## Mound City News expanding with web printing operation and new building

*Tarkio Avalanche and Fairfax Forum newspapers sell*

The *Mound City News* is expanding its printing capabilities to include a newspaper web printing operation. The new press is requiring a new building to be constructed just north of Mound City at the junction of Highways 59 and N. The building will house an 8-unit Goss Community web press and state-of-the-art pre-press operation, along with an additional storage area. The *Mound City News* newspaper office will not be moving its main office to the new location and will remain at 511 State Street.

With the web printing operation expansion, it will be the first time in around 50 years that any weekly newspaper has actually been printed in the county since the letterpress era. "Most small weekly newspapers are printed at the closest, or most economical daily newspaper, or at a commercial printing shop with a web press," stated Adam Johnson, owner of the *Mound City News*. "With this expansion, we look to keep more dollars in the county and hopefully bring in some new business from elsewhere in the area."

The pre-press operation will be one of the best in the area. Pre-press is the process between a finished newspaper computer file and the actual printing plate that is to be

placed on the press for printing. "Most operations this size use a traditional negative to produce printing plates. They create a negative of the page area and then expose the image onto the printing plate. After the exposure is finished, chemicals are used to wash the non-image area away from the exposed image," Adam explained. "The *Mound City News* expansion will feature a computer-to-plate system. It will go straight from the finished computer file and, using a thermal imaging laser, produce the image to the plate directly. This eliminates possible human error, which, in turn, should produce a better product. This also eliminates the use of chemicals during the plate-making process, thus providing a greener operation."

The web printing operation is expected to be up and running the first of September. The first printing customers of the new web printing operation will be the *Mound City News*, *Atchison County Mail*, *Tarkio Avalanche* and *Fairfax Forum*.

## Square Dancing

*The way it used to be*

Although rain cancelled the square dancing events at the Craig Summerfest, memories of square dancing still returned for many. Square dancing in the mid-1940's, was just that - dancing. Modern square dancing began taking the place of the old-fashioned square dancing in the sixties and seventies.

Folks from miles around would turn out in towns all around for a night of fun and dancing. Mound City's VFW building, Craig's Red and White Store, Oregon's Avon Coffman Seed Store, Maitland's Legion Hall, Forest City's City Hall, Fortescue's Opra House, Big Lake's Silver Bell, Bigelow's old grocery store, Skidmore's Legion Hall, and the old Harmony School seven miles north of Brown's Curve and towns in Kansas were host to these memorable evenings.

Warren Morris, now 87, of Mound City, MO, was a banjo player in a band that travelled from town to town, making an event happen nearly every night of the week somewhere. The banjo he played was purchased from a pawn shop for \$8.80.

Warren started with the band composed of several other self-taught musicians in 1945, with square dancing escalating to full swing by 1948.

Band members included

Fred Pierson on fiddle, Don Beasley, Paul Rhoades and Earl French on guitar, Florence Byrd was on piano and Warren Morris on banjo. Bill Gillis filled in on guitar and Macon Byrd, JR Byrd, Maurice Smith and Tim Hufford were callers for the dances.

"Fred could play for four hours and never play the same song twice," remarked Warren enthusiastically. "He was a great fiddle player."

Songs like "Soft Water Special", "Possum Up a Gum Stump", "Tennessee Wagner" and "Arkansas Traveler" were favorites for the evenings.

The evening would start around 8:00 p.m. with a large crowd on hand by 9:00 and the dance went on until midnight (or later). A full house was usually on hand often with as many as 10 to 25 squares (eight to a square) joining in the fun.

Warren remembered some dancers like Mr. and Mrs. Dale Williams, Mr. and Mrs. George Andes, Mr. and Mrs. Alton Cromer, Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Denny Deffenbaugh, Mr. and Mrs. Buck Hutton, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Huntsman, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Huntsman, Mr. and Mrs. Derbin Fleming, Mr. and Mrs. Hoot Mendenhall and Mr. and Mrs. Mel Karsten. Many other people, whose names could not be recalled, were involved in square dancing for periods of time during those 25 years.

Maurice Smith, 77, of Mound City, who started attending the dances as a sophomore in high school, remembered many of the dancers were 'singles'. They may

have been unmarried, or one of the spouses might not participate, but would watch. He recalled other dancers Colene White, Minnie Zachary, Tommy Fogg, Ordis McCall, Joyce and Jack Loucks, Malcomb Barnes, Barb Edwards, Russell Jumps and Jerry Riley.

Maurice learned how to call by dancing and listening to Macon Byrd. He said square dancing started in the country when people would go over to someone's house, move the furniture, roll up the rugs and dance.

"I liked to mix it up on them. I'd make each couple do something different," remarked Maurice of his calling days. "If they didn't pay attention, they'd get lost."

Mary Lee Privett remembers marrying Ken and coming to Mound City in 1958 and taking part in the square dancing. She vividly described her dress with the netting petticoats as being brown with turquoise braid trim.

"It was a lot of fun," commented Mary Lee. "It was good exercise and a good way to get acquainted."

Doris Griffith and her late husband Denzil enjoyed square dancing too. She remembers meeting Mary Lee at one of the square dances, "I took Mary Lee's hand on a square dance move and thought I'd broken it. It felt like a dead fish." (Mary Lee is double jointed.) Doris also remembered her dress and 'good shoes', with one able to buy a dress at Esther Fields' dress shop in town.

One of the obstacles dancers remembered was excess

drinking. One needn't be wary after the 'no drinking rule' was put into effect. When a dancer had had too much to drink, it became a problem for everyone in the square, so a rule was enacted to help alleviate the problem.

Priscilla Griffith remembers there being several squares of dancers from Mound City during the years that she and her late husband Junior danced. There were people from other communities there too and it was 'really a good time'.

Bands and square dancing soon saw the move toward obscurity, when modern square dancing became popular. Additionally, bands were replaced with the 45 rpm records.

One thing is for sure, all those who took part in the square dance days of old fondly recall the time spent "promenading" all across the county.

## ELECTION RESULTS

*Results unofficial as of press time*

Tuesday's Primary Election drew 1,147 voters to the booths in Holt County. Just under 30% of registered voters showed up to vote on primary candidates and one proposition, allowing the State of Missouri to deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance.

Prop. C, the health care proposition, saw 902 yes votes and 192 no votes. The Holt County Collector race for the Republican primary held the only other real race. Donna Cotton received 607 votes and Cindy Wohlford received 400.

Holt County Republicans voted Roy Blunt for U.S. Senator, Tom Schweich for State Auditor, Sam Graves for U.S. Representative Dist. 6.

Republican candidates running unopposed were Vicki Book for Circuit Clerk, Gay Quick for Treasurer, Robert Shepherd for Prosecuting Attorney, Kathy Kunkel for County Clerk, Mark Sitherwood for Presiding Commissioner, Wm. S. Richards for Associate Circuit Judge, Mike Thomson for State Representative Dist. 4, and Brad Lager for State Senator Dist. 12.

Holt County Democrats voted Robin Carnahan for U.S. Senator, Susan Montee for State Auditor, Clint Hylton for U.S. Representative Dist. 6, and Robert Ritterbusch State Representative Dist. 4.

These candidates winning the primary elections will be running for offices in November.

## Continued from front Family owned newspapers sell to cousins

The *Tarkio Avalanche* and *Fairfax Forum* newspapers in Atchison County are under new ownership effective with last week's issue, July 29, 2010. W.C. and Mike Farmer of Rock Port, MO, have purchased the *Tarkio Avalanche* and *Fairfax Forum*. After nearly 30 years of publishing the *Tarkio Avalanche*, Will and Joy Johnson are making a change.

Back in 1978, Bill and Marilyn Farmer purchased the *St. Clair County Courier* in Osceola, MO, as well as the *Appleton City Journal* in Appleton City, MO. That purchase started an era of newspaper publishing in the Farmer/Johnson families.

In 1979, at the age of 21, the Farmers' nephew, Will Johnson, started as publisher of the *Appleton City Journal*. At that time, he was the youngest publisher in the state of Missouri. Will spent the next year publishing the *Journal*.

Will was courting hometown girl, Joy Eldridge, at the time he was publishing the *Journal*. In August, 1980, the two were married. Joy graduated from SMSU in Springfield in December, 1980. After Joy's graduation from college, the two spent some time looking for a newspaper in Missouri to purchase. The quest took the young couple to several communities in the state before settling in Tarkio. Will and Joy purchased the *Tarkio Avalanche* in June, 1981, from Annette Secor.

In 1984, John Henry Cox of Rock Port, MO, approached Will and Joy, asking them if they were interested in purchasing the *Atchison County Mail*. "At the time John Henry asked if I was interested in purchasing the Mail, I was in no position to secure the funds to make the purchase," Will said. "I remember that the first thing I thought of was that Bill and Marilyn might be interested. They had sold the *St. Clair County Courier* and *Appleton City Journal* in 1982 after I came to Tarkio and were teaching school. I called Bill and said, "Hey, you want to get back in the publishing business?" Bill called John Henry and negotiated the sale, moving his family to Rock Port in 1984.

When the Farmer family moved to Rock Port, W.C. was 15 years old and Mike was 13. Since that time, the Farmers have called Atchison County, MO, their home.

W.C. and Mike grew up in the newspaper business and have experienced many changes in the industry over the years. They both graduated from Rock Port High School and received their bachelor's degrees from Doane College in Crete, Nebraska.

After college, both W.C. and Mike continued to work at the family business, the *Atchison County Mail*. W.C. has taken over the duties as publisher at the *Mail* and has added a photography business, W.C. Farmer Photography, which is more of a passion of W.C.'s than work. Alongside W.C. is his wife, Shauna. They have three children, Chandler, Kaleigh and Makenna.

In 2000, when Bill announced his intention to retire, Mike moved back to Atchison County, and started working at the *Mail* office again. In 2003, Mike married Lisa Stokes, adding not only Lisa to the Farmer family, but also her son, Jason. Together, Mike and Lisa have a son, Holden.

"It's no retirement for us," Will said, "just a change in jobs." Will and Joy will be working part-time in Mound City, MO, for their son, Adam, at the *Mound City News*. "We are at a point in our lives that we must be more flexible with our time. We'd like to be able to spend more time with our parents," Will commented. "The seven day a week commitment to the two newspapers sometimes did not allow for us to be away when we needed to be, and with the web printing operation in Mound City, we will be able to work less hours," Will went on to say.

"We look forward to bringing this business to the Mound City area. At this point, my parents and I will

be teaming up on both the newspaper and printing businesses. The added flexibility of them being here should make the transition seamless," Adam commented.

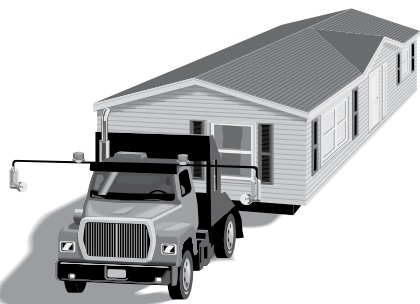

## Kurtz Aviation pulling double take

Garold Kurtz, owner of Kurtz Rural Aviation in Mound City, received help from a look-alike plane this season. Thad Cooper, from Louisiana, has been helping Garold for the past two weeks apply fungicide during this critical application time frame.

Thad was introduced to Garold through a mutual friend, and Thad, whose plane appears identical to that of Garold's, came to Mound City to help. Thad has been a crop duster for the past four years. Most interesting, however, is the flying experience that has taken him to "fields" far and away as a missionary pilot.

Thad began his mission-

ary work participating on Macedonia mission trips to Honduras. While on these missions, Thad and other team members observed the many remote villages in the mountains that needed their attention as well. After five years of backpacking and mules because of no roads in Honduras, Thad decided there had to be an easier way - fly in.

Thad began to research Mission Aviators, where he learned the many facets of becoming a licensed mission aviator. After approximately four years of attending AMP (Aviation Maintenance Professional) school, language school, culture school and seminary,

Thad was officially a Missionary Pilot.

Thad became part of the CIA (Christians in Action), which does mission work in Shell, Ecuador. It was there that a group of missionaries who journeyed to the heart of the Amazon jungle in search of the Waodani, a fierce tribe of warriors, was murdered in 1950. The movie, "The End of the Spear", was released in 2006 about the event. Mickey, who was one of the original tribal members involved in the missionary massacre and now a Christian, works with the missionaries in the deep Amazon as a translator.

Thad, who flies missions for CIA and Extreme Missionary Adventures (XMA), has many a story about the missions. "He is a very interesting person," Renee and Garold Kurtz remarked of Thad's many mission experiences and his heart for the people. "He really loves people and he's willing to make that sacrifice."

One story was of an 80 year-old woman in a remote Amazon village who, speaking through Mickey, told the missionaries, "I've been waiting all my life for you to come." Thad stated, "There are people who want to hear, if one is brave enough to take the gospel there."

Thad continues to fly mission trips further into the remote areas, where landing areas have been chopped out by villages that are just wide enough for the wings. During the winter, Thad and his wife, Wendy, and four children live in Louisiana where he is an instructor for Aerial Application in Louisiana.

bridge over North Fork of Highly Creek closed.

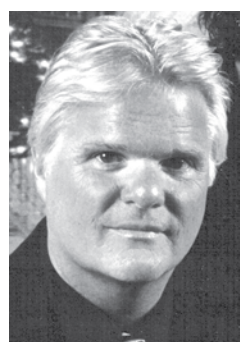

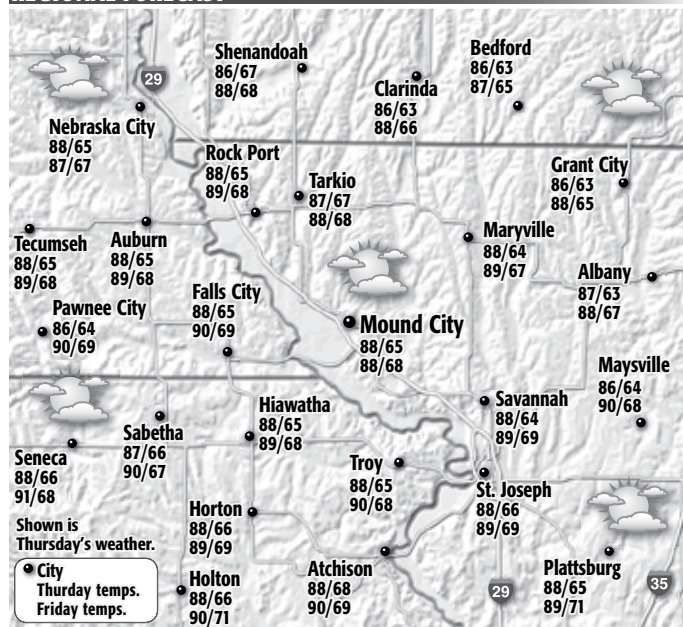

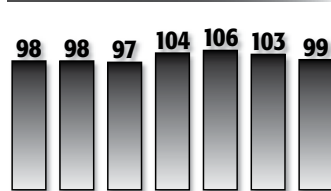

# Tech Talk

Have you ever tried to access webmail only to find that none of your emails are there? Most people don't realize that once your email is downloaded to your home computer, you can't access it from webmail when you're away from home. The good news is, you can change a few settings and now be able to access your emails on webmail even if they've been downloaded on your home computer. Here's what you do:

If you're using Outlook 2007, follow these 7 steps: 1) Go to the Tools menu and click on Account Settings. 2) Select the Email account and click on the Change button. 3) Click on the More Settings button. 4) Click on Advanced tab in the lower section; check the box beside "leave a copy of messages on the server". 5) Check the box beside your choice of amount of days or when you delete the email from your deleted items (this is

your preference). 6) Click OK. 7) Click Next and then click the Finish button.

If you're using Outlook 2003 or older, use the following steps: 1) Go to the Tools menu and click on Email Accounts. 2) Select View or Change Existing Accounts. 3) Select the Email account, click the Change button. 4) Click the More Settings button. 5) Click on Advanced tab in the lower section; check the box beside "Leave a copy of messages on the server". 6) Check the box beside your choice of amount of days or when you delete the email from your deleted items (this is your preference). 7) Click the OK button. 8) Click Next and then click the Finish button. Now you can access your emails from anywhere.

Here's another quick tip. Want to send a message to someone without the other email recipients knowing? Use the Bcc line (Bcc stands for blind carbon copy). If you add someone's name to the Bcc line a copy of the message will be sent to that person, but his or her name is not visible to the other email recipients. If you don't see the Bcc line when you open a new email, go to the Options tab and select Show Bcc (or just Bcc, depending on which Outlook version you are using), then it should appear.

**2, 4-D  
Resistant  
Soybeans  
being tested**

Growing at the Bradford Farm Ag Experiment Station at the University of Missouri-Columbia is 2, 4-D resistant soybeans. Several agronomists have attended the Pest Management Field Day and Crop Diagnostic workshop this past month and learned of this latest research.

The use of 2,4-D soybeans would create another mode of action for weed control in soybeans. The research is being conducted by Dr. Kevin Bradley, Extension State Weed Specialists and his graduate student. Their goal is to examine how this technology would fit Missouri growers and implement this product into weed management systems.

This technology would allow growers another tool to manage hard to control broadleaf weeds in soybeans. The plots that have been viewed during touring involved using this product with other tank-mixes. The plots looked clean with tank-mix partners.

**The right steps can help mothers  
succeed at breastfeeding**

*August is Missouri Breastfeeding Month*

Health experts see an increase in breastfeeding when new mothers follow the right steps.

Helping women take those steps is a priority at Hannibal Regional Hospital, the first hospital in Missouri to be designated "baby-friendly" by a program working to increase breastfeeding rates nationwide.

"Prior to adopting the baby-friendly practices about a year ago, we had about 62 percent of mothers starting to breastfeed," said Dr. Sandra Ahlum, an obstetrician at Hannibal Regional Hospital. "Now that number has increased to about 77 percent."

Even women who don't plan to breastfeed, Ahlum said, often change their minds once the first step toward breastfeeding is taken - when the baby is put "skin-to-skin" with the mother immediately after

birth.

Mothers who have given birth at Hannibal Regional Hospital say they appreciated the hospital's support of breastfeeding.

"There is nothing like having your own baby and nursing," said Erica Barnes, whose son, Truitt, was born June 28. "It's such a special bond just between the two of us. It's the best thing we can possibly do for Truitt."

Hannibal Regional is the only Missouri hospital certified as baby-friendly by the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative. The designation recognizes a hospital for adopting recommended steps to help women successfully breastfeed.

The steps to successful breastfeeding are the focus of this year's Missouri Breastfeeding Month, observed annually in August,

and World Breastfeeding Week, Aug. 1-7.

"Breast milk contains most of the nutrients a baby needs for the first six months," said Margaret Donnelly, director of the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services. "Ideally, babies should continue to be breastfed - even while solid food is being introduced - until they are at least a year old."

Nursing mothers can take several steps to establish consistent feeding and ensure a good milk supply:

- Breastfeed within the first hour. Ask for the baby to be put skin-to-skin right after birth.

- Room in with your baby. Keep the baby in your room all day and night so you can get to know your baby's early signs of hunger.

- Breastfeed on demand. When a newborn roots, makes sucking sounds, puts fist to mouth, or is starting to wake, this is a signal to feed your baby.

- No bottles or pacifiers. Bottles and pacifiers often interfere with breastfeeding and cause babies not to nurse frequently enough.

- Breastfeed exclusively. Providing only breast milk protects your milk supply and gives you and your newborn time to learn how to breastfeed.

"Right after she was born she laid with me skin-to-skin and nursed for about two hours," said Lissa Biggs, who delivered her daughter, Lucy, at Hannibal Regional Hospital on July 12. "It made a big difference having her in the room, knowing that I am reading the signs that she is hungry, rather than waiting for a nurse to tell me."

Babies benefit from breastfeeding in a number of ways, Donnelly said. Breastfed babies:

- Have fewer health problems such as diarrhea, ear infections, respiratory infections and urinary tract infections.

- Have fewer problems with allergies and asthma.

- Are less likely to become obese as they grow older.

Mothers benefit as well. Breastfeeding boosts a woman's immune system, reduces bleeding after childbirth and helps a mother return sooner to her pre-pregnancy weight. Mothers who breastfeed also are at lower risk of developing breast, uterine and ovarian cancer.

## Nixon requests disaster declaration

Governor Jay Nixon requested a major disaster declaration for several Missouri counties including Holt on Wednesday, July 28. The requests have been forwarded to FEMA Region 7, and then the requests will move on for approval by President Obama. The requests include \$1.5 million in Individual Assistance and \$1.4 mil-

lion in Public Infrastructure Assistance.

It appears at this time that the threshold has been met for Public Infrastructure, but the declaration must still be approved.

Counties included in the Public Infrastructure request are: Adair, Andrew, Atchison, Buchanan, Caldwell, Carroll, Cass, Chariton, Clark, Clinton, Daviess, DeKalb, Gentry, Grundy, Harrison, Holt, Howard, Jackson, Lafayette, Lewis, Livingston, Mercer, Nodaway, Putnam, Ray, Schuyler, Scotland, Sullivan and Worth.

On the Individual Assistance request, Marion County (near Hannibal) was included due to heavy Iowa rains that flooded that area. This should aid Holt County in meeting the threshold for damage per capita. Other counties included are Audrain, Callaway, Knox, Linn, Monroe, Pike, Randolph, Shelby, St. Louis and the city of St. Louis.

Governor Nixon has also asked Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack to designate 55 Missouri counties as primary disaster areas, which will permit assistance for farmers from the USDA's Farm Service Agency.

"Agriculture is a vital part of our economy, and it is essential that Missouri's farmers have the support they need to keep their operations running after being affected by storms," Governor Nixon said.



## Spoils of the flood

**Residents around Big Lake-** Returned to their homes, as waters receded in mid July, to begin the grueling task of clean-up. Piles of household refuse can be seen in yards and ditches around homes at Big Lake. Electricity began being restored to residents when they were able to return to their homes for clean-up. Residents need to call the electric company to have the electricity turned on in their homes. The water supply to the lake was returned to residents on Sunday, July 25.



**The right bin of the two grain bins-** Owned by Steve Binder, Rulo, NE, south of Craig, MO, suffered extensive damage as the flood waters from the levee suddenly broke just a couple miles west of these bins. A quick levee was thrown up around the bins in an attempt to ward off the water, but with the flood waters reaching over a foot higher than 1993, it was to no avail. In addition to ruined dryer motors, the bottom two rings of the west bin burst as the grain swelled, spewing corn from the bin. Much of the 40,000 bushels of corn stored in the bin was completely ruined, while another percent may see substantial docking. The east bin, while it didn't break, saw approximately 3,500 bushels wet and damaged.
