"You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby" is July theme for the Forest **City Drug Store Museum**

The Forest City Drug Store, built by Clay Archibald was 1859, turned into a museum by the Riverbend Extension Company and is open to the public for special summer pro-

grams and special tours or meetings, serving up delectible delights of yesteryear.

The drug store was sold in 1870 to Dr. John France from Baltimore, Maryland, when he was informed of the opportunity to run a drug store in the booming river town of Forest City. The building remained in the France family line for 87 years.

After Forest City celebrated its sesquicentennial in 2007 and the drug store was used as a museum, interest was peaked to keep the building as a museum. Subsequently, the Riverbend Extension Company was formed and the company purchased the building in 2008. The museum is now in its third season of providing programs and opportunities for visitors to take part in an original "soda fountain" experience.

The soda fountain was recently restored after much diligence with parts found in Chicago and purchased with funds from a \$3,000 grant from the Messick Trust.

The beautiful original marble soda fountain bar serves



drinks, fountain patrons ice cream, floats, sundaes, malts, shakes and banana splits. There are specials each month as well. Unique marble baseboards cap all the cabinetry in the building. Original hardwood floors, display cases, prescription medicine bins, tobacco cabinets, lead glass cabinets and shelving takes visitors back in time to the days of old on a visit to the old drug store.

During the "You must have been a beautiful baby" exhibit on Sunday, July 18, cherry limeades and brownie sundaes were the specials. Each item is served up in original glassware.

Among the many old "baby things" are bassinets, a buggy, potty chairs, high chairs, clothing items, shoes and pictures. The oldest item on display is a 1875 layette worn by Anna Flacher in Germany. A coat belonging to Larry Fawks in 1903 is part of the display. Items of O'Neil Hicks, who was mayor of Forest City for years and owned the filling station

there, are also on display. The Riverbend Extension

Company will have the "baby items" on display one more week. The museum will be open Sunday, July 25, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

The company is excited to offer a Show and Tell theme in August. It's an opportunity for any individual

to bring in their unique antiques and demonstrations. The museum will be open for those showings on August 8 and 22 from 1:00-4:00 p.m.

September shows on the 12 and the 26 will take visitors on a walking tour of historic Forest City landmarks. The walking tours will begin each Sunday at 1:30 p.m.

The Riverbend Extension Company will host a Harvest Celebration Dinner on October 16 at the Historic City Hall.

On November 7, the company will usher in the hunting season with "A Salute to Bud Slusher" from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the museum.

"Christmas Was Meant for Children" is the theme planned for December 5. The museum will be open from 1:00-4:00 p.m. to view the antique toy display.

Local youth participates in mission trip to Haiti

Mike Bellamy, president of House of Hope Haiti, a non-profit organization that funds orphanages and schools, also made the trip to the Carribean country of Haiti. House of Hope Haiti strives to empower Haitians to be more self-sufficient and educate them both vocationally and spiritually.

Ethan made the trip via three plane rides and arrived in Port au Prince, which allowed them to view the devestation there and the tent cities that had developed as residents left the Port au Prince and had no place to return to. The team's trip got more interesting as members rode in the back of a pickup with 300,000 miles on it through unmarked streets, where honking was the form of signalling, to the village of Cote des Arcidine.

The mission team stayed at a "nice" open-aired hotel that provided members with three meals a day. The food was always fresh, as there is no refrigeration.

"It was neat to watch the lobster come in on a guy's gun," commented spear

Ethan. Some of the team members spent two different days hiking up a 4,000 feet mountain to visit a village where House of Hope had built a church and school. The grueling trip (that Ethan said he puked on going up) was very long and steep. The team registered the children at the school. The children wouldn't know their birth dates, only the year in which they were born. They spent time talking (with help from an interpreter) and playing with the children in the vil-

Ethan Miller, a senior at villagers to see what they needed and how they could help them.

The villagers retrieved water from a natural spring a half of a mile down the hill and hauled it up on their They grew melons, fruit trees and many other vegetables.

The mountain people were very gracious. These sustenance farmers were also very kind and generous in stark contrast to the people in the lowlands. These people worked as a community. Their Christian background had them sharing their love with others. As they could see that they had done well, they wanted to share.

The team also spent three days at two different orphanages, sharing and playing with children ages 3-16 in a Vacation Bible School setting. Different groups led the children in singing, recreation, crafts and Bible sto-

"You could tell that it gave them hope to know that there is something better than what they are going through," Ethan said.

Ethan played his guitar for the children and three female members of his team led the songs. The children would listen and copy the American singing, but they would also sing songs in their language that Ethan would play to.

The group also built tables and benches for the children at the schools to do their homework on.

Ethan, a rural American young man, realizes just how fortunate he is to live where he does, realizing that the Haitians do things just to live to stay alive is their goal.

"It's amazing to think that you can still get to places that don't have a Walmart, grocery store or fast food place anywhere!" remarked Ethan. "If they want gravel, they take a pic axe to a rock and make gravel. We're pretlage. They visited with the ty spoiled."

Local man volunteers with the Red Cross

Holt School District in Oregon, MO, decided to retire. Not able to sit idle, he began looking for things to fill his time. One day as he was driving through St. Joseph, MO, he decided to pull into the Red Cross office. Kevin had no idea what the Red Cross did, but that stop forever changed his life.

After completing an informative course about the many facets of the Red Cross, Kevin joined forces with it in June 2004. He was deployed in August on his first disaster.

Since then, Kevin has assisted with 24 disasters, including four in his own county in Missouri. He has completed training in many different areas of service. He has helped with all the hurricanes, the flood in New York, the fires in California and the floods in Minnesota.

Kevin is part of Mass Care, which encompasses the feeding and the sheltering of clients. He enjoys being on the scene and helping to feed people.

"It's amazing to see how people bounce back," Kevin stated. "To see how they can be as happy as they are."

Kevin enjoys interacting with the many people he comes in contact with during these disasters. Survivors have shared some of the most incredible stories with Kevin.

"It's very rewarding work,"

Kevin Connell, a 30-year Kevin commented, "to be able He is willing to do whatever veteran counselor of the South to help people in ways even as small as giving them a bottle of water.'

> This volunteerism has taken Kevin out of his comfort zone. He likes to be very organized with a to-do list, but has learned to enjoy this line of work where he has to be more flexible, not knowing all the details of each disaster situation. In his area of service, Kevin is sent on site for a period of three weeks at a time, assisting in the feeding and sheltering of people displaced from the disaster.

> When we moved from Fortescue to the back of the lake in 1929, the river was out and flowing in the lake by Courtney's, so we crossed the water at Alexander Crossing. As most moving back then was done with wagons and

wasn't a problem. I wasn't very big, but I can remember sitting in a buggy, with an older neighbor boy, that was hooked on behind one of the loaded wagons. I guess ever since then, I've had a lot of respect for Old Man River.

After the lake got full enough to flow back to the river, the road would become impassible on the south side of the tracks, as the road had not been built up yet. There was a small bridge closer to the tracks over the chute where it turned south to the main river. Dad used to take us kids fishing for Bullheads there, for it was a good spot at that time. During the 50's and later, fishing was good between there and the river when the level was up. The last time we caught 25 or so good sized channel cat was quite a while ago.

With all the levee (dams above), controlled release of water behind them for the benefit of recreation, need for barge traffic, and the so called need for low levels for a few water birds and sturgeon, we end up in a controlled flood and having a nervous "June Rise". 



50 Years Ago - 1960

- Dr. I. F. Sweaney, an Oregon, MO, physician, died after an extended illness at the age of 40.
- More than 3,000 invitations were sent out by the Atchison-Holt Electric Cooperative for its annual meeting. Lunch, swimming, exhibits and a four act stage were slated for the event.
- Clyde Houston of Maitland was reappointed to the Holt County Welfare Commission, joining members Rev. Chas. Hagee of Mound City, Roy Hornecker of Oregon and Harry Dukes of Craig.

25 Years Ago - 1985

- The Holt County Co-op Elevator in Mound City installed a new scale that would accommodate 60-ft. loads, replacing the 30 year-old 50-ft. scale.

10 Years Ago - 2000

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Proposed Statutory Amendment

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, the 3rd day of August, 2010.

PROPOSITION C

Proposed by 95th General Assembly (Second Regular Session) SS SCS HCS HB 1764 Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to:

 Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services?

· Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies?

It is estimated this proposal will have no immediate costs or savings to state or local governmental entities. However, because of the uncertain interaction of the proposal with implementation of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, future costs to state governmental entities are unknown.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 375.1175, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 1.330 and 375.1175, to read as follows:

1.330. 1. No law or rule shall compel, directly or indirectly, any person, employer, or health care provider to participate in any health care system.

2. A person or employer may pay directly for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for paying directly for lawful health care services. A health care provider may accept direct payment for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for accepting

direct payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services.

3. Subject to reasonable and necessary rules that do not substantially limit a person's options, the purchase or sale of health insurance in private health care systems shall not be prohibited by law or rule. 4. This section does not:

(1) Affect which health care services a health care provider or hospital is required to perform or provide;

(2) Affect which health care services are permitted by law;

(3) Prohibit care provided under workers' compensation as provided under state law; (4) Affect laws or regulations in effect as of January 1, 2010;

(5) Affect the terms or conditions of any health care system to the extent that those terms and conditions do not have the effect of punishing a person or employer for paying directly for lawful health care services or a health care provider or hospital for accepting direct payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services.

5. As used in this section, the following terms shall mean:

(1) "Compel", any penalties or fines;

(2) "Direct payment or pay directly", payment for lawful health care services without a public or private third party, not including an employer, paying for any portion of the service:

(3) "Health care system", any public or private entity whose function or purpose is the management of, processing of, enrollment of individuals for or payment for, in full or in part, health care services or health care data or health care information for its participants; (4) "Lawful health care services", any healthrelated service or treatment to the extent that the service or treatment is permitted or not prohibited by law or regulation that may be provided by persons or businesses otherwise permitted to offer such services; and

(5) "Penalties or fines", any civil or criminal penalty or fine, tax, salary or wage withholding or surcharge or any named fee with a similar effect established by law or rule by a government established, created or controlled agency that is used to punish or discourage the exercise of rights protected under this section. 375.1175. 1. The director may petition the court for an order directing him to liquidate a domestic insurer or an alien insurer domiciled in this state on the basis:

(1) Of any ground for an order of rehabilitation as specified in section 375.1165, whether or not there has been a prior order directing the rehabilitation of the insurer;

(2) That the insurer is insolvent;

(3) That the insurer is in such condition that the further transaction of business would be hazardous, financially or otherwise, to its policyholders, its creditors or the public;

(4) That the insurer is found to be in such condition after examination that it could not meet the requirements for incorporation and authorization specified in the law under which it was incorporated or is doing business; or (5) That the insurer has ceased to transact the

business of insurance for a period of one year. 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a domestic insurer organized as a stock insurance company may voluntarily dissolve and liquidate as a corporation under sections 351.462 to 351.482, provided that: (1) The director, in his or her sole discretion,

This act is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state for approval or rejection at an election which is hereby ordered and which shall be held and conducted on Tuesday next following the first Monday in August, 2010, pursuant to the laws and constitutional provisions of this state for the submission of referendum measures by the general assembly, and this act shall become effective when approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon at such election and not otherwise.

Section C. Pursuant to chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this act to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of this act shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to:

• Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare

· Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies?".



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What's in a Disaster **Declaration?**

The recent flooding in Holt County has left local citizens with many questions about a Disaster Declaration. There are three types of disaster declarations that may occur in Holt County related to the recent and ongoing flooding: agricultural, individual assistance and public infrastructure.

An Agricultural Declaration of Disaster is done through the USDA and will be based on the number of acres impacted in Holt County and other Missouri counties that have seen flooding in a determined time frame. That declaration has nothing to do with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) or the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), the local county or political subdivisions.

An Individual Assistance Declaration of Disaster comes from FEMA at the national level and requires the approval of the President of the United States. This process is currently underway. Teams from FEMA, SEMA, the Small Business Administration and local officials surveyed the flood-impacted residential homes the week of July 6. Final reports are expected to be submitted to Governor Jay Nixon by early next week. The Governor will then request assistance from the President. The entire process takes several weeks.

Holt County officials caution flood-impacted residents to prepare for clean-up and make temporary housing decisions based on personal finances not on a pending disaster declaration.

A Public Infrastructure Declaration of Disaster also comes from FEMA and is approved at the national level. Assessment for this declaration was completed the week of July 12. This type of declaration allows local political subdivisions to repair levees, roadways and clean up debris along right-of-ways, as well as be reimbursed for protective measures like sandbagging and emergency dirt work done by the county and various levee and drainage districts. This damage assessment is being compiled alongside assessments from other northwest Missouri counties and will also be sent to the Governor for approval.

Disaster declarations are not mandatory and are based on a total dollars impact in a region. Persons impacted by the flooding in Holt County should continue to document all losses and keep accurate records of expenditures related to the flooding. Should a disaster declaration for agriculture, individual assistance or public infrastructure be approved, persons impacted will receive more information on how to file claims for loss.

> "Accurate reports of production are essential and become the primary component of the 'farm trigger' that is used to determine payment eligibility for the ACRE program," VanGundy said.

> ACRE participants have the option of accepting the county average farm yields or certify actual yields for each year between 2004-2008 to establish benchmark yields for planted covered commodities. In addition, farms enrolled in ACRE for 2009 are required to report actual 2009 production for each planted commodity.

> The deadline to submit yields and set benchmark yields was previously set for July 15. Producers are encouraged to call the Holt County FSA office at (660) 442-3134 to schedule an appointment. Failure to meet the September 1 deadline will result in a program violation and may require refund of any prior payments earned.

Potato leaf hopper attacks area alfalfa crop

This tiny insect is about an eighth of an inch in length, wedge shaped and pale green in color. They are very hard to see as you walk through alfalfa, as they quickly jump and fly.

This pest migrates from the south in spring and often rides on storms that move this insect northward. From there, it drops out and moves to alfalfa fields.

Two to three generations of this pest generally occur in northwest Missouri. Most damage occurs after alfalfa is harvested. These insects use piercing-sucking mouthparts to injure alfalfa. Alfalfa will become stunted and have an inverted "V-shape" on the leaflets.

The economic threshold used to determine when to control this insect is based hopper resistant or not. The sion.

A common canning quandarycan I Can on my ceramic or glass-top stove?

In setting up some upcoming food preservation classes, I came across what The economic threshold has become a common quandary for folks who want to can: Can I can on my ceramic or glass-top stove?

> The first and obvious answer is to check the recommendations of the particular stove's manufacturer. Some say absolutely not; some say it is okay, but with certain stipulations.

The general recommendation for canning is that the canner not be more than 2 inches wider than the burner or heating element. more information, With a ceramic or glass contact Wayne Flanary at stovetop, this is an even greater concern because of damage that can occur. When the canner sits on the hot burner, it reflects heat back down on the stovetop. When the canner is wider, it reflects and traps more heat. These non-burner surfaces are not designed to handle that much heat and can be damaged: discoloration, burner damage, cracking the stovetop, or to the glass stovetop.

Another concern with this er. type of stovetop is that if a

By Janet Hackert, Regional canner is dragged across the top, it can scratch the cooking surface. This must be avoided, even when the canner is full and heavy.

Many glass-top stoves have auto-shutoffs and this can prevent sufficient heating. The stove is designed to shut off when heat is excessive. But if the heat shuts off during the canning process, the required continuous processing time cannot be reached, resulting in food that is not safely canned.

A stove with a smooth Here is why it is an issue. top requires a flat bottom canner to work properly. For boiling water canning, a large, flat, smooth bottomed stock kettle can be used by inserting a rack inside the kettle to keep jars off the bottom of the pot. Canning rings can also be used to elevate the jars. The pot must be big enough to fill the water to 1-2 inches above the tops of the jars and to allow boiling water to circulate around the jars. Some pressure canner makers are making flat, smooth bottomed pressure canners but still recommend checking with the stove manufacturer to even fusing the metal pot make sure they will work properly and safely togeth-

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Controlling big weeds in Roundup Ready soybeans

Many area soybean fields have large weeds. The wet weather has delayed herbicide applications and weeds have continued to grow. Large weeds are difficult to control, so it is important to use the highest glyphosate labeled rate and adjuvants along with other herbicides when needed. To add a tank-mix partner with glyphosate, check the most effective product to control the weed using efficacy charts.

Marestail is common in no-till fields. Marestail is difficult to control when plants are small and is very hard to control when it takes on rapid growth.

The mostherbicide treatment for controlling marestail in Roundup Ready soybeans is probably a tank-mix of glyphosate plus FirstRate. The combination of the two herbicides seems to work better than either herbicide alone, on glyphosate resistant plants. It is important to use the full-labeled rates of glyphosate and recommended adjuvants, including ammonium sulfate. Other tank-mixes to consider with glyphosate for controlling marestail would include Classic and Synchrony herbicides.

in soybeans is waterhemp. Northwest Missouri agronomists have confirmed glyphosate-resistant waterhemp in northwest Missouri. The best way to handle this weed is to use a preemergence herbicide followed by glyphosate. Flexstar, Cobra and Ultra Blazer can be fairly effective for controlling small waterhemp, however, these products will not provide adequate control of large weeds.

As far as sunflowers and cocklebur, glyphosate will provide adequate control. Be sure to use the full rate of glyphosate and since these weeds are tall, adjust boom height for proper spray coverage. Tankmixing Scepter or Classic herbicide with glyphosate may increase control. The residual activity of these products may also help control later emerging weeds.

When weeds are large, adjust the glyphosate rate to the highest labeled rate.
