The Hwy. 111 fill project nears completion with the cooperation of local farmers. The work at the site has tried to accomplish two things: the filling of an enormous hole, and the clearing of 90 acres of farmground that returned to production. Local woman working prestigious internship with mining company

Some students work in offices for their summer internships, but Northwest Missouri State University student, Deanna (Biermann) Mandrick travels 1,000 feet underground each day to go to work. Mandrick, a junior environmental geology major from Craig, MO, is spending her summer as a mine geologist intern with the Doe Run Mining Company near Viburnum, MO.

In her internship, Mandrick grades mine headings and determines whether the amound of lead in an area is economical for the company to mine. She also maps mined areas and assists with mineral exploration.

Mandrick was the only intern selected from about 60 applicants, and the opportunity has altered her career plans, she said. "I am still interested in environmental geology, but I really think that I am going to stick with mining," Mandrick stated. "It is really more interesting to me now that I have been around it a little bit. Mining is much more hands-on, and I actually get to go out and do things in the mine."

The job may be interesting, but it does come with



From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago - 1962

- A couples' Scotch Foursome Tournament was held at the Mound City Golf Course on the 4th of July, with 40 persons attending. A cookout with chefs, "Pan" Crouse and "Shag" Halcomb, followed at the clubhouse. Ivan Loucks and Mrs. Lowell Ripley won the tournament with a score of 39.
- Higher altitude Mound City residents were without water for nearly 3 hours when city employees succumbed after a gallant 18-22 hour a day fight for weeks with water treatment plant problems.
- An estimated 2,000 people attended the fireworks' display, headed by Glenn Doan and the Mound City Fire Department, in Mound City on July 4th. Nearly 400 cars were counted leaving the parking area. Nearly 100 cars remained, with folks attending the dance that followed. The Mound City school band provided a concert and the dance band from Oregon, MO, led by Avon Coffman, provided excellent music for the final dance. Sol Forney emceed the entire 4th celebra-





Staying safe in extreme heat conditions

Workers who are exposed to extreme heat or work in hot environments may be at risk of heat stress. Exposure to extreme heat can result in occupational illnesses and injuries. Heat stress can result in heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps, or heat rashes. Heat can also increase the risk of injuries in workers as it may result in sweaty palms, fogged-up safety glasses, and dizziness. Burns may also occur as a result of accidental contact with hot surfaces or steam.

Workers at risk of heat stress include outdoor workers and workers in hot environments such as firefighters, bakery workers, farmers, construction workers, miners. boiler room workers, factory workers, and others. Workers at greater risk of heat ion stress include those who are 65 years of age or older, are overweight, have heart disease or high blood pressure, or take medications that may ing be affected by extreme heat.

Prevention of heat stress in workers is important. Employers should provide training to workers so they understand what heat stress is, how it affects their health and safety, and how it can be prevented.

Heat Stroke

Heat stroke is the most serious heat-related disorder. It occurs when the body becomes unable to control its temperature: the body's temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails, and the body is unable to cool down. When heat stroke occurs, the body temperature can rise to 106 degrees Fahrenheit or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not given.

Symptoms

Symptoms of heat stroke include:

- Hot, dry skin or profuse sweating
- Hallucinations
- Chills
- Throbbing headache
- High body temperature • Confusion/dizziness
- Slurred speech

Extreme NW Missouri temperatures could mean pavement blowups


As temperatures continue to hover well above 90 degrees in northwest Missouri, motorists should be aware that the extreme heat can cause pavement "blowups" on northwest Missouri road-

A pavement blowup occurs when the roadway surface expands at a crack or joint where moisture has seeped in. As sections of pavement expand with increasing temperatures, the natural release location is typically found at the cracks and joints, resulting in buckled pavement.

Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) crews are monitoring state routes for these blowups and will make repairs as soon as possible, when discovered.

"It's hard to know when or where a pavement blowup will happen when it gets this hot outside," said Northwest District Maintenance Engineer Marty Liles. "If you experience a blowup, use extra caution, slow down and call us to let us know where the problem is, so we can get out there and take care of it."






HOT!!!
