



## Letter to the Editor

Letter to the Editor,

I've spent my entire adult life as a northwest Missouri farmer. I've supported my school, my county, my state, and the United States of America with my tax money since I was 18 years old. In that time I've done what I could for my community by taking part in local government, but mostly what I've done for the last 40 years is work for a living.

Like everyone knows by the time they reach their sixth decade of life, making a living is sometimes easier said than done.

But my family has been lucky. We've stayed with the farm through good times and bad. And we have seen some bad times, but never anything as bad as what we have brewing in our nation today.

Anyone who thinks that Missouri will be insulated from financial pain should think again.

For the last four years the Missouri General Assembly has played politics. It's been pretty hard to find much in the way of bi-partisan action. This year was the worst of the worst when majority Representatives chose to raise their pay and eliminate campaign contribution limits in the same session.

Now the financial bailout of private business by the Federal government threatens a lot of the federal aid our state and local governments rely on.

The coming years will require a level of leadership that has been lacking in Jefferson City for four years.

We have state blacktops that are crumbling. We have bridges right here in the 4th District with concrete so rotten the reinforcing steel shows through. They've been that way for quite awhile. There are schools that can't afford to pay teachers a salary equal to their level of education, or even to heat their buildings as we head into winter with record high fuel prices. Our county governments are facing the same situation.

Even the cost to small towns of keeping the street lights burning and controlling stray pets has risen to the point that they pose

There is much we need, but one thing we don't need is a bunch of Senators and Representatives who think of their paychecks and their campaign accounts ahead of doing their jobs.

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## Prioritizing phosphorus and potassium

The increase in crop input you can afford. prices has many growers concerned about what might happen if commodity prices drop. The cost of phosphorus and potassium fertilizers has increased dramatically and are at record highs. Swings in crop yields and prices provide a great amount of risk into the profitability of the operation. The need for sound planning is more important than ever.

fertilizer applications

The use of fertilizers should be used to obtain the greatest return on investment rather than to maximize yields. First, prioritize what nutrients are limiting crop yields. This is addressed by using a good soil testing program across your row crop, pasture and hay acres.

Yes, this is simple but often overlooked. We often see growers applying fertilizer rates that have traditionally been applied in the past. Our suggested strategy is to apply phosphorus and potassium fertilizers by using soil testing to determine the soils ability to supply nutrients to the crop. There may be one or more nutrients limiting yields. Also, soil tests will help us identify areas where we need to apply fertilizers maximize yields.

Once you determine what nutrients limit the crop yields, the next step is to correct this limitation by developing a strategy that meets the needs of the crop that

For example, if phosphorus levels are low and all other nutrients are adequate, then adding potassium would not help to increase yield. This is simple but this is often ignored. If both nutrients are limiting, then it is better to apply at least a portion of every limiting nutrient rather than focusing on one.

If soil test values are well above a point where a response will not be expected, one may eliminate the nutrient and use the fertilizer dollars in a field or portion of field that will generate a return on investment.

So the strategy is to apply nutrients to portions of the field that have the highest likelihood of vield response rather than applying an average amount across the entire field. We are maximizing the greatest return on investment while maximizing yields.

Another strategy would be to focus different fertilizer applications on different fields. Often fields vary in phosphorus and potassium levels. This may provide an opportunity to prioritize different fields for phosphorus and potassium applications.

science students. The new Craig Math and Science Club will be recycling paper, plastic, and aluminum items again this year. The club now has a cosponsor, Ms. Heitman, along with math teacher Melanie Brandon. Students must be enrolled in either a science or math class to participate and be in grades 7-12. An initial collection of 100 lbs. of recyclables substitutes for dues.

The club was created with the thought of promoting an interest in math and science, while instilling a lesson about responsible living and the importance of caring for the environment through recycling.

Students collect recyclable paper (cardboard, newspapers, magazines, junk mail, office paper, and paper students have used for classroom assignments and homework), plastics (#1 and #2), and alu-

As the recyclables are received from each club member, they are weighed and total number of pounds collected is recorded. The materials are then deposited in a roll-off container provided by Williams' Recycling. Upon notification, Williams' Recycling picks up the recyclables free of charge.

The total weight of recyclables collected is added together each year. The three seniors collecting the largest amounts will receive scholarships.

The public is welcome to participate. It is important to assist the club by pre-sorting recyclables. Paper items should be sorted into the following three categories:

Cardboard: corrugated cardboard, cardboard pop boxes, and items like cereal boxes and cracker boxes.

Office paper: typing paper (of any color), notebook paper, and envelopes. Note: We no typing paper and colored typ ing paper.

The club cannot accept carbon paper, things that are laminated, or soiled items such as used tissue and greasy pizza boxes. However, lids from the pizza boxes are usually acceptable.

Bottles and jugs should be sorted into two categories, #1's and #2's. These numbers are usually found on the bottom of each container. Milk jugs must be thoroughly rinsed.

Recyclables can be sent to the Craig school with a student or can be delivered personally after school until 4:00 p.m. on most days.


Last year parents and community members helped collect \$611.70 in cash from box tops and over 24,000 points in soup labels. The school received great classroom help from this community collection.



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

Time to plant spring best if the bulbs are given half the soil and add wa- for tulips as soon as they are available. Keep tulips in a cool, dark place and

Divide perennials, especially spring bloomers. Enrich the soil with peat moss or compost before replant-

Divide peonies now. Replant in a sunny site and avoid planting deeply.

Lift gladiolus when their leaves vellow. Cure in an airy place until dry before husking.

Begin forcing poinsettias to bloom at the end of the month. Place plants in a cool, dark room or closet from 5 p.m. until 8 a.m. for about 8 weeks or until top leaves turn red.

Fruit

Pick pears before they are fully mature. Store in a cool, dark basement to ripen.

Discard any spoiled or fallen fruits.

Check along peach tree trunks to just below the soil line for gummy masses caused by borers. Probe holes with thin wire to puncture borers.
