffered a devastating house fire early Sunday morning, March 24. Flames engulfed the northeast corner of the home, but the family of six escaped unharmed during the snowstorm in the wee hours of the morning.

Home suffers severe damage following an early morning fire

According to an affidavit filed in support of the criminal complaint, law enforcement officers responded to a report of a domestic disturbance at Maupin's residence in Skidmore on Tuesday, March 12, 2013. When officers entered the residence through the open front door, there was nobody in the house; however, they saw long guns positioned at the windows and exterior doors of the residence. As they were leaving the residence, Maupin's wife told them that she and her husband

on the property and drove at a high rate of speed in the direction of the officers. They pointed their weapons in the direction of the Escalade and the vehicle stopped. Maupin, whom the affidavit says was driving, was ordered to exit the vehicle. Instead, he again drove in the direction of the officers. The officers did not fire their weapons due to the presence of children in the vehicle. Maupin backed the vehicle up and drove out another exit from the property, the affidavit says, due to the driveway being blocked.

This is especially important since these conditions cause clots to form in unwanted places such as the heart, lungs, or even the brain in the case of a stroke.







Youth spring turkey hunting season

In just over a week, the season counts as the first spring turkey season will be here. On Friday, April 5, and Saturday, April 6, the statewide youth spring turkey hunting season takes place. The 2013 youth season is one week before the start of the regular spring turkey hunting season, Monday, April 15, through Sunday, May 5. Youth, ages 6 to 15, can hunt from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset Central Daylight Time. Therefore, shooting times for Holt County on Saturday, April 6, are 6:27 a.m. and 7:50 p.m., and on Sunday, April 7, are 6:26 a.m. and 7:51 p.m.

must possess one of the following three permits: Resident Spring Turkey Hunting Permit, Resident Landowner Spring Turkey Hunting Permit or a Nonresident Spring Turkey Hunting Permit. Youth during this season are limited to one male turkey or turkey with a visible beard. However, if a youth takes a turkey during the youth portion, the youth is NOT allowed to harvest a second bird until Monday, April 22. This is because the bird taken during the youth issued.

If a youth is interested in hunting turkeys during any portion of the spring turkey hunting season, they must be in the immediate presence of a properly licensed adult, someone 18 years or older. This adult would be considered a mentor and would need to have Hunter Education Certification if born on or after January 1, 1967. Mentors born before this date are exempt from Hunter Education. However, youth ages 11 through 15, may hunt alone if they have Youth hunters in Missouri received and passed Hunter Education Certification.



50 Years Ago - 1963

SUMMIT CHURCH OF CHRIST???

In 2009, a student at the College of the Ozarks, Point Lookout, MO, was sorting out old archives in the school's Ralph Foster Museum and found receipts and records for stained glass installation in several Holt County churches. They were all sent to the society as it was thought we might "enjoy having the little bit of the history" in Holt County. One church was the Summit Church of Christ, Mound City.

Many of the letters, receipts, and drawings are from the St. Joseph Art Glass Works in the 1940s to Mrs. Dessie G. Phialas, pastor. She writes that she is moving to Iowa and the windows are "her last personal gift to the church" and that they "have sold out to the good Nazarenes". Is this the former Nazarene Church building located at 304 East 4th St. in Mound City that is now where the River of Hope Fellowship congregation meets? A sketch of a window design found in the Church of the Ozarks' packet

is similar to one of the stained glass windows in that building. Was it once the Summit Church of Christ? Did it sit near the Summit School? Was it moved into town and when? Society files have Mound City News Independent clippings about a 50-year celebration of the Mound City Nazarene Church April 7, 1994.

Other Holt County churches included in the collection from the College of the Ozarks were: Mound City Presbyterian (1939), Mound City Methodist (1940 and 1964), and the Mound City Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints (1963).

The society also has a file of Summit School histories and photos along with several Summit Country School ledgers on the shelves in the Genealogy Center.

The Holt County Historical Society Genealogy Center at 612 State Street in Mound City will open Sunday afternoon April 7, 1 to 3 p.m., and then be open every Wednesday, 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Board of Aldermen for the city of Mound City was held at the Mound City City Hall on Friday, March 22, 2013. Mayor Chris Krueger called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Those present were Mayor Chris Krueger; Aldermen Kristine Gibson, Jason Biermann, Jim Krueger and Robert Heck; City Clerk Patsy Smith, Henry Just, Shane George, Jack Patel, Larry Knapp and Joe Laukemper.

Mayor Krueger opened the meeting for public discussion of the proposed lodging tax. Mayor Krueger read a letter from the Mound City Development Corporation and an email from Donnie Ireland, both addressed to State Representative Mike Thomson. The correspondence encourages passage of HB140 which "would not impose any new tax, but let the citizens of Mound City decide what is in their best interest". The mayor invited public comments from those present.

BUERGER'S DISEASE: ANOTHER CONSEQUENCE OF TOBACCO USE

A condition known as Buerger's disease has been brought to the attention of the public, recently. This condition is also known as thromboangiitis obliterans and is caused by vasculitis, which is an inflammation of the blood vessels. The actual cause of the inflammation in the vessels is not known, but it is believed that the chemicals in tobacco can cause swelling in the blood vessels and begin the chain of events leading to death of the tissues.

Buerger's disease can affect blood vessels in other parts of the body, such as the brain and heart, but it most commonly causes swelling in the hands and feet, which can lead to blockage of those vessels by blood clots. When the blood flow to these areas is decreased, there may be pain, tissue damage and possible gangrene (which is death or decay of body tissues). Ultimately, the condition may result in the amputation of the affected areas.

Although Buerger's disease can occur in people that use other tobacco products such as cigars and chewing tobacco, or those that do not use tobacco, it is far more common in those who are cigarette smokers. Those who are considered heavy cigarette smokers, who typically smoke 11/2 packs or more per day, are at greatest risk of developing the disease. The condition is more common in men ages 20-40, but it can occur at any age and also affect women and children. Some symptoms of the disease are:

Pale, red, or bluish hands or feet

Cold hands or feet

Pain in the hands and feet; may be severe

Burning or tingling

Pain in the lower extremities when walking - frequently in the arch of the foot

Development of painful sores, ulcers on the hands or feet, or other skin changes. There may be blood clots in the veins of extremities, just below the skin and the presence of a condition known as Raynaud's phenomenon; a narrowing of the blood vessels which causes decreased circulation to the fingers and toes and may lead to ulcers or gangrene.

Buerger's disease cannot be cured. The patient needs to stop use of all tobacco products. Most measures are directed at controlling symptoms. Among the things that may be helpful are avoiding cold temperatures, application of warmth and gentle exercise to help increase circulation to the hands and feet. Doctors may prescribe medications such as aspirin and vasodilators to help expand blood vessels. They may attempt surgical bypass of blood vessels in an attempt to improve circulation to the affected areas and may even cut the nerves that supply the affected area in an effort to reduce the pain. Eventually the patient may experience infection or tissue death that is so serious that amputation of fingers, hands, or feet must be done

The best way to prevent Buerger's disease is to never begin use of tobacco products, but if you already use them, you should stop and seek medical care promptly if you have symptoms.






