## 32nd Annual Fishing Derby catches a ton of fish

The 32nd Annual Gene Kent and Melvin Livengood Memorial Fishing Derby was held west of Craig, MO, at the Thurnau Wildlife Area on Saturday and Sunday, August 11 and 12. The event was started in 1980, when Gene Kent, Melvin Livengood and Ivan Ohlensehlen discussed the idea of a family oriented fishing tournament. Melvin's son, Doug, took the idea and put a plan into motion. The tournament has been a yearly event since, with the exception of one year due to flooding. Tom Kent and Lynn Thurnau have fished in all 32 tournaments.

This year's event, the biggest river event in northwest Missouri that promotes fishing, drew 28 boats, registered with 70 fishermen, women and children. A total of 1,633 pounds of catfish (407 fish) and 554 pounds of carp (99 fish) were caught in the two-day tournament. The event culminated at a well attended fish fry on Sunday evening at the Craig Legion Hall.

"The flooded conditions of the Missouri River over the past two years have resulted in great fishing for Missouri River anglers," stated Jade Wright, Holt County Conservation Agent. "Dur-

ing years of flood, few fish are being harvested. There are more places for fish to hide from natural predators, and food sources are plentiful. Additionally, the diversity of water allows for ideal spawning conditions for each fish species. These factors together add up to an abundance of fish and phenomenal growth rates. When flood waters recede, more big fish are put back into the smaller channelized river with less food to go around. That makes for great fishing as we have experienced this summer and most likely will continue to reap the benefits of for the next few years."

## Prepare for the school year with required immunizations

*DHSS reminds parents to add immunizations to back-to-school supply lists*

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) reminds parents to prepare for the upcoming school year now by getting their children's annual physicals and required immunizations.

"Immunizations are proven to be one of the most successful and cost-effective ways to prevent serious diseases," said Margaret Donnelly, Director of the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services. "Even though we're still on summer vacation, we encourage parents to make their children's immunization appointments now instead of waiting until the busy days right before school begins."

Missouri law requires children in kindergarten through 12th grade to receive immunizations to protect against 9 vaccine-preventable diseases. This helps protect everyone including students, teachers, staff and other community members.

Children attending kindergarten through 12th grade are required to have

the following up-to-date immunizations or booster shots:

- DTaP - Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis or DT - diphtheria and tetanus

- Tdap – Tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (required for 8th, 9th and 10th grade)

- IPV - Polio

- Hepatitis B

- MMR- Measles, mumps,

rubella

- Varicella – Chickenpox

Most vaccines are covered by health insurance and children 18 and younger may be eligible to get immunizations for free through the Vaccines for Children Program if they are Medicaid eligible, uninsured, underinsured or an American Indian or Alaskan Native.

Contact your health care provider to ensure your child is up to date on immunizations. For more information visit [www.health.mo.gov/im](http://www.health.mo.gov/im) munizations or contact your local public health agency.

# Remembering

**"Early Missouri"**

The following are excerpts from a book that was copyrighted in 1897, describing Missouri at that time. It started off with the following, 'the early inhabitants of Missouri were peculiar people'. First of all, they were Indians, but when they settled there, no one knows. Next came the French, then the Spaniards and lastly the Americans. The last named were mostly people from Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia. (My folks came from Kentucky.) Nearly all the American settlers in Missouri were descendants of pioneers and were a rigidly honest people. No locks were on their doors and they had no need of any.

There was an old saying I can remember older folks talking about. If one was welcome to one's home, they would say to them, 'the latch string is always on the outside' or 'our door is always open'. As they were dependent on each other for protection, what belonged to one was freely loaned to his neighbor. If a pioneer wanted to borrow his neighbor's axe and did not find the man at home, he took the axe without asking and returned it when done with it. The book stated that the early Missourians were rude and uncultured, but un-

selfish and brave.

Quoting the last page of the book that summed up Missouri in 1897, "Missouri is a remarkable state. Though not admitted to the Union until 1821, it now (1897) ranks 7th in population. The inhabitants numbered more than 3 million, but this is only the 10th of the population which the state is capable of supporting. If Missourians were cut off from all the remainder of the world, it has natural resources within its own borders sufficient to supply 30 million inhabitants with all the necessities and comforts essential to a civilized people. Though there have been panics and failures in all parts of the world, they have merely checked the prosperity of Missouri. That prosperity has never come to a standstill and today (1897), no state has a more promising future." That's all the quotes from the book.

Today, even with what seems overcrowded, we lack several million in population that what was thought Missouri could handle, we're somewhere near 6 million. If we were cut off from the rest of the world now, we'd sure have a big problem. Even if the complete United States were cut off, it would take a long time to be back

where we could support ourselves, like at one time we could have. I have heard numerous comments that our condition today is "just the sign of the times". I sure agree with that, but a lot of us have seen the sign of the so called times that were good. When you have to rely on other countries, or other companies or individuals, you have lost control of too many things that affect daily lives. I heard a statement that now here in the USA, there is not one thing that we manufacture today without some portion obtained from some other country and, in some cases, 100% is from another country.

The early Missourians would never have believed that this could happen to us. In fact, while I was growing up, I wouldn't have believed it either. We were short a good many things during World War II, but we all got together and made the United States the greatest and leading country in the world. I sure hated to see us as 2nd and losing out more each day. Yeah, I sure wish for some of the OLD Missouri days. One old saying is "history repeats itself", maybe it will all come back. It looks like we'll be number one in the Olympics, thanks to a group of dedicated people.

Evelyn M. Thomas-Haeffele of Mound City, MO, was born on December 23, 1914, in Kansas City, MO, the fourth of nine children of Delbert F. and Myrtle L. (Doty) Havlic. She attended Hale Cook Grade School and three years at Southwest High School.

In 1933, Evelyn married Lynn Thomas, who had a 13 month-old daughter named Janet Sue, who now resides in France. In August, 1939, Lynn and Evelyn had a daughter, Dorothy Winifred.

Lynn and Evelyn opened Gladstone Flowers and Greenhouse in 1954. Lynn died in January, 1970, and Evelyn ran the flower business.

Evelyn's son-in-law, David King, helped manage the flower shop until 1978 when Evelyn retired to marry Walter Haeffele, who had seven grown children. Evelyn became interested in antiques and had a booth at Dancing Horse Antiques in Mound City until it closed.

Walter died in 1999. In 2002, Evelyn moved to Mound City to be near her daughter, Dorothy.

Evelyn passed away on Friday, August 10, 2012, at a St. Joseph, MO, hospital at the age of 97.

In addition to her husbands, Evelyn was preceded in death by her parents; brothers, Delbert, Billy and Donald; and sisters, Dorothy, Alberta, Virginia, and Barbara.

Survivors include Evelyn's daughter and son-in-law, Dorothy and David King of Oregon, MO; daughter, Janet Sue of France; brother, Eugene Havlic of Lee's Summit, MO; three grandchildren and their spouses, Derek and Kimberly King of Dallas, TX, Davina and Jeremy Deen of Liberty, MO, and Tana Williams of New York; great-grandchildren, Logan King and Maya Deen; a great-granddaughter belonging to Tana Williams; nieces and nephews; and loving children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren from the Haeffele marriage.

Evelyn was a member of the American Business Women's Association for 17 years and held all offices except president, because she did not have enough time to devote to it. She was a member of North Stars' Toastmistress Club for 19 years and held all offices, including president, three times. She entered a Kansas City-wide speech contest, and came in third place. Evelyn was a member of the Concordia Lutheran Church in Mound City.

Services were held on Monday, August 13, 2012, at 10:30 a.m. at the Concordia Lutheran Church in Mound City. Interment was held at the New Point Cemetery in New Point, MO. Frances Ruth Hooper of Maryville, MO, passed away Monday, August 13, 2012, at Nodaway Nursing Home in Maryville of complete kidney failure. Ruth was born July 8, 1913, in rural Holt County, near Maitland, MO. She was the younger daughter of George Bethel and Grace M. Goodpasture. Her older sister, Lillian I. Hammond, died in 1990. Ruth was married in Mound City, MO, on November 29, 1933, to Thomas Reid Hooper, who preceded her in death in 1989.

Ruth graduated from Northwest Missouri State College in Maryville in 1954, the same year her son, Charles, graduated the University of Missouri, Columbia, MO. She taught at Eugene Field School in Maryville from then until her retirement in 1978. Ruth rarely forgot the name of one of her former students and could often remember their classmates and incidents that happened in their particular fourth grade class.

Ruth was a graduate of Cottey College. She was a member of the P.E.O. Sisterhood, Chapter HT (MO); Order of the Eastern Star; the Republican Party; Daughters of the American Revolution; and Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Ruth was a proud supporter of Northwest, the Maryville Public Library, and the Nodaway County Historical Society.

Ruth was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Maryville at the time of her death, but claimed that a part of her always stayed with the United Methodist Church in Maitland where she grew up. She served on various church boards for many years and remained interested in the congregation's members and mission even after moving to Nodaway Nursing Home this summer.

Ruth declined to travel in her later years, but she and Tom moved from state to state, town to town, several times before settling in Maryville in 1949.

Ruth is survived by her daughter, Shirley McKee (Terry), of Beavercreek, OH; granddaughter, Marcy Novak (Rich); grandsons, Tom, Mike (Heather), and Richard Hooper; great-grandchildren, Ben, Amanda and Sam Novak, and Hannah and Reid Hooper; nieces; nephews; and cousins. 

## Straight talk with Sam

*Protecting our rural post offices by  
U.S. Congressman Sam Graves*

According to Congressman Joe Baca, "The U.S. Postal Service's unmatched ability to reach every household and business in America six days a week is a vital part of the nation's infrastructure." I agree and also think a small town post office can often serve as the backbone of a community.

In an effort to save money, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) had proposed closing thousands of post offices predominantly located in rural areas. The backlash from our rural communities was enormous. The USPS has backed off its plan to close these facilities and instead wants to reduce hours at most of them.

First of all, I am pleased that the USPS heard the voices across rural America that spoke out against proposed closings. There were 3,700 post offices nationwide studied for closure and those will be included in this new plan. In total, the USPS will look at 13,000 locations for reduced hours.

Closing a post office in a small town is not the same as closing one in an urban community. The daily service is sometimes the only lifeline that many residents have for checks or prescriptions.

Throughout this process, I'm asking the postal service

to listen closely to a community's feedback through public meetings and surveys. The USPS should make customer convenience a priority by keeping facilities open during peak hours and closely examine potential service reductions in areas seeing population growth. They also must ensure the data used to determine any changes is up-to-date and accurate.

It's important that those affected by these changes get treated fairly, no matter where they live.

## Concordia Lutheran Church, home of the Tri-Parish, to take on new name

In the aftermath of the Flood of 2011, the three Lutheran churches of Holt County, which have collectively been in existence for centuries, have decided to forego their own individual identities and collectively become one united body of believers under one name. With each church steeped in its own set of traditions, the unification process will continue to develop throughout the coming months as it has during the ‘flood months’.

St. Peter’s Lutheran Church at Craig, MO, never recovered from the Flood of 2010, and had worshiped at either the church in Corning, MO, or Mound City since the floodwaters had wreaked havoc and left the church in a dilemma on what action to take. The violent floodwaters of 2011 put the punctuation mark on the dilemma. All the beautiful stained glass windows, church furnishings and other items remained in storage, and a decommissioning service

was held after the flood. Later, lightning struck the church and it burned to the ground. The church and parsonage have since been destroyed.

St. John’s Church in Corning suffered historical damage during the Flood of 2011. The building, which is on the *National Register of Historic Places*, had all the pews and other movable items removed, but the large pulpit remained and received damage. The building is uninhabitable and costly to repair.

Meanwhile, the smaller church in Mound City, Concordia, has been the safe haven for the fellowships to worship. Talk began in January about the future of the three Lutheran churches. The churches received input from the Missouri Synod as the members talked about where the churches were headed in the future. The consensus was to form a new church, dissolving the three individual churches.

In June, St. Peter’s

Church voted to join the Concordia congregation, and in July, St. John’s Church voted to join as well.

Now, the incorporated churches of St. Peter’s Lutheran Church, St. John’s Lutheran Church and Concordia Lutheran Church of Mound City will dissolve and then jointly incorporate under a new church name by December, 2012. Congregation members are being asked to propose new names for the church that will represent a new body of meshed believers. The name will be voted on and made public by the time the church holds its second annual worship service in Griffith Park in September.

“The challenges for the church will be the many traditions each congregation has. Traditions are personal and important to the members,” stated church pastor, Reverend Brian Lemcke. “We’ll also work through other issues, like which of four hymnals

we’ll use, and what will we do about not enough space.”

The church has formed a Unification Committee, comprised of 12 people, which has four members from each congregation on it. The committee has a myriad of issues to address and work through, as some of the steps needed in forming the new corporation can potentially be quite complicated.

Concordia has made several improvements to its facility, including installing an elevator. The ‘new’ church will continue to worship at the present site on Nebraska Street in Mound City, but a possible building project is not out of the question for the congregation that is already bulging at the seams. With over 100 attending each Sunday, and many more on the books, once the transition is made to a new name, the congregation has other decisions to make for its future.

## Corn and soybean condition

Corn lodging is occurring in drought stressed areas of corn fields. Growers should keep a close eye on their fields and consider early harvest. Check fields by pushing corn over and determine if there is high risk. Often, when corn plants are drought stressed, the lower part of the plant may be cannibalized to fill the ear which leads to lodging.

There are many differences in corn yields across northwest Missouri. There were scattered rain events that helped corn yields whereas others missed rains and there is little grain on the ear.

Moving into seed fill with soybean crops, most fields have a limited amount of pod set. Dry conditions caused many flowers and pods to abort. Next, if dry conditions continue, seeds in the pods will abort. The soybean plant will respond to its environment by only filling what seeds it feels it can produce.

# This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

## 50 Years Ago - 1962

- The largest number of golfers, 53, participated in a club tournament. Tracy Burge and Frank Burge took first and second place, respectively, with a 73 and 76 score. Six boys entered the junior competition with Jay Griffith winning “A” flight with a score of 48 against opponents Bob Ripley and Timmy Clark.

- Nine Holt County youth attended the 1st Freedom Forum in Mexico, MO, along with 182 others. Attending the 5-day event were: Kenny Greiner, James Mendenhall, Martha Slusher, M.C. Derr, Christy Beal, Linda Andes, Stephen VanVickle, Jim Hagee and Pamela Gray.

- A long list of Mound City couples and families were pictured and named as part of a large number who vacationed at Babe’s Resort Camp in Perham, MN. Mr. Charles Davis was credited with having hauled the supplies in a school bus and having taken his boat for water skiing and fishing. Francis Bohart was shown with a 10 lb., 30 1/2” walleye caught on Ottertail Lake near Perham.

- An estimated 150 farmers showed up at the Holt County Board of Appeals in Oregon, MO, after receipt of notices of increases in the assessed valuation over government sealed commodities. The sealed grain information had not been assessed because loans were not recorded. The lack of information resulted in a drop of taxable personal property of \$455,000.

## 25 Years Ago - 1987

- The new scoreboard at the Mound City football field was erected and operational by the first home game of the season. A boom truck, operated by Phil Blazer, helped raise the scoreboard into place on the steel frame built by Dale Holstine.

- Mound City Kiwanis Club members, Jim Krueger and Mason McIntire, were pictured doing the resealing of the tennis courts in Griffith Park.

- Lannie Sipes, jailer at the Holt County Courthouse, tendered his resignation to Sheriff Bernie Delaney. Kirby Felumb was hired to fill the position.

- The Mound City School was scheduled to open on August 24. The elementary principal was Cheri Patterson, the high school principal was Terry Vest, and Bill View was the superintendent. School lunch cost was \$.90.

- Thomas Market in Mound City offered ground beef for \$.99 a pound; 32 oz. Miracle Whip for \$1.19; eight 16 oz. bottles of Pepsi for \$1.49; a 29 oz. can of Shurfine peaches for \$.79; and red or white seedless grapes for \$.59 a pound.

## 10 Years Ago - 2002

- The 7,500 square foot building, leased by Dollar General from the Mound City Development Corporation, was expected to cost \$305,000. It was \$200,000 for the building, \$47,000 for the parking lot, \$25,000 for legal fees, and \$33,000 for the land and improvements. Interest was expected to raise the total cost to \$530,000. A TIF Commission hearing was set to vote on the new district.

- A buffalo herd, owned by Donnie Wright of Mound City, was featured on the front page. The herd was started five years prior and had just produced a calf.

- Rainfall amounts, which dropped up to two inches of rain sporadically across the county, were thought to be too little, too late, for some Holt County crops.

# Midwest Transmission Project announces public open house meetings

Residents of northwest Missouri and southeast Nebraska are invited to attend public meetings in their area to learn about the planned Midwest Transmission Project. KCP&L and Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) recently announced the Midwest Transmission Project, a partnership to plan and construct a 150-190 mile 345 kV transmission line from Sibley, MO, to Nebraska City, NE.

The project is expected to cost approximately \$400 million, provide 50-70 construction jobs, and be in service by June, 2017. Its purpose is to relieve congestion and improve reliability of the nation's energy grid while also providing an additional gateway for renewable energy to reach customers in Missouri and Nebraska. The meetings are open house formats where interested citizens can drop by anytime to gather information and chat directly with project planners.

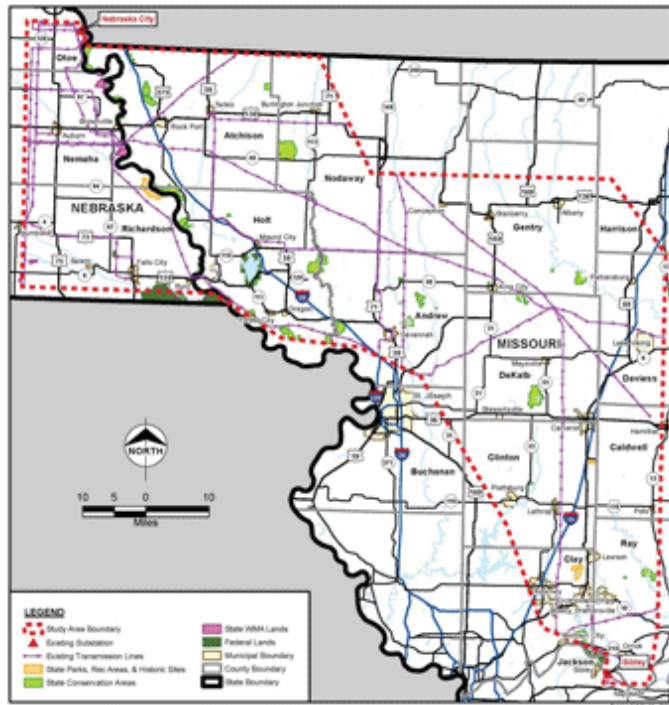

Nebraska counties in the study area are Nemaha, Otoe and Richardson. The final route is scheduled to be selected by the summer of 2013.

The Midwest Transmission Project planning process will be open and transparent. Local meetings with landowners, public officials, community leaders, the news media and the general public will communicate all aspects of the

## Congressman Graves stops in Mound City on Main Street Listening Tour



**U.S. Congressman Sam Graves of Tarkio, MO-** Visited with constituents on Monday, August 13, at The Klub in Mound City. The visit was one of four stops that day as part of the Main Street Listening Tour. Nearly 30 people attended the luncheon that the congressman used to address legislative issues.

U.S. Congressman Sam Graves of Tarkio, MO, stopped in Mound City on Monday, August 13, to visit with constituents as part of his Main Street Listening Tour. The congressman, his staff and an estimated 30 members of the community were on hand at The Klub during the noon hour for the visit.

Mound City representative, Morris Heitman, introduced Congressman Sam Graves, who then addressed the crowd concerning issues that Congress dealt with during session. Graves briefly explained the new 6th District that, with the addition of 13 counties, now includes a total of 36 counties, stating that agriculture

remains a main focus in the diverse district.

The congressman reassured those present of his continued efforts in the process of making flood control the number one priority of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers concerning the Missouri River. "Even with the drought," commented Graves, "we are working for change. I think they thought we'd back off, but we didn't. We're still pushing for the needed changes."

The farm bill was briefly discussed, stating that a lot of paring back is being done in the food stamp program. The bill will more than likely be acted on in lame duck session.

"The worst thing that

could happen would be a tax increase," stated Graves. "A lot depends on this election. There is an extreme amount of uncertainty in all areas, which is never good."

Several questions were entertained from the floor, with the congressman addressing each.

When questioned about the apparent impasse between the two political parties, resulting in 'legislation not being done', Graves acknowledged the difficulty, but also emphasized the issues that are being resolved that are just not gaining media attention. He cited a personal example he just resolved as chairman of the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program, a program that hadn't been reauthorized for six years. Through persistence, Graves worked to whittle disputed items down and sealed an agreement to reauthorize the program. He stated it is 'an example of working across political lines to achieve policy'.

When asked his role and focus as chairman of the Small Business Administration, Graves stated that he was focused on three primary elements as they related to small businesses: contracting reform, regulating tax increases, and regulatory reform.

Graves spoke briefly about businesses being regulated 'to death', adding that the EPA is 'out of control'. The

agency's four major initiatives to regulate carbon emissions could have devastating effects on this state, as 83% of Missouri's energy comes from coal.

Holt County Assessor Carla Markt reminded Graves of the implications poor decisions by the Corps of Engineers (government) has had on Holt County. She cited a loss of \$141 million in Holt County in crops, tax base and flood related losses; combined with a \$17-\$19 million decline in tax base, with 360 acres lost in agricultural land and 33 acres completely out of production. Graves assured county officials and constituents of his resolve in continuing to fight for the reform, adding that the federal government has no business purchasing more land. "They can't manage what they have," commented Graves, "and with the federal deficit, there is no reason to purchase any more."

Congressman Graves touched on the \$1.8 trillion health care bill, which has grown drastically from President Obama's estimated \$800 million. The congressman assured those present that he and other lawmakers would be doing everything they can to repeal it.

Congressman Graves' stop in Mound City followed a morning stop in Tarkio, MO. He had other stops that day, and a series of stops planned throughout the coming weeks.

## Short and tall soybeans

This spring was a challenge with soybean emergence. Some seed was planted in moist soil and seed germinated resulting in large soybean plants. Others were planted in dry soil and finally emerged resulting in small soybean plants. However, there was a transition zone in which the seed did swell and the lack of moisture caused the seed to die.

So how will delayed emergence impact soybean yield? Delayed emergence limits the soybean plants' ability to add vegetative growth. For example, long-term University of Missouri (MU) research conducted by Dr. Bill Wiebold indicates that soybeans planted June 5 will yield 89 percent compared to that of the optimum planting date; June 12, 84 percent; June 19, 79 percent; June 26, 72 percent; and July 3, 65 percent. If soybeans have moisture, they can emerge relatively quickly.

How could this information be used if soybeans lay in the soil without germinating? Use the emergence date of late emerging soybeans and then subtract a week. Typically, June has good soil moisture and soybeans will emerge in a week. Back off a week, then use

the planting dates already stated to compare yield loss. Again, the key is using the emergence date of the delayed soybeans and backing off a week.

The proportion of the area of delayed emergence would be the area that would have reduced yield. If 25 percent of the field had delayed emergence, then 25 percent of the field would have delayed yield loss.

Yes, some larger plants which emerged first will compensate yield in smaller gaps, but many fields have large

gaps. Also, narrow row spacing will compensate more than in 30-inch rows as plants will be better spaced.

If the dry weather continues, the vegetative and reproductive growth will be limited reducing additional yield compared to the long term data research data.

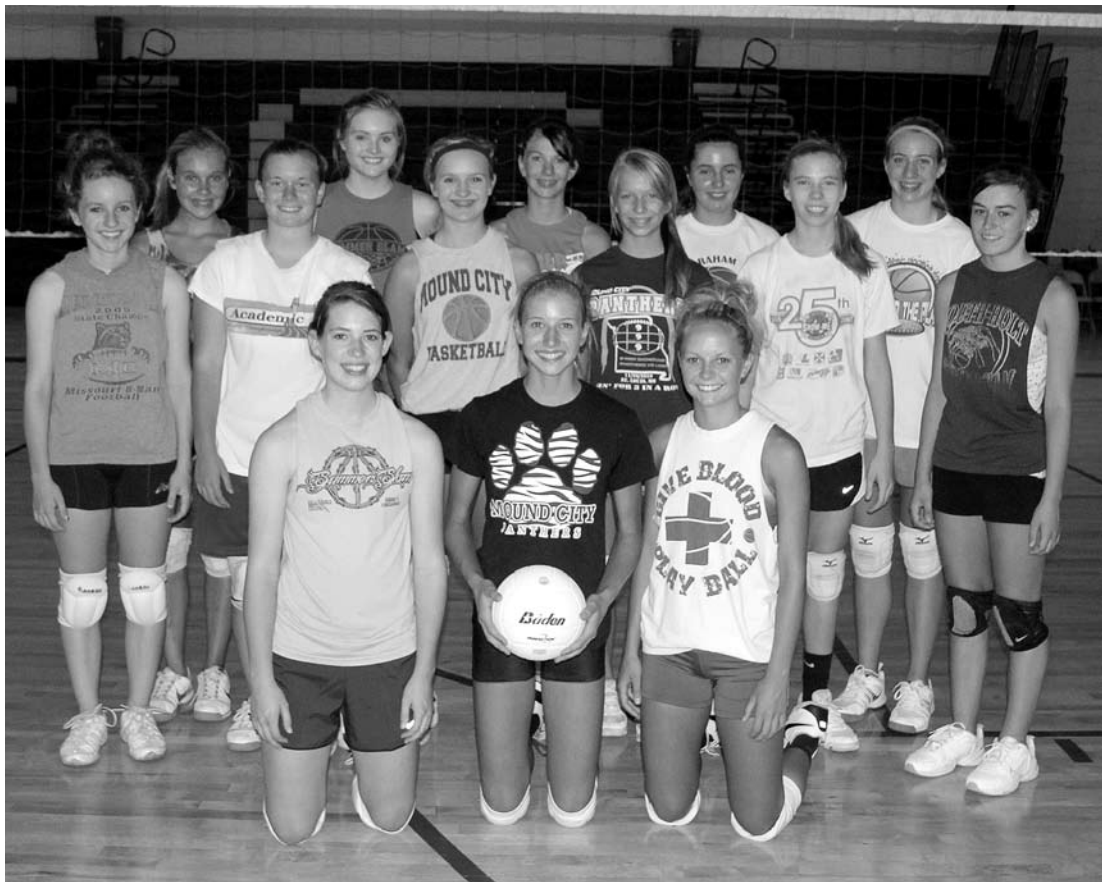

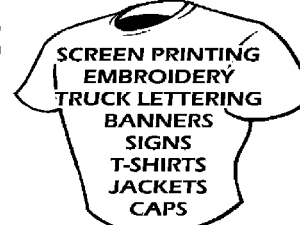

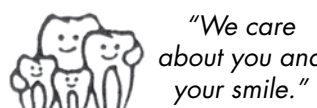
