Remembering

"Early Missouri"

The following are excerpts from a book that was copyrighted in 1897, describing Missouri at that time. It started off with the following, 'the early inhabitants of Missouri were peculiar people'. First of all, they were Indians, but when they settled there, no one knows. Next came the French, then the Spaniards and lastly the Americans. The last named were mostly people from Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia. (My folks came from Kentucky.) Nearly all the American settlers in Missouri were descendants of pioneers and were a rigidly honest people. No locks were on their doors and they had no need of any.

There was an old saying I can remember older folks talking about. If one was welcome to one's home, they would say to them, 'the latch string is always on the outside' or 'our door is always open'. As they were dependent on each other for protection, what belonged to one was freely loaned to his neighbor. If a pioneer wanted to borrow his neighbor's axe and did not find the man at home, he took the axe without asking and returned it when done with it. The book stated that the early Missourians were rude

selfish and brave.

Quoting the last page of the book that summed up Missouri in 1897, "Missouri is a remarkable state. Though not admitted to the Union until 1821, it now (1897) ranks 7th in population. The inhabitants numbered more than 3 million, but this is only the 10th of the population which the state is capable of supporting. If Missouri were cut off from all the remainder of the world, it has natural resources within its own borders sufficient to supply 30 million inhabitants with all the necessaries and comforts essential to a civilized people. Though there have been panics and failures in all parts of the world, they have merely checked the prosperity of Missouri. That prosperity has never come to a standstill and today (1897), no state has a more promising future." That's all the quotes from the book.

Today, even with what seems overcrowded, we lack several million in population that what was thought Missouri could handle, we're somewhere near 6 million. If we were cut off from the rest of the world now, we'd sure have a big problem. Even if the complete United States were cut off, it would take and uncultured, but un- a long time to be back

where we could support ourselves, like at one time we could have. I have heard numerous comments that our condition today is "just the sign of the times". I sure agree with that, but a lot of us have seen the sign of the so called times that were good. When you have to rely on other countries, or other companies or individuals, you have lost control of too many things that affect daily lives. I heard a statement that now here in the USA, there is not one thing that we manufacture today without some portion obtained from some other country and, in some cases, 100% is from another country.

The early Missourians would never have believed that this could happen to us. In fact, while I was growing up, I wouldn't have believed it either. We were short a good many things during World War II, but we all got together and made the United States the greatest and leading country in the world. I sure hated to see us as 2nd and losing out more each day. Yeah, I sure wish for some of the OLD Missouri days. One old saying is "history repeats itself", maybe it will all come back. It looks like we'll be number one in the Olympics, thanks to a group of dedicated people.





Protecting our rural post offices by U.S. Congressman Sam Graves

According to Congressman to listen closely to a commu-Joe Baca, "The U.S. Postal Service's unmatched ability to reach every household and business in America six days a week is a vital part of the nation's infrastructure." I agree and also think a small town post office can often serve as the backbone of a community.

In an effort to save money, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) had proposed closing thousands of post offices predominantly located in rural areas. The backlash from our rural communities was enormous. The USPS has backed off its plan to close these facilities and instead wants to reduce hours at most of them.

First of all, I am pleased that the USPS heard the voices across rural America that spoke out against proposed closings. There were 3,700 post offices nationwide studied for closure and those will be included in this new plan. In total, the USPS will look at 13,000 locations for reduced hours.

Closing a post office in a small town is not the same as closing one in an urban community. The daily service is sometimes the only lifeline that many residents have for checks or prescriptions.

Throughout this process, I'm asking the postal service nity's feedback through public meetings and surveys. The USPS should make customer convenience a priority by keeping facilities open during peak hours and closely examine potential service reductions in areas seeing population growth. They also must ensure the data used to determine any changes is upto-date and accurate.

It's important that those affected by these changes get treated fairly, no matter where they live.



From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago - 1962

Six boys entered the junior competition with Jay Griffith winning "A" flight with a score of 48 against opponents Bob Ripley and Timmy Clark.
- Nine Holt County youth attended the 1st Freedom Forum in Mexico, MO, along with 182 others. Attending the 5-day event were: Kenny Greiner, James Mendenhall, Martha Slusher, M.C. Derr, Christy Beal, Linda Andes, Stephen VanVickle, Jim Hagee and Pamela Gray.
- A long list of Mound City couples and families were pictured and named as part of a large number who vacationed at Babe's Resort Camp in Perham, MN. Mr. Charles Davis was credited with having hauled the supplies in a school bus and having taken his boat for water skiing and fishing. Francis Bohart was shown with a 10 lb., 30 1/2" walleye caught on Ottertail Lake near Perham.
- An estimated 150 farmers showed up at the Holt County Board of Appeals in Oregon, MO, after receipt of notices of increases in the assessed valuation over government sealed commodities. The sealed grain information had not been assessed because loans were not recorded. The lack of information resulted in a drop of taxable personal property of \$455,000.

25 Years Ago - 1987

- The new scoreboard at the Mound City football field was erected and operational by the first home game of the season. A boom truck, operated by Phil Blazer, helped raise the scoreboard into place on the steel frame built by Dale Holstine.
- Mound City Kiwanis Club members, Jim Krueger and Mason McIntire, were pictured doing the resealing of the tennis courts in Griffith Park.
- Lannie Sipes, jailer at the Holt County Courthouse, tendered his resignation to Sheriff Bernie Delaney. Kirby Felumb was hired to fill the position.
- The Mound City School was scheduled to open on August 24. The elementary principal was Cheri Patterson, the high school prinicipal was Terry Vest, and Bill View was the superintendent. School lunch cost was \$.90.
- Thomas Market in Mound City offered ground beef for \$.99 a pound; 32 oz. Miracle Whip for \$1.19; eight 16 oz. bottles of Pepsi for \$1.49; a 29 oz. can of Shurfine peaches for \$.79; and red or white seedless grapes for \$.59 a pound.

10 Years Ago - 2002

- The 7,500 square feet building, leased by Dollar General from the Mound City Development Corporation, was expected to cost \$305,000. It was \$200,000 for the building, \$47,000 for the parking lot, \$25,000 for legal fees, and \$33,000 for the land and improvements. Interest was expected to raise the total cost to \$530,000. A TIF Commission hearing was set to vote on the new district.
- A buffalo herd, owned by Donnie Wright of Mound City, was featured on the front page. The herd was started five years prior and had just produced a calf.
- Rainfall amounts, which dropped up to two inches of rain sporadically across the county, were thought to be too little, too late, for some Holt County crops.
- Craig Reunion organizers were pleased to see American Beauty Carnival & Rides pull into town for the annual event. The past two years had carnivals not showing up for the event.



Flood of 2011, the three Lutheran churches of Holt County, which have collectively been in existence for centuries, have decided to forego their own individual identities and collectively become one united body of believers under one name. With each church steeped in its own set of traditions, the unification process will continue to develop throughout the coming months as it has during the 'flood months'.

St. Peter's Lutheran Church at Craig, MO, never recovered from the Flood of 2010, and had worshiped at either the church in Corning, MO, or Mound City since the floodwaters had wreaked havoc and left the church in a dilemma on what action to take. The violent floodwaters of 2011 put the punctuation mark on the dilemma. In the aftermath of the was held after the flood. Church voted to join the we'll use, and what will Later, lightning struck the church and it burned to the ground. The church and parsonage have since been destroyed.

St. John's Church in Corning suffered historical damage during the Flood of 2011. The building, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, had all the pews and other movable items removed, but the large pulpit remained and received damage. The building is uninhabitable and costly to repair.

Meanwhile, the smaller church in Mound City, Concordia, has been the safe haven for the fellowships to worship. Talk began in January about the future of the three Lutheran churches. The churches received input from the Missouri Synod as the members talked about where the churches were headed in the future. The concensus was to form a new church, dissolving the three individual churches.

In June, St. Peter's

Concordia congregation, and in July, St. John's Church voted to join as well.

Now, the incorporated churches of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, St. John's Lutheran Church and Concordia Lutheran Church of Mound City will dissolve and then jointly incorporate under a new church name by December, 2012. Congregation members are being asked to propose new names for the church that will represent a new body of meshed believers. The name will be voted on and made public by the time the church holds its second annual worship service in Griffith Park in September.

"The challenges for the church will be the many traditions each congregation has. Traditions are personal and important to the members," stated church pastor, Reverend Brian Lemcke. "We'll also work through other issues, like which of four hymnals

we do about not enough space."

The church has formed a Unification Committee, comprised of 12 people, which has four members from each congregation on it. The committee has a myriad of issues to address and work through, as some of the steps needed in forming the new corporation can potentially be quite complicated.

Concordia has several improvements to its facility, including installing an elevator. The 'new' church will continue to worship at the present site on Nebraska Street in Mound City, but a possible building project is not out of the question for the congregation that is already bulging at the seams. With over 100 attending each Sunday, and many more on the books, once the transition is made to a new name, the congregation has other decisions to make for its future.

Corn and soybean condition

Corn lodging is occurring in drought stressed areas of corn fields. Growers should keep a close eye on their fields and consider early harvest. Check fields by pushing corn over and determine if there is high risk. Often, when corn plants are drought stressed, the lower part of the plant may be cannibalized to fill the ear which leads to lodging.

There are many differences in corn yields across northwest Missouri. There were scattered rain events that helped corn yields whereas others missed rains and there is little grain on the ear.

Moving into seed fill with soybean crops, most fields have a limited amount of pod Dry conditions caused many flowers and pods to abort. Next, if dry conditions continue, seeds in the pods will abort. The soybean plant will respond to its environment by only filling what seeds it feels it can produce.

Short and tall soybeans

This spring was a challenge the planting dates already statseed was planted in moist soil and seed germinated resulting in large soybean plants. Others were planted in dry soil and finally emerged resulting in small soybean plants. However, there was a transition zone in which the seed did swell and the lack of moisture caused the

seed to die. So how will delayed emergence impact soybean yield? Delayed emergence limits the soybean plants' ability to add vegetative growth. For example, long-term University of Missouri (MU) research conducted by Dr. Bill Wiebold indicates that soybeans planted June 5 will yield 89 percent compared to that of the optimum planting date; June 12, 84 percent; June 19, 79 percent; June 26, 72 percent; and July 3, 65 percent. If soybeans have moisture, they can emerge relatively quickly.

How could this information be used if soybeans lay in the soil without germinating? Use the emergence date of late emerging soybeans and then subtract a week. Typically, June has good soil moisture and soybeans will emerge in a week. Back off a week, then use

with soybean emergence. Some ed to compare yield loss. Again, the key is using the emergence date of the delayed soybeans and backing off a week.

The proportion of the area of delayed emergence would be the area that would have reduced yield. If 25 percent of the field had delayed emergence, then 25 percent of the field would have delayed yield loss.

Yes, some larger plants which emerged first will compensate yield in smaller gaps, but many fields have large

gaps. Also, narrow row spacing will compensate more than in 30-inch rows as plants will be better spaced.

If the dry weather continues, the vegetative and reproductive growth will be limited reducing additional yield compared to the long term data research data.
