

Gavins Point releases reduced to lessen downstream flooding

Basin above Sioux City, Iowa, was 2.6 million acre feet (MAF) during April, 89 percent of average, according to the U.S Army Corps of Engineers (Corps). "Conditions in most of the basin during the first half of April were dry and warm. However, heavy rains during the last half of the month increased runoff into the reservoir system," said Jody Farhat, chief of the Corps' Missouri River

Runoff in the Missouri River Basin Water Management Division. The widespread rain also increased flows on many of the tributaries that join the Missouri River below the reservoir system, causing river levels to rise above flood stage. "Rainfall events like we've seen over the past couple of weeks can cause localized flooding downstream of the reservoir system. Gavins Point releases were reduced from 21,000 cfs to 14,000 cfs over several days because many locations downstream of Nebraska City rose above flood stage," said Farhat.

> When possible, the Corps will utilize the available flood control space in the reservoirs to limit downstream river levels; however, the ability to significantly reduce flood risk along the lower Missouri River diminishes at locations further downstream due to the large uncontrolled drainage area and the travel time from the Gavins Point Dam. "Flood risk reduction remains a primary consideration as we progress through 2016. While the risk of widespread flooding from upper basin runoff is low this year, floods can and will occur as a result of spring and summer thunderstorms, particularly along the lower Missouri River where soil moisture is much wetter than normal," Farhat added.

> Gavins Point releases will be increased as the downstream stages fall, which will slow the decline of the river, but will not contribute to peak stages.

"Soil and water stewardship is important to Missouri farmers, and we are fortunate to have a state program that helps farmers implement costly, but needed, conservation practices on their land. Missouri is the envy of other states with the improvements made possible by the onetenth cent parks and soils sales tax, both for soil and water conservation and for our state parks," said Missouri Farm Bureau President Blake Hurst. "We appreciate Governor Nixon's support for renewal of this landmark program and encourage Missouri voters to renew it once again

this November." "Missouri corn farmers have a long history of investing in our soil and natural resources," said Morris Heitman, President of the Missouri Corn Growers' Association. Missouri's Parks, Soils and Water sales tax provides funding for the Missouri Soil and Water Conservation Program, which assists farmers and landowners with soil and water conservation by providing partial reimbursement for a number of management

Since the tax was last renewed in 2006, more than 61,000 conservation practices have been implemented through \$348 million in costshare grant projects coordinated by Missouri's local Soil and Water Conservation Districts. To date, more than 177 million tons of soil have been prevented from eroding into Missouri's streams, rivers and lakes.

Missouri's Parks, Soils and Water sales tax is also the primary source of funding for Missouri's nationally acclaimed 88 state parks and historic sites.

Sheriff's office to receive two new vehicles; commissioners discuss bridge repairs

The Holt County Commission met Monday, April 25, at 9 a.m., at the Holt County Courthouse in Oregon, MO. Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll were in

County Clerk Kathy J. Holstine presented minutes for approval. Following review, a motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the minutes.

Bob Ripley, Oregon Times Observer, joined the commission to invite the commissioners to a meeting on Friday, April 29, with Catherine Hanaway, candidate for Missouri Governor.

Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, met with the commission to discuss the possibility for a summer food program, but no county business or organization participated in the contract.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock appeared before the commission to discuss a formerly tabled matter to purchase one Dodge Durango and one Dodge pickup truck to add to the sheriff's patrol vehicle fleet. He had received a quote from 911 Customs to properly outfit the vehicles to patrol car specifications including light bars. Commissioners discussed the purchase and agreed to bid for financing of the two vehicles and associated components necessary for police service with the purchase price of approximately \$28,100 for each vehicle and \$6,300 each in police

package installation. Commissioners acknowledged that there is no budget appropriation for a new vehicle purchase in the 2016 budget, but approved the purchase with financing to start in April of 2017.

Wayne Flanary, University of Missouri (MU) Extension Agronomist, discussed MU student participation in a clean-up day at Schooler Cemetery near Maitland, MO. Glenn Caton provided a brush cutter and David Carroll furnished a tractor and loader for the work. Mr. Flanary presented before and after pictures of the

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann provided an update on equipment repairs and various roadway issues being ad-

dressed in the county.

Commissioner Carroll reported that Norris Quarry donated 85 tons of rock for Holt Road 190. Kinney Construction plans to donate 125 tons of rock on Holt Road 120 between Highway 113 and Raintree Drive, 62.5 tons on Hagar Drive north of Holt 130, and 62.5 tons of rock on Grevstone Drive north of Holt 130 to bring those roadways back into pre-construction condition. Carroll also noted that Road and Bridge employees replaced a corrugated metal pipe on Lincoln Road earlier in April.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, May 2.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, May 2, at 9 a.m., at the courthouse. Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll were in attendance.

Carla Markt, Oregon, approached the commission to provide an update on a recent Missouri River Recovery and Implementation Committee (MRRIC) work group meeting she attended in Omaha, NE. She discussed Adaptive Management strategies being considered by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and potential impacts to land in Holt County with spring or fall increased releases from Gavin's Point Dam to allow for creation of piping plover and pallid sturgeon habitat.

County Clerk Kathy J. Holstine discussed PW00165, a project on Holt Road 130 to replace a damaged box culvert from storms that occurred in September, 2014. The repair project is part of a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) disaster declaration. The county has requested an "Improved Project" to allow for a 61 feet long, 9.5 feet diameter, step-bevel corrugated metal pipe to be placed in the waterway rather than repairing the old concrete culvert. Ms. Holstine reported there is a discrepancy with State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) related to the Improved Project. Commissioners wish to proceed with FEMA project funding of approximately \$20,000 rather than repair the project wholly with county funds. Ms. Holstine will prepare the documents necessary to request reimbursement from SEMA.

Jeff Holstine, Holt County Johnson Grass Board, appeared before the commission to give a report on plans to start work with Bill Keiffer and Russ Marrs working for the board to spray noxious weeds and Johnson Grass on county right-of-way. Mr. Holstine noted he hopes to make three trips around the county over the summer, weather permitting.

Wayne Flanary, MU Extension Agronomist, gave an update on work at the annex building.

Collector Donna Cotton appeared before the commission to present the Annual Settlement of Funds for collections. She reported total distributions to the various taxing entities of Holt County collected through her office up to February 28, 2016, as \$10,225,337.99.

Mrs. Cotton also made a request on behalf of the Holt County Museum and Research Center to take a sapling from a locust tree in the northwest corner of the courtyard. This tree is believed to be the oldest tree in the courtyard and was established prior to the first courthouse being located on the grounds. Commissioner Sitherwood had recently requested to use grant funds for a forestry specialist to survey the courtyard trees. He recommended the museum board work with the forester to choose the right time and location for extracting the sapling.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann approached the commission to give a departmental report. He noted that Missouri Department of Conservation cost share program rock is nearly complete; truck repairs continue with truck 399 needing a brake

evaluation and truck 299 at Dave's Diesel for repairs. He also noted that Bill Metzgar asked him to make repairs to a corrugated metal pipe on Keystone Road that is rusted out in the bottom. Mr. Biermann has placed the repair on the schedule. Also scheduled for work is the approach to the Little Tarkio River bridge on Holt Road 130 that has a crack in the concrete from someone walking an excavator over the bridge without proper protection. Mr. Biermann asked the commission to consider a temporary repair until engineer Phil Schrick, Professional Engineer (PE), can get approvals for a permanent repair. The crack has now caused the concrete to crumble and the rebar to be exposed. He also reported that Road and Bridge employees have made a temporary repair to the doors at the Mound City Mausoleum. Additional work is needed for Memorial Day. A motion was made, seconded and passed to patch the bridge until approvals can be obtained for a permanent bridge.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock reported that patrol vehicles ordered through Laukemper Motors will be built May 6th or 7th. Bids for financing the cars was set for Tuesday, May 10, 2016, at 10 a.m. Sheriff Wedlock also requested the commissioners approve Commenco as a consultant on the 911 Phase 2 Wireless transition to move trunk lines and alley circuits. Commissioners approved the company's technical assistance for the project.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Tuesday, May 10.






