One of the biggest issues facing the State Park is the sewer system. The manhole that was washed out during the flood has remained untouched at its location at the end of the parking lot between the pool and the restaurant. That area is still marked by a 15' drop-off from the parking lot to the water's surface and the manhole is nestled in a hole that is nearly 12' deep. 

# Have a safe July Fourth weekend!

Colonel Ron Replogle, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, reminds Missouri's travelers of the importance of safety during the upcoming July Fourth holiday.

In 2011, 14 people were killed and 478 injured in Missouri over the holiday in 1,055 traffic crashes. One person was killed or injured every 9.5 minutes. Of that total, troopers worked 259 crashes, including eight of the fatalities and 130 injuries during the 2011 July Fourth holiday. Troopers arrested 168 people for driving while intoxicated during last year's holiday weekend.

The 2012 counting period for the July Fourth holiday will be from 6 p.m., Tuesday, July 3, to 11:59 p.m., Wednesday, July 4. This is a 30-hour counting period compared to the 2011 holiday counting period of 78 hours.

The Highway Patrol will be participating in Operation C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) over the July Fourth holiday weekend. All available officers will be patrolling Missouri's roadways enforcing Missouri's speed limit, seat belt, and alcohol laws, in addition to being available to assist motorists.

Troopers throughout the state will participate in a 20-Mile Trooper operation on July 3 and July 8, 2012. This operation will include interstates 35, 44, 55, and 70, and U.S. Highways 60 and 61. Troopers will be targeting all traffic violations, and be especially vigilant of aggressive driving violations.

Motorists who need assistance or who witness criminal activity while traveling on Missouri's roadways can contact the nearest Highway Patrol troop headquarters by calling the Patrol Emergency Report Line at 1 (800) 525-5555 or \*55 on a cellular phone.

The Highway Patrol also reminds the public that the Fourth of July holiday is one of the busiest boating holidays of the year. In 2011, there were no boating fatalities. However, eight people were injured in 11 boat crashes. One person drowned in the Current River in Carter County during last year's July Fourth holiday. Additional officers will be working on the state's waters to ensure safety. Missouri's boaters are asked to do their part by remaining alert for other boats and swimmers, and being courteous on the water. With more boats on the water, it is even more important to pay attention when operating a vessel.

Remember: • Distractions and alcohol consumption slow reaction

 Appoint a passenger to help monitor the other boats around vou.

 Make evasive maneuvers early and deliberately. The many firework displays after dark attract many more boaters at night.

At night, remember to: • Check your vessel's nav-

igation lights before heading out, and be sure to have spare bulbs on board.

 Avoid overloading your boat with too many passengers. This can cause the boat to become swamped and affect the handling of the boat.

Observe Missouri's nighttime speed limit of 30 miles per hour on the water.

• Slow down and take your time. Nighttime accidents tend to involve more serious injuries and damage, due to the lack of visibility.

Finally, it is illegal to discharge fireworks from a vessel, so leave them in a safe place on shore.

"Please be courteous whether operating a vessel or vehicle," said Colonel Replogle. "Remember to buckle up in your vehicle and wear a life jacket when on or near water. If your celebration includes alcohol, designate someone else to drive, whether operating your boat or your car. Don't become a statistic."

# Corps awards \$8.3 million to restore Missouri River navigation channel

neers has awarded \$8.3 mil- at that point. lion in contracts for repairs to the Missouri River Bank rate roughly 250,000 tons of Stabilization and Navigation Project along nearly 116 river miles stretching from Sioux City, IA, to Rulo, NE.

The Bank Stabilization and Navigation Project (BSNP) provides a 300 feet wide by nine feet deep channel for navigation. Numerous structures in the BSNP sustained damage during the high flows of the Flood of 2011, reducing the system's capability to perform as designed.

# This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

# 50 Years Ago - 1962

- An annual Mound City swimming meet was scheduled for July 6 at the Mound City swimming pool. Teams from Maryville, Hamburg, Rock Port and Auburn were slated to compete. The Mound City team was being coached by Allen Gillis and Miss Lois Pat-
- An article heralded the persistence of young children who wanted desperately to have a 4th of July celebration, when no adults or organizations seemed to be organizing it. They collected funds for fireworks, which started the ball rolling for activities that ended up filling the day with fun activities.
- Following Little League and Pony League games, the Mound City high school band performed a concert. After a half hour fireworks display, a dance was held on the tennis courts for which an orchestra had been procured.
- The Mound City School hired Darwin Propes as principal and guidance counselor for 1962.
- Mound City Flowers and Gifts was accepted into membership by the Florists' Telegraph Delivery Association, a worldwide organization that can wire floral arrangements to anyplace in North and South America and to 189 countries abroad.

# 25 Years Ago - 1987

- Esther Field was selected as the grand marshal of the 1987 Fourth of July parade.
- A Kansas man drowned in Big Lake after diving into a shallow muddy area near Alpine Beach.
- A week after a visit by the Chinese, a bus loaded with 37 farmers and their wives from France unloaded at Yocum Service, Inc., in Mound City. Darrel Yocum welcomed the group, which was on its fourth day of a five-day tour.
- The 92nd Craig Reunion was nearly a miss, as a traditional carnival could not be secured for the annual event. A two-day event was decided on instead of a four-day event. A parade and the crowning of Little Mr. and Miss Craig Reunion continued.
- Jamy Miles, Carl Mackey, Jeff Holstine, Nathan Kelim, Kent Bohart and Steve Panning attended the FFA State Leadership Training Camp at Lake of the Ozarks, MO.

# 10 Years Ago - 2002

- Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) workers were back at Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge for the first time since 1986. YCC workers included: Laura Edwards of Mound City, Krystel Tubbs of Bigelow, and Ryan Brown and Preston Catterson of Oregon.
- The Mound City School Board voted a 2 1/4% increase for teachers' salaries, which was a \$500 increase in base pay. The raise brought the minimum salary to \$22,500 for a beginning teacher.
- Work stopped on the new 7,500 square feet Dollar General store that was to be built at the corner of 5th and State streets in Mound City. Tax Increment Financing (TIF) concerns stopped the work, as city aldermen discussed a proposed larger TIF district.
- Over 375 riders were registered for the 5th annual Buckin' Blast Rodeo that was to be held in Mound City at the rodeo grounds. The event was sponsored by the American Legion Post.
- The State Theater Arts Council was disturbed to learn that funding from the Missouri Arts Council could be cut by as much as 50%.

# Innovative minds combine efforts

• Has clean sweep- which raises and lowers the row cleaner and can be controlled from the cab

"With ground selling for up to \$7,000 an acre, this was a way to improve production on the ground we own by as much as 15 bushels to the acre," stated Young. "It helps farmers get the most out of their acres."

In 2008, John Deere employee Chris Fischer (Falls City, NE, native) was challenged by farmers to make a control box that allowed farmers to shut anhydrous rows down in sections. The request sent Fischer off and running in search of ways to develop the unit. After a couple months, John Deere employee Chris Krueger of Mound City joined forces with Fischer in the development process. The two soon found companies that would help make some of the components for the new unit. The two innovative employees built about a dozen of the units that first year. In March of 2010, the two formed Precision Ag Innova-

tions, LLC, and started the patent process on their new product. By the end of 2010, the new business had collaborated with Hartfiel Automations of Kansas City, MO, and streamlined its product into a completely assembled and leak tested unit, known as PrecisioNH3, that can be installed by farmers. The PrecisioNH3 ties in with a farmer's current GPS system, and allows the farmer to shut off two anhydrous rows at a time.

With 20 systems running on the new design, the two John Deere employees opted to leave their jobs and join the Unit Pro team, to concentrate on marketing and servicing their products. The PrecisioNH3 units are still being sold at both the Mound City and Hiawatha, KS, John Deere dealerships.

"We decided that with our company expanding, we couldn't devote enough time to it and continue to work at John Deere," remarked Chris Krueger. "In addition to business demands and regular work schedules, Chris Fischer is a farmer and I'm the mayor of Mound City, creating entirely too many things to be done.'







# Gov. Nixon asks Farm Service Agency to begin damage assessments statewide to livestock, crops from excessive heat and severe drought conditions

of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) to conduct damage assessment reports for all 114 Missouri counties and the city of St. Louis to determine the extent of damage to crops and livestock because of the excessive heat and severe drought conditions persisting throughout the state. The governor and his administration have been monitoring drought conditions across the state throughout the spring, and will continue to do so this summer.

"The heat and drought will likely cause crop yields to decrease and livestock to be under greater stress," Gov. Nixon said. "This year, many Missouri farmers have undergone a number of hardships caused by weather conditions. Hay is already in short supply, impacting livestock farmers. Timely damage assessments by the Farm Service Agency will help those farmers who have been affected recover more quickly."

Gov. Nixon said the state of Missouri offers a hay directory for farmers looking to purchase

Gov. Jay Nixon recently hay for their livestock. Those asked the U.S. Department selling hay also are encouraged to list themselves on the directory. The hay directory can be found through the state website, MO.gov.

The governor's request for damage assessments from the drought is the first step in the process of declaring counties as primary disaster areas. Primary disaster counties are those that lose at least 30 percent of the estimated yield of a single crop, or where individual farmers suffer production losses of more than 30 percent.

A disaster designation would allow eligible farmers to be considered for assistance from the USDA's Farm Service Agency. Farmers who qualify would receive FSA emergency loans. Affected farmers would apply to FSA, which considers each application individually on its merits. Farmers in counties contiguous to primary disaster areas also could be eligible for assistance.

As the damage assessment process moves forward, more information will be available about applying for assistance.


