School Board accepts bid to build new wall

The Mound City School Board met on Monday, August 9, at 7:30 a.m. to review bids obtained for repair work to be done on the collapsing retaining wall at the front of the school on Nebraska Street.

The proposed project will only affect the main stairs in front of the school and the area of yard to the north. The area to the south will be renovated at a later date.

The main stairs in front of the school's main entrance will be replaced, the grass area (parkway) to the north will be removed, a new sidewalk installed and a shorter wall will wrap in a half moon from the new front steps to the steps in front of the gym. The new sidewalk will connect the front steps and extend to the junior high portion of the building, with a grass area between the base of the new wall and the new sidewalk.

Four bids were submitted to the board for consideration. Each bid contained a base bid which used precast blocks and an alternate bid which included the traditional landscape blocks. The following bids were reviewed as submitted:

1.) Lewis Backhoe & Excavating, Inc. of Cosby, MO, Base Bid: \$167,330 and Alternate Bid: \$168,935.

75th Anniversary Celebration kickoff at Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge

As a kickoff to its 75th anniversary celebration, the Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge will host an open house event on Monday, August 23. The refuge was established on that date 75 years ago by President Franklin D. Roosevelt as a refuge feeding and breeding ground for migratory birds and other wildlife.

There are several events planned for the day, with the refuge opening for regular hours from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Refreshments and a wildlife powerpoint, showcasing photos taken on the refuge by a host of photographers, will be available at the headquarters all day.

A special 75th pictorial cancellation, a free event, will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the headquarters. Kay Smith, Mound City Postmaster, will facilitate the special cancellation event. Attendees may bring their own stamped envelope for a free postmark or envelopes and stamps can be

purchased at the event.

From 1:00-3:00 p.m., Mike Moseman, a native St. Joseph woodcarver will be featured in the headquarters with his woodcarving.

Mound City Librarian Cindy Grant will offer a special children's storytime event with craft at 10:00 a.m.

Four notebooks full of pictures, letters, memos and other memorable documents beginning in 1930 to the present will be on display. There is also a notebook containing the names of all the service people that have worked at the refuge over the past 75 years.

That same evening, the World Premier Showing of the New Squaw Creek DVD will be shown at the State Theater in Mound City at 9:00 p.m. Follow the lights to the theater for the new footage of the refuge. Ron Bell will follow the film event with a short presentation highlighting the remaining 75th anniversary celebration events.

New board members for the State Theater

Planning for this season's programs, organizing fund-raising and arranging for building repairs are among activities for the State Theater Arts Council. In addition, the board has filled all officer slots, including Linda Boultinghouse, president; Brenda Haines, vice-president; Sandra Fuhrman,

secretary; and Melinda Tally, treasurer. The board in July accepted the resignation of Jim Thomas, who had served as treasurer of the theater board since its inception in 1988. Jonathan Miller resigned at the May meeting after serving several years as president.

Gary Parker and Melinda Tally were welcomed as new board members for three-year terms at the annual meeting in July, which preceded the regular meeting. Other current members are Wava Duncan, Stan Seitz, Barb Heitman, Roger Rowlett and Kristy Reedy. Two more spots are to be filled.

Committee slots filled so far include Brenda, program; Gary and Stan, maintenance; Wava, Barb, Melinda and Linda, fund-raising; and Roger and Brenda, concessions.

New giving levels for fund-raising have been approved. Board members will be contacting individuals and businesses and an insert explaining financial needs was placed in the *Mound City News*.

The board also voted to refurbish the front doors, rather than replace them. Another major project is to repair the south auditorium wall which has had moisture damage. Also, the ticket booth is getting new glass (replacing a cracked window), new ceiling and lighting. The board also voted to arrange for permanent displays in two of the front display windows.

The board's next meeting is Tuesday, August 17, at 4:30 p.m. at the theater.

Black-bellied whistling ducks make rare appearance in Holt County

This picture of a pair of adult black-bellied whistling ducks, though considered very rare in Missouri, was taken Tuesday morning, August 10, just west of P Highway near Bigelow, MO, by Bill Beasley and Bill Hutting. Bill Beasley has observed the ducks in the area for over a month. Due to its unique appearance, this species is almost unmistakable. It is one of only two whistling duck species native to North America.

A black-bellied whistling duck is 19-21 inches (48-53 cm) long. It has a long red bill, long head and longish legs, pale gray head and mostly gray-brown plumage. The belly and tail are black, and the body plumage, back of the neck and cap are a rich chestnut brown. The face and upper neck are gray, and they sport a thin, but distinct, white eye ring.

Black-bellied whistling ducks are most commonly found on the eastern coast of Mexico, where they have their feeding and breeding grounds. The rare sightings in Missouri show maybe a single record or up to a few occurrences a year.

Dr. Russian, Audubon Society expert and professor at Missouri Western State University, has never had the opportunity to see a black-bellied whistling duck in Missouri. When contacted, he was eager to grab other Audubon members and make the drive to see them firsthand.

Gearing up for grapes

The Mound City Development Corporation is making preparation for the sale of the three varieties of grapes in its vineyards to several different businesses for processing the fine grapes grown here in Mound City into retail products.

The first to be ripened and ready for picking in a couple weeks are the Frontenac grapes. A portion of these grapes will be made into jelly this year. Last year, some of the Nortons were made into a wonderful jelly by the Jam Shop in Weatherby, MO. While the decision is not quite conclusive, plans are being made to make the remaining Frontenacs into grape juice or a juice concentrate.

The Chambourcin grapes will ripen toward the end of September and be harvested for use as wine.

The Norton grapes are the last to ripen and will be harvested in mid October. These also will be made into Mound City wine. The corporation has secured several different wineries for the production of the 2010 Mound City wine.

The Mound City Development Corporation is also taking part in a first ever

Winefest. The Winefest will be held at Griffith Park in Mound City on Saturday, October 9, from 4:00-9:00 p.m. The fundraising event will be sponsored by Northwest Missouri Enterprise Facilitation. More information will be released at a later date. Look for future ads in this paper for details of this event.

Remembering

"Where's my bow?" A few weeks ago, two friends and I were down at Cabela's for a day off. By the way, we had buffalo burgers for lunch, one of my favorites, excluding a buffalo steak.

Back in the archery department, that was under reconstruction, memories were brought to mind of my first bow and introduction into the world of archery. The last time I was there, they had a few "long bows", which, hanging next to the modern compound bows and crossbows, they sure looked out of place. I was thinking of purchasing one, even though I have a left hand compound and a recurved bow, that I hadn't been using anyway, but there wasn't any there this time.

My first bow, other than poorly made ones when we used to play Cowboys and Indians, I started when I was in high school. It was a manual training project. I purchased a 6' x 1.5" square piece of lemonwood for \$1.00 and used instructions out of my Scout Handbook for the proper method to make it. A lot of hours were spent using a drawknife, plane, rasp and sandpaper on it and it still didn't look right. I used it anyway. I didn't do much to it until I came back from WWII, then I kept at it until I had it just right.

When we were living in Maitland, I had a few bales of hay fixed up with a target in the basement. That made a good place to practice, and I could use a .22 hand gun

there too. I used it for several years, even did some bow fishing. One day a young man wanted to look at the bow and before I could get him stopped, he pulled the string back as far as he could and it cracked, since there wasn't an arrow in it to govern the amount of draw. That put an end to my archery career at that time.

When I went into professional scouting, we lived in Muscatine, IA, and at a sporting store there, I witnessed a local demonstrating one of the newer recurved bows. That renewed my interest in archery again, for up until that time, I had never seen that type of bow. I also was helping with the area Boy Scout Camp and among many duties, I was in charge of recreational archery. During open house for visitors during the weekends, we had so many adults and first timers, that there was a waiting line and we didn't have enough equipment for those busy days. Sure was a surprise that archery was so popular up there.

We moved to Louisiana from there and I purchased a "Ben Peirson" fiberglass slightly curve bow with an arrow rest on both sides and a 55 pound pull, so both a right and a lefty could use it. One of the houses we lived in had a portion of the yard with a large thick hedge at the end, which made an excellent safe place to practice. I put several bales of hay in front of it and placed a target

on them. In just a few days of being out there practicing, cars started stopping to watch and then people came over to try it themselves. I instructed a good many, who went and purchased a bow and went from there to bow hunting when the state finally formed a recognized season for bow hunting alone. I made a special bow sight that worked fine for either right or left archers. Since I'm more or less both handed, it worked fine with me.

Now the compound bows and the elaborate crossbows have taken over the use of the long bows and the recurved ones. I understand interest is coming back to the basics again. I hope so. If you're not involved with archery, sometime visit a sporting goods store that sells bows or better yet, go watch a local archery shoot and just see what a highly technical field it has become, along with all the different sights, including telescopes on the crossbows.

Instead of pounds pull, they are rated in feet per second and instead of the old cedar arrows, carbon and fiber have taken over. The assortment of arrowheads for hunting make me realize more than ever, if I had my rather, I'd rather be shot with a firearm than an arrow anytime. If the American Indians could have perfected their bows like the ones of today, we might be living in a different world.

State Theater Arts Council launches annual fund drive

The State Theater Arts Council has launched its annual fund drive, seeking the support of area residents to help pay for programming, upkeep and repairs at the theater.

Officials learned in late July that the theater has been awarded an \$11,652 grant from the Missouri Arts Council for the 2010-2011 season, about \$1,300 less than it received last season. The grant covers only part of yearly expenses, which generally range from \$25,000 to \$30,000. The theater must rely on the generosity of the local community to cover the rest.

Season tickets are the same price as last year, \$75 each. In addition, giving levels approved at the board's July meeting are: Contributor, up to \$199; Benefactor, \$200-\$299 (includes two season tickets); Patron,

\$300-\$599 (includes three season tickets); Angel, \$600 and over (includes four season tickets). The theater also will need sponsors for some of the shows and welcomes any business, club or individual who would like to help out in that way.

Plans are being finalized for shows for the upcoming season - among those are the annual anniversary show in October, featuring country music performed by local talent; a Christmas children's show and a Christmas concert; and a community play.

Local support is especially critical in helping keep the theater's unique, historic building in good repair. Community donations helped pay for a \$10,000 roof repair last year and several projects are planned for this season, among those refurbishing the front doors; repairing the south auditorium wall, broken seats and the ticket booth; and minor repairs to part of the roof.

"State Theater officials are grateful for the continuing loyalty and generosity of area residents who have helped keep this community treasure going for more than 20 years," said Linda Boultinghouse, president. "We hope these faithful people will continue to support us and that others will join in the effort. To those who already have given for this season, a big thank

you." Any amount given will be greatly appreciated and will make a difference, she added.

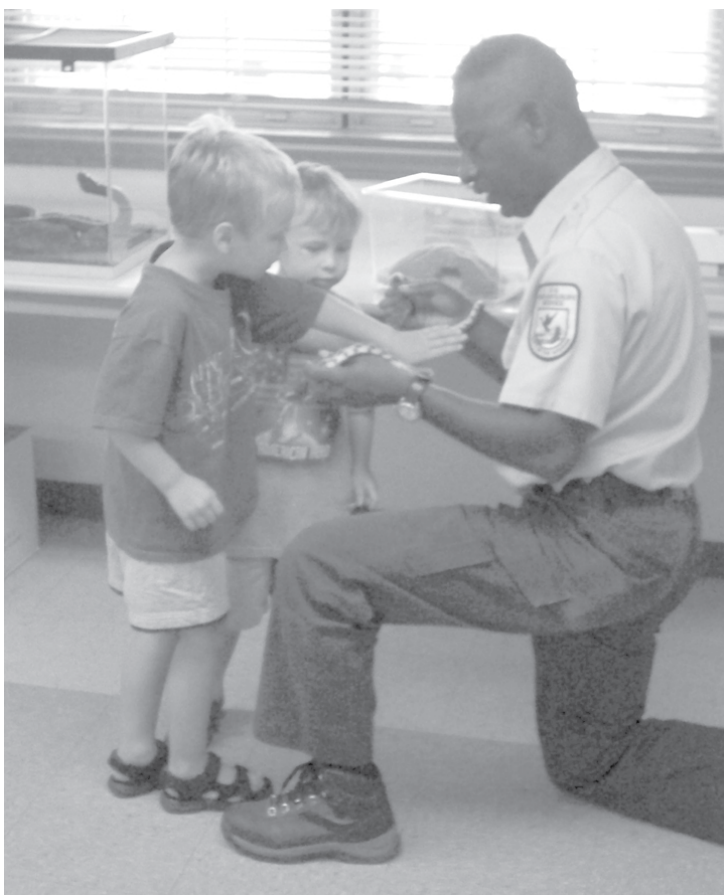

Division of State Parks asks for assistance in rebuilding flooded park

‘Remake Big Lake’ campaign kicks off

Big Lake State Park has been a cornerstone of recreation in northwest Missouri since 1932. It has been a place of great happiness – of anniversaries and family barbecues and afternoons spent fishing.

On June 17, 2010, however, a nearby Missouri River levee gave way and virtually all of the park’s 407 acres were inundated. The waters have receded, but a substantial clean-up and rebuilding effort remains. Initial estimates are that it will cost more than \$100,000 to restore the park.

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources is looking for some help in rebuilding the park and has embarked on a “Remake Big Lake” campaign to raise funds and awareness. Additional information on the campaign, as well as pictures of the park before and after the flood, can be found at mostateparks.com/remakebiglake.htm.

“Farmers lost their crops, families lost their homes and northwest Missouri lost a beautiful place,” said Bill Bryan, Division of State Parks director. “The task ahead of us is large – just buying grass seed and fertilizer for 66 of the park’s 407

acres is going to cost about \$20,000. There are plenty of other expenses that go into making a park a place people want to go. We’re asking Missourians – and anyone who has ever had a favorite park – to help us remake Big Lake. There are many ways people can help.”

The two easiest ways to help are:

- Voting for Big Lake State Park in Coca-Cola’s contest to name America’s favorite park. If Big Lake wins, the park will receive a \$100,000 grant from Coca-Cola that will be used to restore the park. People can vote at <http://www.livepositively.com/#americasparks>.

- Donating online through the State Parks donation portal at <http://mostateparks.com/remakebiglake.htm>. All donations made online between August 5 and September 30 will go towards restoring Big Lake.

The priority for the park is opening the cabins, campground and c-store in time for Labor Day.

Big Lake State Park is located near Craig and averages more than 200,000 visitors a year. Previous to the flood, it had a dining lodge, motel, convenience store and Scout Island.

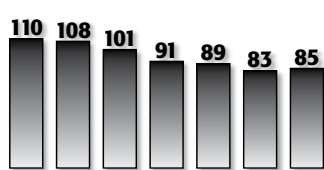

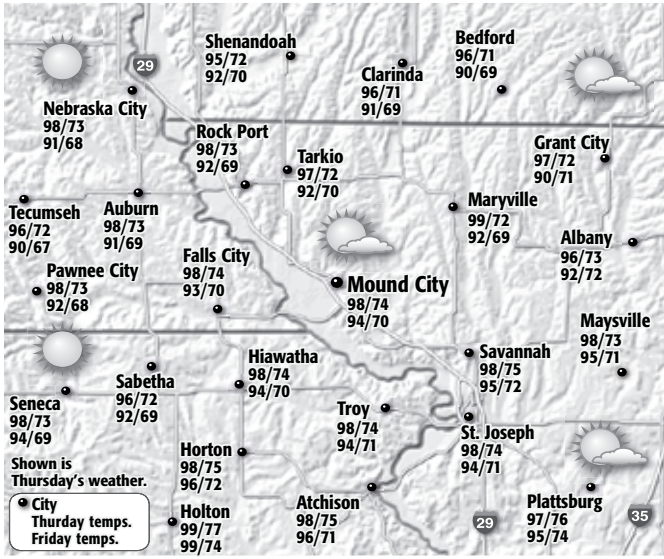

Moisture testing available through Holt County Extension Center

Individuals and businesses at Big Lake and other locations in Holt County who experienced flooding of homes or offices can schedule moisture testing through the Holt County University of Missouri Extension Office.

Wooden wall studs, floor boards and any other wooden building parts that were flooded need to be tested for moisture content. It is very important to have the moisture at a safe level before closing walls or applying other finishes or floor coverings. Closing with high moisture will result in growth of mold inside walls, ceilings

and under carpets. In hot, humid weather drying occurs slower. Using high volume fans can speed up the drying process. There should be no signs of mold in the structure.

To schedule an appointment for moisture testing by a University of Missouri Extension Specialist, call the Holt County Extension Center at 660-446-3724. Testing will be available on Tuesdays and Fridays, as needed. Walls in homes or businesses need to be open, cleaned and disinfected. They must have dried for a minimum of three to four weeks before the testing is needed.

Missouri soft red winter wheat performance tests available

Growers who are considering planting winter wheat this fall may want to stop by their local Extension office and pick up a copy of the Missouri Soft Red Winter Wheat performance tests. This report is from the University of Missouri Variety testing program which tests different winter wheat varieties from different locations across the state.

The range in yields of the north Missouri sites are from 60 bushels to a low of 30 bushels. This reaffirms the principle of good variety selection can

increase the profitability of an operation. The past season was challenging for growing wheat. Soft red winter varieties are better suited with their disease packages compared to hard red winter wheat varieties.

50 Years Ago - 1960

USDA announces Conservation Reserve Program general sign-up

The Holt County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Jackie VanGundy, announced the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) will offer a general sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) now through August 27, 2010. Interested landowners can offer eligible land for CRP's competitive general sign-up at the Holt County FSA office.

CRP is a voluntary program that assists farmers and other agricultural producers to use their environmentally sensitive land for conservation benefits. Producers enrolling in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving

covers in exchange for rental payments, cost-share and technical assistance.

"Landowners enrolling in CRP will be entering into long-term contracts of 10 to 15 years," VanGundy said. "In exchange, the landowner receives an annual rental payment and could also receive funding up to 50 percent of the cost to establish the conservation practices."

VanGundy said land currently not enrolled in CRP may be offered in this sign-up provided all eligibility requirements are met. Addi-

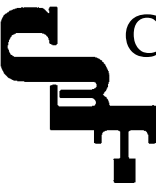

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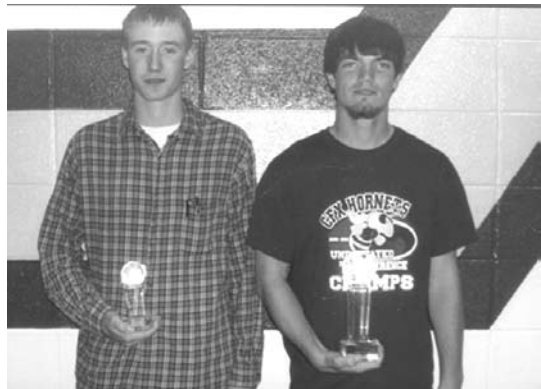

The Craig Math and Science Club completed another very successful recycling year. The club had 30 members and collected 150,563 pounds of recyclables including paper, plastic and aluminum. The amount brings the club's three-year total to over 444,000 pounds.

The club presented awards for the 2009-2010 year. First place Recycler was Kevin Dodson, Second Place Recycler was Trevor Drewes, Parent Volunteer of the Year was Phyllis Dodson and Community Volunteers of the Year were Robert Rother and Ada Edwards. Kevin Dodson received the first place Senior Scholarship of \$750; the second place Senior Scholarship of \$500 went to Jordan Showalter; and third place Senior Scholarship of \$250 was awarded to Nicolette Rogers.

The project has had amazing response, growing from a school project to a community project. Club members, parents and their co-workers, grandparents and extended family members from all over Holt County and beyond, are collecting recyclables for the Craig Math and Science Club.

Besides saving landfill space, the club is helping to conserve natural resources and members are influencing others to live more responsibly and to care for the environment.

Paper items should be sorted into these three categories: cardboard, office paper and everything else (magazines, newspapers, slick items and books).

Plastic bottles and jugs should have the lids removed and should be smashed. (The lids may be saved too, just separated). The jugs should be sorted by the numbers 1 or 2 found on the bottom of the bottle. Milk jugs should be thoroughly rinsed.

Any aluminum may also be collected. The sale of the aluminum is applied toward the Math and Science Club scholarships and other stu-

dent incentives.

Craig teachers Melanie Brandon and Trudy Heitman are the sponsors for the club. Donations from many local businesses help make the recycling project possible, and help provide the scholarships and student incentives.

"We are so appreciative of our 37 sponsors and the support they give the program," stated club sponsor, Melanie Brandon.

The sponsors weigh and record each members' recyclable poundage. The mate-

rials are then deposited in a roll-off container provided by Williams' Recycling, which then picks up the recyclables free of charge.

Club members, grades 7-12, can collect the recyclables, or recyclables can be dropped off at the Craig School from 3:10 to 4:00 p.m. most days after school, except Wednesdays. Assistance for sorted recyclables unloading may be obtained by calling the school at 660-683-5431 in advance to ensure help and proper drop-off.

tionally, current CRP participants with contracts expiring September 30, 2010, may make new contract offers. Contracts awarded under this sign-up are scheduled to become effective October 1, 2010.

FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) for environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP. The EBI consists of five factors - wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring benefits - and cost. Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after the sign-up ends and after analyzing the EBI data of all the offers. Those who would have met previous sign-up EBI thresh-

olds are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up.

CRP protects millions of acres of America's topsoil from erosion and is designed to improve the nation's natural resource base. By reducing water runoff and sedimentation, CRP also protects groundwater and helps improve the condition of lakes, rivers, ponds and streams. Acreage enrolled in CRP is planted to resource-conserving vegetative covers, making the program a major contributor to wildlife population increases in many parts of the country. As a result, CRP has provided significant opportunities for hunting and fishing on private lands.
