## Fatality accident closes southbound lane of Interstate 29 for 6 hours

Nora M. Ponciano, age 44, of Omaha, NE, lost her life in an accident on Interstate 29 1/2 mile north of Craig, MO, at the 92.8 mile marker on Friday, June 29, 2012. At approximately 9:57 a.m. on Friday, Ponciano was traveling northbound in the passing lane on Interstate 29 in her 2006 Chrysler PT Cruiser. Paul I. Hays, age 65, of Watson, MO, was southbound in the passing lane of Interstate 29. The Ponciano vehicle crossed the median into the southbound lanes, striking the Hays vehicle, which was a 1999 Kenworth. The Ponciano vehicle came to rest on its wheels in the median and the Hays vehicle came to a controlled stop in the passing lane of southbound Interstate 29.

According to the highway patrol report, Ponciano, who was not wearing a seat belt, was ejected from her vehicle, coming to rest outside the vehicle in the median. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Holt County Coroner Susan Lentz at 10:48 a.m. Her body was taken by Meierhoffer Funeral Home to Meierhoffer Funeral Home in St. Joseph, MO. Hays, who was wearing a seat belt, was not injured.

The PT Cruiser was totaled while the Kenworth received moderate damage. The Cruiser was towed from the scene by Double M Towing of Rock Port, MO. The Kenworth trailer was towed from the scene by R & W Towing of St. Joseph while the Kenworth tractor was driven from the scene.

Interstate traffic was rerouted for nearly six hours after the southbound lane of Interstate 29 was closed due to the accident. Southbound traffic was rerouted at the Corning, MO, exit (99 mile

marker) onto Missouri Highway 111 to U.S. Highway 59 near Craig, continuing back to I-29 near Craig (92 mile marker).

Cpl. R.J. Helfers of the Missouri State Highway Patrol investigated the accident. Cpl. Helfers was assisted by Sgt. M.P. Quilty, Sgt. W.S. Sims, Trooper J.R. Zach, Trooper N.J. Greiner, Trooper J.W. George, Troop A Crash Team Sgt. H.A. Sears and Sgt. G.Q. Billings, CVO Chief M.A. McCartney, CVO K.L. Shewey, the Holt County Sheriff's Department, the Missouri Department of Transportation, the Craig Fire Department and the Atchison-Holt Ambulance District. This is the fifth fatality accident for Troop H of the Missouri Highway Patrol for the month of June and the 15th for the year.

## Voter registration deadline

Adults 18 or older, or those who will be 18 by August 7, 2012, are eligible to vote in the August 7 primary election. Final registration for voters is open until Wednesday, July 11.

Holt County voters can register at the license bureau in Mound City, at the Holt County Health Department in Oregon, MO, or at the Holt County Clerk's office in the courthouse in Oregon. The courthouse will remain open for voter registration until close of business at 5:00 p.m. on July 11.

## Flood of 2011 .... One year later Week 4 - A look at Holt County

*Beginning with the June 2, 2011, issue of the Mound City News, articles ran for weeks articulating to readers the latest issues regarding the flood. That has been a year ago now, and this article is the final of a four-part series that will shed light on various areas throughout Holt County that were dramatically impacted by the Flood of 2011, taking at look at where they are now.*

Holt County, not a fledgling when it comes to disasters, knew early on that it needed to prepare for the inevitable flood that besieged the county in 2011. With record level releases anticipated from dams upstream, and river levels well above flood stage, the county prepared. Sandbags were garnered, filled and placed, citizens were evacuated, levees were thrown up around towns and multitudes of livelihoods hung in the balance as record amounts of water headed toward Holt County.

Hundreds of people were evacuated from their homes in five communities and from the countryside at large. Interstate 29 was closed at the Rock Port, MO, exit. Traffic and commerce to Mound City came to a screeching halt.

When the 100 days of water receded from the 120,000 acres of devastated cropland, 51 levee breaks in 52 total miles of levees in the county were visible. The arduous task of planning and figuring out how to pay for and protect the land ensued.

Starting at the north end of the county is the Corning Levee District. Construction of a 3/4 height repair of 8 breaches on that levee were repaired by April with the contract going to Ideker, Inc. The district has collaborated with Mill Creek Levee District to the north, and the Big Tarkio Drainage District to the south for providing complete flood protection. A design for the permanent \$1.1 estimated levee rebuild is complete and is currently being reviewed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). This process will facilitate the district being eligible by the Corps for its PL 84-99, which is an 80/20 program. The project rebuild is fully funded by CDBG monies.

Construction on the Union Levee is complete. It was partly done through the

80/20 program, with CDBG paying the 20%. Ideker, Inc., was awarded the bid for the project, which contained a 1/2 mile break where the river decided to take a left turn south of the mouth of the Big Tarkio River.

East of the Union levee is a high bank levee that was originally built in 2010, when landowners decided that a parallel levee was needed for protection of more ground. The project resulted in the formation of a new district, named Levee District 15. The new district will set its new tax levee via a hearing before September 1. The district is working with the Corps in order to be eligible for its program. The area, which is in the process of setting the tax base, will have \$17-\$19 million off of the tax base because of loss of farmable ground and ground sold to the Corps. The county is hoping for some rebound, and as the ground is recovered, the tax base will be readjusted.

Levee District #10 incurred 16 breaks in its system. First, an enormous hole with an extensive price tag, had to be filled. Once the hole was fixed, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) monies and district monies combined to pay for the Corps to rebuild. The district had to spend \$320,000 on the project. The project began in mid February and was complete by early April.

Levee 9, in the southern portion of the county, is currently under construction on a 120 day contract by Hill Brothers. It is a non-federal 80/20 levee that had five breaks that scoured very deeply.

Canon Drainage District had its 80/20 levee completed in April. The levee had 7 breaks from the floodwaters. The levee only needs seeded and mulched.

At the far southern end of the county, two federal levees exist, which are Pick-Sloan funded designs and are 100% funded by the Corps. Both levees had huge scours, resulting in an estimated \$5 million worth of damage. During the flood fight, over \$3 million was dumped into the scour holes to fight the scouring and eventually save the levees from potential breach.

The county is seeing a great rebound in sales tax through truck traffic. A "Bonus check", in the form of a 'local option use tax', has been a great asset to the county. This tax, which has been in effect since 1990, is paid by businesses for items purchased out of state for use

in Holt County. The railroad alone has paid \$199,000 in combined sales and use tax for equipment used in the county for work it did during the flood. Last month the use tax was \$62,000, compared to a normal year of \$14,000. The tax is helping keep the county 'afloat'.

From Missouri Department of Transportation's (MoDOT) standpoint, four major locations suffered 'extensive damage' - the bridge on Hwy. 136 in Atchison County, breaks in Hwy. 159, and the enormous hole on Hwy. 111.

In an effort to rebuild the aforementioned sites, shot rock was hauled into the gaping holes to the tune of 355,000 tons. That amount of rock would be equivalent to over 4 Washington Monuments.

The Hwy. 111 fill project nears completion with the cooperation of local farmers. The work at the site has tried to accomplish two things: the filling of an enormous hole, and the clearing of 90 acres of farmground that returned to production. To date, the company has moved 3,011 cubic yards of sand. That number can be looked at one of three ways, the amount of sand, if converted to asphalt, would cover 867 miles of roadway with a 1" overlay; or it would fill 95 Olympic sized swimming pools; or cover a regulation football field 145' high. APAC, contractor for the project, will add 18" of rock, then 4" of base rock, topped with a 7 1/2" layer of asphalt. The project is expected to be complete by September.

The 675' long, 40' long and 50' deep hole on Highway 159, at the south end of Big Lake, MO, was one of three gaps in the road system that MoDOT had to repair. Through arduous work, the holes were filled and the road was reopened. A full asphalt overlay will be completed on the highway yet this summer.

'The Beast', as the bridge on Highway 136 in Atchison County was dubbed, was 480' long and was 65' deep. The highway had 4 gaps that needed repair, which were done in a timely fashion..

"We're looking forward to all the work being done," remarked Mike Rinehart, MoDOT Northwest District Area Engineer. "The holes and damage were so large and severe, the repairs are long in coming."

## Holt County Assessor defendant in lawsuit concerning Missouri Open Records Law

A petition has been filed with the circuit court in Holt County for a permanent injunctive relief and assessment of civil fines and penalties. The document was filed on Friday, June 15, 2012, showing Holt County Assessor Carla Markt as the defendant; and Roger W. Hurlbert, doing business as Sage Information Services, of Glen Ellen, CA, as the plaintiff.

According to the petition filed, on May 19, 2012, Mr. Hurlbert sent a written request to Holt County Assessor Carla Markt asking for a "copy, on CD or similar electronic media, of the current real property assessment record file for the entire county". The letter also stated that he would agree to reimburse the cost of making the electronic copy subject to the parameters of Section 610.026(2), which is part of the Missouri Open Records Statute. Court documents show that on May 24, 2012, Mr. Hurlbert received a telephone response from Mrs. Markt when she informed him that the fee for providing this data would be approximately \$7,200, or \$1 per page for each of the county's real property parcels. Also, Mr. Hurlbert was informed that the Holt County assessor's office lacked the technical capability to make the electronic copy of the records, so there would also be a fee of approximately \$500 for a third party vendor to make the electronic copy.

On May 31, 2012, another letter was sent to the Holt County Assessor's Office from Mr. Hurlbert stating that he thought her office was in violation of R.S.Mo 610.026 which states - Except as otherwise provided by law, each public governmental body shall provide access to and, upon request, furnish copies of public records subject to the following: "(2) Fees for providing access to public records maintained on computer facilities, recording tapes or disks, videotapes or films, pictures, maps, slides, graphics, illustrations or similar audio or visual items or devices, and for paper copies larger than nine by fourteen inches shall include

only the cost of copies, staff time, which shall not exceed the average hourly rate of pay for staff of the public governmental body required for making copies and programming, if necessary, and the cost of the disk, tape, or other medium used for the duplication. Fees for maps, blueprints, or plats that require special expertise to duplicate may include the actual rate of compensation for the trained personnel required to duplicate such maps, blueprints, or plats. If programming is required beyond the customary and usual level to comply with a request for records or information, the fees for compliance may include the actual costs of such programming". Mr. Hurlbert also provided Holt County Assessor Carla Markt with fees that he had received from other counties in Missouri ranging from free to \$75.00 for similar information.

The petition concludes

that the assessor knowingly violated the provisions of the Missouri Open Records Law and asks the court to hold Mrs. Markt subject to a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 and pay for the plaintiff's attorney fees and costs and such other and further relief as the court deems just and proper in this matter. The petition also states that the assessor purposely violated the provisions of the Missouri Open Records Law and asks the court to hold her subject to a civil penalty of up to \$5,000 and pay for the plaintiff's attorney fees and costs and such other and further relief as the court deems just and proper in this matter.

The Mound City News contacted Carla Markt concerning the petition filed and asked for her comment. Mrs. Markt said that she was unable to comment on this matter at this time, but expected to provide further information in the near future.

## German exchange student finishes year with a tour of United States with parents

Jessica Kronenwett, the only child of Hans Peter and Christine Kronenwett of Kuppenheim, Germany, eagerly received her parents on June 1, when they stepped foot on American soil to greet their daughter, who had spent the last ten months of her life in Mound City, MO. Mound City, population 1,200, is not totally unlike life in Kuppenheim, population 7,600, with fields and livestock nearby, but life here will leave an indelible imprint not only on Jessica, but a host of people.

Jessica's journey started with a dream she had of coming to the United States as a foreign exchange student. It became a dream that her parents allowed her to indulge in, and one that sent her 4,800 miles away from them. Jessica first stepped foot on U.S. soils in August, 2011, through the Ayusa (Ayusa International) program. Jessica spent five days in New York getting acclimated and assigned. With no reservation, she soon flew to Kansas City, MO, and then was placed in a home in Warrensburg, MO.

After a month, Jessica became very disenchanted with the setting she found herself in. The organization decided to find a new family for Jessica to grow and thrive with during her American experience. A representative with Ayusa responsible for finding a new home for Jessica, called friends in Mound City to see about a possible placement. The friends, Donnie and Kim Ireland, eagerly jumped at the opportunity. The call came on a Monday, the paperwork on a Tuesday

and after background checks and approval, Jessica was in their home by the following Sunday, October 2.

"When they first asked me what I thought about letting her come, I said no!" remarked Sydney, the Irelands' 7th grade daughter. "I knew I would get attached and then I'd have to say good-bye. I was right. Saying good-bye was *really* hard."

The students at Mound City School greeted Jessica, who came in as a junior, in the spirit of true friendship. While here, Jessica joined the basketball team, a sport that she had never played, tossing in a couple baskets during her time on the floor. She excelled in track, where she qualified for state competition in three events. Jessica came home from Jefferson City, MO, with a 7th place state finish in the 400M relay. She also had an 11th place finish in the long jump and a 14th place finish in the triple jump.

The Irelands, which also include their graduated son, Drew, and daughter, Sydney, broadened Jessica's experience by keeping her involved and partaking in a variety of experiences.

"Besides having an American high school experience, we wanted her to have the experience of our family life," commented Kim Ireland. "At first she was like a guest, but then she became one of the kids, which she may not have liked at times," stated Kim laughing. "Going from being an only child to having a younger 'sibling' around was a bit different."

Besides being extremely involved at school and in community activities, the Irelands took Jessica with them on family trips. They snow skied in Colorado and vacationed in Florida. Kim lovingly chronicled the wealth of Jessica's experiences and friends in a photo book for her.

Jessica's parents, who had only communicated by phone and via Skype for the past 10 months, arrived at the end of Jessica's allotted time in the U.S., to begin coast to coast travels that would expire all of Jessica's

30-day visas. "The trip was difficult to plan," remarked Hans Peter, "because she was located in the middle of everything."

After a few days in Mound City, which included a farewell party for Jessica, the reunited trio flew to Chicago, IL, then went to Niagara Falls and later landed for some extensive sightseeing in New York City, NY. The family then flew to Las Vegas, NV, where they excitedly met up with Christine's parents (also from Kuppenheim), who were on vacation with a tour group. Jessica and her parents then went to California and took in a vast array of popular sites and beaches.

When asked to describe the differences between European travel and traveling within the United States, the Kronenwetts remarked about the prevalence of fast

food, the enormity of the hotels, which they stated 'they could just stay there and never leave, because they have food, shopping and are beautifully landscaped', and the busy traffic.

Following their month of travels, the Kronenwetts returned to Mound City to pack up all their things and say more tearful final good-byes. They returned to Kansas City and boarded the plane heading for home. Jessica, having lived her American high school dream, now has in its place, a head full of real people and places marked by her time in America that will now fill her dreams for years to come; and those people, her friends and U.S. family, will forever remember the time she shared with them and how fortunate they were to have her spend her dream in Mound City.



# Local woman working prestigious internship with mining company

Some students work in offices for their summer internships, but Northwest Missouri State University student, Deanna (Biermann) Mandrick travels 1,000 feet underground each day to go to work. Mandrick, a junior environmental geology major from Craig, MO, is spending her summer as a mine geologist intern with the Doe Run Mining Company near Viburnum, MO.

In her internship, Mandrick grades mine headings and determines whether the amount of lead in an area is economical for the company to mine. She also maps mined areas and assists with mineral exploration.

Mandrick was the only intern selected from about 60 applicants, and the opportunity has altered her career plans, she said. "I am still interested in environmental geology, but I really think that I am going to stick with mining," Mandrick stated. "It is really more interesting to me now that I have been around it a little bit. Mining is much more hands-on, and I actually get to go out and do things in the mine."

The job may be interesting, but it does come with

its share of risks and safety requirements. Because of the dangerous nature of working in a mine, all workers are required to log when they enter the mine, where they travel within the mine and when and where they leave the mine. It is possible to travel as far as seven miles underground within the mine.

"It's kind of a different world inside a mine," Mandrick said. "It's not really scary, but you just have to be sure to keep safety constantly in mind."

Doe Run is globally recognized, however, as one of the safest of all mining companies, having received numerous safety awards. Workers are required to wear protective clothing, a belt with a mine lamp and an extra battery, and an emergency breathing apparatus.

Mandrick said Northwest faculty and coursework helped prepare her for the internship - specifically classes in mineralogy, sedimentology and geology. "Many of my classes really helped me understand what was going on down here," she said. "More importantly, they gave me knowledge that I could apply to help me learn more while working here."

Dr. Aaron Johnson, assistant professor of geosciences, recommended the internship to Mandrick because he saw her as the right person for the job. Johnson said Mandrick's experience growing up on a farm helped prepare her for the mining internship because the kind of hot, sweaty, difficult and dangerous work done on a farm presents similar emotional and physical challenges.

"This job is not for the faint of heart," Johnson said. "You're 1,000 feet underground. It's dangerous. You really have to be the kind of person that is willing to push yourself, not just

physically but intellectually, because the opportunity is there to learn a lot. Deanna was one of the few students that really combined those qualities. She was really just emotionally, intellectually and physically ready and able to step up to this kind of challenge."

The Doe Run Mining Company is the largest integrated lead producer in the western hemisphere, with operations in Missouri, Washington and Arizona. The Missouri mines account for 70% of the lead mined in America today, according to the Doe Run Mining Company's website. Most of the lead mined by Doe Run is used to make car batteries assembled in the United States.

# This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

## 50 Years Ago - 1962

- A couples' Scotch Foursome Tournament was held at the Mound City Golf Course on the 4th of July, with 40 persons attending. A cookout with chefs, "Pan" Crouse and "Shag" Halcomb, followed at the clubhouse. Ivan Loucks and Mrs. Lowell Ripley won the tournament with a score of 39.
- Higher altitude Mound City residents were without water for nearly 3 hours when city employees succumbed after a gallant 18-22 hour a day fight for weeks with water treatment plant problems.
- An estimated 2,000 people attended the fireworks' display, headed by Glenn Doan and the Mound City Fire Department, in Mound City on July 4th. Nearly 400 cars were counted leaving the parking area. Nearly 100 cars remained, with folks attending the dance that followed. The Mound City school band provided a concert and the dance band from Oregon, MO, led by Avon Coffman, provided excellent music for the final dance. Sol Forney emceed the entire 4th celebration.
- The Mound City girls' softball team defeated Maryville, MO, by a score of 19 to 12. Mound City fell to Barnard, MO, 4-3 in an exciting game at Barnard.

## 25 Years Ago - 1987

- The 1987 4th of July festivities netted these winners: Grand Prize Baby - Jacob Schoonover and Krista Lane; Little Mr. and Miss Firecracker - Adam Markt and Michelle Russell; Miss 4th of July - Karla Bohart and Runner-Up, Angie Pendleton; and Senior King was John Andes.
- The annual 4th of July celebration had the parade theme of, "We the People". Approximately 60 entries gave the day a lot of variety and color. Esther Fields served as Grand Marshal for the event.
- The Mound City Summer Ball Program recorded sales of 1,600 tickets in a fundraiser drawing for Royals' tickets and a stay at the Adam's Mark Hotel. Winning ticket sale prizes were Matt Messick, Chad and Jason Thurnau, Josh Hall and Curtis Stroud.
- Representatives of Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge met with Mound City personnel to present a plan and blueprints for a new water control gate on Davis Creek. The proposed gate would sit 1 1/4 mile south of the north refuge boundary. No action was taken.

## 10 Years Ago - 2002

- The Friends of Squaw Creek received a \$25,000 grant which was bestowed on the Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge. The grant was to be used to enlarge the auditorium for conservation education programming. The refuge was getting a \$250,000 federal grant for headquarters' expansion and another \$500,000 for other projects.
- A benefit with matching funds by the Aid Association for Lutherans was held with proceeds going to the Northwest Holt Fire Protection District. The benefit raised \$1,262, which was combined with \$1,200 matching funds for the purchase of five new First Responder medical equipment bags.
- Dubbed 'The Best Rodeo Mound City has ever had', the 2002 Buckin' Blast Rodeo drew an estimated two-day crowd of 2,500 people. Shaylin Miller won the girls' mutton bustin' event and Joshua Johnson won the boys' event. Two injuries were reported and three bulls escaped on loading day.
- The future of the TIF district in Mound City, which included the new Dollar General site, hinged on the vote by the Mound City City Council.



# Agriculture Secretary Vilsack announces economic development funding to support business growth, create jobs

will create 12 new jobs and save 36 existing jobs.

“It’s a great opportunity for USDA Rural Development in Missouri to be able to assist Laclede Electric Cooperative in being able to get resources out to communities that need them,” said Anita J. (Janie) Dunning. “We are glad our agency had the resources available and know that Ozark Technical Community College will be successful in its mission of offering more educational opportunities to rural communities.”

## New Rock Port, MO, welcome center now open

The new Rock Port, MO, Welcome Center officially opened to the public on Wednesday, June 27, during a formal dedication ceremony, according to the Missouri Division of Tourism and the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT). The new center is located on Interstate 29 just south of the town of Rock Port. "Rock Port is the gateway into Missouri from the north and this new welcome center is a wonderful facility in a great location to educate and really welcome visitors to our state," said Don Wichern, MoDOT Northwest District Engineer. "We appreciate everyone's hard work to get this center open and look forward to the years of service it will provide." Elements of the dedication included honoring Senator Hardin Cox, who was at the ceremony. The center is dedicated to him for his long-term service to the state. The city of Rock Port was recognized for its contributions to the project, and several officials were on hand and recognized for their support. Representatives from Missouri Western State University spoke about its contribution to the educational panels located outside the building. A Blue

Star Memorial Highway bronze has also been re-installed. The theme of the new welcome center is "Energy Conservation and Alternative Energy: Past & Present". Working with Missouri Western State University, Northwest Missouri State University, and various history and energy experts, informational/educational panels have been installed throughout the building. Leadership in Environmental and Energy Design certification is also being sought. MoDOT has worked closely with the Missouri Arts Council on a nationwide search to identify an artist to design and construct a mural for the lobby of the welcome center. Matt Dehaemers, the chosen artist, was also on hand to discuss his plans, which include colorful background panels that will spell out Rock Port with a see-through foreground panel that will combine some of the energy theme into the design. All will be lit by LED lights. Many of the background pieces are made of designs inspired by quilt patterns that relate to transportation - one even called the "road to happiness".

"If I can get some of the visitors to just stop for a few extra moments and think about what they see and the meaning behind it, then I've done my job as an artist," Dehaemers said. The welcome center is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., Monday - Saturday by Missouri Division of Tourism personnel.

# Staying safe in extreme heat conditions

Workers who are exposed to extreme heat or work in hot environments may be at risk of heat stress. Exposure to extreme heat can result in occupational illnesses and injuries. Heat stress can result in heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps, or heat rashes. Heat can also increase the risk of injuries in workers as it may result in sweaty palms, fogged-up safety glasses, and dizziness. Burns may also occur as a result of accidental contact with hot surfaces or steam.

Workers at risk of heat stress include outdoor workers and workers in hot environments such as firefighters, bakery workers, farmers, construction workers, miners, boiler room workers, factory workers, and others. Workers at greater risk of heat stress include those who are 65 years of age or older, are overweight, have heart disease or high blood pressure, or take medications that may be affected by extreme heat.

Prevention of heat stress in workers is important. Employers should provide training to workers so they understand what heat stress is, how it affects their health and safety, and how it can be prevented.

**Heat Stroke**  
Heat stroke is the most serious heat-related disorder. It occurs when the body becomes unable to control its temperature: the body's temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails, and the body is unable to cool down. When heat stroke occurs, the body temperature can rise to 106 degrees Fahrenheit or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not given.

**Symptoms**  
Symptoms of heat stroke include:

- Hot, dry skin or profuse sweating
  - Hallucinations
  - Chills
  - Throbbing headache
  - High body temperature
  - Confusion/dizziness
  - Slurred speech
- First Aid**  
Take the following steps to treat a worker with heat stroke:
- Call 911 and notify their supervisor.
  - Move the sick worker to a cool shaded area.
  - Cool the worker using methods such as:
  - Soaking their clothes

with water.

- Spraying, sponging, or showering them with water.
- Fanning their body.

**Heat Exhaustion**  
Heat exhaustion is the body's response to an excessive loss of the water and salt, usually through excessive sweating. Workers most prone to heat exhaustion are those that are elderly, have high blood pressure, and those working in a hot environment.

**Symptoms**  
Symptoms of heat exhaustion include:

- Heavy sweating
- Extreme weakness or fatigue
- Dizziness, confusion
- Nausea
- Clammy, moist skin
- Pale or flushed complexion
- Muscle cramps
- Slightly elevated body temperature
- Fast and shallow breathing

**First Aid**  
Treat a worker suffering from heat exhaustion with the following:

- Have them rest in a cool, shaded or air-conditioned area.
- Have them drink plenty of water or other cool, non-alcoholic beverages.
- Have them take a cool shower, bath, or sponge bath.

**Heat Syncope**  
Heat syncope is a fainting (syncope) episode or dizziness that usually occurs with prolonged standing or sudden rising from a sitting or lying position. Factors that may contribute to heat syncope include dehydration and lack of acclimatization.

**Symptoms**  
Symptoms of heat syncope include:

- Light-headedness
- Dizziness
- Fainting

**First Aid**  
Workers with heat syncope should:

- Sit or lie down in a cool place when they begin to feel symptoms.
- Slowly drink water, clear juice, or a sports beverage.

**Heat Cramps**  
Heat cramps usually affect workers who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture levels. Low salt levels in muscles causes painful cramps. Heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion.

**Symptoms**  
Muscle pain or spasms usu-

ally in the abdomen, arms, or legs.

**First Aid**  
Workers with heat cramps should:

- Stop all activity, and sit in a cool place.
- Drink clear juice or a sports beverage.
- Do not return to strenuous work for a few hours after the cramps subside because further exertion may lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

- Seek medical attention if any of the following apply:
- The worker has heart problems.
- The worker is on a low-sodium diet.
- The cramps do not subside within one hour.

**Heat Rash**  
Heat rash is a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather.

**Symptoms**  
Symptoms of heat rash include:

- Heat rash looks like a red cluster of pimples or small blisters.
- It is more likely to occur on the neck and upper chest, in the groin, under the breasts, and in elbow creases.

**First Aid**  
Workers experiencing heat rash should:

- Try to work in a cooler, less humid environment when possible.
- Keep the affected area dry.
- Dusting powder may be used to increase comfort.

**Recommendations for Employers**  
Employers should take the following steps to protect workers from heat stress:

- Schedule maintenance and repair jobs in hot areas for cooler months.
- Schedule hot jobs for the cooler part of the day.
- Acclimatize workers by exposing them for progressively longer periods to hot work environments.
- Reduce the physical demands of workers.
- Use relief workers or assign extra workers for physically demanding jobs.
- Provide cool water or liquids to workers.

## Extreme NW Missouri temperatures could mean pavement blowups

As temperatures continue to hover well above 90 degrees in northwest Missouri, motorists should be aware that the extreme heat can cause pavement "blowups" on northwest Missouri roadways.

A pavement blowup occurs when the roadway surface expands at a crack or joint where moisture has seeped in. As sections of pavement expand with increasing temperatures, the natural release location is typically found at the cracks and joints, resulting in buckled pavement.

Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) crews are monitoring state routes for these blowups and will make repairs as soon as possible, when discovered.

"It's hard to know when or where a pavement blowup will happen when it gets this hot outside," said Northwest District Maintenance Engineer Marty Liles. "If you experience a blowup, use extra caution, slow down and call us to let us know where the problem is, so we can get out there and take care of it."

Motorists can call MoDOT's toll-free customer service center at 1-888-ASK-MODOT (275-6636) to report pavement blowups.

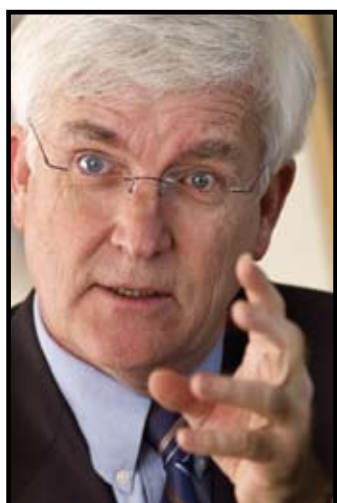

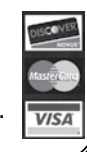

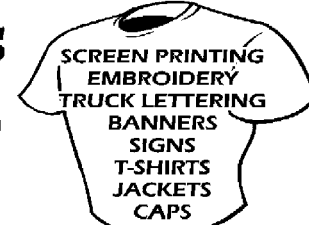
