Descendent of one of Mound City's founding fathers here on research

Great-grandson, Stuart Crow Shelton, travels to Mound City from Texas

On Thursday, July 11, Stuart Crow Shelton was doing research about his great-grandfather, Galen Crow, at his home in Bowie, TX. Stuart never met Galen and Stuart's grandfather never talked about him. During his research, Stuart discovered that his great-grandfather was one of the founding fathers of Mound City in 1857. This prompted Stuart to tell his wife, Linda, that he wanted to travel to Mound City to learn more about his great-grandfather, Galen. Linda asked Stu-

art when he wanted to go and Stuart said tomorrow, meaning the following day, which was Friday, July 12; so, on Friday, they left Texas for Mound City with all the information that Stuart had collected, hoping to add more to his research about Galen.

The Sheltons arrived at the Super 8 in Mound City on Sunday, July 14. With many places to visit to gather information, Stuart was very excited to get started. Their first stop was the Maple Grove Cemetery in

Oregon, MO, where Stuart's great-grandfather's (Galen Crow's) first wife, Mary E., was buried. Upon arriving at the cemetery, they discovered that not only was Galen's first wife buried there, but also a son of Galen and Mary's, Alpheus Crow.

The Klub restaurant to close

Community Building to stay open for events

The board of the Community Building of Mound City voted to close the restaurant operations of The Klub in Mound City. The board met for several hours on Monday, July 15, and came to the conclusion that this was the best option at this time.

As of Monday, July 29, the restaurant will cease operations on a daily basis. The restaurant will be open for private events that have already been booked, along with other special events being held in the community center.

The board oversees the McRae Community Center, which houses the Waterfowlers' Hall of Fame and The Klub restaurant.

In 2012, the board undertook an extensive remodeling project totaling close to \$250,000. The project included an entire overhaul of the kitchen facilities, restaurant dining space, bar, and banquet hall. The goal was to make repairs and upgrades to the facility that would be long lasting and to provide Mound City with a place to hold events, weddings, meetings, etc., that the community could be proud of. The proj-

ect has been largely supported by private donations and remodeling loans.

During the remodeling, the board interviewed potential lessees. The board was unable to find a qualified lessee at that time and decided to hire a manager instead of leasing the restaurant.

With the process of remodeling and the push to get open and start making payments on the loans, the board decided that hiring a manager could be the answer.

The board has again started looking for someone to lease the restaurant part of the building. The board will continue to work at completing all of the projects at the community building, including the pavers at the front entrance of the facility, which was recently completed, along with a long list of continued renovations.

The Community Building board met again on Monday, July 22, to discuss potential lessees who have shown interest in the restaurant and will keep the community updated as those talks continue. The board is also seeking a member to fill one vacant board position.

Northwest County Clerks and Election Authorities hold meeting in Oregon

Holt County Clerk, Kathy J. Kunkel, hosted a Legislative Round Table at the TJ Hall Building in Oregon, MO, on Thursday, July 11. Mrs. Kunkel is the president of the Northwest County Clerks and Election Authorities, representing 25 counties and four urban area election boards. The round table focused on changes to Missouri law related to elections including the repeal of a Missouri statute referred to as the "death penalty" that requires an election authority to remove any absentee ballot cast if the voter dies on or before Election Day. Numerous changes are needed to update the laws to meet tech-

nology upgrades. Atchison County Clerk Susette Taylor, president-elect of the statewide County Clerks' and Election Authorities' Association, led the work session.

"This was a great opportunity to bring the clerks and election board members from the region to Oregon, MO, rather than a metropolitan area. It is important for the people behind the scenes in elections to visit rural areas, see a polling place and understand the challenges." The TJ Hall Building serves as the polling place for the southern portion of Holt County with approximately 1,400 voters.

This field of corn, located off of Route N and west on road 160 outside of Mound City, MO- Stands a little shorter, Tuesday, July 23, than normal for this time of the year. The ground has two inch cracks in it from the lack of precipitation this summer season.

The beans in a field north on Highway N and west on road 160 outside of Mound City, MO- Look pretty good so far on Tuesday, July 23, but with the lack of rain needed to water the crops, only time will tell if the beans will have a good yield after picking.

Corn and soybean outlook

The corn crop is in a critical stage and is in need of rainfall. Scattered rainfall has some corn fields allowing corn growth with limited stress, whereas other fields missed the rain. July makes the corn crop and August makes the soybean crop. This is when precipitation is most

critical to each crop. Corn that is growing in soils that are eroded and that have low organic matter is firing and corn that was planted late is rolling in the afternoon sun. The week before pollination and the two weeks after pollination is the most critical stage for corn.

Corn yields will be reduced during this time if they are under stress.

Corn yields will also be impacted by the variability of growth in area fields. Many corn fields are uneven and some plants are lagging behind. This will impact and reduce crop yields.

The soil's ability to hold moisture varies across Holt County and can be seen readily. During this stage of growth, corn will use around 0.35 inches of moisture per day. This will be higher with hot south winds and lower with cooler temperatures. By using this calculation, one

can see that the crop can run out of moisture very quickly.

Holt County is fortunate that rain typically follows the Missouri River, however timely rains are needed to maintain good yields. The month of July's precipitation amount is .03.

Soybeans are growing and closing row middles. Soybeans have the ability to compensate for dry conditions so August will determine the soybean yields.

Public invited to Graves-Chapple Field Day on Tuesday, August 27

On Tuesday, August 27, the public is invited to the Graves-Chapple Research Center's Field Day near Corning, MO. The annual free event is a chance to find out what is going on at the local research center and to learn more about better management practices and ways to improve the productivity of farms or land.

A highlight of this year's Field Day is the opportunity for landowners to get a soil test performed on the spot. University of Missouri (MU) College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources (CAFNR) specialists will be on hand to analyze soil samples and provide feedback for better management practices. Data collected from the samples will assist in a study on soil health and drought mitigation. Anyone interested in participating should collect approximately a half cup of soil from each field to be tested and bring it to the Soil Health field day booth. In addition, a soil sample should also be taken from a fence row or other undisturbed area on each farm to serve as a reference point. With each participant, specialists will ask for some general farm management information and will discuss further soil testing and participation in a web-based database.

Registration begins at 8 a.m. and educational tours will start at 8:30 a.m., with the last tour departing at 11:30 a.m. A complimentary lunch, provided by Kent Fish-

er Insurance, will be served at 12:15 p.m.

Tour topics will include pest management practices, nutrition and herbicide applications, farm income prospects for input and marketing practices, cover crop varieties and field scouting techniques.

"Our Field Day is a great way to get out to connect with the community," says Jim Crawford, Graves-Chapple superintendent. "We get to share the findings of the research going on that can be very helpful to farmers and landowners."

Each year, the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources sponsors the Graves-Chapple Field Day as an opportunity for the public to find out what research goes on in their community.

Located near Rock Port, MO, at the toe slope of the loess hills, Graves-Chapple's mission is to provide research and teaching in the specific soil and climatic conditions of extreme northwest Missouri. This occurs through research and demonstrations of conservation tillage and soil conservation management practices, turf and forage and crop production practices. Soil conservation and water quality issues also are addressed.

Galen Crow came to Holt County, MO, from Hartford, Ohio County, KY, in 1851, engaging in the practice of law in Oregon. His first wife, Mary, died on June 18, 1853, at the age of 24 and their son, Alpheus, died one month later at the age of six and a half months.

After his family died, Galen moved to North Point, MO, which is now Mound City, where he engaged in the mercantile business. Galen became the postmaster of North Point in

1855.

In February of 1857, the town of Mound City was laid out and incorporated by the General Assembly of Legislature. Galen was appointed president of the town company, which included William Jones, Ira and H.W. Peter, George E. Glass, John Burnett, B.F. Ruffner, R. Middleton and Charles F. Holly. Galen Crow also served as the Holt County Sheriff from 1856 to 1860. On October 13, 1857, Galen married Cordelia Jones. While Galen was sheriff, he was sent to represent the county at the General Assembly.

During the Civil War (1861-65), Galen served in the Confederate Army as a Colonel in General Sterling Price's Brigade until he was taken prisoner to Johnson's Island in Ohio. He was a prisoner for 11 months. While being held captive, his wife, Cordelia, or Granny Cordelia, as Stuart has named her, traveled to see President Abraham Lincoln because she thought it had been long enough for her husband to be a prisoner. In 1867, Galen and Cordelia moved to Austin, TX, to spend the rest of their lives. On March 9, 1903, Galen died.

Stuart was born and raised in Austin. His grandfather was William Price Crow, son of Galen; and his mother was Mary Catherine Crow Shelton, daughter of William. Stuart, like his great-grandfather, is a lawyer. Stuart was surprised to find that his great-grandfather practiced law at one time and glad to find that he was not a horse thief. The Crow family tends to name their children after its descendants, therefore the middle name of "Crow" for Stuart.

Stuart and Linda were very impressed by how everyone they talked to in town was so helpful and welcoming; and even more so by how excited community residents were that the Sheltons were in town. Liz Burnsides and Gene Poynter assisted the Sheltons at the genealogy center. The visiting couple had lunch at the Mound City Nutrition Site, where many local residents talked with them; and Ted Youcum opened up the Mound City Museum for them to go through.

Being retired, Stuart is hoping to make another visit to Mound City. He is thinking of coming back in the fall with his son.

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Cover crops and soil health in NW Missouri, more than meets the eye

Within the farming community there is fervor over cover crops as of late. There are some amazing claims being made about the benefits of cover crops. While some of them sound too good to be true, many are substantiated when the cover crops are part of a system that focuses on the overall health and function of the soil system. Universities all over the country, (the University of Missouri right here in Northwest Missouri, too), are researching and reporting their findings, farm magazines are featuring cover crop success stories, and within the United States Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) nationwide, there is a large emphasis being placed on improved soil health, the big picture goal that uses cover crops as one tool to achieve that goal.

This article series will look at some of the benefits of improved soil health, explain how cover crops improve soil health, and provide ideas and tips to get started improving soil health through the use of cover crops. It will look at what soil organic matter (SOM) does for cash crops, what microbes can do for growers (and what growers can do to encourage them) and also some ways to feed crops directly from cover crops. There are many great resources from both the public and private sector that growers are encouraged to examine.

The first thing about cover crops that piques most people's interest is the ability of cover crops to provide plant available nutrients directly to cash crops. This is true, in fact it is possible to provide 250 pounds of plant available nitrogen, 130 pounds of potash and 150 pounds of calcium per acre, as achieved by Dave Brandt, an Ohio farmer and soil health pioneer. The catch is that

the system used to provide this low cost fertility is not as simple as seeding a cover crop and watching the benefits come rolling in. This level of cover crop performance is achieved by a systems' approach to healthy soil. The good news is that this system is completely feasible (physically and economically) here in Atchison and Holt counties, Missouri. The key to obtaining such impressive plant available nitrogen strictly from cover crops is to grow a properly inoculated legume cover crop long enough to begin blooming alongside a cover crop that will store the nitrogen produced and hold it in the soil through the winter and early spring. Dave Brandt has used Austrian winter peas and tillage radishes planted in alternating rows to accomplish this feat. This cover crop mix is but one of many that are used in rotation to not only provide nutrients to cash crops, but to build a healthy soil that is idealized for plant production in every way. This idealized plant producing environment is dependent upon high levels of soil organic matter.

The benefits of higher soil organic matter (SOM) have been known and universally accepted for a long time. Soil organic matter typically makes up 6% or less of the total weight of the soil, but controls over 90% of the soil functions that produce crops. Two functions of SOM of particular interest to farmers (because of the profound effect on crop growth and yield) are the buffering effect SOM has on soil pH (think reduced liming requirements) and the way that SOM enhances water infiltration (drainage), which then holds that water in ideal amounts available to plants similar to a sponge, neither too dry or too wet. Perhaps the most valuable (in terms of dollars) benefit of SOM is the nutrients that it supplies to the growing crop.

Soil organic matter acts as an idealized slow release

source of balanced plant nutrition. Soil organic matter is also a food source to some of the biotic community (soil microbes, the drivers of soil health). Cover crops that have a high carbon to nitrogen ratio like grass type cover crops (cereal rye, wheat, Sudan/sorghum grass) and high residue crops like corn and wheat help increase SOM if the soil system is not disturbed and is functioning properly. If dead plant residue sits on the soil surface and does not break down, it is not contributing to the SOM content of the soil and is a sign that the biotic community is not functioning.

Under a corn and soybean rotation, corn residue is not easily recognizable by the time corn is planted again in a healthy functioning soil. On the other hand, when plant residue is incorporated into the soil by tillage, the SOM is oxidized and lost as carbon dioxide. The sudden large influx of oxygen via the tillage stimulates the carbon eating bacteria in the soil, which deplete the remaining soil carbon. This action causes an unsustainable short lived spike in plant available nutrients, but at the expense of the SOM content of the soil and the long term benefits that SOM provides.

Soils in prairie systems typically have 7-10% SOM, most no-till farming systems that do not use cover crops have about 2-4% SOM and most conventionally tilled farming systems range from .5-1.5% SOM. By using cover crops and no-till farming methods, it is possible to build SOM levels back to the prairie type levels. One percent SOM will hold approximately one acre inch of plant available of water. Having high levels of SOM actually drought proofs soils, a benefit that really comes to bearing in years like 2012.

•July is the time to have

cover crop seed supply confirmed, supplies can be limited and demand is growing.

•Have specific goals for cover crops on the farm; match their specific benefits to the resource concerns in fields.

•Cover crops can dramatically enhance drainage; they aren't just for erosion anymore.

•Six weeks of cover crop growth will start to yield soil health benefits, but more is definitely better.

•Cover crops that live through the winter can reduce weed pressure at planting time.

•Experts with first hand commercial scale cover crop experience speak in this area regularly, be on the lookout for the next upcoming workshop.

•The local NRCS office is a great place to get more information on how to get started using cover crops to improve soil health on the farm.

Squaw Creek Refuge announces deer hunt dates

Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge near Mound City will again hold two managed deer hunts during the fall and winter of 2013-14. The hunts are to provide quality recreational opportunities and continued management of the refuge's resident white-tail deer herd. Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge will hold a managed primitive firearms' deer hunt for persons with disabilities confined to a wheelchair on Saturday, December 14, and Sunday, December 15, 2013. Hunter accessible provisions will be made to accommodate selected individuals during this hunt. The application process for this deer hunt is limited to 8 individuals confined to a wheelchair by calling the refuge and registering for the random drawing. Hunters selected will be permitted to harvest two deer, but only one antlered. Hunters may obtain information and must apply for the managed hunt by calling the Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge at 660-442-5754, ext. 13, during normal business hours from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Hunters must contact the refuge before Thursday, August 15, to register for the drawing.

The refuge will host the annual muzzleloading or cap and ball firearms' managed deer hunt on Saturday, January 4, and Sunday, January 5, 2014. The application period for applying opened Monday, July 1, and closes Thursday, August 15, 2013. The two day hunt is a continuing effort by Squaw Creek National Wildlife Ref-

uge in cooperation with the Missouri Department of Conservation, to provide quality hunting opportunities. The Squaw Creek Refuge managed hunt number is 72 when applying for the January, 2014, hunt. To apply for the refuge's January hunt, go to the Missouri Department of Conservation's website for managed deer hunts at <http://mdc4.mdc.mo.gov/applications/managedhunts/show-hunts.aspx>.

Remember the opening was Monday, July 1, and the deadline is Thursday, August 15. Hunters can check on line the selection of candidates at the Missouri Department of Conservation's website by Saturday, September 14. Full details regarding managed deer hunts and the application process are available in the Missouri 2013 Fall Deer and Turkey Hunting Regulations booklet.

Squaw Creek NWR is located 5 miles south of Mound City and 30 miles north of St. Joseph, Missouri. Safe grilling tips for National Grilling Month

Whether you fire up the grill for weekend entertaining or use it each night, think of your grill as an extension of your kitchen. Follow the same food safety steps both inside and out.

Start Clean

Whether you are using your own grill or a public grill at a park or campground, scrub it with hot, soapy water before each use.

Wash your hands before, during and after food preparation. Since bacteria can easily transfer from the body to foods and surfaces, wash your hands thoroughly after switching tasks.

This is especially important after handling raw meat. Pack moist towelettes or a hand sanitizer in your cooler for when soap and water are not readily available.

Safely Thaw and Marinate Meat

Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator or microwave, not on the countertop or by the grill.

Marinate meat in the refrigerator.

Never use the same brush to baste raw and cooked meat. Wash brushes in hot, soapy water between uses.

Boil any leftover marinade before using it to season cooked meat.

Don't Share Ware

Use separate cutting boards, plates and grilling utensils when handling raw meat and ready-to-eat foods. Color-code them to easily separate items used with raw foods.

After using knives, grilling tongs or forks with raw meat and poultry, clean them thoroughly with hot soapy water.

Cook It Right

Grilled foods can be harmful if not fully cooked. The only reliable way to ensure meat is safe and ready to eat is by using a meat thermometer. Checking the color of meat or juices does not work.

Use the following internal temperature guide:

Steak: 145°F (Allow to rest for 3 minutes before carving or consuming)

Hamburgers: 160°

Chicken: 165°

Watch the Clock

Don't leave food, even if it's fully cooked, out of refrigeration for extended periods of time.

Put all dishes in the refrigerator within two hours. In hot weather (90° F or warmer), this time is reduced to one hour.

Set out perishable food items in one-hour shifts. After each shift, place uneaten food back in a refrigerator set below 40° F.

Lengthen the staying power of perishable foods by keeping them on ice. Keep a refrigerator thermometer on hand to make sure foods stay chilled properly in the cooler or refrigerator.

Let Leftovers Go

Store leftovers in shallow, airtight containers (two inches deep or less). Write the date on top.

Leftover grilled foods have a refrigerator life of three to four days. If you don't finish a leftover within this time frame, toss it.

Reheat leftovers to an internal temperature of 165° F before serving a second time around. Check the temperature with a meat thermometer.

Boil leftover sauces before reusing them on cooked meat.

American Red Cross shares steps to stay safe in rising temperatures

Summer is here, bringing with it dangerous excessive heat. The American Red Cross has steps people can follow to stay safe as the temperatures soar.

NEVER LEAVE CHILDREN, PETS IN THE CAR: the inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees. Other heat safety steps include:

- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol.
- Avoid extreme temperature changes.
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays.
- Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.
- Postpone outdoor games and activities.
- Use a buddy system when working in excessive heat. Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.
- Check on family, friends and

neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

- Check on animals frequently to ensure that they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water.

- If someone doesn't have air conditioning, they should choose places to go to for relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day (schools, libraries, theaters, malls).

HEAT EXHAUSTION: Excessive heat can lead to sunburn, heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

If someone is experiencing heat cramps in the legs or abdomen, get them to a cooler place, have them rest, lightly stretch the affected muscle, and replenish their fluids with a half a glass (about 4 ounces) of cool water every 15 minutes.

If someone is exhibiting signs of heat exhaustion (cool, moist, pale or flushed skin, heavy sweating, headache, nausea, dizziness, weak-

ness exhaustion), move them to a cooler place, remove or loosen tight clothing and spray the person with water or apply cool, wet cloths or towels to the skin. Fan the person. If they are conscious, give small amounts of cool water to drink. Make sure the person drinks slowly. Watch for changes in condition. If the person refuses water, vomits or begins to lose consciousness, call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number.

HEAT STROKE IS LIFE-THREATENING: Signs include hot, red skin which may be dry or moist; changes in consciousness; vomiting and high body temperature. Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number immediately if someone shows signs of heat stroke. Move the person to a cooler place. Quickly cool the person's body by immersing them up to their neck in cold water if possible. Otherwise, douse or spray the person with cold water, or cover the person with cold, wet towels or bags of ice.
