Golden Triangle Energy appeals tax assessment to **Board of Equalization**

Stockholders, employees and the lawyer for Golden Triangle Energy (GTE) in Craig, MO, appeared before members of the Holt County Board of Equalization (BOE) on Monday, July 16, to appeal the county's 2012 \$22 million property assessment. Present at the hearing were BOE members Mark Sitherwood, Bill Gordon, Don Holstine and Barry Kreek (member Anna Lou Doebbling was absent). Also present were Holt County Assessor Carla Markt, Holt County Clerk Kathy Kunkel, and more than a dozen other interested individuals.

Wayne Tenenbaum, lawyer for Golden Triangle Energy, preempted his address to the BOE stating, "The ethanol industry is in the dumps, plain and simple."

Tenenbaum then articulated the dismal state of the ethanol industry, citing the closings of 31 small plants across the nation. He tossed out figures from a few of the sales of plants that closed, attributing the economic obsolescence that those companies experienced to may soon be in, if trends don't change.

This economic obsolenscence has resulted from the unforeseen high corn prices, the oversupply of ethanol and other contributing factors. Estimates made 4-5 years ago did not foresee corn prices above \$8 a bushel.

Asking the business to pay property tax on an assessed valuation of \$22 million, resulting in a property tax bill of over \$500,000, is simply impossible. Golden Triangle Energy stated that it was appealing to the BOE for a reduction in assessment to

\$15 million. The attorney went on to state that should the company's financial contributing factors change for the 'upside', the company would indeed expect the county to reassess and increase its taxes. GTE is only asking for a fair assessment.

Barry member, BOEKreek, asked for additional input from any of those present at the July 16 hearing. Herb Derks, Dwight Rosenbohm, Byron Fink and Robert Drewes each asked the county for fairness in assessment, restating the value that the business brings to the county.

GTE was built in 2001 under 10-year Chapter 100 bonds. For nine years, the company paid \$32,000 per year in lieu of taxes that was divided between the school district, the ambulance district and the fire district. In 2007, because of the plummet in ethanol value, GTE chose to diversify and began adding a high quality alcohol operation (which did not increase the production capabilities, it is still a 19,500,000 gallon/ year plant).

However, the offer hinged on other aspects, that in the end, GTE decided the bonds would, 'offer little relief'.

According to county ofknowledge the facts regard- ficials, the county had set GTE paid \$210,802 in 2009 taxes under protest. Then, in 2010, the State Tax Commission ruled on the protest and placed the valuation at \$10.6 million on the new operation. GTE then paid an additional \$32,434 in 2009 taxes, coupled with 2010 taxes of \$260.277.

In November of 2011, GTE made the balloon payment to the county for the end of the Chapter 100 bonds in the sum of \$294,000. The plant then paid \$255,775 in taxes under protest in 2011. In all, GTE has paid to date, \$1,415,925 in taxes to Holt County.

The company's newsletter indicated that despite meetings with the county assessor, where GTE employees felt they were very transparent with the company's audited financials, no resolution was made, and an appeal was the necessary next

The Craig R-3 School District stands to profit most from the taxes garnered from GTE. The difference in the \$22 million assessment and the \$15 million assessment could mean roughly a \$108,000 difference for the district. Craig Superintendent Mike Leach would not comment on the district's opinion of the appeal, stating only that the school has a good rapport with GTE and that it is a 'good booster'. He stated that he would 'take whatever he gets and budget accordingly'.

The BOE will meet again before the end of July and stated that it would make a determination on the request for a reduction by July 30.

Dredge in place and ready for action at Big Lake

The arduous task of dredging Big Lake is drawing nearer. Steps made the week of July 9-13 show the earnestness of Holt County farmer, Tom Tubbs, in making this project a reality. On Thursday, July 12, the dredge was put into place by a crane, and a Kansas City, MO, company had arrived to begin fusing together the 12" pipes that will carry the sludge.

Tom Tubbs purchased the dredge at an auction in Blue Springs, MO, in February, 2012, with a two-fold purpose in mind: to remove silt and deepen the lake that has silted in after three years of flooding, and to use the sludge to fill in the acres and acres of scour holes created on his farmland as a result of the flood.

Approximately 2-3 acres of soybeans were recently shredded at the south end of Big Lake in Tom's field to set up the pipe fusing operation. A Kansas City company called Dredge America was hired to work onsite.



The dredge was placed on the lake- At Big Lake on Thursday, July 12, and tested for functionality the same day by Marty Wennihan and Josh Dean, employees of Tom Tubbs. The dredge appeared to be working properly and now awaits the second phase before being ready to pump.

Holt County BOE faced with tough economic decision

The Holt County Board of Equalization (BOE) is faced with a tough decision concerning Golden Triangle Energy (GTE) in Craig, MO, and its property assessment. Golden Triangle officials have asked the BOE to reduce its assessed valuation. Based on several factors, Golden Triangle put on a good argument for lowering the assessment at a hearing with the BOE on Monday, July 16.

The BOE is probably looking at the fact that Golden Triangle had a tax abatement for nine years from the county to help get the business established, and now that the abatement is over, GTE should start paying additional property tax.

Golden Triangle isn't asking for a free ride - only a reduced tax assessment from \$22 million to \$15 million; so the question is whether the BOE feels that it is in the best interest of the taxpayers to agree on a reduced tax assessment or not.

Several factors the BOE must take into account include the economic impact of the facility for Holt County, i.e. 30+ employees receiving reasonable wages and spending some of their income in Holt County; increased corn prices for local producers; increased benefits for other businesses in the county (truckers, utility companies, suppliers, hardware stores, building centers, etc.); support to area fund raisers; and the inevitable increased property tax receipts well above the first nine years from GTE for the Craig school, county funds and other taxing entities.

It's a tough call, but apparently, according to the balance sheets of GTE will have a tough time paying for any tax increase. GTE officials believe that the plant and property should be assessed at around \$15 million instead of the \$22 million currently assessed. In my opinion, this would be a fair compromise for Holt County in order to retain GTE's facility and the economic benefits it brings with it.

I never received any tax abatement for my printing plant project, but I never asked. I believe that every situation is different and should be looked at accordingly. Holt County must continue to look for ways to help businesses survive and locate in our county.

CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENT 2**

Proposed by the 96th General Assembly (First Regular Session) HJR 2

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure:

• That the right of Missouri citizens to express their religious beliefs shall not be infringed; That school children

have the right to pray acknowledge God voluntarily in their schools; • That all public schools

The ReCHAI program is — basic obedience training, mentorship to families who adopt the dogs and training as service dogs for veterans with post-traumatic stress ing soldiers will experience dogs become more adoptable.

In the first phase of the program, veterans like Trista teach dogs basic obedience skills. Dogs participate in this training for four weeks, unless they are adopted. If they are adopted, they are replaced with new dogs from the shelter. During the basic obedience classes, which take place twice a week, the dogs and their handlers train in two separate sessions for about 20 minutes.

Trista enjoys training the dogs, as well as the time she has working side by side with other veterans in the training program. The expertise of training and the camaraderie of veterans has been a good experience for

"Knowing that I'm able to train a dog in basic commands is a great feeling; plus, then I know the dogs are more likely to go to a good home quicker," remarked Trista. "I have my own dog, and I know how The two loves collide in a much it really helped me when I got back."






