# Food pantry to open on September 12, aims to serve more

In the sanctuary of the former Community of Christ Church at 1410 Nebraska Street in Mound City, industrial shelving units are being installed near rows of empty pews. Barbara Hanlon hopes that soon both will be full.

The director of the local Food Pantry, Hanlon, Pastor Brian Lemcke and a small group of volunteers decided to continue a food pantry when Helen Runnels, who previously ran a pantry from the Baptist Church, retired.

Hanlon stressed that although local churches

are working to keep the pantry going, she hopes it becomes a community effort. She pointed out that hunger can affect anyone.

"It affects the community in a lot of ways," Hanlon said. "Those in need are either in a minimum wage job or they have no job ... some people are one flat tire away from going broke."

The previous food pantry fed about 30 people per month, but Hanlon noted that there have been some policy changes that aim to help more people fill in nutritional gaps.

"We are doing something different. We are opening it up to the working poor so we are going up above poverty level. That will include people who work in minimum wage jobs. That previously was not the case," state Hanlon.

To be able to visit the food pantry, individuals will have to bring a photo identification (ID), proof of residency and income verification. After being checked in to the waiting area, people will have the opportunity to shop for their food.


"Where the pews are, there will be a waiting area, and we are going to have the shelves placed so that we're having one person at a time come in and get their food so that it's a private type thing," Hanlon said.

The head of the household will receive 10 pounds of food per month; every subsequent member will receive 5 pounds. The food pantry is set to open Friday, September 12, and will be open twice a month on the second and fourth Fridays from 2 to 6 p.m.

Donations to the food pantry shelves are more than welcome and may be dropped off at the Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Mound City or call 660-442-0106.





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### **Kunkel trades plains for Chinese farmland**

In the heat of summer (July 5-22), Kathy J. Kunkel, Holt County Clerk, bid farewell to the Midwest to travel to the Middle Kingdom: China.

"[I was there] for 17 days," Kunkel said. "It was a fantastic trip to China."

Kunkel's journey, however, began a couple of years ago, when she first joined Agricultural Leadership of Tomorrow (ALOT).


"It's a two-year statewide agricultural leadership and development program," she explained.

Unlike the other participants, who endured an application process and around \$5,000 in fees, Kunkel was asked by the ALOT Board of Directors to be a part of the

"It gave me a platform to be able to talk about the Missouri River, flooding [and] the economic impact," she

That knowledge of the river, of the levees and the barge system, and Kunkel's agricultural background ("I'm a farm girl, born and bred," she said), made for an easy foundation when she stepped off the bus to the farmlands of Yinchuan, located in China's Ningxia province.

The point of the trip, the culmination of two years of

are abundant in Missouri, but they don't grow well in China. If the two were to develop an import/export program using existing barges, it would be possible to transport the Show-Me State's crops to a country lacking in the necessary agricultural resources.

"My focus has always been on increasing the local market for soybeans," Kunkel said. "It's a resource we already have... Missouri has a huge market for soybeans."

Ideally, she'd like to use farmers' crops in a four-state region (Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas) to "add premium to local farmers and to the direct market."

"It helps Missouri," Kun-

Planning is still in the early stages, but Kunkel's trip to China helped plant the seed for the possibility of a direct export of soybeans to China from the four-state area mentioned above.

And although Kunkel spent the bulk of her time working, she did get the chance to be a tourist, if only for a couple of hours at a time; she took roughly 3.000 photos, visited the terracotta warriors in Xian, tasted a variety of Chinese dishes, and saw the process of pearl farming.

"I brought back pearls [for my daughters]," she said.

### Ambulance runs off road and overturns south of Tarkio

No one was injured Tuesday, August 26, 2014, after an Atchison-Holt ambulance ran off the road and overturned while attempting to avoid hitting another vehicle that stopped in the driving lane. The accidents occurred around 9:25 a.m.

A 2008 Dodge 3500 ambulance, driven by Ricky Lee Mitchell, age 44, of Fairfax, Mo., was traveling southbound on U.S. Hwy. 59 south of Tarkio, Mo., in Atchison County when a white pickup (unknown) stopped in the driving lane in front of the ambulance. In an attempt to avoid striking the pickup, Mitchell crossed the center of the roadway,

overcorrected and ran off the right side of the roadway. The ambulance overturned and came to rest on the driver's side.

Mitchell, who was wearing a seat belt, suffered no apparent injuries. The Atchison-Holt ambulance received extensive damage and was towed from the scene by Double D Towing of Mound City. The accident was investigated by the Missouri State Highway

Gene Bradley, director of the Atchison-Holt Ambulance District, said that this is the first time in 12 years that there has been an accident in the fleet.

"We average about 100,000 to 110,000 miles a year for the fleet, so that's a pretty good safety record. It's unfortunate, but he is okay," Bradley said. Bradley added that Mitchell received some "bumps and bruises" from the wreck, but has no other inju-

According to Bradley, Mitchell reported that the pickup slammed on its brakes to avoid hitting dogs that were in the road.

Due to the damage the vehicle sustained in the accident, the district will have to purchase another ambulance, Bradley commented.

### Two fatalities result from accident east of Oregon

August 28, 2014, six miles east of Oregon, Mo., on U.S. Hwy. 59 when the driver of a 2002 Jeep Grand Cherokee crossed the center of the roadway and struck an oncoming Dodge Caravan.

The driver of the Grand Cherokee, Jana B. Parsons, 48, of Forest City, Mo., was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Holt County Coroner Susan Lentz. The driver of the Dodge Caravan, Michael Ginn, 61, of Independence, Mo., was transported via air evacuation to Heartland Hospital in St. Joseph, Mo., where he was pronounced dead by Dr.

A fatal accident occurred Thursday, J. Simpson. Ginn's passenger, Joseph W. Derr, age 67, also of Independence, was seriously injured and transported to Heartland Hospital by the Andrew County Emergency Medical Service (EMS).

> Parsons was westbound while Ginn was eastbound on U.S. 59 at approximately 2:59 p.m. when the head-on collision occurred. The Parsons vehicle came to rest in the roadway facing southwest with the Ginn vehicle traveling off the south side of the roadway, coming to rest in the ditch facing northeast.

> All victims were wearing seat belts. The vehicles were totaled and towed

from the scene by Double D Towing of Mound City.

Missouri State Highway Patrol Trooper C.J. Sullivan and Major Crash Investigation Unit Sgt. H.A. Sears investigated the accident. They were assisted by Sgt. M.P. Quilty, Cpl. R.J. Helfers, Cpl. S.E. Pritzel, Cpl. T.L. Williams, the Holt County Sheriff's Department, the Andrew County EMS, the Atchison-Holt Ambulance Service, the Holt County Coroner, the Mound City Rural Fire Department and the South Holt Rural Fire Department as well as the air evacuation service.



# This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

### 50 Years Ago - 1964

- Mound City's schools opened with the largest number ever recorded enrolled in the twelve classes for the term. The total in all grades was 478. This was 47 more pupils than was the case the prior year, and the additional number was primarily due to the annexation of the Bellevue District. Of the 478 current students, records showed that 420 were eating at the lunch room, which certainly necessitated a mammoth operation in that department.
- The protection of the giant Canada Goose, thought extinct, was the reason for the hunting days' reduction in the Squaw Creek area.
- Don Beesley and the Country Gentlemen walked away with first place honors at the National Old Time Fiddlers and Country Music Contest held in Brownville, Nebraska. It was the fourth time this musical organization had won top honors there. The musical group was composed of: Don Beesley, Fortescue, guitar and vocalist; Paul Rhoades, Craig, rhythm guitar; Charles Litherbury, Fairfax, electric bass; Ronnie Burson, Quitman, drums; and Dean Thompson, Sioux City, Iowa, steel guitar.

### 25 Years Ago - 1989

- Opening day enrollment at Holt County R-II took a drop after three years of little fluctuation. Total enrollment for K-12 was 342, which was down 11 from opening figures in 1988.
- The State Theater Arts Council planned to give tours on Market Square Day to show the public the progress that had been made in the restoration project.
- South Holt was going to try for a repeat of the state 8-man football title. The team would return 32 with the following 10 seniors: Randy Dozier, Jason Fansher, Dennis Guyer, Jim Hurst, Chris Jones, Mike Messick, Ray Ottman, Jarod Scroggins, Zach Thompson, and Brian Williams. The Craig Hornets would be returning to competition after sitting out a year due to low numbers. They would play mostly a junior varsity schedule. Craig seniors playing were Jon Russell, Casey Radley, and Chris Holt.
- Enrollment numbers at Craig R-III broke a three-year downward spiral by showing a slight increase. The K-12 enrollment was 166 for the 1989-90 opening day.

### 10 Years Ago - 2004

- New staff members at Nodaway-Holt were Dan Sinkhorn, Kodi Keiffer and Kathy DeVault.
- Mike Leach was the new principal at South Holt High School. Other staff members new to South Holt included Lindy Holt, Jackie Scott, Melody Alford, Kim Johnson, and Brent Snyder.
- A summer Youth Rodeo Series at the Fogg arena northeast of Mound City drew contestants "from all over," said Shirley Fogg. A total of 96 contestants participated in the seven rodeos.
- Enrollment at the four Holt County school districts was close to last year's, with the exception of South Holt Elementary, which was down 19 students to 136. South Holt's K-12 enrollment was 328, Craig R-III was 122, Mound City was 284, and Nodaway-Holt was 261.
- The Rev. Karl Forehand was to start as pastor at Big Lake Baptist Church. He had been the supply pastor since June, when Pastor David Johnson left.

### Exchange student enjoys friendly atmosphere

Being the new kid in school can be difficult - and even more so when your classmates don't speak your native language. For Vicente Soto that doesn't seem to be the case.

Soto, a Chilean foreign exchange student, has only been in Mound City for about a month, but he's already a member of the football team, an honorary Homecoming candidate and has made friends. Soto is being hosted through the Kim and Donnie Ireland family in Mound City. Kim says she enjoys watching the foreign exchange students that they host make new friends.

"Vicente's made some good friends," Kim said. "He's playing football and the boys that are playing with him have been really awesome. Ben and Blake Shifflett have been great to help him feel included in what the kids do."

Although Soto does speak English, Kim said sometimes there is still a language barrier between him and his classmates, but they have quickly overcome it.

"To watch him gain friendships, even though there has been a language barrier at times because of his English, the kids still find ways to communicate with each other," Kim

Soto is from the capital city of Santiago, which is also home to 6.3 million people. Although Mound City is much smaller, Soto said he likes how friendly everyone is here.

"The people are very happy here," he said. Soto also said that his favorite subject in school is math and in his spare time he likes

to play tennis. Although there are some similarities between his school in Chile and here, he noted the biggest difference. "It's very different, he said. "First you can go outside the school for lunch."

Soto said that when he began school in Mound City, it would have been easier to communicate with classmates if they spoke Spanish, but it's getting easier to talk to his classmates and friends here.


Soto is the first student that the Irelands have hosted from South America. Previously, they have hosted two students from Europe, but this year the family decided to make a change.

### Soybean fields across the state falling victim to sudden death syndrome

Sudden death syndrome (SDS) is showing up in soybean fields across the state. Farmers should scout fields thoroughly for symptoms of SDS.

Regional Agronomist Wavne Flanary states that in scouting area crop fields, SDS is the worst that state agronomists have seen. The severity of damage and soybean yield reduction is impacted when soybeans are in grain fill stage including pod set and pod

Yellow compaction, may help prevent the areas may turn brown, but veins remain green. As the disease advances, leaves turn brown and may curl up or fall off the plant.

Root systems deteriorate and lateral roots and taproots may be discolored. When split open, internal tissues of the taproot and lower stem may be light gray to light brown. Infected plants may have smaller root systems and clumps of dusty blue mold growth may be visible on the taproot.

Several diseases may look alike, so growers have to get into the field, Sweets says.

SDS appears in fields with high soil moisture. This year, a wet, cool spring followed by the second-coolest July on record created conditions favorable for SDS in much of Missouri.

High numbers of early season soybean root rot due to weather conditions may have been a precursor to SDS, said MU Plant Diagnostic Clinic Director Patricia Wallace. "SDS is a big problem this year," she said.

The disease sometimes appears as a circular or oval area of yellow or dying plants in fields. It may appear in irregular or wavy streaks that follow drainage patterns in the field.

Little can be done once plants are infected. Weather over the rest of this growing season influences







### **Craig and Mound** City settle into co-op agreement

After announcing an Nodaway-Holt. agreement to cooperate (co-op) for all sports last November, 2013, Craig and Mound City schools have begun their joint venture. Fall sports are underway and all seems to be going well.

Korey Miles, the principal and athletic director for Mound City, said that co-oping has been beneficial to student athletes who might not be able to play some sports if student numbers are too low to offer those sports. Co-oping has become popular at many rural schools.

"It's becoming more common in the smaller schools. There's actually three co-ops, I believe, within our conference for football," Miles said.

"It's been a great cooperative together for Mound City and Craig so far. The kids get along great and the parents have been very supportive of the kids and the teams," Miles said. "It's been a great experience. The kids really enjoy it and I think it's been a great time for both schools to get together and work towards having a good program."

Craig and Mound City entered a co-op agreement after Fairfax, which formerly co-oped with Craig, decided to co-op with Tarkio.

"Craig had come to us with an interest," Miles said. "Craig's numbers are low and school officials were wanting to find a team that would be willing to co-op with them. We were willing to bring them in and help them out.'

Mound City and Craig then decided to co-op for all high school and junior high sports. Mound City is also co-oping its junior high football with

The Mound City and Craig co-op isn't the only new sports agreement this year. As stated previously, Tarkio and Fairfax are co-oping for football and North Nodaway and West Nodaway have cooped for all sports. Additionally, South Holt and Tarkio have co-oped for wrestling.

Mound City and Craig students will be able to participate in cross country, football and volleyball in the fall; basketball in the winter; and track and golf in the spring; as well as cheerleading.

Ken Eaton, the superintendent and president of the Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSH-SAA) agreed with Miles that co-oping is a positive agreement that benefits students. Eaton estimated that in Missouri, there are approximately 50 co-ops for football alone.

"It's been good to give kids the opportunity to participate," Eaton said. Miles added that, ultimately, co-oping is in the best interest of students.

"We are always trying to make decisions that are best for the kids," Miles said. "It's an agreement that allows kids to have opportunities that they wouldn't have if they didn't co-op."

Junior high co-op agreements are one year agreements, while high school coops last for two years.

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### Recount on right-to-farm vote has started

Missouri's secretary of state has ordered a recount of the Aug. 5 vote on Constitutional Amendment 1.

The measure was approved by a margin of 2,490 votes out of nearly 1,000,000 votes cast -a difference of slightly more than two-tenths of a percentage point (50.12 percent in support to 49.87 percent opposed).

Missouri law provides a recount can be demanded if the difference is one-half of a percentage point.

Counties have until Sept. 11 to report the recount results. The secretary of state's deadline for certifying the recount is Sept. 15.

The measure would establish "the right of farmers and ranchers to engage in farming and ranching practices."

Although promoted by the agriculture industry, the proposal had been opposed by advocates for environmental protection and humane treatment of animals.
