## Council hears proposal for winery and plans for new building for fireworks' sales

The regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen for the city of Mound City was held on Tuesday, July 9, 2013. Mayor Chris Krueger called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Those present were Mayor Chris Krueger; Aldermen Robert Heck, Jim Krueger and Kristine Gibson; City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, Sewer Superintendent Kelly Graves, Police Officer Craig Buckles, Larry and Diann Knapp, Scott Laukemper, Joe Laukemper, Donald Protzman, Judy and Holly Howard and City Attorney Brian Tubbs. Absent was alderman, Jason Biermann.

There being no additions, deletions or corrections, Alderman Krueger moved to waive the reading of the minutes from the June 11, 2013, regular meeting and approve them as presented, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

**Presentations/Guests**  
Larry and Diann Knapp, White Rose Restaurant & Gifts: Liquor License Application - Mr. Knapp presented a license application for the sale of liquor by the drink (Resort) and Sunday sales. Billboards: Mayor Krueger

asked Mr. Knapp about past discussions on billboards promoting the city. Mr. Knapp stated the city can apply for a special permit from the state to place up to three signs on either side of the interstate within 60 miles of town. The signs are limited in size to 160 square feet and can only promote historic areas and points of interest such as museums, the refuge, etc. Mr. Knapp gave estimates totaling around \$1,000 per sign for materials, not including the art work, and suggested perhaps volunteers would install the signs. It is possible that a local or area farmer may be willing to permit placement of a sign in a fence row without cost. Mr. Knapp felt the signs, which would be owned by the city, would be less expensive than leasing a sign from him or someone else at around \$300/month. Mayor Krueger will meet with Mr. Knapp for further discussion.

After further review of White Rose's liquor license application, Alderman Gibson moved to approve a new liquor by-the-drink and Sunday sales license (Resort) for White Rose Restaurant & Gifts L.L.C., Heck seconded. Approved unanimously.

Donald Protzman: Winery - Joe Laukemper introduced Don Protzman, Maryville, MO, and stated Protzman has put together a proposal to bring a winery to Mound City in the building owned by the Mound City Development Corporation at 1423 State Street. Laukemper stated there are 2-3 other projects being considered, but the others have not developed a plan. Laukemper says in order to get proper financing to move forward, Protzman will need consideration from the city's TIF (tax increment financing).

Mr. Protzman stated he intends to produce 2,000 cases of wine per year and sell it retail. In order to apply for a state liquor license, he needs a city license or letter of approval stating the city has approved the winery. Protzman questioned what license he will need from the city. City Attorney Brian Tubbs stated the city ordinance will be amended to mirror what the state requires so whatever license he applies for with the state will be the same for the city. Protzman stated that under the state license for a domestic winery, he is permitted to sell a bottle of wine to an individual and

then can open and serve the wine to them. He also plans to sell on Sunday. He is projecting to open the winery in 3-6 months. Alderman Heck moved to approve issuance of a Domestic Winery and Sunday Sales liquor license to Donald Protzman, pending approval by the State Division of Liquor Control, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously. The clerk will prepare a Letter of Approval for submittal with Protzman's state application. City Attorney Tubbs will prepare an ordinance for the August meeting to amend the

liquor license regulations.

Mr. Protzman stated there are major expenses with this project and he will not be able to proceed without assistance from TIF funds. Joe Laukemper suggested a pre-TIF agreement be considered so Protzman can proceed with the plans. The clerk explained that legal costs associated with a TIF project can be \$10,000 or more and are at the expense of the developer. Gilmore and Bell Attorneys,

## Contracts awarded for highway projects in northwest Missouri

The Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission recently awarded four contracts for projects in northwest Missouri. All four projects are scheduled for the 2013 construction season, according to the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT).

One of the projects is located in Holt County. U.S. Highway 59 east of I-29 near Craig, MO, will receive grading and drainage to relocate a county road. The \$163,000 project was awarded to Ideker, Inc.

This project will take place during the 2013 construction season and motorists should expect lane closures and delays during construction.

# Clean Line Energy to hold informational open houses about clean energy transmission line project

Clean Line Energy (Clean Line) is hosting two weeks of public open house meetings in Missouri to invite community members and landowners to learn about the Grain Belt Express Clean Line transmission project. The Grain Belt Express Clean Line is an approximately 750-mile overhead, direct current transmission line that will deliver 3,500 megawatts of low cost, renewable power from Kansas to Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and states farther east.

During these meetings, the Clean Line team will discuss potential routing options for the direct current electric transmission line project and provide the public an opportunity to provide feedback. The potential routes are still under review at this time and are subject to change based on public feedback. Clean Line is inviting landowners with property within 'planning corridors' centered around each potential route to provide their input. The public open house meetings will be held in communities near the network of potential routes in order to provide an opportunity for landowners and community members to learn about the project firsthand, ask questions and provide input.

Similar to the trains that carry grain harvested in the Midwest to markets, the Grain Belt Express Clean Line will move wind energy from its source in the grain belt of the country to markets with strong demand for low-cost, clean power. Clean Line believes that public involve-

ment is a crucial component of the transmission line development process and has identified a network of potential routes based on extensive feedback from community leaders, landowners, government agencies, conservation and non-governmental organizations, as well as environmental and engineering data collected during more than two years. Feedback received from the Missouri Public Open Houses will help Clean Line refine the potential routes and ultimately select a proposed route to file for approval with the Missouri Public Service Commission.

The transmission line and wind farms will bring about tremendous rural economic development, create thousands of temporary jobs and hundreds of permanent jobs, and dramatically reduce pollutants by millions of tons. The Grain Belt Express Clean Line will deliver three Hoover Dams' worth of energy per year, enough for more than 1.4 million homes, based on average electricity consumption. The wind energy delivered by the transmission line will put downward pressure on wholesale electricity prices because it will be cost competitive with other sources of generation. Residential, commercial, and industrial customers in Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and states farther east are likely to benefit from the increased market competition. In addition, Missouri manufacturers will likely see increased demand for their products with the growth of the wind

industry in the state and the completion of the Grain Belt Express Clean Line, leading to increased employment for those companies and others involved in the wind energy sector services.

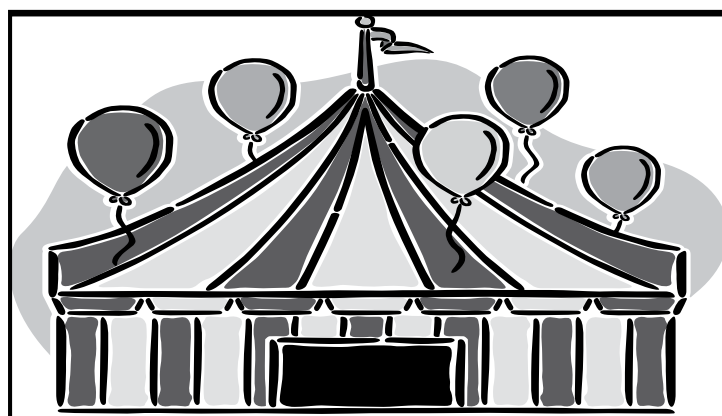

### 50 Years Ago - 1963

- Three young boys admitted climbing the fence at Mound City's Municipal Swimming Pool, and taking a refreshing dip late one warm night. It would have seemed wrong to have severely sentenced these boys, which a Mound City ordinance permits, when it was learned that several others had committed the same offense. A stern warning was printed in the paper for all parents and young folks to read and take heed.

- Ninety-nine Holt County 4-H members attended the annual one-day 4-H camp held at Big Lake State Park. The evening program was attended by approximately 300 parents, leaders, and 4-H members. # Council hears proposal for winery and plans for new building for fireworks' sales

Kansas City, MO, have provided legal services for past TIF projects. Laukemper asked if City Attorney Tubbs could provide the legal services, but Mr. Tubbs is hesitant to take on the additional work and time involved for such a specialized project. Council members agreed they are in favor of doing whatever is required or needed on the city's side to encourage a new business and instructed the city attorney and clerk to contact Gilmore and Bell to determine associated legal costs and answers on doing a pre-TIF agreement.

Judy Howard: Selling Fireworks in City Limits – Ms. Howard and daughter, Holly, were present to discuss their plans to construct a new 40' X 80'-100' building and sell fireworks within the structure. They would like to build within the city limits, but city ordinances prohibit the sale of fireworks within the city. Howard presented sales tax information from Rock Port, MO, and felt Mound City would benefit from increased sales tax revenues if the ordinance was amended to permit sales within the city. She suggested restricting sales to within a permanent structure so tents would not be permitted. They would abide by all state requirements for licensing, including location, and would probably sell from May-July and maybe December. They would not be shooting fireworks out of the business. After further discussion, Alderman Krueger moved to authorize the city attorney to draft an ordinance to permit the sale of fireworks within a permanent structure, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously. Mr. Tubbs will have this ordinance for the August meeting.

### New Business

Annexation Survey – The council reviewed and discussed the survey completed by Midland Surveying of the proposed voluntary annexation area. After discussion, council members asked Attorney Tubbs to proceed with drafting a petition for annexation from the landowners which is the next step in the process.

### Department Reports

Police – Monthly Report:

The monthly report was reviewed. Officer Buckles reported that the 2010 Impala has some kind of cooling problem that is being looked into. Buckles also reported that the new software for the car cameras has been installed in the 2012 Impala and seems to be working. The department will be installing the software on the camera in the 2010 Impala as well.

Sewer Department – Kelly Graves reported that a new center console was installed in the 2012 Chevy truck to accommodate the radio and other equipment.

Water Department – Request Bids for Loader Tractor/Backhoe: After talking with city maintenance staff, Alderman Krueger is not sure there is a need for a new tractor at this time. He suggested waiting and maybe looking for a mini-excavator next year instead. City workers have never operated a tractor with a backhoe attachment so they don't know how well it would work for them. Graves reported the city's John Deere tractor has 800 hours on it. He felt a mini-excavator could be used for more than digging, but whatever the council decides is fine. It was noted that the old 1975 backhoe is not safe to operate. After some discussion, council members decided to table the matter for a later date.

Street Department – Tree Trimming Along City Streets: Mayor Krueger reported that the list of trees needing trimmed along Savannah and Nebraska streets is quite extensive, although some residents have opted to take care of their own. The council discussed safety concerns if city employees have to trim the trees by standing in the bucket of the tractor. They felt it would be best to hire somebody to trim the trees and city employees could then pick up the limbs and haul them to the tree dump. It was agreed to advertise for bids for tree trimming along the truck route with bid opening at the August meeting.

Council members discussed a complaint concerning a storm drain grate on Savannah Street at Grand Avenue. Kelly Graves will get a cost estimate to repair or replace the grate.

Later in the meeting, Mayor Krueger reported that Michael McFadden, McFadden Construction, contacted him about seal coating some streets and the two parking lots this summer. McFadden will be working in the Maryville, MO, area and

would like to do projects in close proximity at the same time. The council agreed to advertise for bids for sealing the streets and parking lots that were asphalted last year with bid opening at the August meeting.

Park/Pool Department – Griffith Park Play Equipment Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Ramp: There was no further information on a handicap ramp for the Griffith Park play equipment. Alderman Gibson reported that the new play equipment has been getting a lot of use this summer and the pool has been very busy the last few weeks. Smith reported that revenues from the pool are down this summer compared to last year, but that is to be expected since the pool didn't open until late because of issues with the pump and motor.

### Ordinances

Bill No. 7-9-2013(1): Amend Municipal Code Table Entitled "Vehicles Prohibited From Using Certain Streets and Alleys" was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance of the city of Mound City, Missouri, amending Table V-B. Vehicles prohibited from using certain streets and alleys of schedule V, controlled access roadways of Title III, traffic code of the municipal code of the city of Mound City, Missouri, by adding Walnut Street from Paxton Street to Hill Street; and providing for an effective date thereof.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Krueger seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Unanimously approved. Absent: Biermann. Bill approved. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1220.

Bill No. 7-9-2013(2): Amend Budget for Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2013, was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance of the city of Mound City, Missouri, amending the budget for the fiscal year ending June 20, 2013, adopted by ordinance No. 1197, by amending certain revenue and expenditure accounts.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Gibson seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Unanimously approved. Absent: Biermann. Bill ap-

proved. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1221.

Bill No. 7-9-2013(3): Establish Procedures for Financial Disclosure for Certain Officials/Conflict of Interest was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance of the city of Mound City, Missouri, to establish a procedure to disclose potential conflicts of interest and substantial interests for certain municipal officials.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill, Krueger seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Unanimously approved. Absent: Biermann. Bill approved. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1222.

### Administration

Financial Reports/Year End Reports/TIF Reports: Financial reports were reviewed and discussed. The clerk discussed the quarterly TIF report. Project #2, Kwik Zone/Subway, is anticipated to be paid in April, 2018, which is a year sooner than originally projected. Project #3, McDonald's, should be paid off in January, 2018, which is about two years sooner than projected.

Executive Safety Committee Meeting Minutes: Minutes were reviewed. Alderman Gibson and Clerk Smith will remain as the official representatives to MIRMA.

Meeting Date: The council set the next regular meeting for Tuesday, August 13, 2013, at 7:30 p.m.

Local Sales Tax Reinstated: The clerk reported that Governor Jay Nixon has signed a bill that immediately reinstates local sales taxes for vehicles purchased out-of-state or from an individual. Within the next two years, the city will have to submit to voters whether to repeal the sales tax.

Misc.: Council members confirmed that the 3% raise for city employees effective July 1 was to include part-time reserve police officers, Gillette and Bolin.

### Accounts Payable

Alderman Heck moved to approve the bills paid subsequent to the June 11, 2013, meeting and to approve and pay the current month's bills as presented, Krueger seconded. Approved unanimously.

### Adjournment

On motion made by Alderman Heck and seconded by Krueger, the meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

## Storing fresh produce well

Summer and fall are great times of year to get fresh produce at bargain prices. To take advantage of good prices and not waste food, it may be important to know how to store foods well to keep them at their freshest for the longest time.

Temperature of a refrigerator, basement, cold storage room or cave can be tested with a refrigerator thermometer. Since temperatures can vary at different locations within an available space, use a thermometer in each area to test its temperature. Remember that when a door to a refrigerator or cold room is held open, warmer air from the room can warm the storage space within. Close the thermometer in the space, let it equilibrate, and then check it quickly to find the best options. Humidity can be checked with a hygrometer or humidity meter in a similar way.

When considering storage conditions, look at temperature and humidity combinations. Different types of produce do best in different conditions. Some crops, like root crops and cole crops (such as broccoli, cabbage, kohlrabi and cauliflower) do best in cold, moist storage. This means 32-40 degrees Fahrenheit, and 90-95 percent relative humidity. Other produce that store well in these conditions include greens, legumes like peas and lima beans, and other vegetables including green onions,

sweet corn and asparagus.

For vine crops like cantaloupe, cucumbers and watermelon, cool, moist storage is better suited to keep them longer. This means 45-50°F and 80-90 percent humidity. Eggplant, green beans and sweet peppers also do well under these conditions. Other crops, like onions and hot peppers, prefer cool, dry storage, or 32-55°F and only 50-60 percent relative humidity. Pumpkins and winter squash, on the other hand, do best in the warm, dry conditions of 55-60°F and 60-70 percent humidity. Lastly, warm, moist storage of 55-60°F and 80-85 percent humidity is best suited for sweet potatoes and tomatoes.

Under the proper conditions, produce's shelf life can be prolonged to a few extra days or weeks, or even a few months for some items. The University of Missouri (MU) Extension publication, Vegetable Harvest and Storage, G6226, explains these conditions and describes just how and when to harvest specific types of produce and how to store each type for the maximum time.

## Summer Reading Program presents Missouri: The Cave State

Dr. David Ashley, of Missouri Western State University in St. Joseph, MO, gave a presentation on caves, bats and spelunking on Wednesday evening, July 10, at the Squaw Creek Wildlife Headquarters near Mound City, MO. The program was sponsored by the Summer Reading Program of the Mound City Library.

Dr. Ashley gave an informative and interesting presentation on caves, cave exploration and cave animals. The audience was engrossed for the in-depth visual presentation. Many questions were asked and answered by the inquisitive group of diverse ages. On display were many posters and pictures of caves and things associated with caves from Dr. Ashley's collection.

Synthia Tunnell began the event with pictures of a spelunking trip she had taken with Dr. Ashley in the summer of 2011. She also assisted children who were present with composing a bat craft.

Dr. Ashley brought a bat detector that picks up echolocations emitted by bats as they fly at night and played tapes demonstrating those sounds.

There are more than 6,300 caves in the state of Missouri. Missouri is not only the Show-Me State, but also the Cave State. Most of Missouri's caves are found south of the Missouri River in the Ozarks. The bedrock in this region is primarily made up of soluble dolomite and limestone rock formations. Numerous caves are also located between Hannibal

and St. Louis, as well as in Central Missouri near Columbia.

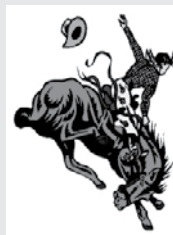

Randy Mendenhall, P.E., Snyder and Associates, presented a final recommendation for work on Candle Road north of Craig, MO, for a nine-foot corrugated metal pipe with flared entry to replace an old bridge structure that has been recently removed. The commissioners had previously agreed to work with landowners at the location and the Big Tarkio Drainage District to complete the project.

At 10:00 a.m., the commission was joined by Jerri Dearmont, Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments (NWRCOG); Steve Cunningham, Union Township Levee District; Emmett Haer, Big Tarkio Levee and Drainage District; Aaron Luce, Levee District #9; Morris Heitman, Corning and Mill Creek levee districts; and Pam Kent, *Mound City News*, for a final closeout hearing of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for levee repairs related to the 2011 Flood.

Mrs. Dearmont reviewed each project separately as follows:

- Union Township Levee District- A non-federal levee participating in the Corps of Engineers' (COE) management program where 80% of the costs of repairs are covered by the COE and 20% by the levee district. The County Commission secured CDBG funds of \$197,355 with NWRCOG selected as administrator for \$9,632. Construction was completed for \$831,700 with Ideker, Inc., selected as the contractor. The levee district provided \$16,000 in match money.

- Levee District #9- A non-federal levee participating in the Corps of Engineers' management program where 80% of the costs of repairs are covered by the COE and 20% by the levee district. The County Commission secured CDBG funds of \$221,312 with NWRCOG selected as administrator for \$10,329. Construction was completed for \$1,210,707 with HB Construction selected as the contractor. The levee district provided \$109,094 in match money.

- Big Tarkio Levee and Drainage District- A non-federal, non-participating levee where 100% of the repairs are covered by the local levee district. The County Commission secured CDBG funds of \$667,317 with NWRCOG

selected as administrator for \$23,320. Construction was completed for \$597,093 with Phillips Grading selected as the contractor. Snyder and Associates provided engineering for \$45,920. The levee district provided \$20,783 in match money.

- Corning Levee District (and Mill Creek Levee District)- A non-federal, non-participating levee where 100% of the repairs are covered by the local levee district. The County Commission secured CDBG funds of \$1,220,707 with NWRCOG selected as administrator for \$39,438. Construction was completed for \$1,350,354.25 with Phillips Grading selected as the contractor. Snyder and Associates provided engineering for \$76,589. The Corning Levee District provided \$21,620 in match money with Mill Creek Levee District providing \$77,000.

Mrs. Dearmont provided final documents for the closeouts, which were approved by the County Commission.

In other matters, the commissioners then discussed a vacancy on Levee District #10 with Steve Cunningham, a Levee District #10 Board Member. After discussion, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to appoint Tom Bullcock, Big Lake, MO, to the board. Commissioner Carroll seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, June 24, 2013.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, June 24, 2013, at 9:00 a.m. with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll in attendance.

County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel presented the six-month expenditure reports for the General Revenue Fund showing the budget at 46.56% (anticipated expenditures were 50%) of the fiscal year, closing at \$771,912. Revenues posted a 55.54% of budget at \$887,429 for the first six months of the year. The General Revenue Fund posted a gain of \$115,517. Commissioners discussed the Sheriff's Departmental Budget line item expense for vehicle purchases and determined that they will not seek financing for two new Durangos in the sheriff's patrol fleet if cash balances remain steady, thereby limiting debt financing.

Road and Bridge Supervisor, Daryl Biermann, joined the commission to discuss various roadway projects and to discuss work scheduled with Burlington-Northern Sante Fe Railroad at T Highway, where lights, gates and signals are scheduled to be installed at Prairie Road.

Commissioners discussed plans for hosting the Northwest Commissioners' meeting at Paradise Park, Oregon, MO, in September.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, July 1, 2013.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, July 1, 2013, at 9:00 a.m. with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll in attendance.

Assessor Carla Markt met with the commission to review the close of the Assessor's Tax Book for 2013, providing the value of all Real Estate property (Residential, Agricultural and Commercial) and all Personal Property in the county. She reported the overall value is up about \$4,000,000 in assessed valuation, including new construction, improvements on existing structures and reclaimed agricultural land from flood damage.

Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, joined the commission to report Medicare billing for the county has been approved and will allow for reimbursement to the Health Department for services rendered in that program.

Road and Bridge Supervisor, Daryl Biermann, reported on various roadway projects and the County Aid Road Trust (CART) road rock program.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock joined the commission to report Automated External Defibrillator (AED) machine use and needs. Work for radio equipment installation at the McCormick Conservation Area will proceed as weather allows access to the tower. The sheriff asked the commission to consider RSMo. 488.5026, a Missouri Statute that allows counties to establish an Inmate Security Fund supported by a \$2.00 fee on each ticket issued to support identification technology for the jail. In light of newly passed legislation, the sheriff felt the county could benefit from the fee.

Arnie Kreek, Northwest Regional Council of Governments, met with the commission to ask for input on additional Department of Economic Developments tied to Presidential Disaster Declaration 4012 (2011 Flood). Limited funds remain for additional work or potential mitigation projects tied to damage caused in the flood event.

Wayne Flanary, University Extension Agronomist, provided a report on new responsibilities and re-alignment of counties within the extension districts of the state. He noted a part-time 4-H specialist position will be available for Holt County in the near future.

County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel presented historic expenditures and revenues for the sheriff and jail budgets from 2003 through 2012, both of which are funded through the General Revenue Fund. The Jail Departmental Budget's line item for salaries is supplemented by the 911 Fund for dispatchers/jailers. Of note, in 2003 the jailer's annual salaries totaled \$47,006.31, increasing substantially in 2006 to \$108,449.57 and closing 2012 at \$120,520.80. Revenues for direct support of the jail reached their peak in 2007 at \$78,597.60 and have been sliding downward since closing 2012 at \$44,153.41 including Criminal Costs, Prisoner Board and Medicine, Sheriff's Fees and Return of Fugitives Reimbursements.

Commissioners reviewed

a notice from KCP&L that a transmission power line will be built across northern Holt County. Presiding Commissioner Sitherwood reported he has been in contact with Dan Hegeman, KCP&L, about the project's development with more information to come before construction.

Commissioners noted there are no appointments scheduled for the Board of Equalization until July 29, at which time the board will convene to hear those petitioners.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, July 8, 2013.

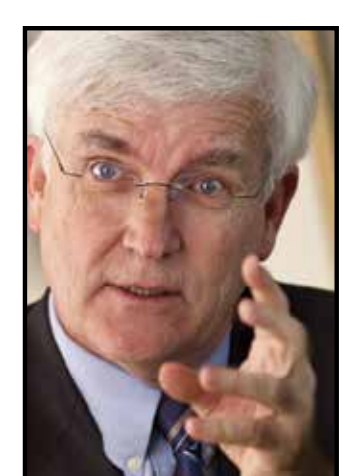
