Mound City News expanding with web printing operation and new building

Tarkio Avalanche and Fairfax Forum newspapers sell

new press is requiring a new building to be constructed just north of Mound City at the junction of Highways 59 and N. The building will house an 8-unit Goss Community web press and state-of-the-art pre-press operation, along with an additional storage area. The *Mound City News* newspaper office will not being moving its main office to the new location and will remain at 511 State Street.

With the web printing operation expansion, it will be the first time in around 50 years that any weekly newspaper has actually been printed in the county since the letterpress era. "Most small weekly newspapers are printed at the closest, or most economical daily newspaper, or at a commercial printing shop with a web press," stated Adam Johnson, owner of the Mound City News. "With this expansion, we look to keep more dollars in the county and hopefully bring in some new business from elsewhere in the area."

The pre-press operation will be one of the best in the area. Pre-press is the process between a finished newspaper computer file and the actual printing plate that is to be

The Mound City News is expanding its printing capa- placed on the press for printing. "Most operations this size bilities to include a newspaper web printing operation. The use a traditional negative to produce printing plates. They create a negative of the page area and then expose the image onto the printing plate. After the exposure is finished, chemicals are used to wash the non-image area away from the exposed image," Adam explained. "The Mound City News expansion will feature a computer-to-plate system. It will go straight from the finished computer file and, using a thermal imaging laser, produce the image to the plate directly. This eliminates possible human error, which, in turn, should produce a better product. This also eliminates the use of chemicals during the plate-making process, thus providing a greener operation."

The web printing operation is expected to be up and running the first of September. The first printing customers of the new web printing operation will be the Mound City News, Atchison County Mail, Tarkio Avalanche and Fairfax

Results unofficial as of press time

Tuesday's Primary Election drew 1,147 voters to the booths in Holt County. Just under 30% of registered voters showed up to vote on primary candidates and one proposition, allowing the State of Missouri to deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health in-

Prop. C, the health care proposition, saw 902 yes votes and 192 no votes. The Holt County Collector race for the Republican primary held the only other real race. Donna Cotton received 607 votes and Cindy Wohlford received 400.

Holt County Republicans voted Roy Blunt for U.S. Senator, Tom Schweich for State Auditor, Sam Graves for U.S. Representative Dist. 6.

Republican candidates running unopposed were Vicki Book for Circuit Clerk, Gay Quick for Treasurer, Robert Shepherd for Prosecuting Attorney, Kathy Kunkel for County Clerk, Mark Sitherwood for Presiding Commissioner, Wm. S. Richards for Associate Circuit Judge, Mike Thomson for State Representative Dist. 4, and Brad Lager for State Senator Dist. 12.

Holt County Democrats voted Robin Carnahan for U.S. Senator, Susan Montee for State Auditor, Clint Hylton for U.S. Representative Dist. 6, and Robert Ritterbusch State Representative Dist. 4.

Family owned newspapers sell to cousins

The Tarkio Avalanche and Fairfax Forum newspapers in Atchison County are under new ownership effective with last week's issue, July 29, 2010. W.C. and Mike Farmer of Rock Port, MO, have purchased the Tarkio Avalanche and Fairfax Forum. After nearly 30 years of publishing the Tarkio Avalanche, Will and Joy Johnson are making a change.

Back in 1978, Bill and Marilyn Farmer purchased the St. Clair County Courier in Osceola, MO, as well as the Appleton City Journal in Appleton City, MO. That purchase started an era of newspaper publishing in the Farmer/Johnson families.

In 1979, at the age of 21, the Farmers' nephew, Will Johnson, started as publisher of the Appleton City Journal. At that time, he was the youngest publisher in the state of Missouri. Will spent the next year publishing the Journal.

Will was courting hometown girl, Joy Eldridge, at the time he was publishing the Journal. In August, 1980, the two were married. Joy graduated from SMSU in Springfield in December, 1980. After Joy's graduation from college, the two spent some time looking for a newspaper in Missouri to purchase. The quest took the young couple to several communities in the state before settling in Tarkio. Will and Joy purchased the Tarkio Avalanche in June, 1981, from Annette Secor.

In 1984, John Henry Cox of Rock Port, MO, approached Will and Joy, asking them if they were interested in purchasing the Atchison County Mail. "At the time John Henry asked if I was interested in purchasing the Mail, I was in no position to secure the funds to make the purchase," Will said. "I remember that the first thing I thought of was that Bill and Marilyn might be interested. They had sold the St. Clair County Courier and Appleton City Journal in 1982 after I came to Tarkio and were teaching school. I called Bill and said, "Hey, you want to get back in the publishing business?" Bill called John Henry and negotiated the sale, moving his family to Rock Port in 1984.

When the Farmer family moved to Rock Port, W.C. was 15 years old and Mike was 13. Since that time, the Farmers have called Atchison County, MO, their home.

W.C. and Mike grew up in the newspaper business and have experienced many changes in the industry over the years. They both graduated from Rock Port High School and received their bachelor's degrees from Doane College in Crete, Nebraska.

After college, both W.C. and Mike continued to work at the family business, the Atchison County Mail. W.C. has taken over the duties as publisher at the *Mail* and has added a photography business, W.C. Farmer Photography, which is more of a passion of W.C.'s than work. Alongside W.C. is his wife, Shauna. They have three children, Chandler, Kaleigh and Makenna.

In 2000, when Bill announced his intention to retire, Mike moved back to Atchison County, and started working at the Mail office again. In 2003, Mike married Lisa Stokes, adding not only Lisa to the Farmer family, but also her son, Jason. Together, Mike and Lisa have a son, Holden.

"It's no retirement for us," Will said, "just a change in jobs." Will and Joy will be working part-time in Mound City, MO, for their son, Adam, at the Mound City News. "We are at a point in our lives that we must be more flexible with our time. We'd like to be able to spend more time with our parents," Will commented. "The seven day a week commitment to the two newspapers sometimes did not allow for us to be away when we needed to be, and with the web printing operation in Mound City, we will be able to work less hours," Will went on to say.

"We look forward to bringing this business to the Mound City area. At this point, my parents and I will

> be teaming up on both the newspaper and printing businesses. The added flexibility of them being here should make the transition seamless," Adam commented.


Nauman elected as President of the Missouri Loins Eye Research Board

of your emails are there? Most people don't realize that once your email is downloaded to your home computer, you can't access it from webmail when you're away from home. The good news is, you can change a

few settings and now be able to

access your emails on webmail even if they've been downloaded on your home computer. Here's what you do: If you're using Outlook 2007. follow these 7 steps: 1) Go to the Tools menu and click on Ac-

count Settings. 2) Select the Email account and click on the Change button. 3) Click on the More Settings button. 4) Click on Advanced tab in the lower section; check the box beside "leave a copy of messages on the server". 5) Check the box beside your choice of amount of days or when you delete the email

from your deleted items (this is

your preference). 6) Click OK. 7) Click Next and then click the Finish button. If you're using Outlook 2003

or older, use the following steps: 1) Go to the Tools menu and click on Email Accounts. 2) Select View or Change Existing Accounts. 3) Select the Email account, click the Change button. 4) Click the More Settings button. 5) Click on Advanced tab in the lower section; check the box beside "Leave a copy of messages on the server". 6) Check the box beside your choice of amount of days or when you delete the email from your deleted items (this is your preference). 7) Click the OK button. 8) Click Next and then click the Finish button. Now you can access your emails from anywhere. Here's another quick tip.

Want to send a message to someone without the other email recipients knowing? Use the Bcc line (Bcc stands for blind carbon copy). If you add someone's name to the Bcc line a copy of the message will be sent to that person, but his or her name is not visible to the other email recipients. If you don't see the Bcc line when you open a new email, go to the Options tab and select Show Bcc (or just Bcc, depending on which Outlook version you are using), then it should appear. • Give players water or rehydration drinks to stay hydrated. Also remind them to drink fluids throughout the day. Do not give athletes salt tablets. Salt tablets can cause vomiting and stomach cramps.

• Give them a break. Players should rest periodically, preferably in the shade.

 Athletes should have a 10 minute break for every 30 minutes spent exercising in the heat.

2, 4-D **Resistant** Soybeans being tested

Growing at the Bradford Farm Ag Experiment Station at the University of Missouri-Columbia is 2, 4-D resistant soybeans. Several agronomists have attended the Pest Management Field Day and Crop Diagnostic workshop this past month and learned of this latest research.

The use of 2,4-D soybeans would create another mode of action for weed control in soybeans. The research is being conducted by Dr. Kevin Bradley, Extension State Weed Specialists and his graduate student. Their goal is to examine how this technology would fit Missouri growers and implement this product into weed management systems.

This technology would allow growers another tool to manage hard to control broadleaf weeds in soybeans. The plots that have been viewed during touring involved using this product with other tank-mixes. The plots looked clean with tank-mix partners.

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

Counties included in the Public Infrastructure request are: Adair, Andrew, Atchison, Buchanan, Caldwell, Carroll, Cass, Chariton, Clark, Clinton, Daviess, DeKalb, Gentry, Grundy, Harrison, Holt, Howard, Jackson, Lafayette, Lewis, Livingston, Mercer, Nodaway, Putnam, Ray, Schuyler, Scotland, Sullivan and Worth.

On the Individual Assistance request, Marion County (near Hannibal) was included due to heavy Iowa rains that flooded that area. This should aid Holt County in meeting the threshold for damage per capita. Other counties included are Audrain, Callaway, Knox, Linn, Monroe, Pike, Randolph, Shelby, St. Louis and the city of St. Louis.

Governor Nixon has also asked Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack to designate 55 Missouri counties as primary disaster areas, which will permit assistance for farmers from the USDA's Farm Service Agency.

"Agriculture is a vital part of our economy, and it is essential that Missouri's farmers have the support they need to keep their operations running after being affected by storms," Governor Nixon said.



Spoils of the flood

Residents around Big Lake- Returned to their homes, as waters receded in mid July, to begin the grueling task of clean-up. Piles of household refuse can be seen in yards and ditches around homes at Big Lake. Electricity began being restored to residents when they were able to return to there homes for clean-up. Residents need to call the electric company to have the electricity turned on in their homes. The water supply to the lake was returned to residents on Sunday, July 25.



The right bin of the two grain bins- Owned by Steve Binder, Rulo, NE, south of Craig, MO, suffered extensive damage as the flood waters from the levee suddenly broke just a couple miles west of these bins. A quick levee was thrown up around the bins in an attempt to ward off the water, but with the flood waters reaching over a foot higher than 1993, it was to no avail. In addition to ruined dryer motors, the bottom two rings of the west bin burst as the grain swelled, spewing corn from the bin. Much of the 40,000 bushels of corn stored in the bin was completely ruined, while another percent may see substantial docking. The east bin, while it didn't break, saw approximately 3,500 bushels wet and damaged.
