Korean veterans honored at Saturday night event

The Paul P. Shutts Post #121 hosted a dinner on Saturday, April 10, as a salute to honor 25 Korean War veterans. Spouses and family members were invited to attend with the honored veterans.

After the "Table for One" ceremony, the nearly 50 honorees, spouses, legion members and family members enjoyed a nice meal.

The guest speaker for the evening was World War II veteran, Wilbur Wright, of Fairfax, MO.

Wilbur recounted for the attendees many stories about his experiences the day that Pearl Harbor was bombed. His vivid portrayal of events, as he witnessed the attack firsthand, was captivating.

Wilbur shared how his own life was spared no less than four times that very day, as he was missed by a torpedo as his ship sank, he avoided the sinking of the Helena (another ship), watched as an airplane gunner trained his gun on him and two others, but missed, and again when he saw closeup a second gunner with his gun trained on him, but the gun never fired.

Wilbur had many books of Pearl Harbor for those present to view, as well as the map of Pearl Harbor with the position of ships in the bay.

After many captivating

stories by Wilbur, a history of the Korean War was shared by Russ Northup.

The Korean War was a military conflict between the Republic of Korea, supported by the United Nations, and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, supported by the People's Republic of China and the Soviet Union. The United States and the United Nations came to the aid of the South Koreans in repelling the Communist invasion. The war began on June 25, 1950 and an armistice was signed on July 27, 1953.

There were 5,720,000 that fought in the war, 36,516 died, and there were 8,100 missing in action.

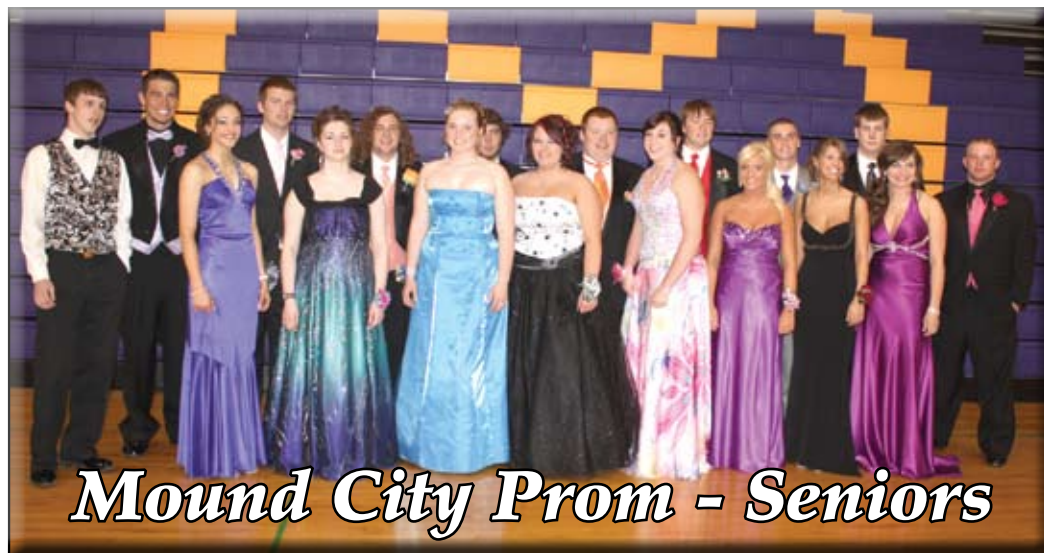

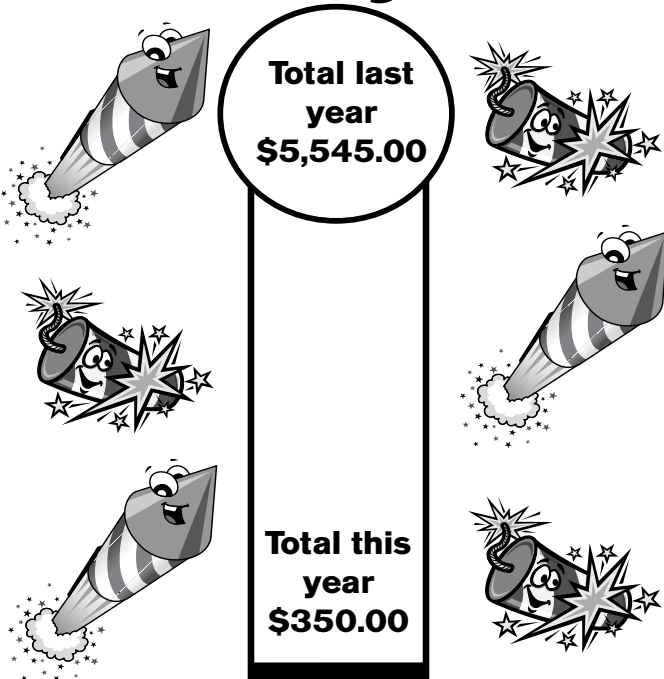

Remembering

"Home is where your hat
is," an old saying I don't think
much of. There is another one
that fits most of us and that
is, "Home is where your heart
is." It doesn't matter where it
is, whether a big fine home, a
shack, located in the moun-
tains, off the seashore, in a big
city, in a small town or on the
farm-that's where the heart
is.

It always remains the same,
regardless of where you even-
tually end up living, you'll
always remember your birth-
place and where you grew up,
which is a good thing.

When I was growing up be-
fore WWII, families more or
less stayed together. If they
moved to better themselves,
they still looked after each
other. The military did open
up moving opportunities due
to military life and defense
work. Unfortunately, there are
always exceptions, and some
families literally dumped
some of the family.

We had the country farm,
which some called the Poor
Farm, that took in certain in-
dividuals, making the begin-
ning of the massive health
care systems of today.

My dad's parents were sepa-
rated and Grandma lived for
a long time and later went to
live with my aunt when she
needed more care. She would
regularly make periodic visits
to dad and his six brothers,
as long as she was able. We
kids always looked forward

to Grandma's visits, most of
the time anyways. Taking
grandparents into the homes
of loved ones when they were
unable to work was a com-
mon practice then, too. When
Granddad visited, we were
kind of scared of him, but not
Grandma. Also, maybe an
uncle or aunt would move in
and become a big part of the
family and would help out
in any way that they could.
That helped everyone, not
only making them feel needed
but they were needed. When
nearly everything back then
was done with a hand and a
strong back, it worked out
well, at least in most cases.

Remember, those were the
days when everyone pulled
their own weight. Sometimes
a non-relative would become
part of a family by working
for their room and board; this
was a way of life until changes
in our culture required move-
ments for employment, and
divided up the family to start
over in various locations.

We had an extra house
on our farm, called the Old
House, where Dad let fami-
lies and sometimes an older
single man live there rent free
and would pay them some to
help Mom around the house
and relieve him of some of
the chores. They might watch
the windmill, keep the water
tanks full, see that the hogs
and cattle had plenty of food
and water, hoe the garden and
just being around helped.

There were several older
ladies in the community that
were passed around to our
Old House as well as others to
stay for a week or so at a time
and then we'd take them to
another place of their choos-
ing. Again, this was a com-
mon practice to help persons
that need the help, especially
during the winter months. We
kids always welcomed them
into our house, other than
helping them in a few things,
we enjoyed them for they were
full of stories and had a lot of
knowledge that they passed
on to us.

That's a change in today's
society. I don't know if our
helpful government control
of some matters would allow
things of the past to continue
as they were, no money in
that. I remember when Bet-
ty's grandmother had to go to
a nursing home and the one
and only time I went along
to see her. She didn't want
anything in the way of help-
ing her there at the home, she
just kept saying, "I want to go
home." That bothered me so
bad, I never went back with
Betty.

That's what I'm saying, that
no matter where we are, the
thought of going home will al-
ways be there. The thing we
should all remember is, we'll
all feel this way sooner or
later, unless you already are.
Look around and see where
your grandparents are, if
they're still living.

CDC CONTINUES TO RECOMMEND VACCINATION FOR H1N1 AND SEASONAL INFLUENZA VIRUSES

CDC recommends influenza vaccination as the first and most
important step in protecting against the flu. In response to
ongoing, persistent 2009 H1N1 activity in the United States,
CDC continues to encourage vaccination at this time for all
persons 6 months of age and older. Flu activity, caused by
either 2009 H1N1 or seasonal flu viruses, may rise and fall,
but is expected to continue for weeks. The majority of 2009
H1N1 deaths have occurred in people between the ages of 50
and 64 years of age; 80 percent of whom have had an
underlying health condition.

*Anyone who wants to protect themselves against 2009
H1N1 should get vaccinated. However, vaccination is
especially important for people at higher risk of serious
complications from 2009 H1N1.*

This includes the following:

- People with certain health conditions, such as lung diseases
including asthma and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease
(COPD), diabetes, heart, or neurologic disease.
- The very young, and those people 65 years and older.
 - Women who are pregnant.
- Anyone traveling to an area where 2009 H1N1 might be
circulating should get the 2009 H1N1 vaccine. It is best to get
the vaccine at least 2 weeks before the start of your trip.

Nearly 50 people attended to learn more about area war veterans Richard Barrett, Mound City; Wilbur Wright, Fairfax; and Bob Smith, Mound City. The trio recently traveled to Washington, D.C., on the Honor Flight, which allowed them to visit and reflect on their memorials.

The war heroes brought medals, a fighter jet replica, a miniature train replica and other items from their service to share with Show and Tell patrons. Audience members were able to speak with them one-on-one about their experiences. Kathryn Swymeler is the site admin-

istrator and event organizer. "The Show and Tell allows people to come in and talk about their experiences," Swymeler said. "It lets us all know that these things are right here in our community."

Smith was a member of the Air Force during World War II. Wright, who served in the Navy, was present at the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Oregon Masonic Lodge #139 to sponsor MoCHIP Child ID program

With more than 80,000 children processed through the MoCHIP Child ID program in four years, MoCHIP is clearly a presence in the community and vows to remain so! Taking place on Saturday, April 24, at the TJ Hall Building in Oregon, MO, the Missouri Masonic Family will be on hand to further ensure the safety of area children, free of charge. The program will be administered from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

No parent wants to believe that the unimaginable could happen to them, though nearly 2,000 children are reported missing or abducted in the United States each day. The peace of mind MoCHIP provides to Missouri families is invaluable.

The program consists of five major components—digital photographs, digital fingerprints, vital child information and emergency contacts, a dental bite impression, and two laminated ID cards. The photographs, fingerprints and child data are burned onto a mini-CD that is compatible with the Amber Alert system already in place. The dental impression provides a virtual diagram of the child's biting surface, which, like fingerprints, is unique to each individual and further supplies enough saliva to provide a DNA sample that can also be used as scent source for trained canine search teams. Combined, this five-part process provides a dramatic, time-sensitive recovery tool for authorities.

Once the child is processed through the program, which generally takes only 15 minutes, the parent is armed with a single pre-printed envelope that instructs authorities in the event of an emergency, something a parent in crisis would undoubtedly have trouble with and a proactive measure to combat the time sensitivity involved in recovery. Within a matter of minutes, the MoCHIP CD can be loaded into a computer directly from a police officers automobile and entered into the Amber Alert system. Girls and boys ages

11 - 21 are statistically most susceptible to become missing and the MoCHIP packet, that contains all the child's vital information, has been tested six times that we know of and resulted in all children/teenagers being returned safely and promptly to their parents' care.

On the day of the MoCHIP event, parents are urged to gather pertinent information such as, doctor, dentist and emergency contact and phone numbers, allergies, medications and parent work, cell, and assorted phone numbers. Information collection forms and permission slips can be downloaded from the mochip.org website and filled out ahead of time. Height charts and scales are available at the event to facilitate the most current details regarding the child.

As would be expected, security and privacy are of utmost importance. All information and specimens are collected on site, processed and provided to the parent or legal guardian in a yellow envelope. 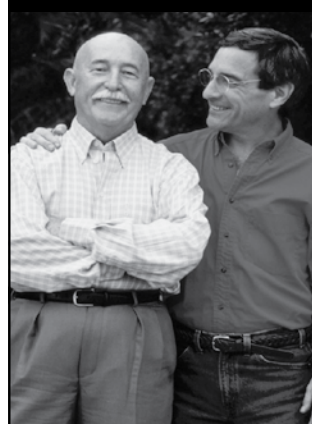

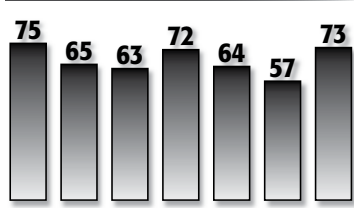

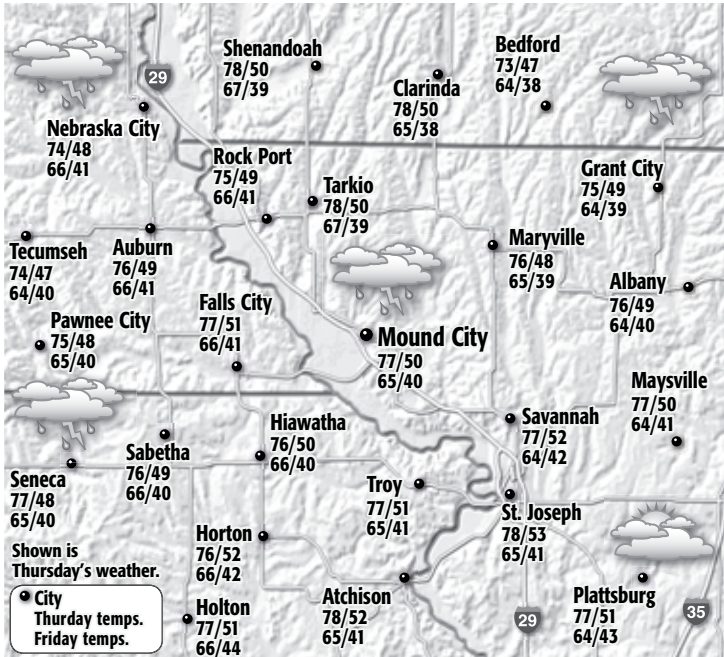

It's still not too late to turn in your Census form

Holt County with 60% response rate

The Missouri Statewide Complete Count Commit-tee wants residents to know that it is not too late to par-ticipate in the 2010 Census.

"We want anyone who hasn't yet filled out their form to complete it and send it in now," says Kelvin L. Simmons, Commissioner of the Office of Administra- tion and the chairman of the Complete Count Committee. "We also know that there are some residents who did not receive a form. Those people can call the telephone ques- tionnaire assistance line at 866-872-6868 for help. They can also visit the 2010.cen- sus.gov website to find a site in their area to pick one up."

According to the Take 10 Map on the U.S. Census Bu- reau's web site, <http://2010.census.gov/2010census/take10map/>, Missourians continued to respond at a rate slightly above the na- tional average. On April 13, the map showed Missouri with a 69 percent response rate and Holt County with a 60 percent response rate. The national average on that day was 66 percent.

Simmons noted that Perry County was the top county on April 12, with 77 per- cent of residents respond-

ing, while Camden County, at the Lake of the Ozarks and Taney County, which contains Branson, had the lowest response rates in the state. Some of the low re- sponse rates in these areas could be attributed to vaca- tion homes. The Census Bu- reau will confirm this with in-person visits to these ar- eas.

Census data is used to de- termine the distribution of federal funding as well as the number of Congressi- onal seats that states receive. It is estimated that Missouri receives \$1,327 per year for every person counted. Fur- ther, Missouri will retain or lose its ninth Congressional seat by counting or missing less than one percent of the population.

"The sheep kind of stepped on my leg, but it didn't hurt too bad," William stated about the ride.

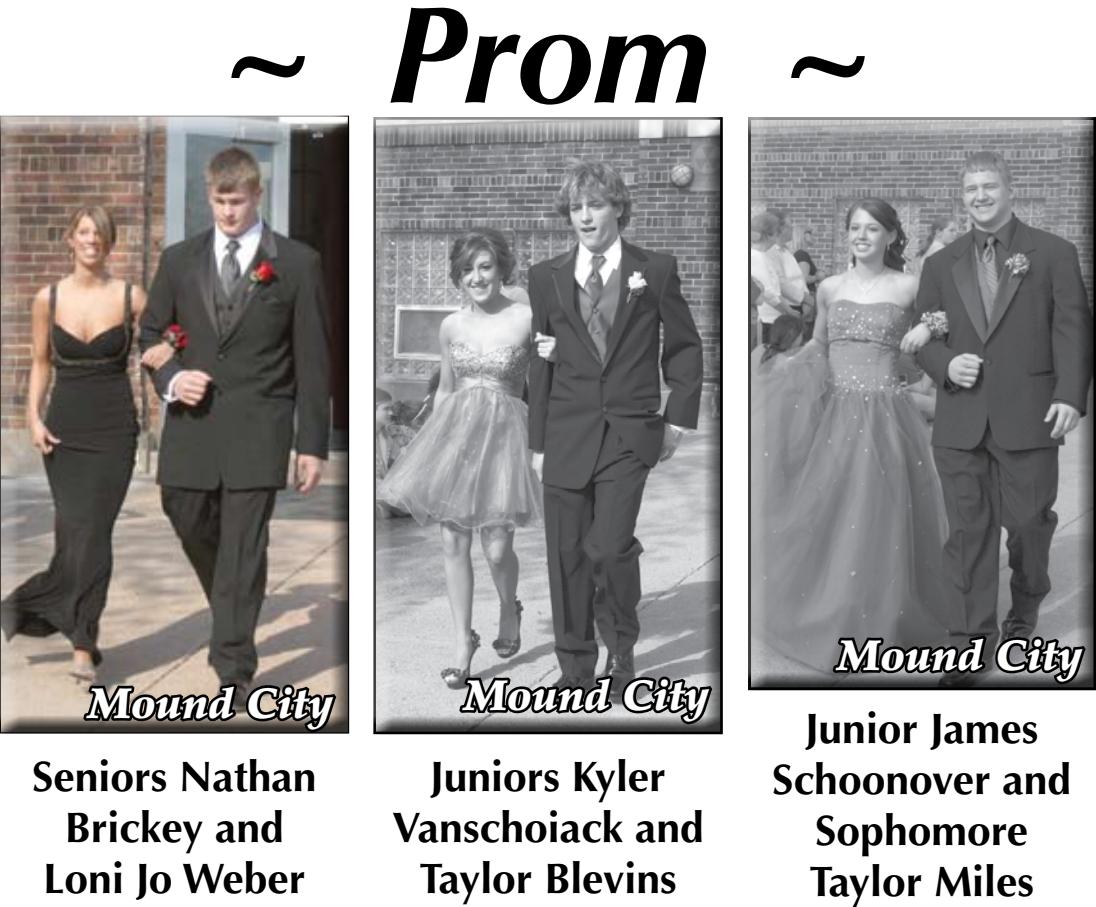
This is not William's first championship in mutton busting. He also won the mutton busting contest at the Mound City Rodeo in July of 2009.

Nodaway-Holt to participate in Missouri Integrated Model program

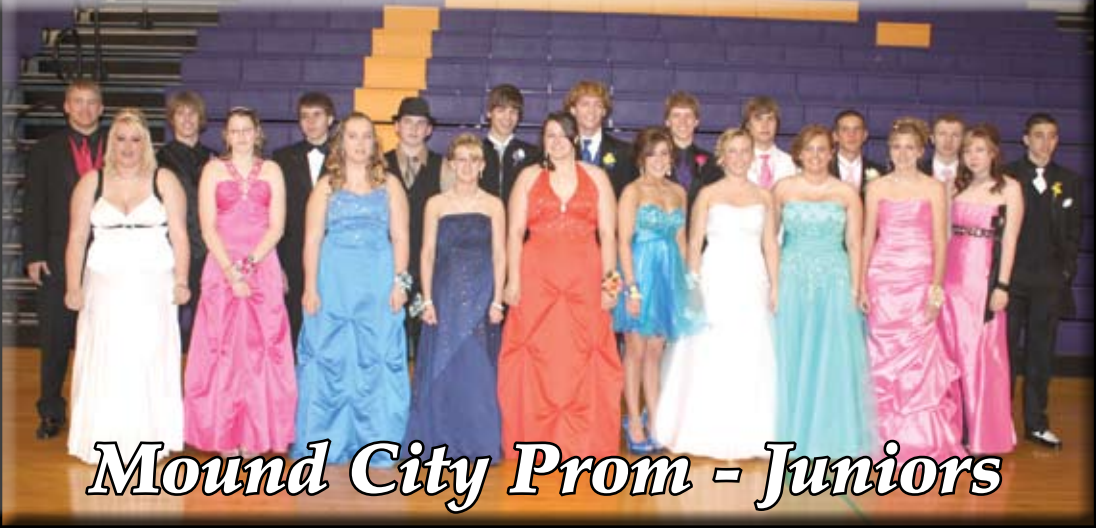

After highlighting the district's needs, the team created an action plan. One priority for the district was to develop a shared mission and vision, which provides a roadmap to the school im- provement endeavor.

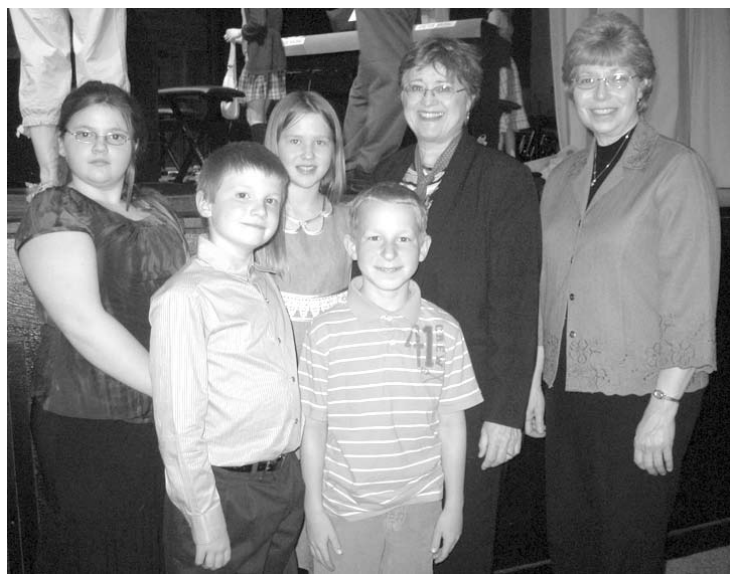
The district mission is, "Quality education today for a successful tomorrow." The vision is, "Be a quality system: enlighten, instruct, intervene, model and col- laborate."

County receives funds for supplement emergency food and shelter programs

District 2, consisting of Atchison, Gentry, Holt and Worth counties, has been chosen to receive \$8,250 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area. Atchison County will receive \$2,625. Gentry County will receive \$2,435. Holt County will receive \$2,202. Worth County will receive \$1,089.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; the Jewish Federations of North America; the Salvation Army; and United Way Worldwide. The local board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

The local board will determine how the funds awarded to District 2 are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area.

The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the national board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government; 2) be eligible to receive federal funds; 3) have an accounting system; 4) practice nondiscrimination; 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs; and 6) if they are a private, voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Youth turkey season harvests

Missouri's 2010 Youth-Only Turkey Season was held this past weekend for kids ages 15 and under. Several kids took to the woods (along with a parent or guardian) in high hopes of seeing a wild turkey up close. Some of these kids were able to get a little closer and ended the day bagging a turkey.

The youth hunters of Atchison County harvested a total of 30 turkeys (26 adults and four juveniles) this past weekend. Holt County hunters also harvested 30 turkeys (21 adults and nine juveniles)

and Nodaway County hunters harvested 34 turkeys (24 adults and 10 juveniles). For the northwest region, 477 turkeys were harvested this weekend with 370 being adults, five bearded hens, and 102 being juveniles.

Statewide there were 3,945 turkeys harvested. The young hunters bagged 2,787 adult gobblers, 556 bearded hens, and 1,102 juveniles. Although all kids were not successful in terms of harvesting a turkey, many were simply rewarded by the time they spent in the outdoors.

Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Waste Collection in Atchison County this Saturday

The Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments announces that a Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Waste Collection will be held this Saturday, April 17, 2010, in Atchison County. On Saturday, the waste collection will be held from 8 a.m. until 12 noon at the Atchison County Highway Barn, located two miles south of Rock Port, MO, on the west side of Highway 111.

There is a variety of acceptable wastes that will be collected. Examples of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) are: fertilizers and pesticides, household chemicals (bleach, ammonia, cleaners), batteries, CFL bulbs, mercury, antifreeze, oil-based paint, and varnish. DO NOT MIX HHW TOGETHER; KEEP HHW IN ORIGINAL PACKAGING.

Examples of E-waste to be collected are: computer monitors, computer hard drives, computer accessories, fax machines, televisions, microwaves, and cell phones.

www.nwmorcog.org. On the website, there will also be proper disposal techniques described to dispose of the unacceptable wastes.

Minimal fees will apply for proper disposal of waste to help offset the high costs of recycling and proper disposal.

The collection is open to residents of Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway, and Worth counties. Photo identification is required. Businesses are not eligible for the program and are subject to the rules established by the Missouri Statutes regarding HHW/E-waste disposal.

The collection is sponsored by county commissions and the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments and is funded by a grant through the Missouri Department of Natural Resources and the Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District.
