## Original club members still meeting after 66 years

Whether they call themselves the Dizzy Stitches, the Young Matrons or the Golden Girls, local residents may happen upon the group of six original club members from 1946 gathered for a treat and talk at the Mound City McDonald's.

A group of Mound City's young women decided to organize a social club in October of 1946. Organizers Maisie Buckles and Doris Elder began the work of organizing the club that was to be called, 'The Dizzy Stitches'. One purpose of the club was to gather twice a month to visit and to get some needed mending done. These young mothers brought their young children to the meetings, and soon no mending was being done and the name 'unofficially' changed to "Young Matrons' Club". At one time, nearly 20 women (and 40 children) would gather in various club members' homes for food and fun.

The club elected officers and held special events. They would host huge, potluck suppers and invite their entire families to join them. The

Young Matrons would also attend social events with their husbands, citing road trips to 'It'll Do' in Oregon, MO, dance halls in Savannah, MO, and suppers in St. Joseph, MO.

Many of the six original members still attend the 'monthly' club meetings now, although members don't host anymore, it's dutch treat! The surviving six original members (perhaps others not in memory) include Colene White, Dorothy Jean Moore, Priscilla Griffith, Jeane Crouse, Wilma Jean Davis and Maisie Buckles. Many members have joined the club over the years, as well as the club losing members, as the 66 years of the organization has ticked by.

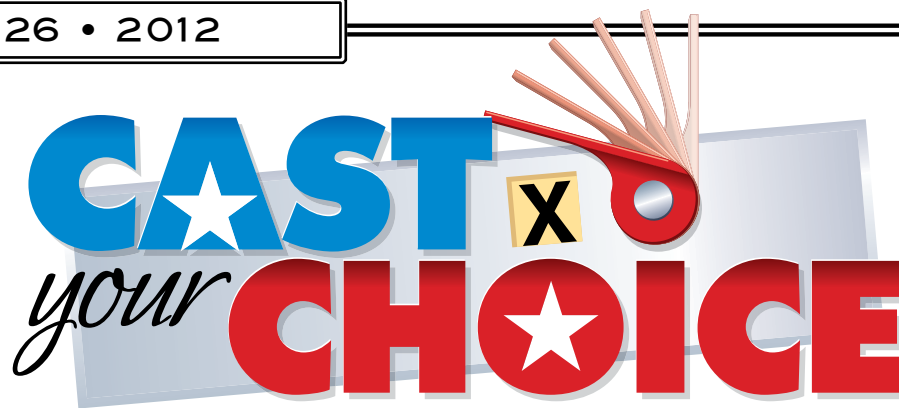

## Love of horsepower

A growing love of tractors and tractor pulls in two small boys has evolved over the years on a much grander scheme to coin the phrase, 'bigger boys and bigger toys'. Mitchell Corbin of Mound City and Chris Waegele of Fillmore, MO, fondly recall their experiences as youth, stating that their newest passion, 'driving the Jolly Green Giant', is simply 'a love of horsepower!'.

Mitchell Corbin remembers going to tractor pulls with his dad, Claude, when he was a young boy. He also remembers that, after the pulls, the two would talk and his dad would always say, 'Someday, we need to build one'. So, a couple of years ago, when Chris Waegele repeatedly encouraged Mitchell to get involved, Mitchell began listening. Mitchell jumped on board with the idea after the two attended a tractor pull in Louisville, KY, and Mitchell realized that the idea of making his and his dad's dream a reality would be fun.

Chris has been involved in tractor pulls his entire life. He attended pulls as a young boy and even pulled in garden tractor pulls for 20 years. His love for the 'big' tractors kept his interest peaked, as he avidly followed the pulling sport. Chris wanted to build his own tractor and, after successfully convincing Mitchell, the two got to work.

The two novice 'experts' began their venture with the tractor's make, definitely John Deere. They knew they wanted it to be of the 'old school' (1972) sheet metal. They then needed a name. The Jolly Green Giant had been a favorite tractor name every year when Chris was watching pulls as a young boy. After some research, the two found that the first Jolly Green Giant tractor had disappeared from pulls and decided to bring the name back.

Chris and Mitchell, whose dad had taught him to mechanic, enlisted the help of Rick Gillenwa-

ter of Mound City and Kevin Young of Craig, MO, to get the tractor built. Ryan Phillips, Chris's son-in-law, and Larry Farr of Mound City, stepson of Mitchell, serve as part of the 'pit crew'.

Many sponsors jumped on board as the 'giant' began to take shape. The sponsorship list, which includes products the two builders use in their 'real jobs', includes: DeKalb; Precision NH3; Precision Planting; RFT, LLC; Northwest Graphix; and Schaefer's Oil.

The team had the Jolly Green Giant ready for its first pull on July 5, 2011, and was very successful the first year of competition. During its second time pulling, the Jolly Green Giant won the pull in Henry, IL. It also took first at the Missouri State Fair and 2nd at the Illinois State Fair. Chris drove the giant the entire first season.

The 2012 season rolled around, with the Jolly Green Giant making its first appearance on the circuit in Mackville, WI, where it took first. Mitchell began taking turns driving this season, as the team competes in the Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League. The team will participate in 11 total league pulls to garner points in the Midwest region summer point series. The team has 5 league pulls left and is currently sitting 2nd in the nation.

The Jolly Green Giant has other pulling appearances slated for the 2012 summer as well. The team pulled in Mound City's Rumble by the Refuge, and will pull in Falls City, NE, the Missouri State Fair and the Illinois State Fair.

The biggest challenge for the team is combating mechanical issues and fighting breakage. Most parts for the tractor are custom made. It's nice to keep spare parts on hand, because sometimes parts can take 2-6 months to acquire, which can knock a tractor out for the entire season.

For both families, the pulling has really become a total family event. Both owners stated how good this has been for their families, and how nice it is to have so much support, support they stated 'has also been outstanding from the community'. The team has its own hauler for the Jolly Green Giant that also boasts complete living quarters. The hauler provides the team with a 'home away from home'. Chris does a lot of the cooking for the families as they travel.

"This is basically, 'our home on the lake,'" stated Mitchell. "We get to spend time together as a family doing something we love. As we travel, we also take in a number of scenic, tourist events as well. We love it. It's been a great thing for my entire family."

The two families have also become part of an even bigger family - a family of pullers. The class of pullers that Mitchell and Chris pull with have become friends as well (that is, until it's pulling time!). The group members, who all 'love horsepower', have found a unique and fun way to share in a love for the sport of tractor pulls.

# Where has all the good food gone?

## A look at the school lunch program

Parents, grandparents and students alike, when discussing the quantity, quality and overall appeal of a school lunch these days, might say, "Where has all the good food gone?" These sentiments have rattled through the school hallways, and have been discussed at the dinner table at home and various other venues when, in reality, the discussions are executed with a very limited understanding of the guidelines that school lunch programs must abide by.

First and foremost, one must acknowledge that the school lunch program is a federal program with guidelines that must be adhered to if the school district is to maintain its federal funding. The school lunch program is not a money maker for the school, and Mound City Superintendent Ken Eaton stated, "I figure if we lose less than \$10,000 a year, I'm happy."

The changes come after First Lady Michelle Obama's campaign for the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act, which was signed into law by President Barack Obama. The new meal requirements raise standards for the first time in nearly 15 years and are expected to improve the health and nutrition of nearly 32 million kids that participate in school meal programs every school day.

With the changes comes an increase in lunch prices. The price per plate is actually at \$2.51. The Mound City School chose to raise its price by \$.05, the minimum amount to maintain compliance. The 2012-2013 school lunch price will be \$1.85.

The new plan creates even more challenges for school lunch personnel in trying to provide healthy, desirable choices for the roughly 240 lunches that the Mound City cooks prepare every day. The Mound City culinary staff, including Food Service Manager Amy Kelly, Nena Brown and Amy Baker, attended the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) training in Kirksville, MO, and learned about the new regulations just a few short weeks ago.

It's the guidelines that force the school to utilize prepackaged foods, because they are already sodium balanced. "It is very hard to stay inside the guidelines," stated Amy Kelly. "I understand the goal is to try to help students make healthier choices and reduce obesity and disease, but if you look around Mound City, those two things don't really seem to be a problem. We just happen to get lumped into the 32 million kids all across the nation."

The following list is an attempt to help adults understand the intricate balancing act, which now includes several new regulations, that the school must maintain in order to continue to be funded:

- Calorie regulations. Kindergarten through 5th grade-between 550-650 calories; 6th through 8th grades-between 600-700 calories; and 9th through 12th grades-between 750-850 calories.
- Transfats- NONE; Saturated fats- less than 10%. Hence, no fried foods.
- Sodium limits. Kindergarten through 5th grade students are only allowed

a maximum of 1,377 mg of sodium at lunch (a carton of milk accounts for about half of the sodium requirements). 6th through 8th grades can intake a maximum of 1,520 mg, and 9th through 12th grade students have a maximum of 1,588 mg. (There is also a USDA/DESE target that says by the year 2022, a 9th through 12th grader will only intake 740 mg of sodium in a school lunch!) Flour purchased at the store has so much sodium that it is impossible to home make baked items for consumption within these perimeters.

- Meats/Meat alternative. Kindergarten through 5th graders can consume only 8-10 oz. in a week. 6th through 8th graders- only 9-10 oz. in a week, and 9th through 12th graders- only 10-12 oz. in a week. (A chicken patty is 3.8 oz., and that's one meal)

- Vegetable rule. In a week's time, the cafeteria is required to serve a dark green vegetable, a red/orange vegetable, a starchy vegetable, a bean or pea, and some other vegetable.

- Whole Grains. The regulations ask for 50% of the foods to fall in that category this year, with 100% by 2013. Mound City is choosing to go 100% in 2012. That regulation means only whole wheat pasta and breads, and any desserts must be made with whole wheat flour, etc. "Kids have a hard time eating a brown noodle," stated Kelly.

Some of the other regulations include:

- Five things have to be offered at every meal. The five items include: milk, fruit, vegetable, whole grain bread and meat/meat alternative.
- Children in grades pre-kindergarten to 2nd grade will get each of the five items put on their plate.
- Students in grades 3 through 12 must select 3 of the offerings, and one must be a fruit or a vegetable. Those three items will be placed on their plate.
- Third grade students through seniors will continue to be offered the limitless salad bar. The salad bar offers a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables. It provides a variety of options for the students. The issue with the salad bar is that foods placed on the bar are included in total sodium offered to 'x' number of kids during the lunch period, and once the items are gone, even though it's called 'endless', the items cannot be replenished.

The Mound City food service program will continue to offer a la carte items for sale. These items still have to be within the strict guidelines, but are not reimbursed by the government.

Mound City's food service program was audited last year, and any deviance from the strict guidelines were noted. One example was, "they were serving too much food".

"I understand people's frustration with the food service program," commented Superintendent Ken Eaton, "but, they have to realize that we have to stay inside the guidelines in order to maintain funding. It is an important program."

The big picture of the new mandates look to force the issue of a balanced meal, with plenty of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and teaching children to make wise food choices. In theory, it is a great idea, but on paper, it hardly seems practical, which may be why children are so hungry when they get home; but then, weren't kids hungry when they got home from school 30 years ago, and that's when they were eating those really good lunches!

From the *Mound City News* archives

**50 Years Ago - 1962**

• The 12th annual Horse Show was slated to be held at the Oregon, MO, riding grounds, two blocks north of the courthouse square. The Oregon Rough Riders' Club was sponsor for the event and was scheduled to lead off the evening festivities. Club officers included: Harold Trimmer, Russell Andler, Billy Noel and Donald Greiner.

• Mike Crider of Oregon, MO, a member of the Sunrise Seniors' 4-H Club, won blue ribbons on all four animals in the 4-H class of the Jersey Booster Show. He was also awarded best showman of the entire show.

• Laura Lehmer of Mound City was chosen Junior Dairy Queen of the North Central Missouri Jersey Booster Show.

• Sheriff and Mrs. Floyd Ramsey offered county residents the opportunity to come and view the jail property and the living residence of the sheriff with the election close at hand. The purpose was to make voters aware of the 100 year-old building's condition before voting on building a new structure.

• Mr. and Mrs. Carl Taylor and their 6 children lost nearly everything in an apartment fire on Savannah Street. The fire was thought to be electrical.

**25 Years Ago - 1987**

• The 92nd Craig Reunion was set to begin under a new format. Hale's Shows of Tomorrow pulled out of participation a few years back and left the Craig Story Hardin Post 164 in search of a new carnival. A new carnival was not located, and a two-day format was decided upon.

• A dredge began working at the south end of the State Park campground. The process was expected to deepen Big Lake to an average of 10 feet. The sludge from the dredging process is being deposited in a reservoir on the Bill Brandon farm.

# August 7th's Primary to decide election in several races

Meet your local candidates

The Tuesday, August 7, Primary Election is just around the corner and Holt County has four contended races for voters to decide at the polls. The results of the primary will be the determining vote in several races, as voters must choose to receive a Democratic ballot, Republican ballot, Libertarian ballot or Constitution ballot. Of the races listed below, all are Republican races, with the exception of the Second District Commissioner's race, which is Democratic.

*Mound City News* is trying to assist voters in gathering information about the candidates. The candidates listed below were given opportunity to respond to a list of questions aimed at helping voters make informed choices. The following are the candidates' responses to the questions:

**Second District Commissioner (Democratic Ticket)**

**Don Holstine (Incumbent):**

*What is your primary focus?* My primary focus for the next four years as a county commissioner is to see Holt County recover from the repeated floods that have impacted our county and ensure that our citizens' homes, farms and businesses are protected by restoring infrastructure and improving our communities' rural way of life.

*What is your secondary focus?* My secondary focus is to continue to work diligently to bring new businesses into the county, support current businesses, ensure a strong agricultural base and develop recreational opportunities that bring new dollars to our communities.

*What skills/knowledge/experience would you bring to the office?* With nearly 12 years of experience as a county commissioner, I bring a broad set of skills and knowledge to the office, including my lifelong experience as an independent farmer-businessman. I am also a realtor. I have an in-depth knowledge of the 530 miles of roads, 7,200 parcels and 40 political subdivisions of the county, as well as the interworking of the various county offices of which the commission has budgetary authority. I have served in many roles as a commissioner including development of economic incentives such as Chapter 100 Bonds and Tax Increment Financing districts, operation of the county's Emergency Operations Center, construction of the Holt County Annex Building and fiscal oversight of nine Community Development Block Grants.

*How long have you lived in the county?* I am a lifelong resident.

*Other personal/important information?* I am a graduate of Mound City R-2 High School. I served as a staff sergeant for six years in the Air National Guard and then raised my family in Holt County, where members continue to live and are active in community and civic organizations. Currently, I am serving on the following boards: Community Services, Inc., regional board member serving as secretary/treasurer; Northwest Missouri Solid Waste Board; Holt County University of Missouri Extension Board, county of Holt representative; Northwest Missouri County Commissioners' Association and the Missouri River County Officials' Coalition (a 4-state board focused on Missouri River issues). I have completed training with the County Commissioners' Association of Missouri, Missouri Association of Counties, the National Incident Management System, Incident Command System, Missouri State Tax Auditor's Office, and the Missouri Department of Transportation. On a regional level, I have worked with all neighboring counties in Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas, as well as the Iowa Tribe of White Cloud, building re-

lationships and supporting issues including the new Rulo bridge and collaboration on flood issues impacting the four-state area. In addition, I have partnered with other Holt County officials to promote legislative issues important to our county by participating in legislative hearings and meetings in Jefferson City as well as showcasing Holt County each year at Great Northwest Day at the Capitol. During my tenure as county commissioner, we have replaced over a dozen bridges utilizing the federal BRO program in cooperation with the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) to stretch Holt County's tax dollars making our farm-to-market roads safer and more accessible. I have years of experience working with the State Emergency Management Agency, the Federal Emergency Management Agency and many state and federal agencies that respond in an emergency. This experience is essential as Holt County seeks grant funding, rebuilds and plans for the future.

**David Carroll:**

*What is your primary focus?* I really do not have one primary focus. I do believe there are many things that will be my focus. Number 1 will be listening to the people of the 2nd District. They have told me some concerns of theirs while I have visited with them over the last 2 months. Other items that I will be focused on will be the roads and snow removal, as well as economic development for the county and working to keep the businesses we have. Another big concern is the devastation of the 2011 flood; what can be done to not only continue to repair the damage, but to make sure it does not happen again. I am going in with an open mind to this job. I do not have an ax to grind. I will be working with the other commissioners to look for ways to make the county better.

*What is your secondary focus?* Working with the other two commissioners. If we do things like they do in Washington, nothing gets done as everyone knows. We have to forget our party affiliation, location in the county, and do what is best for the whole county. We also must make sure all departments in the county can provide services the people expect. If elected, anyone could call me at any time. I will make it a priority to travel around the district and be seen. I want to hear what you have to say.

*What skills/knowledge/experience would you bring to the office?* I have been on many boards. I have served on the Nodaway-Holt School Board, Maitland Fire Board, Senior Citizens' Tax Fund Board, Northwest Health Services Board, Maitland Housing Board, and boards for the developmentally disabled. I know that you need to listen to the administrators and taxpayers and then do what you think is best for the people you represent. I have never been afraid to call a congressman or someone in Jeff City to get an answer. I have never driven a road grader, but I have driven the roads of the district for 22 years as a rural mail carrier. I have an idea of what needs to be done to fix a road. Thirty-seven years with the post office, with the last 15 being postmaster, taught me a lot about dealing with the government. I have also coached youth sports for 41 years. One thing I have learned and try to teach the kids is that you have to give 100%, whether it is on the field, in the gym, or at the work place. If elected, I will give 100% to the commissioner's job.

*How long have you lived in the county?* I have lived in Holt County my whole life. I have lived for the last 34 years on the family farm between Maitland and Mound City.

*Other personal/important information?* I graduated from Nodaway-Holt High School and attended Northwest Missouri State University. I have been married to my wife, Rita, for 34 years. She is currently elementary principal at Nodaway-Holt. I have 2 children. My daughter, Tiffany, resides in Lathrop, MO, and is the 5th grade teacher at Lathrop Elementary. Her husband, Adam, is a police officer in Gladstone, MO. My son, Matthew, is deceased. I have 3 grandchildren: Bryson, who is 13, Maddyx, who is 9, and Jacklyn, who is 3. I am a lifetime member of St. Gregory's Catholic Church in Maryville, MO. I currently am the high school girls' basketball coach and junior high girls' and boys' basketball coach at Nodaway-Holt. I have coached youth sports for the last 41 years, 27 of those years have been coaching Trojannette softball.

**Holt County Sheriff (Republican Ticket)**

**Scott Wedlock (Incumbent):**

*What is your primary focus?* As sheriff, I have worked to make the office more efficient, and improve the quality of law enforcement. The statutory duties of the sheriff should be the primary focus of the sheriff. As defined in Missouri law, the office of sheriff is the chief law enforcement officer of the county.

1) The sheriff is the servant to court as in the civil process papers, ex partes, and criminal warrants' service. In Holt County, the sheriff's office maintains the warrant files not only for the sheriff's office, but the local municipal agencies and highway patrol that are filed by the local court. The warrants are first put in the state computer system and every month a review process is done. Last year, our civil process totaled approximately 365 papers. Roughly 1,000 warrants are maintained, mostly out of state traffic offenses due to the interstate. The sheriff's office also provides a bailiff to the different court divisions and is responsible for "bringing individuals that are arrested on a warrant, sometimes from great distances, to the court".

2) The sheriff's office is the keeper of the county jail. My focus has been to make our facility function as safely as possible for the staff and inmates and prevent future escapes such as the one in December, 2008. After one particularly bad storm, in coordination with the commission, a new metal roof replaced the leaky and weather damaged section over the jail and the remaining part received new asphalt shingles. New tamper resistant lights inside the cells have been installed to replace

the worn out single bulbs that the inmates had control over. Controls and switches have been relocated outside the cells. Processes and procedures have been implemented to limit how much property an inmate may possess while in jail. Letters, except for legal, are replaced by postcards. This greatly reduces the possibility of dangerous contraband being mailed into the jail.

3) Improved procedures and processes recommended by the state auditor's office have been addressed including better tracking of fuel purchases. A recent attorney general's opinion on the distribution of the civil, commissary and miscellaneous fees conflicts with the auditor's opinion and further direction is needed before an informed decision can be made.

4) The sheriff's office enforces laws, investigates crimes and submits information to the county prosecutor for further action. When I was first elected, it was apparent that individuals living in our community were making a living through criminal enterprises such as theft, metal scrapping, and the drug trade. In cooperation with other agencies, many of these individuals have been arrested, charged and prosecuted and are serving time in state and federal correctional facilities.

*What is your secondary focus?* As sheriff, I have moved the vast majority of purchasing back to the local merchants. In conjunction with the county commission, the 911 system has been steadily improved. A new radio system, county-wide mapping revisions and improved emergency call taking capabilities provide greater resources to the local emergency services. Moving to phase II, which allows much better caller/address location, is in the process with the telephone providers now. The staffing of the 911/Jail is unique to Holt County in that one person is the 911 operator and jailor. Call volume is unpredictable as is jail population. Many folks have started in Holt County and moved on to higher paying positions with other agencies. I enjoy working with the other local, county, and state elected officials on the many issues that impact our community.

*What skills/knowledge/experience would you bring to the office?* I began my law enforcement training in 1986 by graduating with honors from the Missouri State Highway Patrol Basic Police Academy and have continued with my professional training in the areas of DWI/Drug enforcement, criminal investigations, vehicle accidents and community policing. I have been privileged to attend the National Emergency Training Center, Emmitsburg, MD, six times to complete advanced training in incident management and leadership. Now, as sheriff, I persistently applied and was accepted to attend the National Sheriff Academy in Colorado. That

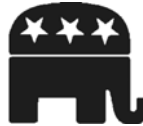

## Michael Freeman:

*What is your primary focus?* My primary focus is on roads and bridges. This topic concerns me because it is the major budget item for the county. In addition, it coincides with my construction background. Several issues related to roads and bridges need to be addressed.

- Create road grading routes and coordinate site housing to avoid unnecessary fuel expense and loss of time caused by driving heavy equipment to county barns each night.

- There is a need to re-evaluate

whether the county should be in the rock hauling business or whether it should be privatized. Other budget items need the same evaluation.

- Because the size of farm equipment is growing bigger, we need wider roads and less brush on them. One solution is to persuade the Johnson grass board to add brush killer to its mix.

- Evaluate contracts, investigate options and implement plans to balance budgets through pursuit of competitive bids.

- Ensure compliance with national and state standards through accurate record keeping and regular review of work progress.

- Implement knowledge of construction machinery in hardscape maintenance. The county sends employees for trainings pertinent to the job area. I would like to provide additional training to the road and bridge crew on handling and operating equipment.

*What is your secondary focus?* My second focus is two-fold: the citizens and businesses of the county. My goals related to this topic include the following:

- Whenever possible, I would encourage doing business with our county producers and merchants as such support enhances our county economy.

- Promote Holt County to attract businesses and jobs, including additional health care professionals.

- Monitor county spending and make decisions after consideration of multiple options, acceptance of competitive bids, and seeking alternative financing (e.g., grants, economic development loans, etc.).

- Improve communication between governmental units within the county and with county residents.

*What skills/knowledge/experience would you bring to the office?* My professional experience includes owning and managing a row crop and livestock operation (30+ years). # Secretarial Disaster Declaration includes Holt County

The Secretary of Agriculture designated 97 Missouri counties as primary agricultural natural disaster areas. This designation makes certain farmers and other agricultural producers in these counties eligible for low-interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), in addition to other disaster programs.

The following counties were designated as primary natural disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by drought and excessive heat which occurred April 1, 2012, and continuing. Those counties are: Adair, Andrew, Atchison, Audrain, Barry, Barton, Benton, Boone, Buchanan, Caldwell, Callaway, Camden, Carroll, Cass, Cedar, Chariton, Christian, Clark, Clay, Clinton, Cole, Cooper, Crawford, Dade, Dallas, Daviess, DeKalb, Dent, Douglas, Franklin, Gasconade, Gentry, Greene, Grundy, Harrison, Henry, Hickory, Holt, Howard, Howell, Iron, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Johnson, Knox, Laclede, Lafayette, Lawrence, Lewis, Lincoln, Linn, Livingston, McDonald, Macon, Maries, Marion, Mercer, Miller, Moniteau, Monroe, Montgomery, Morgan, Newton, Nodaway, Oregon, Osage, Pettis, Phelps, Pike, Platte, Polk, Pulaski, Putnam, Ralls, Randolph, Ray, Reynolds, St. Charles, St. Clair, Ste. Genevieve, St. Francois, St. Louis, Saline, Schuyler, Scotland, Shannon, Shelby, Stone, Sullivan, Texas, Vernon, Warren, Washington, Webster, Worth and Wright.

Eight counties and the Independent City of St. Louis were designated as contiguous natural disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by drought and excessive heat which occurred April 1, 2012, and continuing.

Producers in contiguous counties may also be eligible for programs based on this designation. The contiguous counties are: Bates, Carter, Madison, Ozark, Perry, Ripley, Taney and Wayne.

All counties listed above

were designated natural disaster areas on July 17, 2012, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

Loans for physical losses must be used to replace or repair damage to buildings, fences or to compensate the farmer for losses of basic livestock, stored crops, or supplies on hand, equipment, etc., that was lost due to the disaster. Loans for production losses may also be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to make payments on real estate or chattel debts. Generally, loans for production losses cannot be approved until crops have completed their production cycle or have been harvested.

In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered a 30% loss in production or an actual physical loss that was essential to the successful operation of the farm.

USDA also has made a variety of other programs available to assist farmers in recovering from the disaster, including the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), which was approved as part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008; the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP); Federal Crop Insurance; and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program.

Theresa also urges people to replace energy and sports drinks with water. "I do not recommend energy drinks at all. They only dehydrate you even more and with these temperatures as high as they are, hydration is of the utmost importance," Theresa said.

Another helpful tip is to check on family members. The Center of Disease Control reports that the elderly population is more prone to heat exhaustion because

many medications change their body's ability to regulate body temperatures and their bodies do not adjust well to sudden changes in temperature.

The National Weather Service reported 208 heat related deaths in the United States last summer. That number increased from 119 from 2010.

Tips to remember:

- Drink plenty of water.
- If working outside, take frequent breaks in a cool shaded area.
- Seek medical attention if you stop sweating, become dizzy, nauseous or weak.
- Elderly people (65 years and older), infants and children and people with chronic medical conditions are more prone to heat stress.

## Nauman-Norman Reunion to take place July 29

The annual Nauman-Norman Reunion will be held this year, Sunday, July 29, at Evans Circle in Mound City, MO. The doors will be open at 12:00 noon for a pot-luck meal. Drinks and eating utensils will be furnished. The following is a quote compiled by Floyd House in 1965 from the Nauman-Norman Family History:

*"The eleventh annual reunion of the Norman-Nauman family of America was held at the home of John G. Norman, Thursday, August 26, 1915. Three long tables were spread on the lawn*

*under the maples and all seemed to do ample justice to the occasion. Though the roads were in bad condition and the weather threatening, 94 relatives and a number of visitors were present. Relatives present were: D.C. Nauman and family; Mrs. George Nauman and family; Sirum Nauman and two daughters; Will Nauman and family; Isaac Griffith and family; Abe Griffith and family; Les-ter Griffith and family; Mrs. Cora Prather and family; V.M. Offenbacher and family; Mart Miller and family; J.W. Nauman and family; Ches-*

*ter Caton and family; Mrs. Bessie Nauman and family; Frank Judy and family; J.B. Dearmont and family; M.L. Norman and family; Charles Bammer and family; Fred Spring and wife; Lester Judy and wife; Carl, Elmer, Clyde and Stella Nauman; Jacob Nauman; Mrs. Paul Zachary; John Paul and Raymond Nauman; Harry Wright; Mrs. B.C. Judy; Mrs. Jennie Judy; Pearl Judy; Mrs. Ernest Henning and son, Burman, of Effingham, KS; Mrs. Maude Frank and Miss Kate Norman of St. Paris, OH; and John G. Norman and family.*

Largely through the researches of Professor B.F. Prince of Springfield, OH, a relative of the family, a rather definite family history has been written.

In 1902, the family in Ohio conceived the idea of holding a reunion commemorating the hundredth anniversary of their grandfather, John Christain Nauman, Jr. This was held Sept. 6, 1905. About 150 relatives were present. At this reunion, J.S., J.R. and J.W. Nauman of Craig, MO, were present. Since that time reunions have been held at the following places: 1906, Ohio; 1907, Pleasant View Church in Holt County, MO; 1908, Ohio; 1909, Page County, VA; 1910, Ohio; 1911, West Liberty, IA; 1912, Page County, VA; 1913, Ohio; 1914, Isaac Griffith home in Holt County. The place of the 1916 reunion has not been determined.

The lapse of time from 1750 to 1915 covers 165 years. The family has grown from one to over 1,000 and covers seven or eight generations. The descendants of the fifth generations (including the older ones still living) number about 75. About 260 of the relatives live in Holt County.

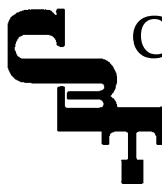

The Holt County Commission met Monday, June 11, 2012, at 9:00 a.m. at the Holt County Courthouse in Oregon, MO, with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner Don Holstine present.

Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, approached the commission to discuss matters of her department.

Road and Bridge Supervisor, Daryl Biermann, appeared before the commission to discuss CART rock application and roadway repairs.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, June 18, 2012.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, June 18,

2012, at 9:00 a.m. with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner Don Holstine present.

Holt County Water Supply District #1 representatives Kent Kurtz, Bradley Kurtz and Beth Haer appeared before the commission to request the purchase of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) data layers from the county to complete a project that identifies the water district's meter sites in the county. After discussion, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to provide the needed data layers for a sum of \$1,418.50 with the water district exchanging its data layers to the county in lieu of additional charges. Commissioner Holstine seconded the motion.

Approved unanimously.

Theresa Mackey, representing the Holt County Autumn Festival, requested permission to conduct Bingo on the courthouse grounds during the fair. Her request was approved.

O'Neil Long, rural Mound City, appeared before the commission to ask that roadwork on Holt Road 210 be completed. Water is cutting from a driveway across the roadway and washing the gravel off. Road and Bridge Supervisor, Daryl Biermann, has inspected the area and talked with landowner, Sean Slocum, about drainage issues on his property contributing to the roadway damage.

Mr. Biermann discussed various roadway projects including the application of gravel to Ironwood Road north of a recently completed bridge project (BRO-28). Mr. Biermann plans for the road to be brought up in shape and graveled later in the summer.

# Mound City resident obtains U.S. Citizenship

Abelina Smith of Mound City arrived in the United States in 2006 with her U.S. husband, Derek Smith. From the Philippines, Abelina came here on a K-3 nonimmigrant visa. (She and Derek were married in the Philippines in September of 2005). Knowing the U.S. was where she wanted to live, Abelina knew that in order to thrive and reap the benefits of a U.S. citizen, she would eventually apply for citizenship.

Abelina Luboa Smith, thought to be the last child of her father and mother, Abe and Solina, was given a surname. However, her family quickly gave her the nickname, Kris, after her great-grandmother, Kristina.

Kris, upon arrival in the U.S., immediately applied for a 2-year temporary residency. Then, before the two years was up, she applied for a 15-year residency that would have been effective until 2019. (People can reapply for the 15-year residency over and over). Through the processes, Kris had to produce many documents, fill out a plethora of forms, have biometric eye scans, take fingerprints and pay pricey fees numerous times. Kris decided amidst all the paperwork, tests and pricey legalities that she should just go ahead and apply for citizenship.

During the last week of March, 2012, Kris filed for

U.S. citizenship, a fee which alone was \$790. A packet of U.S. information was sent to her confirming her request that contained a book and a DVD on the U.S. government for her to study. She had to go back through the many steps previously done, adding to her already growing file, as well as take a citizenship test. During the test on June 27, which Kris states was very nerve-racking, she was administered a test by a Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) officer. The officer began the test by asking questions regarding the government and Constitution of the United States, and executed a reading and writing portion of the test, which all in all took about an hour. Kris was notified in just a few days that she had passed the exam, but was instructed not to tell or consider herself a citizen until the ceremony.

Kris and Derek arrived at the U.S. Courts' Western Division of Missouri in Kansas City, MO, early on Thursday, July 19, to take part in Kris's Naturalization Ceremony. The Honorable John T. Maughmer, U.S. Magistrate Judge, bestowed the rite of citizenship and later stated, "I'm honored to do this service. Usually when I'm done with a regular court proceeding, half the people leave upset. In this case, however, everyone is extremely happy!"

## Using drought damaged corn for forage

The best method to utilize drought damaged corn is by making silage. Harvest timing is critical as moisture should be around 65% for proper fermentation. Generally, silage will reduce the risk of nitrates in harvested corn forage.

Plants with green leaves are generally too wet for good silage. The stalk and ears of plants contain a lot of moisture. Once plants die, they will dry out fast. Plants could be windrowed and allowed to dry somewhat before chopping if moisture is too high.

Green chop can be effective, but caution should be used as nitrates will change into nitrates, which are ten times as

deadly if green chop begins to heat. Chop and immediately feed only the amount that animals will clean up in one feeding.

Haying is the most difficult way to harvest drought damaged corn. If ears have started to form, the stalk and ears will be difficult to dry. Baling corn too high in moisture will result in rotting and even fire. Use a crimper when windrowing. Nitrate in stalks will not decrease when baled. Adjust the cutting height to 8 to 10 inches as nitrates tend to accumulate in the base of plants.

Some growers have shredded stalks and then raked and baled. Try only a few acres to test how this method works and if losses are acceptable.

Another option is to bag baled corn. This works best when corn is in the milk stage and stalks are not large. Visit with a supplier regarding how to best use this equipment to handle corn.

Grazing can be used by strip grazing using electric fences. Make two to three moves per week with daily being best. Be sure to train cows to electric fences before turning in.

Windrow grazing may also be another alternative. This is the same as baling corn, but has several advantages such as fencing and strips are easier to determine. To determine how to best feed corn forage, contact local Extension livestock specialists.
