
Drug Store Museum preparing for **Forest City** history walk



FEMA personnel will meet at the Holt County Courthouse in Oregon, MO, for an Applicant Briefing on Monday, August 30. The public meeting will have board members from all political subdivisions, such as cities, levee districts, drainage districts and road districts, present to affirm their intent to file a claim for assistance.

Bryan Crousore, emergency response services specialist with Church World Service, phoned Crystal Karr, pastor at Mound City Methodist Church, and spoke with her to confirm willingness of several community members to work with long-term recovery in this area. Crystal contacted Paul Grant, pastor at First Christian Church in Mound City, and after a series of phone calls,the first meeting with Bryan was set.

At the first meeting, Bryan walked the group through the best practices and lessons learned from past disasters and what it takes to form this type of committee. A decision was made at that meeting to form a committee that would be able to address and carry out longterm recovery efforts in Holt County.

"We will be continuing to help them through a mentoring role," stated Bryan Crousore. "By organizing, they can leverage outside resources better, which could include government help that wouldn't be available on an individual level."

It is the committee's goal to help people stay in Holt County by helping them retain their places of primary residency and to help people with the spiritual and emotional process that occurs as a result of a disaster.

The committee met a second time on Thursday, August 19, at the First Christian Church with 11 people present to write and adopt a mission statement.

School gets off to good start

Mound City's second graders were reviewing math facts on Friday, August 20, in Carol Brandon's classroom. Carol, who has taught first, second and third grades over her years at Mound City R-2, has 26 students in her classroom

"It has been a really good start," Carol, the 30-year veteran teacher, stated. "I think the kids were ready to get back to school and so was I."

School enrollments around the county

Enrollment at local schools has dropped slightly for three of the county schools, and risen in only one. Elementary student numbers reflect preschool students, except in the case of Craig.

Craig's school enrollment has dropped by six students compared to September's enrollment in 2009. Currently there are 44 kindergarten through sixth grade students and 40 high school students for a total of 84 students.

enrollment at 289 students for 2010. The high school has 124 students and preschool through sixth grade enrollment totals 165. The total enrollment falls short of the 2009 enrollment by only one student.

Nodaway-Holt R-VII has 240 students enrolled this year. That number is down eleven from last year's total. There are 147 preschool through sixth grade students enrolled and 93 high school students.

South Holt's enrollment is up 8-10 students over last year's total. Current

enrollment shows preschool through sixth grade students at 157 and high school at 125 for a total of 282 students.

While total county enrollment is down slightly, schools remain each small town's lifeline. Progress and education should be everyone's goal.



Citing the extraordinary hardship and losses caused to agricultural areas, Gov. Nixon, on July 28, asked Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack to designate 55 Missouri counties as primary disaster areas, which will permit assistance for farmers from the USDA's Farm Service Agency.

Holt County was also declared a disaster area in 2008 and 2009. With those programs, producers are eligible for assistance if their crop loss was 10% or greater on all their farms in all their coun-

The 2010 declaration will allow farmers the benefit of a disaster program, which will assist them in reclaiming losses due to excessive rainfall, flash flooding, flooding and high winds. Program details will be released at a later date.

Dove season also provides an excellent opportunity to introduce kids into the sport of hunting. Dove hunting is one of those seasons where it fits well to teach youngsters. The weather is usually pleasant, there are plenty of opportunities to shoot, and traditionally, hunters sit in one spot rather than do a lot of walking, helping youngsters stay enthused.

Most of the regulations for hunting doves remain the same for this year. Mourning, collared and white-winged doves may be taken from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through November 9. The daily bag limit for doves is 15,

with a possession limit of 30. Hunters are still required to have two permits to hunt doves: a Missouri Small Game Hunting Permit (required for every person between the ages of 16-64) and a Missouri Migratory Bird Hunting Permit (required for every person age 16 and over). Resident and nonresident hunters age 15 and under do not need to purchase permits to hunt dove, however, heading out for the hunt.

> Last year, about 4,000 acres servation areas were actively managed for doves. Managed dove hunting fields are planted in sunflowers, wheat, millet, buckwheat, corn or combination of the above. Each field provides a different type of hunting experience.

> Repeated heavy rains early in the summer hampered planting and growth of crops on some fields. Hunters should visit fields they want to hunt beforehand or at least call information about field condi-

Doves like open ground, seeds, perching sites and water. Any spot that combines two or more of these elements can be an excellent hunting spot. An abandoned gravel road, an old airstrip or parking lot is a start. A pond with a wide margin of bare soil or mud is another possibility. Add a telephone line or some dead trees for perching, and you have a dove magnet.

When buying permits, hunters are encouraged to pick up a regulation book and take a few minutes to read it before

The forecast for August was anticipated to be at above average runoff levels as well, which would make 2010 the third highest runoff season during the

A recent news release Corps' 113-year statistical

"Our goal is to evacuof next year's runoff season so that we are again prepared to capture any floodwaters that might be coming our way," stated Jody Farhat, chief of the Water Management Office in Omaha.

Releases from Gavins Point Dam will increase from the current rate of 38,000 cubic feet per second to 47,500 cubic feet per second by late August. In order to evacuate all of the surplus water from the system in time for the start of next season, the Corps will adjust releases out of the other system dams as well, with the exception of Fort Peck Dam in Montana.

Although the river state continued to drop over the weekend and was predicted to be at 15'5" by newspaper date, the increased releases from Gavins Point Dam are bound to impact the river here. The low river level may provide cushion for the waters that must be headed this way, but the broken levee has not been repaired and may remain inaccessible before it can be repaired. The new levee swiftly erected by farmers southwest of Craig has already benefited residents as it has held back several feet of water. How long the temporary level will hold

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
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Residents are urged to take precautions by avoiding food or drinks that contain raw or undercooked eggs

Wright County Egg of Galt, IA, has issued two recalls in the last week of shell eggs 19, 2010. These eggs were shipped to food wholesalers, distribution centers and food service companies in eight states, including Missouri.

The recalled eggs were packaged under the following brand names: Lucerne, Albertson, Mountain Dairy, Ralph's, Boomsma's, Sunshine, Hillandale, Trafficanda, Farm Fresh, Shoreland, Lund, Dutch Farms and Kemps. Consumers who bought any of these brands should toss them out or return them to the store where

they were purchased. To date, no cases of Salmonella linked to the eggs have been reported in Missouri. Salmonella is a type of bacteria that can cause an infection in the lining of the small intestine, but the bacteria can be destroyed by thorough cooking.

Therefore, Missouri health officials recommend that consumers thoroughly cook all eggs until more is known about the source of the contamination. Consumers should avoid eating raw eggs and be sure that both the white and yolk of eggs are fully cooked before eating them.

Symptoms of Salmonella infections typically include diarrhea, abdominal pain or cramping, vomiting, fever, headache, chills and muscle pain. The illness can range from mild to severe.

Symptoms most often appear about 12 to 36 hours after exposure to the bacteria. The illness usually lasts 4 to 7 days, and most people recover without treatment. However, patients should seek medical treatment if symptoms are severe or they become dehydrated. The infection can be life-threatening if it spreads beyond the intestines. An estimated 600 people nation-

For Consumers: • Individuals who think they might have become ill from eating recalled eggs should consult their health care providers.

• Keep eggs refrigerated at less than 45° F (7° C) at all

times. • Discard cracked or dirty eggs.

Wash hands, cooking utensils and food preparation surfaces with soap and water after contact with raw eggs.

• Eggs should be cooked until both the white and the yolk are firm and eaten promptly after cooking.

• Do not keep eggs warm more than 2 hours.

• Refrigerate unused or leftover egg-containing foods promptly.

• Avoid restaurant dishes cooked eggs.
