and retirement destinations is not a new trend in the U.S., but numbers have steadily changed over the past few years, and rural areas, like Holt County, have seen a mass exodus affect their populations.

To take a look at the reasons behind the falling statistics, after the media-dubbed "Great Recession" of 2007 to 2009, rural areas, known as "nonmetro" in census-speak, saw employment fall by about 5 percent, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) reported. While most cities started to recover, nonmetro counties had zeropercent growth.

majority of nonmetro counties between the first half of 2012 and the first half of 2013," the USDA noted in the 2013 edition of "Rural America at a Glance."

Compounding the issue were consistently high poverty levels and variations in pay between workers in rural areas and those in cities.



Solar panels do Mound City school a power of good

Mound City R-2 has taken energy efficiency to a new level, thanks to an agreement between the Board of Education and Brightergy, a Missouri-based company that focuses on energy independence.

The school has signed a 20-year lease for solar panels placed on the gymnasium and vocational building roofs. According to Superintendent Ken Eaton, "At the end of the lease, we have the option to keep the panels or remove them. I would hope that at the end of the 20-year period, we will be able to refurbish them and continue."

Eaton added that production credits, as part of the government's stimulus package and efforts toward green energy, funded the project, and the agreement with Brightergy called for no up-front costs.

The panels, 86 of which are on the gym and 54 on the ag building, are rated at 40.5 kilowatts, Brightergy reported. They will produce 55,080 kilowatt hours of solar electricity, and in total, the school will be saving \$2,562 annually.

"To me, it doesn't sound like a lot, but over a 20-year period, that's \$108,000," Eaton said. "That's a tremendous amount of money."

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Another gift came from Erma Hinkle, a retired schoolteacher who, Burnsides said, "loved history." Hinkle compiled scrapbooks on the history of the Village of Big Lake, but she died before completing her most recent book.

"Her scrapbooks are phenomenal," Burnsides said. "I took them home and finished them up."

The oldest book dates to 1884. When asked what has stood out in the 42 years the Historical Society has been in Holt County, Burnsides, as well as Norma Jean McCurry and Carolyn Fansher, pointed to the detail in the obituaries.

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
Commencement exercises for Craig and Nodaway-Holt

Remembering

"Mothers"

Did you ever wonder what it was like to be a mother back in your grandmother's time or even way back as far as you can go in today's genealogy? You might be able to track her across the new world, from the time she stepped off of a ship and began an adventure into the unknown and up to you, today. Now, we kind of take Mom for granted; we expect her to be home waiting for us (husband and children), to come home to relax in a clean, happy environment with Mom ready to listen to all our problems and happy things all at once. We never thought that Mom had more critical happenings than us. Probably, she had to play electrician, plumber, yardman, chase down the dog, get the cat out of a tree, listen to a salesperson — a lot of extra jobs on top of normal ones, after getting everyone to work or school, etc... The bathrooms, kitchen, each bedroom was always each morning left a mess, but she was happy to clean them up and was usually content. Why? Because she was a mother. But if she happens to work outside the home, she needs help; things changed then, for everyone had extra things to do or should have to do to help relieve Mom. That's when we find out how much she does each day.

If your ancestor came in on the East Coast and settled down there, probably their lifestyle never changed much from the "old country," and Mother's work was waiting for her like before. But sooner or later, parts of her family would decide to join a large number of adventurers and head west to settle in new settlements to buy or homestead some land or set up a small business. Making that dangerous trip meant that the farther west they went, the more changes they had to meet and do every day. The life of a new pioneer woman and mother was so demanding that many perished along the way. Helping to drive a wagon with either oxen or horses, along with setting up camp and cooking on open fires, washing clothes and bathing in streams, rivers and lakes, gradually wore one out. They had to become proficient in the loading and firing of various weapons against American Indians, animals and outlaws after their livestock and money were taken. They also had to nurse the sick and wounded and even care for youngsters along the way.

Gradually, as things became more civilized, everyday life, like it was back in the more settles areas they had left, began to exist again, making time available

once again for mothers to be able to have their lives back. When the mother started working outside the home, in some cases to help with the family expenses and sometimes as a single mother, they began to see other opportunities: business executives, teachers, politics, military, sports of all kinds, aviation, banking, nurses, doctors, truckers, etc... Now some are wanting to be involved in combat, back like mothers were, I guess, in the west movement. At least they wouldn't have the old single-shot black powder guns some of the grandmothers had. One thing I know, since I lost Betty, I can't handle my work and what she did too, even though I helped her when I could before. It sure takes two.

The dictionary states, "Mother, a female parent, to give birth to, produce, to care for or protect like a mother." Back several years ago when the electronic field came out with automation, I cut out a piece from a bulletin that I think describes a mother much better, and automation also: "Automation is a technological process that does all the work while you just sit there; when you were younger, this was called 'MOTHER.'"






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Annabelle M. Roettger



addition to completing In energy-efficient projects around the school (the windows and roof have been replaced), Eaton, and the teachers, are taking green energy to the classrooms.

"We're trying to send a message to kids that you can do things differently and still benefit," Eaton said, not long after pointing out a stack of letters about recycling from fifth-grade students on his desk.

Once the solar panel system is up and running — around Tuesday, May 20, Eaton said - students will have the opportunity to visit Brightergy kiosks, which will display the amount of energy being produced, among other information. As Brightergy stated

in a press release, "Mound City's leased solar-energy systems are part of the Brightergy's Brighter-Schools program...[which] turns each solar-powered school building into a learning lab as teachers use both actual energy production data from their school's solar systems and an inquiry-based approach to teach students about energy basics, human impact and sustainability, and engineering and technology."

Although there are not currently any plans to add solar panels to the rest of the school ("It's not cost effective enough," Eaton explained), what solar panels there are seem guaranteed to have an impact not only on classrooms but also on the environment

"It'll be an interesting project," Eaton said.

April Drug Take-Back exceeds fall 2013 collection

The Saturday, April 26, Pharmaceutical Drug Take-Back event, in cooperation with Missouri Rural Water Association (MRWA), netted at least 1,118.1 pounds of unwanted medications, an amount that exceeds the collection efforts during the fall of 2013 by 200 pounds or more. According to City Clerk Patsy Smith, Mound City turned in about five pounds.

The MRWA effort included 22 public water systems as sponsoring drop-off sites. Two of these have yet to report their results. Another water system will hold its event Thursday, May 22, in conjunction with National Public Works Week.

"Pharmaceuticals flushed down the toilet get into wastewater and do not get removed in our wastewater treatment processes and thereby pass through in the wastewater effluents, which research has shown causes pollution to our waters," MRWA Management Circuit Rider and Event Coordinator Larry VanGilder said. "Some of the pharmaceuticals get trapped in the bio-solids in our wastewater treatment process, which ends up being disposed of by land application, and this, again, is a detriment to our environment as those pollutants absorb into the soil."

Even trash receptacles pose a threat. "Pharmaceuticals which are disposed of through the trash end up in a landfill," Van-Gilder said, "and when containers holding pills deteriorate, it allows the hazardous chemicals to leach into the soil and eventually travel to the waters of the state."

VanGilder added that "Drug Take-Back events avoid harm to our environment by collecting the pharmaceuticals in a proper and secure manner and properly disposing them through a controlled incineration process conducted through the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency."

With the help of sponsoring water systems throughout the state, MRWA will continue to work toward the elimination of unwanted or unused pharmaceuticals in a responsible manner.

"This is the most effective, safest and most sustainable method of disposing ... unwanted drugs and getting them out of the reach of children or those who may illegally, inappropriately do harm to themselves by consuming them when they get ahold of these drugs," VanGilder said.

MRWA offers its gratitude to public water system representatives, local law enforcement agencies and citizens disposing of unwanted pharmaceuticals. Their willingness to devote time and attention to this worthy effort, even to the point of sacrificing personal time on a Saturday, contributes to a better world for everyone.

"We at MRWA are proud to participate in coordinating these events as we are confident that every effort makes a difference. This program continues to produce positive results which enhance the environment our children and grandchildren will inherit," VanGilder said. "As a grandpa, I am on board with this concept."


