Clean Line Energy to hold informational open houses about clean energy transmission line project

Clean Line Energy (Clean ment is a crucial component industry in the state and the Line) is hosting two weeks of public open house meetings in Missouri to invite community members and landowners to learn about the Grain Belt Express Clean Line transmission project. The Grain Belt Express Clean Line is an approximately 750-mile overhead, direct current transmission line that will deliver 3.500 megawatts of low cost. renewable power from Kansas to Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and states farther east.

During these meetings, the Clean Line team will discuss potential routing options for the direct current electric transmission line project and provide the public an opportunity to provide feedback. 



This Week's **History**

From the Mound City News archives

50 Years Ago - 1963

- Three Oregon youths took high honors in the state high school rodeo at Carthage, MO. Linda Noel, 16 year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Noel, was selected queen; Nikki Sue Buck, 18 yearold daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russel Buck, won allaround cowgirl honors; and Phil Noel, 18 year-old brother of Linda Noel, finished with the championship buckle in the boys' cutting horse contest.
- Three young boys admitted climbing the fence at Mound City's Municipal Swimming Pool, and taking a refreshing dip late one warm night. It would have seemed wrong to have severely sentenced these boys, which a Mound City ordinance permits, when it was learned that several others had committed the same offense. A stern warning was printed in the paper for all parents and young folks to read and take heed.
- Ninety-nine Holt County 4-H members attended the annual one-day 4-H camp held at Big Lake State Park. The evening program was attended by approximately 300 parents, leaders, and 4-H members. Cathy Heck, Summit Jolly Mixers 4-H Club, and Steven Cunningham, Star View 4-H Club, were elected king and queen. Rebecca Andes, Bellevue 4-H Club, and Allen Heck, Lads and Lassies 4-H Club, were selected as the best dance couple.
- Members of the senior band of Mound City High School attended "South Pacific" at the Starlight Theatre, Kansas City. Uniform fees had to be paid before attending.

25 Years Ago - 1988

- An Atchison-Holt ambulance unit returned to Mound City on a part-time basis. Space was rented at the Evans Circle Lounge as headquarters for the Mound City based unit.
- Construction began in earnest on the new grass greens at the Mound City Country Club. Work began in the northeast corner of the additional ten acres that the golf association leased the prior
- Rick Miller addressed the Mound City City Council concerning a citizens' group that was interested in repairing and using the old State Theatre building for school and community productions, music groups, and other miscellaneous projects when the city took possession. This would be a non-profit organization that would apply for grants to help with expenses and put a lot of volunteer work into repairing the structure. The group requested that the city lease or turn the building over to group members. They wanted to have the approval of the council before seeking the necessary funds. The council agreed with the plan and told them to proceed, pending the city obtaining possession of the deed.
- Congressman Tom Coleman was in Mound City to meet with Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service officials to discuss the drought and how it was affecting Holt County farmers.

10 Years Ago - 2003

- A Subway franchise restaurant opened in the new Kwik Zone convenience store this week. The rest of the store and Phillips 66 gas station were to open the following week.
- Gov. Bob Holden gave final approval for the naming of a three-mile stretch of I-29 near Craig in honor of William "Bill" Lark, a sheriff's deputy killed in a crash there in 1994.
- Holt County native, Lowell Mohler, stepped down as director of the Missouri Department of Agriculture and became a member of the Missouri Conservation Commission.

Storing fresh produce well

By Janet Hackert, Regional Nutrition and Health Education Specialist, University of Missouri Extension

Summer and fall are great times of year to get fresh produce at bargain prices. To take advantage of good prices and not waste food, it may be important to know how to store foods well to keep them at their freshest for the longest time.

Temperature of a refrigerator, basement, cold storage room or cave can be tested with a refrigerator thermometer. Since temperatures can vary at different locations within an available space, use a thermometer in each area to test its tempera-Remember that when a door to a refrigerator or cold room is held open, warmer air from the room can warm the storage space within. Close the thermometer in the space, let it equilibrate, and then check it quickly to find the best options. Humidity can be checked with a hygrometer or humidity meter in a similar way.

When considering storage conditions, look at temperature and humidity combinations. Different types of produce do best in different conditions. Some crops (such as broccoli, cabbage, mum time. kohlrabi and cauliflower) do etables including green onions, and Storage.

sweet corn and asparagus.

For vine crops like cantaloupe, cucumbers and watermelon, cool, moist storage is better suited to keep them longer. This means 45-50°F and 80-90 percent humidity. Eggplant, green beans and sweet peppers also do well under these conditions. Other crops, like onions and hot peppers, prefer cool, dry storage, or 32-55°F and only 50-60 percent relative humidity. Pumpkins and winter squash, on the other hand, do best in the warm, dry conditions of 55-60°F and 60-70 percent humidity. Lastly, warm, moist storage of 55-60°F and 80-85 percent humidity is best suited for sweet potatoes and tomatoes.

Under the proper conditions, produces' shelf life can be prolonged to a few extra days or weeks, or even a few months for some items. The University of Missouri (MU) Extension publication, Vegetable Harvest and Storage, G6226, explains these conditions and describes just how and when to harvest specific types of produce and how crops, like root crops and cole to store each type for the maxi-


